No. 379.

AN ORDINANCE providing for an issue of Corporate Stock in the sum of seventy-five hundred dollars (\$7,500) to provide means for the preparation of plans and specifications for the erection of refuse destructors, Engineers' houses, stables, etc., in the Borough of Richmond.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York as follows:

Section 1. The Board of Aldermen hereby approves of and concurs in the following resolution adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment April 16, 1909, and authorizes the Comptroller to issue Corporate Stock of The City of New York to the amount and for the purposes therein specified:

Resolved, That, pursuant to the provisions of section 47 of the Greater New York Charter as amended, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment hereby approves of the issue of Corporate Stock of The City of New York to an amount not exceeding seventy-five hundred dollars (\$7,500) to provide means for the preparation of plans and specifications for the erection of refuse destructors, Engineers' houses, stables, etc., in the Borough of Richmond, and when authority therefor shall have been obtained from the Board of Aldermen the Comptroller is authorized to issue Corporate Stock of The City of New York, in the manner provided by section 169 of the Greater New York Charter, to an amount not exceeding seventy-five hundred dollars (\$7,500), the proceeds whereof to be applied to the purposes aforesaid.

Section 430 of Part 1 of the Code of Ordinances of The City of New York, relating to the discharge of firearms, as amended, is hereby further amended by adding at the end thereof the words, "the grounds of the Robin Hood Gun Club, located in Fourth Ward, in Seventy-second Aldermanic District, Borough of Richmond."

The Chief Engineer was directed to prepare plans and specifications for rebuilding and extending the pier at the foot of Tenth street, East River, the width to be made so as not to interfere with the present line of the ferry racks, and to prepare plans and specifications for a new pier at the foot of Ninety-eighth street, East River (80963).

Permission (80843) was granted the Ogden estate to repair the platform and fender system of same, commencing at a point about 93 feet north of West One Hundred and Seventy-first street, Harlem River, and running thence northerly a distance of about 103 feet to the southerly boundary line of the Washington Bridge Park, Borough of The Bronx, all work to be kept within existing lines and to be done under the supervision of the Chief Engineer, the rental for the land under water and upland area belonging to the City and occupied by said platform to be hereafter fixed, it being understood and agreed that the granting of the permit shall not constitute an admission and recognition by the City of any title or claim of title of, in and to the premises in or on the part of the Ogden estate.

The Municipal Civil Service Commission was requested to authorize the reinstatement of Joseph Peloso as Dock Laborer, and was also requested to submit an eligible list for the position of Tinsmith and Roofer (80939).

A communication (80956) was received from the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund transmitting certified copies of resolutions adopted April 5, 1909, as follows:

1. Approving of and consenting to the execution of a lease to the Central Railroad Company of New Jersey of the 83½ feet of bulkhead next southerly of Pier (new) 46, North River, for a period coterminous with the lease of Pier (new) 46, viz.: October 25, 1914, with the privilege of renewal for a further term of ten years; the rental for the first term to be \$2,600 per annum, and for the renewal term 10 per cent. advance over the rental for the first term; the lessee to have the privilege of using the shed now on said bulkhead; the remaining terms and conditions of the lease to be similar to those contained in leases of wharf property now used by the Commissioner of Docks.

2. Approving of and consenting to the execution of a lease to Mrs. Theresa A. S. Sheridan of a portion of the southerly side of the pier foot of West Ninety-seventh street, North River, for a term of five years from May 1, 1909, with the privilege of renewal for a further term of five years, rental for the first term to be at the rate of \$2,062.50 per annum, and for the renewal term to be at an advance of 10 per cent. The remaining terms and conditions of the lease to be similar to those contained in leases of wharf property now used by the Department of Docks and Ferries.

3. Authorizing the Commissioner of Docks to enter into an agreement with Thomas B. Graham to purchase for the sum of \$250,000 the following described property:

All that certain piece or parcel of land, lands under water, bulkheads and the rights appurtenant thereto, situate, lying and being in the Borough of Brooklyn, The City of New York, County of Kings, State of New York, particularly bounded and described as follows:

Beginning at the point of intersection of the southerly line of Metropolitan avenue and the westerly line of River street; running thence southerly along the westerly line of River street to the northerly line of North First street; running thence westerly along the northerly line of North First street to the bulkhead at present existing on said premises; running thence northerly and along the line of the existing bulkhead in front of said premises to the southerly line of Metropolitan avenue; running thence easterly along the southerly line of Metropolitan avenue to the point or place of beginning, together with all the right, title and interest of the party of the first part in and to Metropolitan avenue, River street and North First street to the middle lines thereof, in front of and adjoining the above described premises; and also all the right, title and interest of the party of the first part in and to the land under water in front of said block of land; and all the right, title and interest of the party of the first part in and to that bulkhead and rights appurtenant thereto at present existing at the foot of the northerly half of North First street and all that bulkhead and rights appurtenant thereto at the foot of Metropolitan avenue between the southerly line of said Metropolitan avenue and the southerly line of the pier at present existing at the foot of said avenue, except such part thereof as the City now owns, with all the right, title and interest of the party of the first part in and to the land under water in front of said two bulkheads. Said agreement to be approved as to form by the Corporation Counsel.

4. Approving of the following terms of settlement of the litigation between the New York Contracting and Trucking Company and The City of New York, in relation to the use and occupation of the pier at the foot of West Seventy-ninth street, in the Borough of Manhattan:

1. All present litigation, including the proceeding to punish the former Commissioner for contempt for violating the injunction order now in force, to be discontinued, without costs.

2. The company to offer no opposition to the completion of the new pier as shown on the amended plans adopted by the Sinking Fund Commission.

3. The present lease of the pier to be surrendered and cancelled and a new lease to be given to the company of the southerly 25 feet of the pier, beginning at the bulkhead and extending westerly 340 feet. The company is to have the privilege of erecting and maintaining at its own expense a dumping board of a size and plan to be approved by the Commissioner of Docks. The new lease to be for a period of ten years with the privilege of one renewal of two years, at an advance of 10 per centum in rental. In all other respects said new lease is to be on the same terms as the present lease.

4. The City is to promptly and with as little interference as possible with the company's occupancy of the old and new piers, complete the new pier in the manner shown on the amended plans.

5. The company is to pay one-half of all rentals fixed by present lease since October 31, 1904, and the full rental up to that date.

Corporation Counsel requested to approve forms of lease to Central Railroad Company of New Jersey and to prepare papers in connection with the settlement of the New York Contracting and Trucking Company matter. The matter of the purchase of the Brooklyn property was referred to the Corporation Counsel for opinion as to what action should be taken.

The Corporation Counsel was requested to advise as to whether the Department has the right to adopt a regulation to the effect that the owner of the bulkhead shall have the right to use the slip within the lines of a triangle formed by bisecting the angle of the pier with the bulkhead and extending said line to the centre of the slip, the owner of the pier to have the use of the remainder of the slip, upon condition, however, that the owner of the bulkhead shall at all times have ingress and egress to his water-front.

The Corporation Counsel was also requested to advise as to whether this Department can grant permits to private parties to place floating docks or drydocks alongside of piers owned by the City in front of bulkheads owned by private parties, the drydocks to be placed in such a manner as not to interfere with access to such private bulkheads, or whether in case drydocks are placed alongside of piers in any position, it is necessary to first obtain the consent of the owners of the private bulkheads, if in the opinion of the Department the placing of such drydocks will not interfere with the ingress or egress to the adjoining bulkhead.

## TENEMENT HOUSE DEPARTMENT.

REPORT FOR THE YEAR ENDING DECEMBER 31, 1908.

Any proper estimate of the work accomplished, and the results attained by the Department during the year 1908, necessarily must be dependent largely upon a consideration of the extremely unusual and disturbing financial conditions which prevailed throughout the year. The effect of this stringency in the money market as regards the work of the Department was twofold in character. Not only did it bring the work of erecting new tenement houses almost to a standstill for a time, thereby decreasing materially the Department's opportunity for achievement in that direction, but it likewise seriously retarded the work of obtaining prompt and speedy compliance with orders issued. Thousands of property owners who recognized the legality and propriety of the orders issued by the Department, and who, under ordinary circumstances and conditions, would have proceeded at once to comply, were utterly unable to do so promptly. The result was that the reduction in number of pending violations was not as great as in some previous years.

## Old Buildings.

In connection with the supervision of old buildings, a very important part of the Department's work consists in investigating citizens' complaints. Much valuable information relative to conditions in the tenements is received by the Department in this form, and by no means the most important complaints are those which are signed. During the year 1908 the Department received 36,640 complaints; of these 13,532 were signed and 23,108 anonymous; 26,700 of the complaints received referred to Manhattan, 1,381 to The Bronx, 7,890 to Brooklyn, 544 to Queens and 125 to Richmond. Twenty-one thousand three hundred and ninety-nine complaints were either not within the jurisdiction of the Department, contained no proper basis of complaint, or had been previously acted upon. Fifteen thousand two hundred and forty-one violations were, however, filed upon investigation of the remaining complaints. Only 98 of these violations referred to new buildings in course of construction, and but 554 to the alteration of old buildings. Violations are filed upon old buildings either as a result of investigation of complaints or upon the regular inspections. During the year 1908 53,126 "old building" violations were filed. This was 2,311 more than the number recorded in 1907. Of these violations, 9,283 related to general structural matters, 6,150 referred to general sanitary conditions, 19,974 were in regard to cleaning and repairing, and 13,571 referred to fire escapes.

## Alteration of Existing Tenements.

During the year 1908, 4,000 alteration plans, affecting 4,557 tenement houses, were filed in the Department. Most of these plans were filed as a result of orders issued by the Department compelling owners to make in their buildings the structural changes required by law. The amount of voluntary alterations, for which plans were filed, was extremely slight, owing, of course, to financial depression. Six thousand eight hundred and sixty-three alteration violations were filed during the year; 3,244 in Manhattan, 659 in The Bronx, 2,664 in Brooklyn, 217 in Queens and 79 in Richmond.

As a result of these alterations many old tenements were much improved. In the matter of lighting, by the construction of 2,574 new skylights, the removal of wooden panels in 7,062 hall doors and the substitution therefor of glass panels, and the installation of 14,068 windows in dark rooms. In the matter of sanitary conditions by the removal of 426 school sinks and the installation of 3,654 water closets in their place.

## New Buildings.

The number of new tenements, for the erection of which plans were filed during 1908, was, as has already been stated, much less than in the years 1906 and 1907. In the year 1908, 1,054 new building plans were filed, providing for 2,001 buildings, to contain 22,283 apartments, or accommodations for approximately 100,000 people. In Manhattan, 187 plans were filed, for 249 buildings, to contain 7,913 apartments; in The Bronx, 238 plans were filed, for 503 buildings, to contain 6,204 apartments; in Brooklyn, 442 plans were filed, for 934 buildings, to contain 6,603 apartments; in Queens, 177 plans, for 305 buildings, to contain 1,503 apartments, and in Richmond, 10 plans, for 10 buildings, to contain 60 apartments.

## Amendments to the Law.

As a result of the Department's experience in enforcing the law, it was found that certain sections had wrought unnecessary hardship upon owners of tenements without any apparent benefit, while others, because of possibility of misinterpretation, needed more definite specification in order to sustain the Department in its administration of the law. The Department therefore took these matters under consideration, and, in co-operation with the Tenement House Committee, composed mainly of the original members of the Tenement House Commission, drafted an amendment to the law whereby the needed changes were made. By this amendment, which went into effect May 11, 1908, section 32 was changed so as to permit the minimum size of scuttles in old law tenements to be 21 by 28 inches, instead of 24 by 36 inches, as previously required. The requirements of this section were further modified to permit, in old law non-fireproof tenements where stairs and halls are of wood, bulkheads of wood covered with metal. Section 67 was amended so as to require that in new buildings no apartment of three rooms or less could extend more than 18 feet from the front or rear wall, as the case might be, without the intervention of a court, thus making clear the prohibition of the construction of long rooms which later might be subdivided. Section 71 was amended so as to define more clearly what is meant by alcoves, and to require alcoves to be separately lighted and ventilated.

An important modification was made in section 91, permitting cellar rooms in new buildings where the cellar ceiling was 2 feet above the curb. A new section, 97a, was added, permitting the occupancy of existing cellar rooms which had been found to be well lighted and ventilated and were in every respect fit for human habitation, although the ceiling was not 2 feet above the curb. Under this new section a janitor's apartment is permitted, providing that every room opens to the outer air, and at least one room opens upon the street or yard, and that the rooms are dry and otherwise fit for human habitation.

In the latter part of the year a request was made by several "Taxpayers' Associations," representing a large number of the owners of old law tenements, asking for a conference between the associations, the Tenement House Committee and the Tenement House Department, with a view to considering the possibility of further amendments to the law. The request was granted, the conference was held with amicable results, and a bill embracing a number of amendments was prepared for presentation to the Legislature, which it is hoped will remove much of the adverse criticism heretofore made concerning the administration of the Tenement House Law.

## Attempted Evasions Checked.

In connection with the erection of new buildings, a matter of the greatest importance, arising out of court interpretations during the preceding year of sections of the tenement house law relative to alcove rooms, was brought to a successful issue by the Department. The court decisions referred to resulted in attempts by certain architects and builders to construct, in the Boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens, rooms of such dimensions as would readily admit of subdivision after the building was completed. Plans were filed showing two apartments upon a floor, each apartment running through from front to rear of building and consisting of but two rooms. Many of these rooms were practically 40 feet in length and only about 9 feet in width. They were thus admirably arranged for subdivision into dark interior rooms, lacking both

light and ventilation, as soon as a certificate of completion could be obtained. This invariably was done by the use of portiere curtains, which resulted in such houses becoming known as "curtain flats." The Department successfully met this glaring attempt at evasion of one of the most important features of the Tenement House Law (the abolition of dark rooms) by the disapproval of plans in cases which presented an aggravated form of the alcove room features on the ground that the windows provided did not properly light all portions of the rooms. This action resulted in an appeal to the courts, and the contention of the Department was sustained by the same court which had held against it in the former litigation. Under this later decision the Department was enabled successfully to cope with the attempts to evade the law in the matter of dark rooms in new tenements.

## Moving Picture Exhibitions.

As a result of serious fires which occurred during 1908 in connection with moving picture exhibitions, the Department made investigations to ascertain whether the films used in such exhibitions were explosive or highly combustible and consequently dangerous to occupants of tenement houses in which such exhibitions might be held. These investigations, which embraced an examination of the reports of proceedings of experts concerning the dangers to life and property incidental to the exhibition of moving pictures, as well as the holding of a series of conferences with the representatives of the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, the Bureau of Combustibles and the Fire Department, convinced the Department that the requirements of section 40 of the Tenement House Act could properly be applied to govern the question as to moving pictures in so far as the tenements were concerned. The Department, therefore, not only refused to approve plans for the installation of moving picture plants, but also issued orders to the effect that all moving picture plants already located in tenement houses should be vacated immediately. This action of the Department, it is gratifying to note, has been unqualifiedly sustained by the courts, thereby finally disposing of a serious source of danger to the occupants of tenement houses.

## City Department Court.

The problem of disposing of court cases arising out of violations filed by the various City Departments has been impressed upon the Tenement House Department. As has been stated, 53,126 "old building" violations alone were filed by the Department during 1908. Many of these cases are promptly complied with, but, on the other hand, thousands of them have to be prosecuted in court. It is a physical impossibility for the courts, as now constituted, to dispose of all these cases promptly, since, in addition to the regular business of the courts, not only violations filed by this Department, but also those filed by all other City Departments, are referred to them. The result is that the Department is obliged to limit the number of cases proposed for disposition through the courts to the number which may probably be disposed of, and it very often happens that serious conditions arise because of the adjournments made necessary by the congested condition of the courts. As a means of modifying the evils resulting from present conditions the Department would suggest the creation of a new court or a special branch of the existing courts for the disposition of municipal cases only. The establishment of such a court, furnished with all the means necessary for facilitating the handling of municipal cases involving violations of laws and ordinances, including such offices and equipment as may be needed by the Corporation Counsel and the heads of the various City Departments having resort to this court, would result in more rapidly disposing of the numerous violations, which are fast accumulating and congesting the business of many of the City Departments.

## Encumbered Fire Escapes.

Probably no more serious problem continues to confront the Department than the question of what to do with tenants or occupants of buildings who persist in blocking the means of egress in case of fire, not only for themselves but for those upon the floors above them. Anything like an adequate and comprehensive handling of this important problem would require firm and consistent backing by the courts in subjecting violators of law to the prescribed penalty. It is obvious that no force of Inspectors, no matter how great, can keep fire escapes cleared by inspection alone. Encumbrances, removed in the presence of an Inspector, may be replaced within ten minutes after his departure. The imposition of a penalty, in cases where the warning was disregarded, would have an instant effect in bringing about a discontinuance of the practice. The Department, being at present without the support of the courts in this matter, is therefore obliged to confine its attention to cases arising out of citizens' complaints and conditions brought to the attention of the Inspectors during their visits to the tenements.

Improvement in the matter of fire protection during the year 1908 was effected by the provision of 6,593 fire escape balconies on 2,201 buildings. In addition the Department caused the clearance of 2,456 encumbered fire escapes.

## Changes in the Personnel of the Department.

The serious difficulty pointed out in the last annual report of the Department in regard to lack of appropriation for increases in salaries of faithful employees still continues. Within the past two years no less than two hundred and sixty-nine employees have left the Department. By far the greater number of these have left because of the fact that no prospect of advancement could be granted. Many were capable and experienced employees who had been in the service of the Department for years. The work of the Department is extremely technical in many of its branches and every skillful employee who leaves is a distinct loss to the City, as the time lost in training new employees in a Department of this size is a serious item for consideration.

## Preparations for 1909.

The Budget, as adopted for the year 1909, provided for the Tenement House Department a special appropriation for the purpose of carrying forward the work of ordering structural changes in old tenements to make them conform with the law, and of making a sanitary inspection of tenements at least twice during the year. Hitherto, owing to lack of appropriation, it has been impossible to carry on these branches of activity as vigorously as is desirable.

This additional appropriation is to be used mainly in enlarging the inspection force, with such increase in clerical force as is absolutely demanded to handle the work turned in by the field men. This will provide for the addition of between 90 and 100 Inspectors to the existing force and means that as these men will be untrained and inexperienced a certain amount of time necessarily must be taken in training them for the duties as Inspectors in the Tenement House Department. These duties are very detailed and depend as much upon practical acquaintance with the concrete conditions to be met, as upon the knowledge of the law required in the Civil Service examination which qualifies them for appointment.

After a period of training in both old building and new building work, the new force will be assigned to taking a complete and comprehensive census of the tenements. Such a census is a necessity as a foundation for both the special structural and sanitary work, and will give an actual enumeration of the tenements and the conditions found in them, such as has never been had before. It is proposed to keep this census record up to date by adding and subtracting all changes as they occur, so that at any given time it will be possible to tell just how many old tenements there are in the City; how many new law tenements; how many dark rooms; of what grades of darkness, ranging from those which have windows of illegal size, or opening on too limited an air space, to those that have no windows at all; how many school sinks remain, etc.

The census, when completed and compared with records on file in the Department, will serve as a basis for the structural work by showing how many old law tenements have already been covered by orders for structural change, and how many remain to be covered. Of those that are to be covered the census will show their relative condition, so that it will be possible (and it has been planned to do so) to take up houses showing the worst conditions first, advancing gradually through the different grades to the highest, which will need only slight changes to make them conform to the law. The census record is also needed as a basis for the special sanitary inspection, to give a record of all tenements where the apartment rental is \$25 or less, as it is this class of houses which the law requires to be inspected at certain definite, prescribed intervals.

It is expected that the training of the Inspectors and the taking of the census will necessarily take up a considerable portion of the first half of the year 1909. Notwithstanding this, however, it is hoped to make good progress with the first sanitary

inspection, and to issue structural orders covering all houses with school-sinks and the worst class of dark rooms; those with absolutely no windows. The latter half of the year then can be devoted by the additional force to the preparing of structural and sanitary orders, so that by the close of the year 1909 two complete sanitary inspections will have been made, one of tenements renting for \$25 per apartment and under, and one of all tenements, and orders will have been issued covering all of the graver structural defects in old tenements.

The Sanitary Superintendent submitted a report of the Chief of the Division of General Sanitary Inspection, regarding the sale of sour cream, and recommended that section 57 of the Sanitary Code be amended so as to apply to the sale of such cream. After considering the matter, it was

Section 57. No cream which is adulterated shall be brought into The City of New York or held, kept, sold or offered for sale in said City, nor shall anyone keep, have, sell or offer for sale in said City any such cream. The term "cream" means that portion of the milk represented in milk fat which rises to the surface of milk on standing or is separated from it by centrifugal force. The term "adulterated" when used in this section refers to cream to which any foreign substance whatever has been added, or which contains less than fifteen per cent. of butter fat.

The Sanitary Superintendent submitted a communication from the Commissioner of the Department of Street Cleaning, transmitting a copy of a letter of the Rev. Edwin Potter, advocating the adoption of a provision requiring that garbage receptacles be kept covered, and after considering the matter, it was

Resolved, That section 108 of the Sanitary Code be and the same is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

Section 108. It shall be the duty of every owner, tenant, lessee, occupant, or person in charge of any and every building, or place of business in the generally built-up portions of The City of New York, forthwith to provide or cause to be provided, and at all times thereafter to keep and cause to be kept and provided, within such building or place of business, and for the exclusive use of such building or place of business, separate receptacles for receiving and holding, without leakage, all the ashes, garbage and liquid substances that may accumulate during thirty-six hours, from said building or place of business, or the portion thereof of which such person may be the owner, tenant, lessee, occupant or in charge, and every such receptacle designed and used to hold ashes shall be made of or lined with some suitable metal.

And it shall be the duty of every owner, lessee or agent of any such building or place of business to cause to be separated and put into their respective receptacles all such materials and substances and such receptacles shall not be filled to within four inches of the top thereof.

And such receptacles, as well as any light refuse or rubbish to be removed, shall be kept within the premises until the proper time for removal, and shall then be placed in the area, or within the stoop-line, fence or other enclosure in front of any building and not upon the sidewalk, and shall there remain until such materials or substances are removed by the Department of Street Cleaning, but in no case shall such receptacles be placed where they shall be or become a nuisance.

All light refuse or rubbish, likely to be scattered or blown about, shall, before being placed outside of any building or premises for removal, be properly bundled, packed or otherwise secured.

Any receptacle containing garbage or liquid substances which shall be placed outside of a building in the area or within the stoop-line, fence or other enclosure shall be covered and kept covered until such removal as aforesaid.

A communication from Miss Beatrice Bend, secretary of the Women's Auxiliary to the Presbyterian Hospital Tuberculosis Clinic, offering the services of the Women's Auxiliary to work in conjunction with the Division of Communicable Diseases of the Department of Health in the district covered by the clinic for the care and treatment of communicable pulmonary diseases, located in the Borough of Manhattan, was received, and the Secretary was directed to communicate with Miss Bend and inform her that the generous offer of the Auxiliary is accepted by the Board and extend the thanks of the Board and expressions of its appreciation.

General Order No. 29.

1. The Police Commissioner has found the usual difficulty in distinguishing between the many meritorious acts performed by members of the Force in the year 1908. The awards herein made are selected from many deserving cases.

2. The Honorable Mention and Medal of the Police Department for the year 1908 (only one medal annually) is awarded to Patrolman James C. White, Twelfth Precinct.

3. The following medals presented by citizens to be awarded to deserving members of the Police Department are adjudged by the Police Commissioner for the year 1908, as follows:

The Rhinelander Medal to Patrolman Edward Burke, Seventy-ninth Precinct.  
The Isaac Bell Medal to Patrolman William A. Stevens, Twelfth Inspection District.

The Peter F. Meyer Medal to Patrolman Grover C. Brown, Eighty-first Precinct.  
\*The Brooklyn Citizens' Medal to Patrolman Clarence C. Smith, Bridge Precinct C.

The Medal of the Automobile Club of America to Patrolman Thomas F. J. O'Grady, Traffic Precinct C.

4. The Honorable Mention with Medal of the Police Department for the year 1908, is awarded to Patrolman James C. White, Twelfth Precinct, for personal courage and conscientious performance of police duty of very high order and at the risk of his own life, under the following circumstances:

At about 8.15 p. m., on December 27, 1908, Patrolman White arrested a man at the corner of Houston and Elizabeth streets. The prisoner stabbed him in the back and broke away, running east to the Bowery. In spite of his wound, Patrolman White pursued and overtook him only after he had reached midway between Houston and Bleecker streets on the Bowery, a distance of a block and a half. Police help then came. He captured his prisoner, and then collapsed from loss of blood. His wound was so serious that it kept him confined under charge of a Surgeon until January 11, 1909. The pursuit and recapture of this prisoner displayed physical and moral courage, and devotion to police duty under circumstances which would have offered to a man of less nerve a sufficient excuse for its abandonment.

5. The Rhinelander Medal is awarded to Patrolman Edward Burke, Seventy-ninth Precinct, for unusual courage at the risk of his own life under the following circumstances:

At about 2 p. m., on April 24, 1908, a horse attached to a brougham occupied by a lady became frightened at Seventy-first street and Fifth avenue, Manhattan, and ran away south. At Sixty-fifth street the carriage collided with an electric hansom and the driver of the brougham was thrown from his seat. His fright increased by this collision, the horse continued down Fifth avenue at utmost speed to Fifty-ninth street. At that point Patrolman Burke, then in Traffic Precinct C, sprang for the horse and succeeded in catching hold of one of the lines, and although at once thrown to the ground and dragged to Fifty-eighth street, he kept his hold and in spite of his speed succeeded in bringing the animal to a stop, thus saving the occupant of the brougham from serious injury and from possible death. In addition, his spring at the horse at Fifty-ninth street caused the animal to swerve and thereby saved a woman with a baby carriage and two children who were crossing to Central Park and were directly in the line of its flight. Patrolman Burke sustained a fractured rib and a ruptured groin, which detained him on sick leave for two months.

The conduct of this officer exhibited great personal courage and an indifference to risk, as well as that rapidity of thought and action which is so often shown by members of the Force in stopping runaways.

6. The Isaac Bell Medal is awarded to Patrolman William A. Stevens, Twelfth Inspection District, for unusual gallantry at the risk of his own life under the following circumstances:

About 7.30 p. m., on August 31, 1908, while the steamer "Grand Republic" was leaving the dock at the foot of First avenue, College Point, a man made a jump for the boat and fell into the water. Patrolman Stevens immediately divested himself of his hat, coat, revolver and billy, and jumping in caught the man under both arms, and with great difficulty, owing to the swell caused by the paddle wheels, he swam with him to a pile of the dock. As he reached the pile, two other men were crowded off the boat, which was backing on a hawser, and fell into the water. Patrolman Stevens, hearing the cries of the passengers that there were two more men overboard, looked around and saw them splashing in the water. Telling the first man to hold on to the pile, he swam to the other two men and kept them afloat until the hawser was slackened down to reaching distance. The boat having then come to a stop, both men clung to the hawser. Patrolman Stevens then swam back to the pile and brought the first man over, staying by the three until heaving lines were thrown, which he fastened to each, and they were pulled aboard the boat. At this juncture a fourth man was crowded off the boat and falling, struck Patrolman Stevens on the head and shoulders, forcing him under the water and grabbing him about the neck as he came up. Patrolman Stevens struck him a slight blow in the face, which loosened his hold, and then went under the water and came up behind him, and catching him under the left arm kept him afloat until another line was thrown from the boat, which he placed around him, and the man was pulled aboard. Patrolman Stevens was then taken aboard himself.

The action of Patrolman Stevens evinced utter disregard of his own safety, and the rescue of four men under conditions involving imminent personal risk was an exhibition of determined bravery and efficiency.

7. The Peter F. Meyer Medal is awarded to Patrolman Grover C. Brown, Eighty-first Precinct, for extraordinary courage at the risk of his own life under the following circumstances:

At about 1.30 p. m., on August 21, 1908, Patrolman Brown, on duty in plain clothes, saw a crowd of people on Van Duzer street, Tompkinsville, Staten Island, many of whom were shouting that a man had shot and killed a man and woman at Swan and Bay streets. Running to Swan street the officer saw a man hurrying through it, flourishing a revolver. It was subsequently learned that he had fired three shots, though without effect. Patrolman Brown pursued him to Bay street, where the man stopped, and, facing his pursuer, fired a shot directly at him from a distance of about thirty-five feet, and then stood with his revolver pointed at the officer and awaiting his approach. Without falter Patrolman Brown, shouting that he was an officer, and firing a shot over the man's head, hurried to him, disarmed and arrested him.

The courage which took no account of personal risk as compared with duty, raises this action of Patrolman Brown to high distinction.

\* This medal is awarded by a committee consisting of the First Deputy Police Commissioner, the Borough President and Mr. Williard E. Edmister.

8. The Brooklyn Citizens' Medal is awarded to Patrolman Clarence C. Smith, Bridge Precinct C, for valor at the risk of his own life under the following circumstances:

On October 11, 1908, an insane laborer climbed over the railing of the footpath of the Williamsburg Bridge and proceeded along the cable to the top of the tower. As he approached the top the attention of Patrolman Smith and another Patrolman was called to the man's action by a citizen. Both Patrolmen started to ascend the tower by means of the stairway, as did also two citizens. Patrolman Smith was the first to reach the top, where he found the man concealed under the cable hoods. He immediately grasped him by the shoulder and endeavored to draw him from the place. He was joined by the second Patrolman, and after a struggle they managed to draw him to the stairway, and being joined at that point by the two citizens, were able after great difficulty to overcome the frantic struggles of the prisoner and succeeded in reaching the footpath of the bridge in safety. A razor was found in the man's pocket, and when questioned, he stated that he wanted to commit suicide by jumping from the tower. Having been examined by a surgeon, he was found to be suffering from acute dementia and was removed to the hospital.

The courage and promptness displayed by Patrolman Smith under such precarious conditions renders his action one of unusual merit.

9. The medal presented by the Automobile Club of America is awarded to Patrolman Thomas F. J. O'Grady, Traffic Precinct C, for the extraordinary courage and skill displayed at the risk of his own life, under the following circumstances:

At about 12.20 p. m., on June 6, 1908, a horse attached to an express wagon took fright at a passing automobile on Thirty-sixth street, between Fifth and Sixth avenues, while the driver was at its head adjusting the bridle. It ran away east to Madison avenue, where the driver was thrown under the wagon. The horse turned south and continued down Madison avenue at full speed. Patrolman O'Grady had been on mounted duty on Fifth avenue and had started in pursuit when he saw the horse cross that avenue. He overtook the runaway at Madison avenue and Thirty-fifth street, but the bridle had become detached and the officer's attempt to seize his head failed. He continued his pursuit to Thirty-second street, where the runaway collided with another wagon. At this point Patrolman O'Grady grasped the horse's mane and vaulted to his back from his own mount. Leaning forward he grasped the nose of the runaway and succeeded in bringing him to a stop at Thirty-first street.

This thrilling feat of Patrolman O'Grady is an example of what courage, coolness and readiness of resource will accomplish.



Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment hereby grants to the United Electric Service Company the franchise or right fully set out and described in the following form of proposed contract for the grant thereof, embodying all of the terms and conditions, including the provisions as to rates, fares and charges upon and subject to the terms and conditions in said proposed form of contract contained, and that the Mayor of The City of New York be and he hereby is authorized to execute and deliver such contract in the name and on behalf of The City of New York, as follows:

#### PROPOSED FORM OF CONTRACT.

This contract, made this day of 1909, by and between The City of New York, hereinafter called the City, party of the first part, by the Mayor of said City, acting for and in the name of said City, under and in pursuance of the authority of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of said City (hereinafter called the Board), and the United Electric Service Company, a domestic corporation of the State of New York (hereinafter called the Company), party of the second part; witnesseth:

In consideration of the mutual covenants and agreements herein contained, the parties hereto do covenant and agree as follows:

Section 1. The City hereby grants to the Company, subject to the conditions and provisions hereinabove set forth, the right and privilege to lay, construct, maintain and operate suitable wires or other electrical conductors in conduits under the streets, avenues and highways within the territory comprised in the Borough of Manhattan, for the purpose of connecting by means of such wires, call boxes, or other signalling apparatus, to be placed upon the premises of the subscribers, with offices of the Company, and thereby maintaining and operating an electrical signal system for the calling of messengers, an electrical burglar alarm system and a fire alarm system, and for no other purpose whatsoever.

Sec. 2. The grant of this privilege is subject to the following conditions:

First—The rights, privileges and authority herein granted shall not be construed to in any way give the Company the right, privilege or authority to engage in a telephone business, or to render telephone service, and this contract is entered into on the mutual and express understanding and agreement by and between the parties hereto, that the Company will not in any way engage in a telephone business or render telephone service, or claim the right so to do under this contract and the rights, privileges and authority therein and thereby granted and conferred.

Second—The said right and privilege to lay, construct, maintain and operate wires or other electrical conductors in conduits for the purpose aforesaid shall be held and enjoyed by the Company, its successors or assigns, for the term of fifteen (15) years from the date when this contract is signed by the Mayor, with the privilege of renewal of said contract for a further period of ten (10) years upon a fair revaluation of said right and privilege.

If the Company shall determine to exercise its privilege of renewal it shall make application to the Board or any authority which shall be authorized by law to act for the City in place of the Board. Such application shall be made at any time not earlier than two years and not later than one year before the expiration of the original term of this contract. The determination of the revaluation shall be sufficient if agreed to in writing by the Company and the Board, but in no case shall the annual rate of compensation to the City be fixed at a less amount than that sum required to be paid during the year prior to the termination of the original term of this contract. If the Company and the Board shall not reach such agreement on or before the day one year before the expiration of the original term of this contract, then the annual rate of compensation for such succeeding ten (10) years shall be reasonable, and either the City (by the Board) or the Company shall be bound, upon request of the other, to enter into a written agreement with each other, fixing the rate of such compensation at such amount as shall be reasonable, but in no case shall the annual rate so fixed be less than the sum required to be paid for the last year prior to the termination of the original term of this contract, and if the parties shall not forthwith agree upon what is reasonable, then the parties shall enter into a written agreement, fixing such annual rate at such amount as shall be determined by three disinterested freeholders, selected in the following manner:

One disinterested freeholder shall be chosen by the Board; one disinterested freeholder shall be chosen by the Company; these two shall choose a third disinterested freeholder; and the three so chosen shall act as appraisers and shall make the revaluation aforesaid. Such appraisers shall be chosen at least six months prior to the expiration of the original contract, and their report shall be filed with the Board within three months after they are chosen. They shall act as appraisers and not as arbitrators. They may base their judgment upon their own experience and upon such information as they may obtain by inquiries and investigations without the presence of either party. They shall have the right to examine the books of the Company and its officers under oath. The valuation so ascertained, fixed and determined shall be conclusive upon both parties, but no annual sum shall in any event be less than the sum required to be paid for the last year prior to the termination of the original term of this contract. If, in any case, the annual rate shall not be fixed prior to the termination of the original term of this contract, then the Company shall pay the annual rate therefore prevailing until the new rate shall be determined, and shall then make up to the City the amount of any excess of the annual rate then determined over the previous annual rate. The compensation and expenses of the said appraisers shall be borne jointly by the City and the Company, each paying one-half thereof.

Third—Upon the termination of this original contract or if the same be renewed then at the termination of the said renewal term, or upon the termination of the rights hereby granted for any other cause, or upon the dissolution of the Company before such termination, the plant and property of the Company used for maintaining and operating an electrical signal system for the calling of messengers, an electrical burglar alarm system, and a fire alarm system within the streets and highways of the City shall become the property of the City without cost, and the same may be used by the City for any purpose whatsoever. If, however, at the termination of this grant, as above, the City, by the Board, shall so order by resolution, the Company shall on thirty (30) days' notice from the Board remove any and all of its wires, or other electrical conductors, or any portion thereof, from any or all of the streets and public places within the City.

Fourth—The Company shall pay to the City for the said privilege, the following sums of money:

The sum of five thousand dollars (\$5,000) in cash within thirty (30) days after the date on which this contract is signed by the Mayor.

During the first five years of this contract an annual sum, which shall in no case be less than twelve hundred dollars (\$1,200), and shall be equal to two (2) per cent. of the gross receipts of the Company, if such percentage shall exceed the sum of two thousand five hundred dollars (\$2,500).

During the succeeding five years of this contract an annual sum which shall in no case be less than two thousand five hundred dollars (\$2,500), and shall be equal to three (3) per cent. of the gross receipts of the Company, if such percentage shall exceed the sum of two thousand five hundred dollars (\$2,500).

During the remaining five years of this contract an annual sum which shall in no case be less than four thousand five hundred dollars (\$4,500), and which shall be equal to four (4) per cent. of the gross receipts of the Company, if such percentage shall exceed the sum of four thousand five hundred dollars (\$4,500).

The minimum annual sums herein provided for shall be paid to the Comptroller of the City in equal quarterly payments in advance on the first days of January, April, July and October of each year. Whenever the percentage required to be paid shall exceed the minimum amounts, such sum over and above such minimum shall be paid to the Comptroller on or before December 1 in each year for the year ending September 30 next preceding.

Fifth—The said annual charges or payments, as above specified, shall continue throughout the whole term of the original contract, notwithstanding any clause in any statute or in the charter of any other company providing for payments for similar rights or franchises at a different rate, and no assignment, lease or sublease of the rights or franchises hereby granted, or any part thereof, shall be valid or effectual for any purpose unless the said assignment, lease or sublease shall contain a covenant on the part of the assignee or lessee that the same is subject to all the conditions of this contract, and that the assignee or lessee assumes and will be bound by all of said conditions as to payments, any statute or any condition herein contained to the contrary notwithstanding, and that the

said assignee or lessee waives any more favorable conditions created by said statute or its charter, and that it will not claim by reason thereof, or otherwise, exemption from liability to perform each and all of the conditions of this contract. Nothing herein contained shall apply to any mortgagee or mere lienor, but shall apply to any purchaser upon foreclosure or under or by virtue of any provision of a mortgage or lien.

It is agreed that any and all payments to be made by the terms of this contract by the Company to the City shall not be considered in any manner in the nature of a tax, but that such payments shall be in addition to any and all taxes of whatsoever kind or description now or hereafter required to be paid by any ordinance of the City or by any law of the State of New York.

Sixth—The rights and privileges hereby granted shall not be assigned, either in whole or in part, or leased or sublet in any manner, either by the act of the Company, its successors or assigns, or by operation of law, whether under the provisions of the statute relating to the consolidation or merger of corporations or otherwise, to any person or corporation whatsoever, nor shall the Company, its successors or assigns, in any manner consolidate or pool its stock, business or interests or enter into any agreement for a division of business interest or territory, or to prevent competition or a reduction in rates, or acquire, own or make use of or in any manner exercise control over any of the rights, privileges, franchises or stock, or use, own, control or operate any of the property, works, plants or appliances of any such persons or corporation without the consent of the City, acting by the Board, evidenced by an instrument under seal, anything herein contained to the contrary thereof in any wise notwithstanding, and the granting, giving or waiving of any one or more of such consents shall not render unnecessary any subsequent consent or consents.

Seventh—The Board may by resolution direct the Company to install free of charge messenger call boxes or fire alarm signals, with the necessary appurtenances thereto, in any or all of the offices of the City situated in the portion of Manhattan in which the Company shall be operating such apparatus.

Upon written notification of the Board to the Company that such resolutions have been adopted the Company shall install such apparatus free of charge, and shall furnish service at rates not to exceed seventy-five (75) per cent. of the rates charged by the Company to any other individual or corporation for similar service.

Eighth—The Company shall construct, maintain and operate its messenger and alarm system, subject to the supervision and control of all the authorities of the City who have jurisdiction in such matters under the Charter of the City, and in strict compliance with all laws or ordinances, now in force or which may be adopted, affecting companies operating electrical conductors in the City.

Ninth—All cables and wires of the Company laid pursuant to this contract shall be placed in ducts, conduits or subways (referred to in this paragraph as subways). Such subways shall be leased from the company or companies having control thereof under the provisions of law, or from the City should it succeed to the rights of such company or companies. If the City shall construct or acquire subways for electrical conductors in the Borough of Manhattan, the Company hereby agrees to lay its wires and conductors in such subways and the City agrees to lease to the Company such space as may be required for the operation of the signal and alarm systems hereby authorized.

Tenth—The Company shall, within two years from the date on which this contract is signed by the Mayor, have in operation at least two thousand (2,000) messenger call boxes, otherwise this grant shall cease and determine.

Eleventh—The Company shall file with the Board, on the first day of November in each year, a map, plan or diagram upon which shall be plainly marked and designated the streets and public places in which are then laid and also those proposed to be laid, during the succeeding year, the several conduits and ducts necessary for the cables and wires used and to be used by the Company, together with a statement showing the number of ducts in each street and wires in each duct occupied.

Twelfth—It is a condition of this contract that the Company shall bear the entire expense of all

the cost of such repairs, with legal interest thereon, all of which sums may be deducted from the fund hereinafter provided.

If, for a period of three consecutive months the messenger, fire alarm or burglary alarm systems of the Company shall not be operated, or if the same shall not be operated for a period of six months out of any consecutive twelve months, the Board may declare the right and franchise and this contract terminated without further proceedings in law or in equity.

Eighteenth—The Company shall at all times keep accurate books of accounts and shall, on or before November 1 in each year, make a verified report to the Comptroller of the City of the business done by the Company for the year ending September 30 next preceding. Such report shall contain a statement of the gross receipts received from the operation of the systems hereby authorized from all subscribers served by the Company, together with such other information and in such form and detail as the Comptroller may require. The Comptroller shall have access to all books of the Company for the purpose of ascertaining the correctness of its report and may examine its officers under oath.

Nineteenth—The Company shall submit a report to the Board not later than November 1 of each year, for the year ending September 30 next preceding, which shall state:

1. The amount of stock issued, for cash, for property;
2. The amount paid in as by last report;
3. The total amount of capital stock paid in;
4. The funded debt by last report;
5. The total amount of funded debt;
6. The floating debt as by last report;
7. The amount of floating debt;
8. The total amount of funded and floating debt;
9. The average rate per annum of interest on funded debt;
10. The amount of dividends paid during the year and the rate of same;
11. The amount paid for damage to persons or property on account of construction and operation;
12. The total income during the year, giving the amount from each class of business;
13. The total expenses for operation, including salaries;
- and such other information in regard to the business of the Company as may be required by the Board.

For failure to comply with the foregoing the Company shall pay a penalty of one hundred dollars (\$100) per day until such statement is rendered, which may be collected by the Comptroller without notice.

Twentieth—This grant is upon the express condition that the Company, within thirty (30) days after the execution of this contract, and before anything is done in exercise of the rights conferred thereby, shall deposit with the Comptroller of the City the sum of five thousand dollars (\$5,000), either in money or securities to be approved by him, which fund shall be security for the performance by the Company of the terms and conditions of the contract, especially those which relate to the payment of the annual charge for the franchise granted, in default of which payment of the annual charge the Comptroller, acting in behalf of the City, shall collect same with interest from such fund after five days' notice in writing to the Company. In case of failure of the Company to comply with the terms of this contract relating to the filing of annual statements and the commencement and increase of construction, or its neglect or refusal to comply with any demand or direction of the Board or other municipal officials, made pursuant to the terms of the contract, or under the authority of any laws or ordinances now or hereafter in force, in such case and in any of these events the Company shall pay to the Comptroller of the City a penalty of \$1,000 for each violation, and in case of any violation of the provisions relating to the illegal use of wires, the Company shall pay to the Comptroller of said City for each violation a penalty of not less than \$100, and not more than \$500, to be fixed by the said Comptroller.

The procedure for the imposition and collection of the penalties provided in the grant shall be as follows:

The Comptroller of the City, on complaint made, shall, in writing, notify the Company, through its president, to appear before him on a certain day, not less than five days after the date of such notice, to show cause why it should not be penalized in accordance with the foregoing provisions. If the Company fails to make an appearance, or, after a hearing, appears, in the judgment of the Comptroller, to be in fault, said Comptroller shall forthwith impose the prescribed penalty, or where the amount of the penalty is not prescribed herein, such amount as appears to him to be just, and without legal procedure withdraw the amount of such penalty from the security fund deposited with him. In case of any drafts made upon the security fund the Company shall, upon ten days' notice in writing, pay to the Comptroller of the City, a sum sufficient to restore said security fund to the original amount of \$5,000, and in default thereof the contract may be revoked at the option of the Board, acting in behalf of the City. No action or proceeding or rights under the provisions of the grant shall affect any other legal rights, remedies or causes of action belonging to the City.

Twenty-first—In case of any violation or breach or failure to comply with any of the provisions of this contract, which shall have been continued for a period of three months after notice given by the Corporation Counsel, the same may be forfeited by a suit brought by the Corporation Counsel on notice of ten days to the Company.

Twenty-second—If at any time the powers of the Board or any other of the authorities herein mentioned or intended to be mentioned, shall be transferred by law to any other board, authority, officer or officers, then and in such case such other board, authority, officer or officers, shall have all the powers, rights and duties herein reserved to or prescribed for the Board or other authorities, officer or officers.

Twenty-third—The word "notice" wherever used in this contract, shall be deemed to mean a written notice. Every such notice to be served upon the Company shall be delivered at such office in the city as shall have been designated by the Company; or if no such office shall have been designated, or if such designation shall have for any reason become inoperative, shall be mailed in the city, postage prepaid, addressed to the Company at the city. Delivery or mailing of such notice as and when above provided shall be equivalent to direct personal notice, and shall be deemed to have been given at the time of delivery or mailing.

Twenty-fourth—The Company promises, covenants and agrees on its part and behalf to conform to and abide by and perform all the terms, conditions and requirements in this contract fixed and contained.
