Whereas, To make the approaches to bridge properly conform to the established City lines of Borden avenue, and to the full width thereof, would cause the rearranging of and additional curbing and paving, regulating and grading of said avenue, the President caused due notice to be given of a public hearing to be afforded by this Board on this 10th day of August, 1900, and caused survey and sketch to be made, showing the present irregular lines of said avenue, in consequence of the existing "Cork Screw" bridge; and

Whereas, No person appeared at such public hearing in opposition to aforesaid proposed
