The minutes of the stated meeting, and of the executive session of May 4, were read and approved.

The Committee of Finance and Audit, through its Chairman, William Dowd, reported their examination and audit of bills contained in vouchers Nos. 2593 to 2612, inclusive; and on his motion the same were approved, and ordered certified to the Comptroller for payment.

The President reported to the Commissioners an opinion of the Counsel to the Corporation, bearing date May 6, in regard to the matters presented to him by the Special Committee composed of the President and the Chairman of the Committee on Construction, and the opinion was read; the concluding clause of which is as follows:

"Second—The Aqueduct Act (section 28) provides that the Commissioners may select the bid or proposal, the acceptance of which will, in their judgment, best secure the efficient performance of the work.

"You are under no obligation, therefore, to accept the bid of the lowest bidder. Whether or not the higher one shall be selected, however, is a matter resting in the discretion of the Commission, and to be determined by them after a full consideration of the question from every point of view. You are entitled to take into consideration the likelihood of delay or embarrassment in the completion of the work by reason of the carrying on of engineering operations at the same place by different contractors, or any other administrative difficulties which may be worthy of consideration.

"Such consideration and determination, however, are for the Aqueduct Commissioners and not for the Counsel to the Corporation."

Whereupon Commissioner Barnes offered the following resolution, and moved its adoption: Whereas, It is the opinion of the Chief Engineer, and also of the Consulting Engineer of this Commission, that delay and embarrassment in the completion of the work on Section 7 would ensue if engineering operations by other parties than O'Brien & Clark should be put upon their Section No. 7 to perform the work of excavation of Shaft No. 13½; therefore

Resolved, That the contract for said Shaft No. 13½ be awarded to said O'Brien & Clark, according to their bid for the same.

The resolution was adopted by the following vote:

Affirmative—Commissioners Spencer, Baldwin, Barnes, Ridgway, and Fish—5.

Negative—Commissioner Dowd and the Commissioner of Public Works—2.

The Commissioners then adjourned.

*Minutes of Stated Meeting of the Aqueduct Commissioners, held at their office, No. 209 Stewart Building, on Wednesday, May 4, 1887, at 3 o'clock P. M.*

Present—Commissioners Spencer, Dowd, the Commissioner of Public Works, and Commissioners Baldwin, Barnes, Ridgway, and Fish.

Also, Chief Engineer Church and Chief Engineer Birdsall, of the Department of Public Works.

The minutes of the stated meeting of April 27, and of the adjourned meeting of May 2 were read and approved.

Commissioner Fish stated that he was unavoidably absent from the meeting of April 27, and that if he had been present he would have voted in favor of the report of the Committee on Construction, adopted by the Commissioners on that day, on the subject of allowances for excavation; as he had always been of opinion that it was a matter for the Chief Engineer to determine according to the contract.

On motion, the Secretary was directed to record Mr. Fish as voting in favor of the adoption of said report.

Commissioner Dowd then moved that a copy of the communications received from O'Brien & Clark and Brown, Howard & Co., and referred to in the minutes of May 2, be transmitted to the Comptroller. Carried.

The Committee of Finance and Audit, through its chairman, William Dowd, reported their examination and audit of bills contained in vouchers Nos. 2,593 to 2,612, inclusive; and on his motion the same were approved and ordered certified to the Comptroller for payment.

A communication was received from the Chief Engineer of this date, recommending that an appropriation of \$165 be made for the purpose of purchasing 10,000 horse-shoe diagrams for the use of the division engineers; also that an appropriation of \$150 be made for the purpose of purchasing one Buff & Berger level for use on the Third Division.

On motion of Commissioner Barnes, the communication was received and the appropriation made. The Comptroller, under date of April 30, gave notice of the issue of warrants for the payment of vouchers not certified to by the Aqueduct Commissioners, in favor of Martin B. Brown, Westchester County Section, \$54.90; The Democratic Register, Westchester County Section, \$383.25, which was ordered entered upon the books of the Commission and filed.

A communication was received from the Secretary of the Civil Service Supervisory and Examining Boards, of this date, stating that the next examination for Inspectors of Masonry would take place at their office on Tuesday next, May 10, and that he had notified Chief Engineer Church of the fact.

The communication was read and referred to the Special Committee on Appointments.

The Commissioners then adjourned, to meet on Monday next, May 9, at 3 o'clock P. M.

**Sanitary Bureau.**

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending April 30, 1887:  
 The number of inspections made by the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors was 6,425.  
 The number of complaints returned by the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors was 1,152.  
 During the past week 320 complaints were received from citizens, and referred to the Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.  
 There were issued to the consignees of vessels to discharge cargoes on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port, 83 permits.  
 There were issued to consignees to discharge rags (in bulk, under bonds), 13 permits.  
 There were issued under the Sanitary Code, 10 miscellaneous permits.  
 There were issued to scavengers to empty, clean and disinfect privy sinks 84 permits.  
 At premises where contagious diseases were reported, 363 visits were made, and 352 disinfections, and 84 fumigations were performed.  
 The number of cases of contagious disease removed to Riverside Hospital, was 10.  
 The number of vaccinations performed was 1,163 of which 597 were primary, and 1,163 revaccinations.  
 There were seized and condemned 11,240 pounds of meat and 8,550 pounds of fish. 500 crates of tomatoes, 50 boxes of oranges, 2,500 pounds of fruit and vegetables.  
 The number of specimens of milk examined was 64; the number of analyses of same made, was 1; the number of quarts of adulterated milk destroyed was 270, and the number of arrests made was 3.

The certificates of 553 births, 57 still-births, 332 marriages and 729 deaths, reported to have taken place in this city, were received by this Bureau during the week ending Saturday, April 30, 1887. This shows a decrease of 67 births, 2 still-births and 31 deaths, and an increase of 67 marriages when compared with the number received during the preceding week; but when compared with the corresponding week of the year 1886 there was an increase of 17 births, 2 still-births, 38 marriages and 72 deaths. Compared with the mortality reported during the preceding week, the deaths from small-pox decreased 1; measles, 4; erysipelas, 3; cerebro-spinal fever, 2; diarrheal diseases, 6; inanition, 4; alcoholism, 3; phthisis pulmonalis, 33; pneumonia, 8; heart diseases, 8; marasmus, tabes mesenterica and scrofula, 3; hydrocephalus and tubercular meningitis, 6; cirrhosis and hepatitis, 6; gastritis, enteritis and peritonitis, 3; Bright's disease and nephritis, 4; premature and preterm births, 5; surgical operations, 1; suicide, 4; while the deaths from scarlatina increased 1; diphtheria, 14; croup, 1; whooping cough, 2; malarial fevers, 1; puerperal diseases, 3; rheumatism and gout, 1; cancer, 7; bronchitis, 7; aneurism, 1; meningitis and encephalitis, 11; convulsions, 6; apoplexy, 5; all diseases of the brain and nervous system, 26; cyanosis and atelectasis, 6; drowning, 2. The number of deaths from typhoid fever was the same in the two successive weeks.

Of the total number of deaths reported for the week, 134 were in institutions, 403 in tenement-houses, 173 in houses containing three families or less, 7 in hotels and boarding-houses, 12 in rivers, streets, boats, etc.; 10 were on the basement floor, 128 on the first, 176 on the second, 142 on the third, 101 on the fourth, 25 on the fifth, 1 on the sixth; 710 were stated to be residents of New York City, and 19 non-residents; 107 were stated to be single, 215 married, 110 widowed, and the condition of 297 was not stated; these were children who had not attained a marriageable age.

The total number of burial permits issued during the week are as follows, viz.: City deaths, 729; still-births, 57; bodies in transit, 19; of the total burial permits issued for city and still-births, 829 were upon certificates received from the Coroners; 553 births; 332 marriages; 57 still-births; 729 deaths; 19 applications for transit permits were recorded, indexed, and tabulated, 139 searches of the registers of births, marriages, and deaths were made, and 13 transcripts of the birth record, 9 of marriage, and 83 of death were issued during the week.

The mean temperature for the week ending April 30, 1887, was 50.6 degrees Fahr., the mean reading of the barometer was 29.598, the mean humidity was 61, saturation being 100, the number of miles traveled by the wind was 1,471, and the total amount of rain-fall was 0.89 inch depth of water, as reported by D. Draper, Ph.D., Director of the New York Meteorological Observatory, Central Park.

#### NOTICE TO CROTON WATER CONSUMERS.

NUMEROUS APPLICATIONS HAVE BEEN made to this Department by citizens claiming reductions or rebates on bills for water supplied through meters, on the alleged ground of leakage caused by defective plumbing and worn-out service pipes, or by willful waste of water by tenants and occupants of buildings, or in full force in water-closets, sinks, etc., without the knowledge or consent of the owners of the premises.

The main object of the use of water meters is to enable this Department to detect and check the useless and unwarrantable waste of an element so valuable and essential to the health and comfort of all the citizens, and this object can only be accomplished by enforcing payment for the water used.

Under the law all charges for water supplied through meters are a lien against the respective premises, and the law therefore holds the owner of the premises responsible for the amount of water used. It is the duty of the owner to give to all householders that, in all further applications for reduction of water rents, no allowance will be made on account of waste of water occurring through leaks, from defective service pipes or plumbing, or from any other cause, and that the owner of buildings, through such leakage or waste may have occurred without the knowledge or consent of the owners of the buildings.

House-owners are hereby notified that whenever their premises become vacant, and are likely to remain vacant, they must notify this Department in writing, and that unless this requirement is complied with no deductions in extra water rents will be allowed for any portion of one year.
