

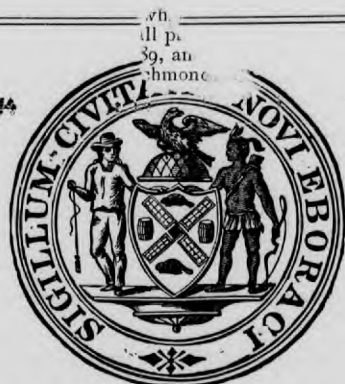

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DEPARTMENT OF EDUCATION.

Report for the Year ending July 31, 1901.

NEW YORK, July 31, 1901.

Hon. ROBERT VAN WYCK, Mayor of The City of New York:

SIR—Section 1085 of the Greater New York Charter provides as follows:

"The Board of Education shall, between the first day of August and the thirtieth day of November in each year, make and transmit to the Mayor of The City of New York a report in writing, bearing date on the thirty-first day of July next preceding, stating the whole number of schools within their jurisdiction, specially designating the schools for colored children; the schools or societies from which reports shall have been made to the Board of Education, within the time limited for that purpose; the length of time such school shall have been kept open; the amount of public money apportioned or appropriated to said school or society, the number taught in each school, the whole amount of money drawn from the City Chamberlain for the purposes of public education during the year ending at the date of their report, distinguishing the amount received from the general fund of the State and from all other sources; the manner in which such moneys shall have been expended, and such other information as the Mayor may from time to time require in relation to common school education in The City of New York."

In accordance with the provisions of the foregoing section, the Board of Education has the honor to present its Fourth Annual Report, showing the operations of the Department of Education for the school year 1900-1901.

The number of schools and departments within the jurisdiction of this Board (omitting the Nautical School) is 519; there are no public schools exclusively for colored children. The number of days the schools were in session in the several boroughs was:

The average attendance of pupils was 398,391. The number of teachers (including all members of the supervising and teaching force) was 11,389. The number of corporate schools (orphan asylums, industrial schools and the like), is 59; the average attendance at these schools for the year was 19,121, and the moneys distributed to corporate schools amounted to \$648,310.15. The total amount of money available for the purposes of public education in the city during the year ending on this date was \$22,845,358.66; the manner in which it was expended is shown by the financial statement which appears later in this report.

Every effort has been made by the Department of Education to meet the constantly growing demand for school accommodations, but the statement must be repeated that lack of funds has, unfortunately, prevented the construction of a sufficient number of buildings and the acquisition of sites necessary to accomplish this end. Keenly alive to the growth of the city, and the needs of the near future as well as the present, the Board of Education, on November 28, 1900, adopted a report requesting the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to authorize the issue of Corporate Stock to the amount of \$14,031,325 for constructing, equipping and improving school buildings and acquiring sites therefor in the several boroughs. The ordinances of the Municipal Assembly approved by the Mayor on April 16, 1901, provided, however, for the expenditure of \$3,700,000 for the purposes mentioned.

It may be added that since consolidation the Board of Education has asked for \$38,489,497 for the erection and equipment of buildings and additions and the purchase of sites, whereas but little more than one-third of this amount, viz., \$14,873,640, has been granted by the municipal authorities.

The reasons given for this reduction are that constitutional provisions relating to bond issues by cities prevent the granting of the amount actually required. The Board of Education, while realizing that existing constitutional provisions restrict the granting of sufficient funds, nevertheless deems it proper to present to your Honor the absolute need of the amount required to provide accommodations for all children seeking admission to our schools.

In addition, requests have been made within the last few months for the issue of bonds to the amount of \$1,698,000 for erecting new school buildings in the Borough of Brooklyn, and for \$3,500,000 for new buildings, additions, etc., in the boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx; but up to the present time no action has been taken regarding the same.

The necessity for additional school accommodations in nearly all sections of the city continues, and is certain to become more and more pressing with the growth of population. The overcrowding in many schools and the large number of half-time and part-time classes—a makeshift necessitated by existing conditions—are anything but creditable to this great and wealthy metropolis, and should not be permitted to continue. The Board of Education is ready and anxious to do its part the moment means are provided. Still, to acquire a site, prepare plans for a school-house, advertise for proposals, let the contract, and secure the completion of the building, with the necessary furniture, etc., can scarcely be accomplished, under the most favorable conditions, in less than two years.

Unfortunately, the opening of new school-houses does not afford the relief in densely populated sections of the city that has been expected by the people. It is true that the occupation of a new building has an immediate effect in reducing the number of short-time classes in the neighborhood; but, under existing conditions, even a large number of additional sittings fails to provide the great desideratum—a seat and desk for every child desiring a public school education. The only remedy is in building more school-houses, so as not only to keep even with the demand but to anticipate it. When once the supply is brought abreast of the demand it will still be necessary, owing to the increase of population, to provide additional sittings for upward of 25,000 children, or, say, 600 classrooms, every year.

The fact should again be emphasized that the city's bill for rents of premises leased for school purposes is a large one. The amount appropriated for 1900 was \$123,715; for 1901 this was increased to \$127,363.34—a sum equivalent to the interest at 3 per cent. on nearly \$4,250,000. And, from present indications, this Board will be compelled in the near future to ask for nearly twice as large an appropriation for rents. The city would be the gainer if a bond issue of five or six million dollars were made at once as an offset to the Board of Education rent account.

SCHOOL BUILDINGS.

During the year now ending eight new school-houses and three additions to old school buildings have been completed and opened in the boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx, containing 374 classrooms and affording 17,066 sittings; six new buildings and three additions in the Borough of Brooklyn, with 157 classrooms and 7,696 sittings; five new buildings and one addition in the Borough of Queens, with 61 classrooms and 2,749 sittings; and one addition in the Borough of Richmond, containing 4 rooms and seats for 180 pupils. The total number of classrooms provided in the city during the school year is therefore 596, and the total number of sittings 27,491.

Hence it appears that on the completion of work now in progress the existing school accommodations of the city will be increased to the extent of 728 classrooms, with an aggregate of 40,654 sittings.

SITES.

In the matter of sites, we are glad to be able to report somewhat more substantial progress than was recorded in our report last year, at least as respects the boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx. Nevertheless, owing to financial inability, only a small proportion of the sites needed, whether for new buildings and additions or for light, ventilation, etc., have been acquired.

The Board of Education has not up to the present time felt justified in rescinding the resolution adopted in April, 1899, requesting the Corporation Counsel to suspend, as far as possible, all proceedings for the acquisition of sites in these boroughs, and, unfortunately, no less than twenty-eight proceedings for the condemnation of sites, instituted in 1897 and the early part of 1898, are still held in abeyance. In view of applications made to the courts to compel the Commissioners of Estimate to proceed in a number of cases, and also because of the very urgent necessity of acquiring certain sites, the Board has, from time to time, asked the Corporation Counsel to continue sixteen long-standing site proceedings in the boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx, and title to twelve sites has vested in the City since January 1, 1901.

In addition, proceedings have been taken for acquiring one much-needed site in the Borough of The Bronx for a new building, and five small sites in the Borough of Manhattan, in order to prevent serious injury to school-houses by the erection of lofty buildings on adjacent property.

We desire to reiterate the opinion heretofore expressed that no site selected previous to consolidation should be abandoned; and it should require little argument to emphasize the necessity for the provision by the City of ample means for reserving and obtaining additional sites for new buildings in sections where the rapid increase of population is certain to create an imperative demand for school-houses in the very near future.

In the Borough of Brooklyn two large sites—one for an elementary school and one for a new building for the Manual Training High School (now most inadequately housed)—and two smaller sites have been acquired during the year now closing, and steps have been taken by the Board of Education for acquiring seventeen additional sites, most of them for new buildings in growing neighborhoods or for additions to greatly overcrowded school-houses. In eleven of these cases the City will within the next few weeks take title to the premises, in pursuance of section 1439 of the Charter.

In the Borough of Queens eight sites have been acquired within the year, and the early acquisition of as many more is contemplated. The erection of new buildings as rapidly as possible will do much to meet the demands for additional school accommodations in this section of the city.

Since the date of our last report two sites have been acquired by condemnation in the Borough of Richmond, on one of which a building is now being erected; a contract will shortly be made for the erection on the other of a high school building. Two other sites have been selected and will be acquired without unnecessary delay.

HIGH SCHOOLS.

It is gratifying to record the fact that since the date of our last report contracts have been entered into for the erection of three handsome and commodious high school buildings in the boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx, which will house about 7,000 pupils. These buildings, it is expected, will all be completed by or before the beginning of the school year in September, 1902, and will provide accommodations for the Wadleigh, the Peter Cooper and the Commercial High Schools. Plans are now under preparation for the new De Witt Clinton High School, which is to be built on the site acquired some years ago on East Fifteenth and East Sixteenth streets, between First avenue and Livingston place.

In the Borough of Richmond a site for a high school at St. George, New Brighton, was acquired nearly a year ago. A contract for the erection of a building thereon, to accommodate 1,200 pupils, is about to be entered into. This will be the first building exclusively for high school purposes in the borough, although three high school departments are conducted in buildings occupied for the most part by elementary schools.

The same is true of the six high school departments in the Borough of Queens. In Long Island City, however, there is one small and poorly equipped high school building. A large site for a new high school in that section of this borough has been lately acquired by the city, on which a building with over 1,200 sittings will shortly be erected.

In the Borough of Brooklyn a far less satisfactory state of things must be reported. Since consolidation, now more than three and one-half years ago, little has been done toward meeting the enlarging demand for high school education. That is to say, the number of children desiring to attend the high schools has greatly increased, but nothing approaching adequate provision for them has been made. It is true that an excellent site for the Manual Training High School has been secured, as well as an addition to the site of the Boys' High School, and an additional site for the Erasmus Hall High School is being acquired; some additions have also been made to the last-named school and several small annexes provided. Since consolidation the Commercial High School has been established in an old grammar school building, quite unsuitable for the purpose, and also the Eastern District High School, which occupies a small building formerly used as the Eastern District Library. The two schools last mentioned ought to be properly provided for as soon as possible; but the most urgent need is for new buildings for the Manual Training and Erasmus Hall High Schools. The former occupies a rented building, not only entirely too small, but one which is a positive menace to the lives of the children attending it; if a fire or a panic from any cause should occur, the result could scarcely fail to be appalling. In Erasmus Hall resort has been had to the very doubtful expedient of "doubling up." In our report a year ago attention was called to the fact that the pressure on this school was so great that 662 pupils were able to secure instruction only in part-time classes; that is to say, two classes under two teachers occupy the same room, one class attending in the forenoon and the other in the afternoon. This year the same method has been pursued in the Eastern District High School, and 1,150 high school pupils have been registered in part-time classes in this borough—a condition of things which to state is to condemn. To place pupils attending elementary schools on part time is, to put it mildly, most unfortunate; but it is a far greater evil to adopt this plan in the case of students in the high schools, many of whom are preparing to become teachers. As a high-school course, or its equivalent, is one of the conditions precedent to securing a license to teach, it is self-evident that all possible facilities should be afforded them in pursuing their studies. It is greatly to be hoped that means may very speedily be provided for constructing the new high school buildings so sorely needed.

In connection with high schools attention may properly be called to the importance and necessity of training schools for teachers, of which there are two in the city, one in Manhattan and one in Brooklyn. Even if they were not indispensable, their usefulness has been amply demonstrated. As a matter of fact, there is no discretion in the matter of maintaining both high schools and training schools; they are absolutely required by the laws of the State.

"All training schools and all high schools heretofore established and maintained by the public school authorities and registered as high schools by the Regents of the State of New York shall be maintained in full efficiency."—Greater New York Charter, section 1096.

"No person shall be employed or licensed to teach in the primary or grammar schools of any city authorized by law to employ a superintendent of schools, who has not had successful experience in teaching for at least three years, or, in lieu thereof, has not completed a three years' course in and graduated from a high school or academy having a course of study of not less than three years, approved by the state superintendent of public instruction, or from some institution of learning of equal or higher rank approved by the same authority, and who, subsequently to such graduation, has not graduated from a school or class for the professional training of teachers, having a course of study of not less than thirty-eight weeks, approved by the state superintendent of public instruction."—Laws of 1895, chapter 1031, section 4.

FREE LECTURES.

Mention may properly be made in this report of the great popularity of the free lectures in school buildings and other meeting places, which constitute an important feature of the public school system. Lectures are now given in all parts of the city. The lecture system was established in the former City of New York in 1889, and since then has been carried on with increasing success from year to year. In Queens and Richmond free lectures were instituted in the year after consolidation; in Brooklyn the system was not adopted until the present year, no appropriation having been made previously by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment. Only a small appropriation was available for the purpose in the last-mentioned borough during the current year, but the success of the new idea was instantaneous and pronounced. During the year the total attendance at free lectures in New York City has been nearly three-quarters of a million; the lectures have covered a wide variety of subjects and the benefits to the community generally have been beyond calculation.

THE NAUTICAL SCHOOL.

Only one educational institution in the city is directly under the control of the Board of Education, viz., the Nautical School, maintained on the ship "St. Mary's," which is loaned by the United States Government for the purpose. The schoolship returned from her trip across the Atlantic on October 24, 1900, and on October 27 the graduating exercises were held and diplomas delivered to thirty members of the graduating class. The winter term commenced November 12, and the usual course of instruction was conducted during the winter, the ship lying at the foot of East Twenty-eighth street. In April last the "St. Mary's" proceeded to Glen Cove, L. I., and several weeks were spent in practical seamanship on the Sound. On June 19 the schoolship started on her annual ocean cruise. The itinerary of Commander W. H. Reeder, Superintendent of the Nautical School, includes brief visits at the Azores, Lisbon, Gibraltar, Tangier and Madeira, and he expects to return to New York early in October.

The appropriation for the support of the Nautical School for the calendar year 1901 is \$31,810. It is probable that a larger appropriation will be asked for next year, as it is the intention of the Board of Education to request the Navy Department to furnish a steam vessel in place of the "St. Mary's," to enable pupils to obtain a knowledge of both steam and sailing vessels. TRAINING SCHOOLS FOR TEACHERS.

By the provisions of section 1096 of the Charter, Training Schools for Teachers, while established and maintained by the School Boards, are placed "under the control of the Board of Education and of the City Superintendent of Schools to the extent that may be necessary to secure compliance with chapter 1031 of the Laws of 1895"; and by the by-laws of the Board of Education the City Superintendent of Schools has supervision over the admission of pupil teachers to training schools and over their graduation therefrom.

There is a training school in the Borough of Manhattan and one in the Borough of Brooklyn. Statistics regarding them for the year are presented in the table below:

TEACHERS' RETIREMENT FUND.

According to section 1083 of the Charter, the Public School Teachers' Retirement Fund is administered by the Board of Education. Said fund is applicable to the entire city, except the Borough of Brooklyn, the School Board of which has full care and management of the Retirement Fund created for the former City of Brooklyn by chapter 656 of the Laws of 1895. No teachers have yet been retired in the Borough of Queens.

Under chapter 91 of the Laws of 1898 five per cent. of the excise moneys or license fees belonging to The City of New York is paid into the Teachers' Retirement Fund. Said amount is, by the provisions of the chapter last named, to be apportioned by the Board of Education among the several boroughs of the city in proportion to the number of teachers actually employed and the amount of salaries paid to them in each of said boroughs. At the date of our last report the apportionment thus required had not been made for the years 1898 and 1899, owing to doubt as to the proper construction of the statute relating thereto. The apportionment has since been made.

THE REVISED CHARTER.

An event of great importance to the public school system has been the passage of the Revised Charter, which early next year will cause many and important changes in the conduct of the schools. On the first Monday in February, 1902, the Borough School Boards will cease to exist, and a new Board of Education, consisting of forty-six members, to be appointed by the Mayor in January, will organize. In this Board Manhattan will have twenty-two members, Brooklyn fourteen, The Bronx four, Queens four and Richmond two. The office of Inspector of Common Schools (now existing only in the boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx) will cease in February next, and the Board of Education is required to divide the city into forty-six local School Board Districts—twenty-two in Manhattan, fourteen in Brooklyn, four in The Bronx, four in Queens and two in Richmond—in each of which districts there is to be a Local School Board, consisting of seven members: five to be appointed by the President of the Borough, a member of the Board of Education designated by the President of that Board, and the District Superintendent assigned to duty in such district by the City Superintendent of Schools. Somewhat more extensive powers than are now possessed by the Inspectors of Common Schools are conferred upon the Local School Boards. The offices of Borough Superintendent and Associate Borough Superintendent are abolished. Besides the City Superintendent of Schools, there will be eight Associate Superintendents, who, with the City Superintendent, will constitute the Board of Superintendents. Twenty-six District Superintendents will be appointed by the Board of Education. Principals, teachers and other members of the teaching staff are to be appointed in all boroughs by the Board of Education on the nomination of the Board of Superintendents.

The salaries of members of the teaching and supervising staff as fixed by the Davis Law (chapter 751 of the Laws of 1900) are retained by the Revised Charter, as is also the provision that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment shall appropriate annually for the General School Fund an amount equivalent to not less than four mills on every dollar of assessed valuation of the real and personal estate in the City of New York, liable to taxation.

Changes of importance are made in the Public School Teachers' Retirement Fund. Heretofore the Retirement Fund for Brooklyn has been separate from that for the other boroughs, and the School Board for that borough has had the full care and management thereof. Under the provisions of the new Charter the pension moneys are combined in one retirement fund for the city at large, and the benefits of said fund are extended to members of the supervising staff, including members of the Board of Examiners. Annuities are not to exceed in the case of a teacher \$1,000 per annum, in the case of a principal \$1,500, and in the case of a supervising official \$2,000. The annuity for any teacher, retired or to be retired, is to be not less than \$600.

The provision of the Davis Law under which the Board of Education established a Treasurer's Bureau and disburses its own funds is repealed, and on and after January 1 next, all disbursements on account of the Department of Education will be made by the Comptroller.

Your Honor will recall that the Department of Education was opposed to the enactment of the Davis Bill, both while it was pending in the Legislature, and also when it was under consideration by the Mayor and the Governor. Nevertheless, when the duty of disbursing its own funds was forced upon it, this Board did not hesitate. As stated in our last report, "It was necessary to organize a financial department in the briefest possible time, in order that contractors and other claimants, as well as teachers, officers and employees, might not be embarrassed by failing to receive the moneys due them." A treasurer was elected and a disbursing bureau established at once, and little delay occurred in the payment of salaries, etc. At the date of our last report the new system had been in operation nearly three months, and the following statement was made:

"It is confidently believed that the new system, which at the date of this report is working regularly and with little friction, will result in the payment of salaries and the liquidation of claims of all kinds more promptly than ever before."

The confidence thus expressed has been more than justified by experience, as is shown by the following schedule, giving the dates on which the salaries of teachers in the boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx have been paid during the past year:

Teachers have been highly gratified at receiving their salaries earlier than under the old system, and many of them have expressed regret at the change which will be made at the beginning of the year 1902. The same is true of contractors and others doing business with the Board in furnishing supplies, materials, etc.

In Brooklyn, owing to special conditions, the dates of payment were later, except for June, July and August; for the earlier portion of the year the best record was for the month of April, the salaries for which were paid on May 9. It should be borne in mind that under the system previously in operation since consolidation teachers' salaries, except for the months of June and July, were not paid by the Comptroller until the 15th of the following month, and sometimes not until a later date.

BOROUGH SCHOOL BOARD REPORTS.

Under the provisions of section 1101 of the Charter each School Board is required to make an annual report to the Board of Education "of such matters as the Board of Education may, by its by-laws or regulations, require."

In conformity with this section the Board of Education on October 26, 1898, adopted a by-law (section 72, subdivision 6) providing as follows:

"6. Each School Board shall, on or before the thirty-first day of July in each year, make and transmit to the Board of Education an annual report stating the whole number of schools within its jurisdiction during the school year then ending, specially designating the schools for colored children; the number of teachers; the number of pupils registered in each school and the average attendance; the number of high schools and of training schools for teachers, with the number of teachers, the total register and average attendance at each and the number graduated therefrom; the number of evening schools, with the register of pupils and average attendance, specially designating the evening high schools; the schools registered with the Regents of the University of the State of New York; the number of centres at which free lectures for working men and working women were given, the number of such lectures, and the total attendance at the same; the corporate schools from which reports have been made to the Board of Education through the School Board, the number of teachers and the attendance at each such school, and the amount of money distributed to each; the amount of the General School Fund apportioned for use within the jurisdiction of the School Board, and the manner in which it was expended; and such recommendations, especially in respect to new school buildings and sites, as the School Board may see fit to make."

The information required by the terms of this by-law has been supplied by the several School Boards, the reports of which will be found after the financial statement and the schedules relating to buildings and sites attached to and made a part of this report.

Borough of Richmond.

Sec. 2. All ordinances or parts of ordinances inconsistent or conflicting with the provisions of this ordinance are hereby repealed.

Sec. 3. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

BROOKLYN DISCIPLINARY TRAINING SCHOOL FOR BOYS.

Report for the Year ending November 1, 1901.

REPORT OF THE MANAGERS TO THE HONORABLE ROBERT A. VAN WYCK, MAYOR OF NEW YORK CITY.

HONORED SIR—The Board of Managers of the Brooklyn Disciplinary Training School for Boys respectfully presents herewith the report of the Superintendent, as well as the report of the President of the Board, for the year ending November 1, 1901, and submits the same as the report for that period.

The Board has exerted every effort during the year to perfect the general methods and objects of the school, and especially to convince the City authorities of the great usefulness of the institution, being the first of its kind that ever was created in the Empire State; and also to gain from the City authorities additions to the plans now completed, and which have proved to be highly satisfactory in every particular, when we take into consideration the small amount of appropriation assigned for the purpose for which this institution has been created.

We find that, although the school has only been in existence for five years, it holds a much higher position in the minds of the public than any other penal institution, or one of semi-penal character, in the State. Commendatory criticism is a daily occurrence in the daily press, and the community recognizes that this institution redeems boys in whom crime is in its incipient state, and returns them as obedient sons to their parents and good citizens to the community. Discipline has been inaugurated and is judiciously maintained. The educational, technical and moral advancement of the boys has been excellent.

The work in the shops has been of great practical use. It is the technical education with the common-school education that elevates the boy to a degree of manhood and inspires within his breast the honorable ambition not only to be intellectually qualified, but to acquire a vocation where he can, in the future, build up an honorable existence for himself and those who may be dependent upon him.

In the Brooklyn Disciplinary Training School for Boys we have succeeded in establishing not only a military discipline and training second to none in the State, but we have also succeeded in building up a degree of reform, in a moral, religious and intellectual sense, which is deserving of the emulation of any community in the land.

In many cases, where boys of respectable parentage have been committed to our care, their crime having been acquired through evil associations, and in many others where crime has been innate, it has been our good fortune to find that those inmates, after a proper period of training and discipline, are repentant, and thoroughly convinced of the errors of their past, and anxious to pursue the course of respectability and honor.

In support of the foregoing statements we desire to give the commendations of the October Grand Jury upon their late visit to this institution, and we think that they should be sufficient to inspire the consideration of the Municipal authorities in encouraging the Board of Managers to increase and extend the work in which they are engaged. We believe that a favorable consideration of our request will be the means of redeeming boys from crime, thereby saving to the State and Municipality thousands and thousands of dollars which otherwise would be used for the extension of jails, penitentiaries and State prisons.

The criminal records of our great city are sufficient to convince thinking men that arson, murder and burglary have been on the increase, and to prevent this enormous increase of crime lies altogether with the proper way of curing the disease of crime in its incipient state in just such institutions as we represent.

A proper building which will accommodate from five hundred to seven hundred boys, with sufficient provision for technical work in which the boys are taught a trade upon which they may place their dependence in future days, is a remedy and the only remedy to prevent crime. In our institution we have thus far established a shoe shop, a tailoring establishment, a weaving establishment, a wood-turning shop, a school of stenography, a carpenter shop, and we now contemplate adding a number of useful trades to those already enumerated.

We claim, therefore, that this institution, having been in existence for about five years, has given more proof of its usefulness and blessing-spreading influence than any other institution in the land. We cherish the fond hope that you will favorably consider our modest request and, in the near future, honor us with your presence in the institution.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT TO THE BOARD OF MANAGEMENT OF THE BROOKLYN DISCIPLINARY TRAINING SCHOOL FOR BOYS.

GENTLEMEN—For the first time it becomes my duty to submit my report, which I do with some degree of pleasure to myself, and, I trust, satisfaction to you.

The standing and efficiency of your wards will support the statement that their moral, mental and physical development never, in the past, attained the present standard. This vindicates, to a large degree, the wisdom of those who, by thought and act, created and defended the great purpose for which this school was instituted; and while my personal service has hardly passed a period of probation, I am encouraged to congratulate you, who are entrusted with its management; the representatives of our great metropolitan press and the many representatives of the people who, having honored us by a personal inspection of the institution during the work, play or drill of the boys, have expressed the greatest satisfaction with the general plan and management in detail.

The parents and guardians of many of the boys, who have untiringly prayed for their discharge, have, when your Honorable Board decided to grant their request, after investigating the new conditions of our school, decided that their retention at the institution for the present would be in the best interests of all concerned.

Employment has been found for many of those discharged by your Honorable Board, and it is gratifying to know that no complaint of their conduct or industry has been made by those who have employed them.

These facts speak louder than words of the accomplishment of the great purpose designed by the founders of the institution, and the fulfillment of your hopes of the past, their accomplishment at the present time, and a higher degree of usefulness in the future.

When we remember that those children are dependent delinquents, assigned by committing magistrates, often with evil tendencies difficult to eradicate, needing all that is supplied by orphan asylums on the one hand and semi-penal institutions on the other; to deal with such conditions discipline is made so attractive that the cheerful note of the bugle, or the rolling sound of the drum calls forth our small army with a zeal seldom seen outside of our institution; four companies officered and equipped, marching and countermarching with a precision of movement which seldom violates a rule of the military code. Spirited music from the school band of twenty instruments elevates the mind of our youthful soldiers to a degree that the past is forgotten, and their ambition is to become members of the guard, which is the highest award to be obtained—that of an officer of the institution. Their test of fitness must be qualified by education and the physical and moral training requisite to win commendation from your Honorable Board and the recommendation of your Superintendent.

With these necessary acquisitions we can furnish the deserving boys with a new start in life, and lead them into a world of usefulness outside of the portals of the Brooklyn Disciplinary Training School for Boys.

It is interesting to note the effort made by the boys on entering the institution to emulate those who have advanced by graduation to positions of distinction in the school, shops and drill. Before they have passed the necessary term of quarantine, the newcomers will stand erect, with military precision, and salute with the dignity of a veteran.

The conduct of the boys, I am reliably informed, was never so good as at present. A single instance of corporal punishment has not come under my observation, and I do not think it necessary, nor will I permit such a disgrace to be inflicted on the boys during my term of administration. An appeal to the boys themselves I have found to be the strongest weapon necessary, and I feel that a kind word and systematized encouragement are much more effective in winning their mental consideration of right and wrong. The physical and instructive occupations of the institutions have won them over to good morals and industry, and the worst punishment imposed on them for breaking a rule of the institution is to deprive the offender of his play-time and require him to stand against the wall of the dining-hall while others are seated, the time of punishment being regulated by the gravity of the offense.

The work of the day is divided into two periods; half of the complement of boys is at school, the conditions being reversed in the afternoons, while all assemble in the study hall at 6 for night class. Thus systematic instruction is given daily, morning, afternoon and night, in the common English branches; and no boys have ever entered a classroom needing mental development more than they. While many of them are unable to read or write, which is not

attributable to any fault of theirs, they grasp at the opportunity afforded them, and respond to the influence of the exercises so efficiently taught in the schoolroom and shops.

The marvelous progress they make in arithmetic, English, geography, history, writing, spelling, mechanical drawing, stenography and typewriting, is satisfactory as exhibited in the following schedule of recitations at the present session:

Much interest has been aroused in the boys by the Saturday afternoon full-dress inspection drill by the Superintendent. Its popularity is becoming quite a feature of the institution from the fact that the parents and guardians of the boys are permitted to review the little army in full marching order, complete in equipment, excellent in exercises. This innovation has won for your wards well-deserved praise from the highest military authorities, and particularly from the gentlemen of the October Grand Jury, from whose findings I take the liberty of quoting the following:

"We desire to call attention to that institution known as the 'Brooklyn Disciplinary Training School for Boys,' at Eighteenth Avenue and Fifty-seventh street, which has for its object the reclaiming of boys just entering upon a career of crime and making them useful members of society. This institution is really a school in which a boy is trained physically, mentally and morally. He receives a common-school education, as well as thorough instruction in the useful arts, mechanics, weaving, printing, tailoring, shoemaking, etc. Their training is based upon military discipline, teaching them the value of obedience. While this school receives only such as are committed by the courts, it is in no sense a prison. There are no bars or stripes or insignia of crime; not even a rattan. In fact, corporal punishment is not resorted to or permitted, and the boys are made to feel that they are good boys. The effect of this training is most gratifying, and we but wish the citizens of our borough could visit this school and know for themselves what is there accomplished. When one considers what expense criminals are to the community and the City, aside from the social and moral effect, investing in an institution of this character which rescues the boy from crime and reforms and restores him to the community an upright and useful citizen, yields an enormous dividend, not only in dollars and cents, but something far more precious.

This institution is especially fortunate in having for its President Mr. Morris Adler, and Mr. J. P. Farrell as its Superintendent, who are peculiarly suited for this work.

"Rather than spend \$150,000 in building a new female prison, which we consider useless and unnecessary, we respectfully suggest that the authorities invest in this Boys' Disciplinary Training School, thus enabling them to extend and do still more efficient work."

It may be stated that, contrary to all rules in similar institutions, every day in the week is a visiting day except Sunday, and the parents and guardians of the boys have full liberty to visit the institution between the hours of 8 in the morning and 6 o'clock at night. This has been found to give great satisfaction to those interested in their welfare, and inspires a spirit of liberty among the boys which was never known before.

Religious instruction is carefully administered by the visiting clergymen of the following denominations: The Reverend Doctor Adolph Radin, of New York, visits the school on Wednesday afternoons of each week to look after the spiritual welfare of the Hebrew boys; while the Fathers attached to the Church of St. Francis de Chantal at Blythebourne tender their faithful services on Sunday mornings to the Catholic boys in the institution chapel. Sunday afternoon is assigned to the Reverend C. W. Jefferis, whose zeal has been untiring in the interests of the Protestant boys of the institution.

Education is given daily, morning and afternoon, in printing, and a creditable exhibit of work performed in the shop may be seen.

The tailoring department is a model of its kind and perfect in detail. Twelve machines are run by an electric motor. Patterns are graded in sizes, and raiment to meet the demands of the institution is here manufactured, the boys making every article they wear—shoes, stockings, underwear, sweaters, uniforms and caps.

In addition, instruction is imparted in carpentering, wood turning, scroll sawing, carving, iron working, painting, tin smithing, boiler-working and electrical engineering.

In addition to the work in the shops, the boys are employed in the general cleaning of the house, kitchen, laundry and sewing-room. During the summer months squads of boys are kept busy in the vegetable garden, and the excellent condition of the grounds speaks loudly of their intelligence in landscape and flower gardening. Head and hand are attracted by interesting employment, and as we are not expected to produce more than our consumption, no task is imposed which will tire the scholar or make him feel that it is given for any other purpose than to educate him for self-support and usefulness.

When I entered upon my official duties, last June, the institution was in the hands of mechanics, who were making alterations and repairs under the supervision of the Department of Public Buildings, Lighting and Supplies, and, in my opinion, the \$30,000 awarded by the City for this purpose was never better expended than in the improvements made in the old brick structure and in the perfecting of its sanitary condition and that of the institution throughout, which state of things exists for the first time in its history.

A few hundred dollars was spent in painting and repairing the frame building, a structure almost as old as the Republic, and while your Honorable Board has expressed satisfaction at this small measure of consideration from the authorities, the same was entirely inadequate to complete the necessary improvements required; and to-day the institution falls far short of that object which the founders had in their minds, and is entirely out of proportion, as a structure, considering the great advantage of its location and the extent of its land, which is over nine acres.

Prior to the completion of improvements the Board of Health refused to pass on the structure, unless a hospital and detention ward were established. I converted one of the rooms in the old frame building into an hospital and established a dispensary in the hallway, and the detention ward for new arrivals is situated in a passageway connecting the brick with the frame structure. These necessary acquisitions were accepted by the Board of Health and a permit was granted to occupy the buildings; but the large increase in our population in proportion to our number of discharges threatens a condition of congestion in the near future that warrants the prompt action of your Honorable Board in presenting an application for a sum not less than \$150,000 for the extension, improvement, etc., of the old building, and the construction of a new building, as suggested in the report of the October Grand Jury, sufficiently large to accommodate a number not less than 700 boys. Personally, I have given careful consideration to this proposition, and have come to the conclusion that this is a great necessity in order to meet the imperative demands of the early future of this the only disciplinary training school under the control and depending upon the support of our great municipal government.

Why should a congestive condition close the doors of this institution against the very class for whose benefit it was especially established? Why should our magistrates and judges be forced to send boys, for whose elevation and correction this school was established and is adapted, to less favored institutions to meet the necessity and secure their ultimate reformation? Why should boys under the age of fourteen years be sent to institutions intended for older and more hardened criminals, when our school could be made fit to impart the educational as well as the moral knowledge required to enable them to be self-supporting, upright and respectable citizens by a special appropriation of \$150,000? The old frame structure could be removed 250 feet east of its present location and used as an hospital and isolation ward (as required by law), and a new structure, brick or brownstone, erected with all the necessary appliances for the accommodation of 700 boys. Only

with such improvements as here suggested can the institution fulfill the great economic mission it was destined to carry out.

Our present brick building is 100 by 60 by 40, or 240,000 cubic feet. The erection of a new building such as I suggest, 200 by 60 by 50, or 600,000 cubic feet, would accommodate the number of boys before stated at a cost to the City far below the present cost per capita. In presenting this suggestion to your Honorable Board I have set forth briefly the prosperous condition of the institution, which is far above the standard of accommodation and appliances therefor; and I feel that the authorities will consider seriously any proposition made in this direction by your Honorable Board, and that your appeal will be received with the same public spirit that our great city has been noted for in the past, and which we all hope for in the future.

In concluding my report, and in producing statements in detail of each of the various departments, I am reluctant to conclude without offering my thanks to your Honorable Board for the great support and consideration I have received from each member thereof, and with pleasure I can announce the success and prosperity of the institution at this date. I feel it is a duty to say that I have received the hearty support and co-operation of the employees of the institution, without whose good services my efforts would be of no avail.

With this high tribute to the administration, the school is fulfilling the great object for which it was instituted. I am,
