

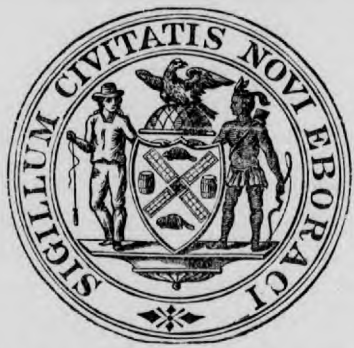

To the Honorable the Board of Aldermen:

GENTLEMEN—Since the contracts have been made for repaving the streets embraced in my communication to you of March 4th ult., and your resolution of July 12th ult., it is ascertained that there will be a balance in the appropriation for repaving over and above the amount of said contracts, which should be applied to additional repaving. Therefore,

In accordance with the provisions of section 1, chapter 496, Laws of 1875, I hereby certify and report to your Honorable Board that the safety, health, and convenience of the public require that the following-named streets be repaved:

Forty-second street, from the easterly side of Second avenue to the westerly side of Third avenue.

Twelfth street, from Fifth to Sixth avenue, except where now paved with Belgian pavement.
Gold street, from Frankfort street to Liberty street.
The said streets to be repaved with Belgian or trap-block pavement, and the work to be done by contract, publicly let to the lowest bidder; of which mode and manner of paving said streets I hereby approve.

Colonel JOHN TRACY, Mayor's Chief Clerk:

SIR—In your letter to me of the 1st inst. you state that Theodore S. Kent, late Inspector of Weights and Measures, has instituted a number of suits in the District Court at Fordham, for the recovery of sums which he claims are due to him for services rendered while Inspector; that it appears that in nearly all the cases the parties have made payments for similar services to Thomas McCormack, who was formerly a claimant to the office of Inspector of Weights and Measures, in the same district as Mr. Kent. You desire to be advised whether any defense can be set up for these parties, as the Mayor would be pleased, in view of the hardship of these cases, if in any lawful way the necessity of a double payment could be avoided.

I am unable to suggest any method of affording relief to the parties in question. As Kent was the lawfully appointed Inspector of Weights and Measures, the only possible defense which could be set up would be that of the prior payment to McCormack. I do not think such defense, however, can be maintained, and it would be wholly at variance with the position heretofore taken by this Department to set up such a defense. Although McCormack had a certificate of appointment, his appointment under the decision of the General Term of the Supreme Court of this Department was null and void, and I do not see how he could be regarded even as an Inspector *de facto*. The parties in question ought to have refused to pay McCormack, and resisted him in the Courts. I have repeatedly offered, during the past few years, when complaints were made to this office that McCormack was collecting money, to defend any suits which he might bring, but none of the persons making such complaints ever availed themselves of this offer. I should be most happy to do anything in my power to relieve the parties who are now prosecuted by Mr. Kent, but I do not see any way in which I can do so.
