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DEPARTMENT OF DOCKS AND FERRIES.

At a regular meeting of the Board of Docks held Friday, February 2, 1900, at 2 o'clock P. M.

Present—The full Board.

The Board proceeded to open estimates on Contract No. 674, a representative of the Comptroller being present.

Five estimates were received, as follows:

On motion, the Secretary was directed to transmit to the Comptroller the security deposits submitted by the above bidders, and the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That the contract opened this day for furnishing and delivering about three thousand piles, under Contract No. 674, be and hereby is awarded to Bernard Rolf, he being the lowest bidder, subject to the approval of the sureties, Henry Wiler and Charles S. Hirsch, by the Comptroller.

The minutes of the meeting held January 26, 1900, were approved.

Peter Corcoran appeared on behalf of the Dockbuilders' Protective Association and requested that a clause be inserted in all contracts specifying that \$3 shall be considered as the prevailing daily rate of wages of Dock Builders.

On motion, the matter was referred to the Corporation Counsel for advice as to whether this Department has power to insert such a provision in contracts.

The communication from the Pacific Mail Steamship Company advising that it will surrender the lease of Pier, new 34, North river, with adjoining bulkheads upon condition that a new lease of the premises be granted the Cromwell Steamship Company, was tabled for one week.

The following communications were referred to the Treasurer:

From the Metropolitan Street Railway Company and the Central Cross Town Railroad Company—Requesting permission to extend the car tracks at the foot of East Twenty-third street, East river.

From the Hudson Contracting Company—Requesting permission to use and occupy a berth at the foot of Ninety-eighth street, North river, for the loading of derrick stone thereat.

From Mrs. James W. Martinez Cardeza—In relation to the compensation to be charged for the berthing of the yacht "Eleanor" at the foot of East Twenty-fourth street.

From the Engineer-in-Chief—Recommending that the area of new made land to be formed in the rear of the bulkhead between Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth streets, East river, be converted into a small park and maintained as an approach to the recreation pier at the foot of Twenty-fourth street.

The following permits were granted, the work to be done under the supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief:

Consolidated Gas Company, to make repairs to gas-main and service pipes in front of Piers, new 35 and new 41, North river, all pavement to be taken up and relaid by the force of this Department, at the cost and expense of said company.

New York, New Haven and Hartford Railroad Company, to make necessary repairs to the ferry racks at the foot of Willis avenue and One Hundred and Thirty-fourth street, Harlem river, the work to be kept within existing lines.

S. C. White's Son's Company, to erect a small platform and to dredge in front of the bulkhead recently constructed at Port Richmond, Staten Island, the work to be done in accordance with plans submitted, and the platform to remain thereat only during the pleasure of the Board.

The following communications were ordered on file:

From the Corporation Counsel—

1st. Approving forms of Contract No. 675, for furnishing cement, and No. 676, for building a new pier at the foot of Pike slip, East river.

2d. Transmitting approved forms of agreement to be executed by the estate of William Beard in relation to the extension of Pier 47, in the Borough of Brooklyn; and by the Brooklyn Wharf and Warehouse Company, in relation to the erection of a shed on Pier 6, in the Borough of Brooklyn.

3d. In relation to the claim of this Department of \$292.57, against Ann Elizabeth Snook, for the cost of removing the bath houses at the foot of West One Hundred and Fifty-fifth street, North river. Chief Clerk authorized to cancel the claim on the books of this Department.

4th. Requesting information as to the ownership of certain property in the vicinity of Rutgers slip, East river. Action of the Secretary in furnishing the same approved.

From the Department of Street Cleaning—In relation to the establishment of a dump on the new bulkhead foot of East Eightieth street.

On motion, by the affirmative votes of Commissioners Cram and Meyer, Commissioner Murphy voting in the negative, the communication from the New York Sand and Gravel Company, and others, doing business and residing in the vicinity of Eightieth street, East river, was placed on file, and any and all actions setting aside the premises at the foot of East Eightieth street for the purposes of a dump were rescinded, and the Engineer-in-Chief directed to examine and report as to what accommodations can be furnished the Department of Street Cleaning for dumping purposes, in the vicinity of Seventy-fifth street, East river.

From the Protestant Episcopal Church Missionary Society for Seamen—Accepting the offer of the Board of January 19, 1900, for the purchase of the fifty-one feet three inches of bulkhead between Market and Pike slips, East river. Secretary directed to request the Corporation Counsel to prepare the necessary form of agreement.

From the John Gillies Company, Incorporated—Transmitting consent of the sureties to the extension of time to January 22, 1900, granted for the completion of Contract No. 663, for building a crib bulkhead between Eightieth and Eighty-first streets, East river.

From William Simmons—Transmitting consent of the sureties to the extension of time to January 26, 1900, granted for the completion of Contract No. 668, for the delivery of yellow pine timber.

From Mortimer S. Brown, attorney—Transmitting notice of application to be made by Melvin L. Decker, for grant of land under water at Newark bay, in the Third Ward of the Borough of Richmond.

From the New York, New Haven and Hartford Railroad Company—Requesting a further extension of ten days in which to consider the offer of this Department for the purchase of the property owned by said company between Clinton and Montgomery streets, East river. Application granted.

From Erastus Wiman—In relation to the revocation of the lease of the pier and bulkhead at the foot of Fifty-fourth street, North river.

From the Long Island Railroad Company—Requesting that the Manhattan terminus of the ferry between Long Island City and Pier 17, East river, be removed to Pier 13, East river, near the foot of Wall street.

On motion, said application was denied, and the communication from the Corporation Counsel transmitting approved form of lease of the franchise of the said ferry from Pier 17, East river, was taken from the table, placed on file, and the officers of the Board authorized to execute such lease.

From Edward R. Dunham—Requesting a lease of 300 feet of bulkhead between Fifty-third and Fifty-fourth streets, East river, with privilege of erecting a shed thereon. Application denied.

From the Granite Cutters' National Union—Protesting against the execution of Contract No. 673 for furnishing granite, on the ground that the form of contract does not contain any provisions relating to the Labor Law of 1899. Secretary directed to state that under an opinion from the Corporation Counsel contracts for furnishing supplies are not subject to the provisions of chapter 567 of the Laws of 1899.

From the Baltimore and Ohio Railroad Company—Requesting permission to construct a pier and double deck freight shed on its property at St. George, Staten Island.

On motion, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That permission be and hereby is granted the Baltimore and Ohio Railroad Company to construct a pier and double deck freight shed on property owned by said company at St. George, Staten Island, in accordance with plans submitted, as amended, which are hereby approved, it being understood and agreed that no work shall be done under this permit unless the said Baltimore and Ohio Railroad Company shall file in this Department an agreement, the form of which shall be approved by the Corporation Counsel, containing the following provisions:

1st. The outer 200 feet of said pier and shed erected thereon shall remain thereat only during the pleasure of the Board of Docks, and shall be removed whenever so ordered by said Board.

2d. That in the event that the said Board of Docks shall decide that the said pier and said shed (except the outer 200 feet thereof otherwise herein provided for) or the land under water covered thereby, are needed for the improvement of the water front, that then and in such case, no item of value, beyond the actual value of said pier and said shed erected thereon under this permit, shall be claimed by or allowed to the Baltimore and Ohio Railroad Company, by reason of the erection thereof, in any proceeding for the acquisition of said property by the Board of Docks either by purchase or condemnation, and that said agreement shall be binding upon the successors and assigns of the Baltimore and Ohio Railroad Company.

From the Treasurer—Reporting that he has arranged with James J. Mooney for furnishing about 1,500 loads of earth filling in rear of the crib bulkhead constructed at the foot of Eightieth street, East river; the work of filling to be done under the direction and supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief of this Department; compensation for the privilege to be \$150, payable in advance. Action approved.

From the Dock Superintendent—Report for the week ending January 27, 1900.

From the Engineer-in-Chief—

1st. Report for the week ending January 27, 1900.

2d. Submitting survey of ungranted lands and land under water at the foot of Bayside avenue and River street, Whitestone Landing, Long Island, and recommending that the Corporation Counsel be requested to advise the Board as to whether this Department should not enter into and take possession of the property, together with the structures thereat.

On motion, said recommendation was adopted, and the report of the Engineer-in-Chief on Secretary's Order No. 19759, advising that the cost of repairing the dock at said location would be about \$2,500, was tabled, pending the receipt of said opinion from the Corporation Counsel.

3d. Reporting the commencement of Contract No. 670, for preparing for and building a platform at the foot of Railroad avenue, Harlem river, January 31, 1900.

4th. Recommending that the owners and lessees be directed to remove so much of the pier on the south side of East One Hundred and Twenty-fifth street as extends beyond the established pier-head-line thereat; and also that they be directed to repair a portion of the pier inshore of the pier-head-line, and also the platform immediately south thereof to the line of East One Hundred and Twenty-fourth street; and in the event of such repairs not being commenced within ten days that the premises be fenced off from public use by the force of this Department. Recommendation adopted.

5th. Recommending that necessary repairs be made by the force of the Department to the Piers foot of West Fifty-fifth and East One Hundred and Tenth streets. Recommendation adopted.

6th. Reporting repairs required to Pier A, North river.

On motion, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That in accordance with section 821 of the Greater New York Charter the Engineer-in-Chief be and is hereby directed to repair the exterior of Pier A, North river, together with the shed thereon; the work to consist of scraping and cleaning the galvanized iron-work where rusted out, and the replacing of two rolling steel shutters on the south side of the pier where they have become worn out, at a cost of about fourteen hundred dollars (\$1,400), and that all the repairs and other work hereby ordered be performed otherwise than by contract, and all material, etc., necessary for said work, not heretofore contracted for, or which may not hereafter be contracted for, be purchased by the Treasurer otherwise than by contract.
