Proceedings of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund at a Meeting Held in Room 16, City Hall, at 11 O'Clock a. m., on Wednesday, October 23, 1907.

Present—George B. McClellan, Mayor; Herman A. Metz, Comptroller; James J. Martin, Chamberlain, and Patrick F. McGowan, President, Board of Aldermen.

Note—The President of the Board of Aldermen informed the Board that the Chairman, Finance Committee, Board of Aldermen, was unavoidably absent owing to serious illness in his family.

The minutes of the meeting held October 9, 1907, were approved as printed.

The Chair called for a hearing in the matter of the request of the Commissioner of Docks that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund authorize and assent to the institution of condemnation proceedings for the acquisition of the bulkhead between Piers (old) 52 and (old) 53, East river, Borough of Manhattan:

SIR—I would respectfully request that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund authorize and assent to the institution of condemnation proceedings for the following described property:

All the uplands, filled-in lands, lands, and lands under water, wharf property, rights, terms, easements, emoluments and privileges of and to the uplands, filled-in lands, lands, and lands under water, and wharf property situate, lying and being in the Borough of Manhattan, City of New York, and bounded and described as follows, to wit:

Bulkhead between Piers (old) 52 and (old) 53, East river, beginning at a point in the present bulkhead between Gouverneur slip and Jackson street, where the westerly side of Pier (old) 53, East river, intersects said bulkhead, said point of intersection being perpendicularly opposite or southerly of a point in the northerly line of South street, distant 31.01 feet from the westerly line of Jackson street, measured along the said northerly line of South street and running thence from said point of intersection westerly along the present bulkhead, between Pier (old) 52, East river, and Pier (old) 53, East river, 573.08 feet, westerly to the easterly side of Pier (old) 52, East river.

Under date of June 27, 1907, the Department of Taxes and Assessments advised that the property is known by Lots Nos. 18, 19, 19½, 20, 21 and 22, in Block 242 of Section 1, and is assessed for the year 1907 at \$89,000.

This property is required for the purpose of erecting three new piers which will add additional wharfage room in a section where it is greatly needed and from which demands are constantly coming.

The City already owns Pier (old) 52 and half of Pier (old) 53, East river, and proceedings for the condemnation of the remaining half of Pier (old) 53 are under way. It is now proposed to acquire the bulkhead between the two piers.

In order to permit the improvement of this section of the waterfront, I recommend that this property be acquired by condemnation proceedings.

If the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund so decide, they may, in my opinion, at a public hearing held as required by chapter 372 of the Laws of 1907, properly approve of and assent to the institution of condemnation proceedings for the acquisition of the bulkhead between Piers (old) 52 and (old) 53, East river, as requested by the Dock Commissioner.

SIR—Hon. J. A. Bense, Commissioner, Department of Docks and Ferries, in communication under date of June 13, 1907, requests the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund to approve and authorize the institution of condemnation proceedings for the acquisition of property between Thirteenth and Fourteenth streets, East river.

In my report dated February 5, 1906, recommending the adoption of the layout on the East river, between Eighth and Fourteenth streets, which was adopted by the Commissioner of Docks and Ferries on January 29, 1906, and approved by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund February 21, 1906, I stated that the portion of the proposed layout between Eighth street and the centre line of the block, between Twelfth and Thirteenth streets, is a continuation of the layout adopted and established by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund on December 19, 1888. The establishment of this layout will give a continuous marginal street, 175 feet in width, from Grand street to the centre line of the block, between Twelfth and Thirteenth streets.

The proposed basin between the centre line of the block between Twelfth and Thirteenth streets and Fourteenth street will permit of the erection by the Street Cleaning Department of a proper plant for the disposal of refuse consisting of covered dumping boards.

The land being necessary to carry out the improvement as adopted, if the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund and the Board of Estimate and Apportionment so decide, they may, in my opinion, at a public hearing, as required by chapter 372 of the Laws of 1907, properly approve of and assent to the institution of condemnation proceedings for the acquisition of property between Thirteenth and Fourteenth streets, East river, as requested by the Commissioner of Docks and Ferries.

"I beg to advise that, after due consideration, I am of the opinion that the interests of the City would be best served by leasing to the Joy Steamship Company, who have made application therefor, the following described property:

"The southerly half of the bulkhead between Piers (new) 28 and (new) 29, East river, Borough of Manhattan, extending from the northerly side of Pier (new) 28 to the portion of said bulkhead leased to the Central Vermont Railway Company, being a distance of about 83 feet, at a rental of \$2,200 per annum.

"The term to commence the first of the month next succeeding the date upon which the lease is approved by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund and to be continuous with the lease dated June 20, 1906, to the Joy Steamship Company, of Pier (new) 28, East river, together with the bulkhead between Piers (new) 27 and 28, East river, viz., ten years from the date the bulkhead between Piers (new) 27 and 28, East river, is completed and ready for occupancy; the lessee to have the privilege of renewal for a further term of ten years at an advance of 10 per cent. on the rental for the first term. The bulkhead between Piers 30 and 31, East river (130 feet), with the privilege of ice bridge, is leased to Edward McDonald at the rate of \$1,800 per annum.

"In this connection I beg to call your attention to the fact that the rental paid by the Joy Steamship Company for Pier 28, East river, is considerably higher than that paid for any other pier on the East river."

In advising a rental of \$2,200 per annum for this 83 feet of bulkhead, the Dock Commissioner uses as a basis the present rental of the northerly half of the bulkhead between Piers (new) 15 and 16, East river, leased to the New York and Texas Steamship Company.

I would call attention to the fact that on February 20, 1907, the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund approved of the leasing of Pier 48, North river, to the Clyde Steamship Company at a rental apparently less than the present rental of that pier, the reason for this action being that the City would by the terms of the lease secure possession of Piers 15 and 16, with adjoining bulkheads, "the rental value of which has very largely increased since the time the lease was granted to the New York and Texas Steamship Company." (See minutes of February 20, 1907.)

The rental paid by the New York and Texas Steamship Company for this property being \$51,000, and the Dock Commissioner having stated that he can obtain from \$10,000 to \$15,000 more for the property and sheds at the present time, I think that the present rental value of the northerly half of the bulkhead between Piers (new) 15 and 16, should be used as a basis for fixing the rental value of the southerly half of the bulkhead between Piers (new) 28 and 29, East river. I would accordingly advise that the rental of this 83 feet of bulkhead be fixed at \$2,450 per annum.

SIR—The Board of Water Supply in a communication under date of September 13, 1907, states that in addition to the premises now occupied by the Board in the Barclay Building, No. 299 Broadway, they desire to lease rooms 1401, 1402, 1403 and 1404 on the fourteenth floor in said building, and it is the intention to have these rooms occupied by the Real Estate Bureau of the Board, and that if the lease is made, the rooms now occupied by the Real Estate Bureau of the Board of Water Supply will be turned over to the Administration Bureau. That the lease, if authorized, will run from October 1, 1907, to May 1, 1910, the latter date being the one on which other leases of the Board of Water Supply will expire.

The rooms desired by the Board of Water Supply are at present, I understand, occupied, and that the tenants are willing to vacate the premises, and the owners of the building are willing to consent to the surrender of the lease, provided the City will occupy the four rooms. Certain partitions are now dividing the rooms into smaller

ones which will have to be removed, and the owners have agreed to remove them and put the rooms into condition to be occupied by the Board of Water Supply. The total area of square feet in the rooms is 1,110.

The rent asked is \$2,100 per annum, which is the same price per square foot that the City is paying for similar rooms in the building. The clerical force of the Board of Water Supply is increasing very rapidly in numbers and it will be absolutely necessary to find additional space for the additional clerks. The Comptroller presented the following report and offered the following resolution, relative to an issue of \$10,000 of Corporate Stock for repairs to roof and for new lantern, gutters, leaders, etc., Thirteenth Regiment armory, Borough of Brooklyn:

October 19, 1907.

Hon. HERMAN A. METZ, Comptroller:

SIR—At a meeting of the Armory Board held October 7, 1907, the following was adopted:

"Resolved, That the sum of ten thousand dollars (\$10,000), be and is hereby appropriated for repairs to roof, and for new lantern, gutters, leaders, etc., Thirteenth Regiment armory, in the Borough of Brooklyn; that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund be requested to concur therein, and authorize the Comptroller to issue bonds

to provide for the payment thereof, and that the Secretary be directed to advertise for bids or proposals for doing the work."

I would report: As previously reported to you on October 2, 1907, I consider that this work is necessary and urgent, and the amount requested, \$10,000, for the work is just and reasonable.

The work being a valuable and necessary improvement, I think the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund may properly concur in the resolution as requested by the Armory Board, and authorize the Comptroller to issue Bonds to the amount of \$10,000 for repairs to roof, and for new lantern, gutters, leaders, etc., Thirteenth Regiment armory, Borough of Brooklyn.

The contract by its terms was to close on June 1, 1907, but owing to the fact that Corporate Stock of the City had not been sold at that time, it became necessary to adjourn the acquisition of title until such time as the City was in a position to sell its Corporate Stock and pay for the acquisition of the property. This, of course, meant a delay in the erection of the armory, and the owners of the property consented that the City should enter into occupation of the same, the question of the amount of money to be paid as rent to be adjudicated thereafter. The title to the premises was closed on September 21, 1907, and the amount of money which it had been agreed upon that the City should pay as rent for the premises in question up to September 21, 1907, was \$4,141.66. There is no question that the City derived a very large benefit by being permitted to enter the property and begin building operations.

The claim being a just one, and the amount charged being fair and reasonable, I would respectfully recommend that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund approve of the hiring of the said premises situated on the easterly side of Fort Washington avenue, between West One Hundred and Sixty-eighth and West One Hundred and Sixty-ninth streets, Borough of Manhattan, and authorize the Comptroller to pay to Charles M. Rosenthal, Clementine M. Silverman and Milton M. Silverman, the sum of \$4,141.66, being in full settlement for all claims for use and occupation of the premises above described up to and including September 21, 1907, without the necessity of entering into a lease. Said rent to be paid from the fund entitled "Rents, 1907."

SIR—The Commissioner of the Fire Department in a communication under date of October 1, 1907, requests the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund to adopt a resolution renewing the following lease:

Lessor, Astoria Homestead Company; location, Nos. 354 and 356 Flushing avenue, Borough of Queens; purpose, quarters of Engine Company 163 and Hook and Ladder Company 67; expires December 1, 1907; amount per annum, \$1,300.

This property has been under lease to the City for a number of years past, the present existing lease having been authorized by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund at a meeting held November 30, 1904, the term being for three years from December 1, 1904, at an annual rental of \$1,200 for the first two years and \$1,300 for the third year. The Commissioner's request is now for a renewal for a period of one year from December 1, 1907, on the best terms that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund may be able to make with the lessors.

Since the receipt of the Commissioner's communication this office has received a letter from the Astoria Homestead Company in which they state that they have contracted to sell the premises, and that they will be unable to renew the lease at the time of its expiration. A copy of the same was immediately transmitted to the Commissioner of the Fire Department, with the request that he take some action thereunder.

Under date of October 14, 1907, this office is in receipt of a communication from Mr. Harry Pushae Williams, real estate agent, of No. 62 Jackson avenue, Long Island City, in which he states that his clients, Henning, Borbeck & Heyser, have contracted to acquire the property now used by the Fire Department, the lease of which expires in December, 1907, and that if the City wishes to renew the lease, he will be glad to receive a request thereon. Upon being interviewed he states that the owners are furniture dealers in Steinway avenue; that they purchased the property for their own use, and that it was their intention to refit the building as soon as the City moved out and have it ready for their business next spring, but inasmuch as there is no other available building for the use of the Fire Department in the neighborhood, they will consent to take a new lease of the building now occupied by them and thus be enabled to renew the City's lease of the firehouse for one or two years from December 1, 1907, the rental to be at the rate of \$2,000 per annum, being an increase of \$700.

For the Fire Department to lease a new building and make all the alterations and repairs necessary to fit it for departmental purposes would cost more than \$700. The fact is that the property is not worth \$2,000 a year as a rental value to anybody else but the Fire Department, and it is worth \$2,000 a year to the Fire Department to be permitted to remain there for a period of one year.

I desire to call the attention of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund to the fact that on April 27, 1906, or one year and six months ago, the City purchased from John D. Crimmins a parcel of land located just east of this present engine house site, being 53.07 feet in width on Flushing avenue by 50 feet in width on the rear and 97.91 feet on the westerly line and 116 feet on the easterly line, at the price of \$5,500, on which the Fire Department in its communication stated it intended to erect an engine house. No contract has been let for the erection of a building upon these premises, and for a year and a half the City has lost interest on the price of \$5,500, plus the taxes.

It seems to me that when the head of a department requests action by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for the acquisition of real estate for departmental purposes, especially where it takes the place of leased premises, some action should be taken by the Commissioner looking to the erection of a building thereon in order to void a lease.

The Commissioners of the Sinking Fund will therefore be compelled to renew this lease for the Commissioner of the Fire Department, and I would respectfully recommend that they adopt a resolution authorizing a renewal of the lease of the premises Nos. 354 and 356 Flushing avenue, Borough of Queens, as quarters for Engine Company 163 and Hook and Ladder Company 67 for a period of one year from December 1, 1907, at an annual rental of \$2,000, payable quarterly; the City to pay for the water used on the premises and to make all the repairs necessary. Lessors, Henning, Borbeck & Heyser.

I would also respectfully recommend that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund call the attention of the Commissioner of the Fire Department to the fact that the City has acquired for his use vacant land upon which a Fire Department house should be erected as soon as possible, and thus make the renewal of this lease upon its expiration in December, 1908, unnecessary.

NOTICE TO CONTRACTORS.

GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately. The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there.
