Minutes of Meeting of the Municipal Civil Service Commission of New York, Held Wednesday, August 27, 1913, at 10 o'clock A. M.

Present—President Frank Gallagher and Commissioner Alexander Keogh. The President presided.

A public hearing was had on the proposed amendment of the Municipal Civil Service Classification by striking from the Exempt Class, under the heading "Department of Parks," the title "Chief Engineer, Brooklyn and Queens," and substituting therefor the following: Chief Engineer, Brooklyn; Chief Engineer, Queens. Honorable Walter G. Eliot, Commissioner of Parks, Borough of Queens, appeared in behalf of the proposed amendment. There were no other appearances and the Chair declared the hearing closed.

A public hearing was had on the proposed amendment of the Municipal Civil Service Classification by striking from the Exempt Class, under the heading "Office of the Commissioners of Accounts," the titles: Chief Accountant, Expert Accountant, 15 Chief Examiners of Accounts, and substituting therefor the following: Seventeen Examiners. Hon. Harry M. Rice, Commissioner of Accounts, appeared in favor of the proposed amendment. There were no other appearances and the Chair declared the hearing closed.

The Commission then went into regular session, and the minutes of two meetings held August 20 were approved.

AN ORDINANCE to amend section 516 of chapter 13 of part 1 of the Code of Ordinances of The City of New York, in relation to "Contracts for Supplies and Work for the City."

Be it Ordained, by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, as follows: Section 1. Section 516 of chapter 13 of part 1 of the Code of Ordinances of The City of New York relating to "Contracts for Supplies and Work for the City" is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

Sec. 516. The sealed envelope containing the estimate shall be endorsed with the name or names of the person or persons presenting the same, the date of its presentation, and a statement of the work to which it relates, and no estimate shall be taken from the "Estimate Box" or the sealed envelope thereof, opened by any one, except at the time and in the manner herein designated for deciding on such estimates. At the time and place appointed for that purpose in the proposals as prescribed in this article, the head of the department, or the president of the board where the same are advertised by a board, or the secretary thereof, or other officers empowered to make the contract, in the presence of the Comptroller or his representative, and such of the parties making them as may desire to be present, shall then and there open the said estimate box and the estimates to be examined at that time, as may appear from the endorsements thereon, shall be taken from said box. The said head of department

or other party hereinbefore authorized shall then and there publicly open and read all estimates which he may have received for the contract mentioned in such proposals, and shall reject all estimates not furnished in conformity with the law and the ordinances relating thereto and the requirements thereof. The award of the contract shall be made according to law.

Section 2. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

BELLEVUE AND ALLIED HOSPITALS.

A meeting of the Board of Trustees of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals was held on August 14, 1913.

Present—Dr. Brannan, the President, in the chair; Messrs. O'Keeffe, Sachs and Stern, Trustees, and Mr. Drummond, Commissioner of Public Charities. Excused—Messrs. Farley, Paulding and Robbins.

Mr. Stern was appointed Secretary pro tem.

The minutes of the meeting of July 31 were held as read and approved.

Bills amounting to \$65,348.21 were approved, and forwarded to the Comptroller for payment.

Dr. George O'Hanlon, the General Medical Superintendent, reported as follows:

Considerable damage was done at Fordham Hospital by the storm on Sunday afternoon, much glass being broken throughout the hospital, and awnings torn away. Many of the patients on the balconies got a thorough wetting before they could be gotten into the wards, but no one suffered by reason of the experience.

The resignation at Gouverneur Hospital of Mr. Schoenherr, Investigator, is reported.

It has been necessary to expend about one hundred dollars to have the boat Westfield thoroughly pumped out and put in proper condition. At Bellevue Hospital repairs are being made to the boat Southfield, which is also in rather bad condition owing to deteriorations as a result of age. A contractor is replacing the running board and gangplank, and making such other repairs as will render it safe for a time. So much money is being constantly expended to keep these two boats in condition that it would seem desirable to consider some permanent provision for these cases if they are to continue being cared for by the hospitals.

Some time ago authority was granted to revise the contract with the Croker National Fire Prevention Engineering Co., so as to place it on the same basis as their contract with the Department of Public Charities. On investigation it was found that this department is receiving more in the way of drills and inspections than the Department of Charities. The Croker company have agreed to reduce their estimate approximately two hundred dollars for the remainder of the year, and approval of this rate is requested.

At the last meeting a report was requested in regard to patients Carrigan and Wise, who had been transferred to the Department of Public Charities, and had died within twenty-four hours. In each of these cases, the patients were seen personally by Dr. Fleming, who felt, in view of their history and the symptoms manifested at the time, that they were proper cases for transfer, and that their death would not occur in the immediate future. The attention of the visiting physicians, who usually sign the transfers on the day made, has been called to the necessity of exercising their very best judgment in these cases, and they have been directed not to consider for transfer any patient whom they have reason to feel would be injured or whose death would be hastened by such transfer.

John Pedry or Buchelle, a laborer, sixty years of age, died in Bellevue Hospital on August 10, and the case was referred to the Coroner to determine the cause of death. This patient received treatment in the dispensary from June 30 to July 11, when Dr. Seward Erdman prescribed hot air bakes and massage. On July 23, while in the hot air room of the baths, which was heated to a temperature of between 150 and 160 degrees, the patient in some manner fell to the floor. He called for assistance, and the Nurse responded immediately. Dr. Rutledge, the Admitting Physician, examined the patient and found that he had suffered a burn of the left shoulder and arm, with considerable bleb formation. The patient had a temperature of 106 degrees, which fell to 101 degrees within two hours after his admission to the ward. He remained conscious, but was irrational and rambling from the time of his admission until his death. He responded poorly to treatment, running a continuous temperature of 102 degrees. The symptoms would indicate that he suffered from a condition similar to a heat stroke, and this, rather than the burns, was the cause of his death.

The report submitted by Mr. Wright regarding food and food waste at Bellevue Hospital is receiving the attention of those responsible for the food service. Experiments are being made of different methods of serving the food, the result of which will be reported. A representative of Mr. Wright's office recently spent a week weighing in detail the food left on the plates, and he found there was much less waste of usable food than at the time of his previous report, when the weights on which he based his statement were of all foods taken together, which included coffee grounds, watermelon rinds, etc. In his previous statement he compared the waste at Bellevue with that at the Kings Park State Hospital. In making this comparison, there are differing conditions which should be considered. At Bellevue, the Doctors, Nurses, and employees, by reason of their duties, cannot sit down at the table and all be served at one time, while at the Kings Park State Hospital the house staff is comparatively small, and for lunch and dinner they are all able to be at the table at a specified hour. The same condition exists as far as the Nurses there are concerned, their meals being served in the same dining room, and at the same time as the patients. This matter is receiving personal attention, and it is hoped that a more complete report will be submitted at the next meeting.

At the last meeting a further report was requested in regard to the recent illness of doctors and Nurses at Harlem Hospital. Immediately upon receiving the report of this illness Dr. Gonzales, the Pathologist, was asked to make a thorough and complete investigation, and Dr. Norris and the writer visited Harlem Hospital and made a personal investigation. Dr. Gonzales made an examination of all food stuffs consumed the day preceding the onset of the epidemic. He also examined the blood, urine and feces of all persons ill. The meat could not be examined as it had been entirely consumed. The results of his examination were negative, except in the cans of lima beans, which showed some putrefactive changes, the cause of which it was impossible to ascertain. These cans had been delivered at the storeroom about two months before they were used, and cans of the same delivery had been used in the other hospitals and at Harlem without any ill effects; also some of the persons ill at Harlem had not partaken that day of the beans.

There is approximately \$3,000 left in the appropriation for the purchase of motor vehicles, which would permit of procuring an additional ambulance. Authority to make this purchase is requested.

On separate motion, duly seconded and carried in each instance, action was taken upon the report of the General Medical Superintendent as follows:

The resignation of the Investigator at Gouverneur Hospital was accepted, and the General Medical Superintendent was directed to appoint a successor.

The expenditure to have the Westfield and Southfield put in proper condition was approved, and it was

Resolved, To take no action in regard to replacing these boats at the present time. The General Medical Superintendent was authorized to execute the revised contract with the Croker National Fire Prevention Engineering Co. for the remainder of the year 1913 on the terms set forth.

The report in regard to transferring patients to the Department of Public Charities was approved.

The General Medical Superintendent was directed to have glass panels placed in the doors leading from the corridor to the hot air room at Bellevue Hospital.

It was resolved not to use the canned lima beans from the present purveyor during the summer, and if any should be bought from other dealers, to have a preliminary chemical examination made before acceptance.

It was resolved to approve of the purchase of an additional motor ambulance, and to request the Board of Aldermen for permission to buy the same in the open market without public letting at a cost not to exceed \$3,000.

Reports of Committees.

Mr. O'Keeffe reported, on behalf of the special committee appointed to select a Purchasing Agent, that they had given due consideration to the qualifications of the several candidates and recommended the appointment of Mr. A. H. Witschleben, at present connected with the Department of Finance.

Resolved, To appoint Mr. Witschleben as Purchasing Agent of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals, subject to the approval of his transfer to this department by the Finance Department and the Municipal Civil Service Commission.

Mr. O'Keeffe, on behalf of the Fordham Hospital Conference Committee, reported that in accordance with the request of the Medical Board a meeting of the Conference Committee had been held at Fordham Hospital on the afternoon of July 31, and recommended as follows: First—that an additional place of Consulting Neurologist be created at Fordham Hospital; second, that the nominations by the Medical Board of Dr. Joseph Byrne and Dr. Herbert V. deV. Cornwell as Consulting Neurologists be approved; third, that Dr. George Reese Satterlee be appointed to the place of Visiting Physician to Fordham Hospital; and fourth, that Dr. Joseph M. Sheridan be appointed Assistant Surgeon to out patients (Laryngologist). This report was approved and its recommendations adopted.

The President reported, on behalf of the special committee appointed to accompany Dr. Lambert to see the Comptroller in regard to setting aside the classification for Social Service Nurses, in order to secure additional Ward Nurses, that Mr. Paulding and Dr. Lambert had called on the Comptroller, but that as he was preparing to leave for a vacation it was impossible to take up the subject with him at the time. This report was accepted.

Consideration was given to the preparation of the Departmental Estimate for 1914, and the Finance Committee, to whom this had been referred, recommended as follows:

First—That provision be made in the estimate for increases in salaries and wages to the amount of \$13,710, and for the sum of \$93,852.90 for new and additional positions, according to a detailed list, a copy of which had been sent to each member of the Board.

Second—That in addition to these amounts provision be made in the estimate for the renewal of the full sum of the appropriation for salaries and wages granted for 1913.

Third—That provision be made for the renewal of all supplemental appropriations that have been obtained or requested from January 1, 1913, to date.

Fourth—That the sum of \$898,500 be requested for all funds other than salaries, which is the amount estimated to be required for 1914.

Fifth—That the request of the Resident Alienist for a change in his title to that of Director of Psychopathic and Alcoholic Service be approved without change of duties.

Sixth—That, subject to the approval of the Training School, the title of the General Superintendent and Superintendent of Training School be changed to "Director of Nursing" or "Supervising Nurse."

The Finance Committee further reported:

First—That provision had been made in the above estimate for the additional employees necessary for the proper administration of Pavilions I, K, L and M of the new Bellevue Hospital.

Second—That provision had been made for the payment of the day wage employees while on military service.

Third—That the request of the Training School for additional Nurses had been included.

Fourth—That provision had been made for the payment of a salary to one Physician and one Surgeon on each of the four divisions of Bellevue Hospital.

After consideration, on motion, duly seconded and carried, the report of the Finance Committee was approved and its recommendations adopted, and it was

Resolved, That provision be made in the Departmental Estimate for 1914 for the increases in salaries, new positions, and other recommendations set forth above.

It was reported that after including these various amounts the total of the Departmental Estimate for 1914 would be as follows:

Communications.

The President presented a communication from Henry C. Wright, Director of Investigation of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment Committee on Inquiry into the Departments of Health, Charities, and Bellevue and Allied Hospitals, in regard to patients who had been kept in the psychopathic wards of Bellevue Hospital for more than twenty days, together with a report thereon which he had requested from the Resident Alienist. After consideration, it was moved, seconded and carried, to authorize the President to communicate with Mr. Wright, transmitting a copy of the report submitted by the Resident Alienist.

A letter dated August 13 was presented from McKim, Mead & White, transmitting plans and specifications for the enclosures for the ends of the balconies on pavilions A and B of the new Bellevue Hospital. These were referred to the Building Committee.

A communication dated August 14 was presented from the Municipal Civil Service Commission, presenting an eligible list from which to make a promotion to the position of General Medical Superintendent, and certifying Dr. George O'Hanlon as the only man on this promotion list.

Resolved, To appoint Dr. George O'Hanlon as General Medical Superintendent of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals, to become effective at once.

A communication dated August 9 was presented from the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, transmitting copies of two resolutions adopted on July 31 approving of transfers of funds within the appropriations for 1913 and revising the schedules accordingly. This communication was ordered placed on file.

Unfinished Business.

The President referred to the delay in the work on the roof wards of pavilions A and B at Bellevue Hospital. It was reported that the contractor was negotiating with a prospective assignee, and in view of this it was

Resolved, To take no action at the present time.

A motion to adjourn the meeting was seconded and carried.

The estimated deficits in these funds are due to the following causes:

382. Food Supplies. The budget allowance of \$346,000 is \$1,000 less than the amount requested in the departmental estimate, which was based on the actual quantities consumed. The additional amount of \$28,000 requested at this time is caused mostly by the increased cost of meats and poultry.

384. Fuel Supplies. \$10,000 of the amount allowed in the Budget for this appropriation was transferred to other funds to meet the pressing demands upon them. The \$4,247.50 required, together with \$72,752.50, the balance in the fund at the present time, is less than the original appropriation.

386. Medical and Surgical Supplies. The amount of \$84,800 appears to be inadequate, as the activities of the first seven months and some of the known needs of this Department for the balance of the year indicate that \$17,200 additional funds will be required for this appropriation.

389. General Plant Supplies. The activities for the first seven months indicate that an additional amount of \$1,656 will be required for the balance of the year. As this is a new titled appropriation for the year 1913, we have no guide other than the above.

395. Wearing Apparel. The anticipated deficit of \$8,780 is based on the following figures: \$280 for the increased cost of doctors' uniforms; \$8,500 transferred to other funds.

396. General Plant Equipment. The sum of \$1,980 is needed to reimburse this appropriation for the amounts transferred to other funds.

399. General Repairs to Plant. The sum of \$5,800 is needed to reimburse this appropriation for the transfers made to other funds.

The above request for Revenue Bonds is to take the place of the recommendation of March 17, and consideration is here given to the transfers effected or pending.

Additional funds are urgently needed for several of the appropriations, and as it is improbable that the authorization of special revenue bonds can be secured in time to meet the anticipated demands on these funds, it is recommended that the following transfers within the appropriations for the year 1913 be made:

In recommending these transfers, as in the case of previous transfers, it is understood that the request for special revenue bonds is to be modified to meet the changed conditions of the appropriations.

A request has been received from the Contract Clerk and Auditor for authority to advertise for the supplies for the balance of the year 1913.

The list of supplies which are to be delivered into the stock of the General Drug Department of the Department of Public Charities will cost approximately \$13,000, and it is estimated will balance the account between the General Drug Department and this Department at the end of the year 1913.

Approval of a list of furnishings for pavilions L and M, and authority to advertise for same, are requested.

The painting and cleaning of the house recently leased for the use of the School for Midwives, at 225 E. 26th st., will be completed within two or three days, and as soon as the furniture can be installed, it will be possible to increase the pupils in the school to about fifty.

A request has been received from the Edison Company for permission to obtain some photographs of the buildings and grounds of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals, for the purpose of a short sketch which is to appear in the Edison Monthly. They represent that the sketch is to be historical and instructive.

A request has been received from the Acting Superintendent of Training Schools for permission for the Board of Managers to supplement the salary of Miss Grace Davis, Assistant Housekeeper in the Nurses' residence at Bellevue Hospital, by \$180, effective as of September 1. In addition to her regular duties she is assuming the class work in dietetics for both Senior Nurses and the preliminary courses, which necessitates her giving additional time.

On separate motion, duly seconded and carried in each instance, action was taken upon the report of the General Medical Superintendent as follows:

It was Resolved, To request the Board of Aldermen to issue revenue bonds in the amount of \$68,663.50 to meet the anticipated deficit in the appropriations for the year 1913, this request to replace that authorized by the Trustees on April 15;

It was Resolved, To request the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to authorize transfers within the appropriations for the year 1913 as recommended by the General Medical Superintendent;

It was Resolved, To authorize an advertisement for the supplies required for the remainder of the year 1913 in accordance with the list submitted by the General Medical Superintendent;

It was Resolved, To approve of the transfer to the General Drug Department of the Department of Public Charities of the supplies listed by the General Medical Superintendent;

It was Resolved, To authorize an advertisement for the furnishings for pavilions L and M of the new Bellevue Hospital;

It was Resolved, To deny the request of the Edison Company for permission to obtain photographs of the buildings of the department;

It was Resolved, To permit the Board of Managers of the Training School to Supplement the salary of Grace Davis, Assistant Housekeeper, by \$180.

The General Medical Superintendent presented lists of special Nurses, who had been authorized at Bellevue Hospital from August 14 to September 3, at Harlem Hospital from June 18 to July 23, and at Fordham Hospital from July 16 to July 22, and on motion, duly seconded and carried, the appointment of these Nurses was approved.

Reports of Committees.

The Building Committee reported on the request of John T. Loew, attorney for the L. J. Wadsworth Construction Company, for the adoption of an overtime certificate so that the liquidated damages would in amount agree with the resolution adopted by the Trustees on December 3, 1912, and recommended, as the final certificate adopted by the Trustees on May 20, 1913, had been made in accordance with the advice of the Corporation Counsel, that no further action be taken at this time, but that if the petitioner can secure from the Law Department an opinion whereby his request can be acceded to, that the matter be again presented for consideration. The report of the Building Committee was approved and its recommendations adopted.

The Building Committee reported, in regard to communications from R. F. Almiral, dated July 22, and September 2, recommending the acceptance of a proposal from Joseph DiBenedetto for changing certain fixtures in the roof ward at Fordham Hospital, that the estimate of \$155 appeared to be excessive, and recommended that the Architect be requested to furnish another and itemized estimate. The report of the Building Committee was approved; and it was

Resolved, To inform the Architect that in the opinion of the Trustees the cost of these changes is excessive, and to request him to obtain another proposal, or at all events an itemized estimate.

The Building Committee reported on the request of Luke A. Burke & Sons Company for an extension of six months' time on their contract for the erection of the Nurses' residence at Harlem Hospital, and recommended, on account of the delay in getting structural steel during the fall of 1912 and other difficulties encountered during the inclement weather of the winter of 1912-1913, that the time be extended to January 1, 1914. After consideration, it was

Resolved, To grant the contractors an extension on their contract time to January 1, 1914.

The Harlem Hospital Conference Committee recommended the appointment of Dr. Max Spiegel as Assistant Physician to Out-patients, and on motion, duly seconded and carried, this report was approved and Dr. Spiegel appointed accordingly.

Communications.

The minutes of the Executive Committee of the Bellevue Hospital Medical Board for August 13 were presented. The resolution asking the Trustees to request the hospitals transferring fracture cases to Bellevue and the Allied Hospitals, where the patient is wearing a plaster cast, to have the cast so cut that it may be readily removed and reapplied, was approved, and the Secretary was instructed to communicate with the hospitals of the City accordingly; the report of the Committee appointed for the purpose of investigating the treatment of fractures in the hospital was approved, and the Secretary was requested to send a copy thereof to Mr. Wright, Director of Investigation of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment Committee on Inquiry into the Departments of Health, Charities and Bellevue and Allied Hospitals.

The minutes of the meeting of the Executive Committee of the Bellevue Hospital Medical Board held on August 27 were presented. It was

Resolved, To request the Board of Coroners to allow a representative of the Pathological Department of Bellevue Hospital to be present at all autopsies on cases from that hospital; the recommendations in regard to the rearrangement of the wash room connected with the operating room, the use of soft soap, and the discontinuance of the use of lime and soda as a hand disinfectant, were referred to the General Medical Superintendent.

A statistical report on the medical and surgical services at Bellevue Hospital was presented from Henry C. Wright, Director of the investigation into the Departments of Health, Charities, and Bellevue and Allied Hospitals for the Board of Estimate and Apportionment. This report was referred to the General Medical Superintendent.

Communications dated August 22 were presented from J. H. Freedlander, transmitting preliminary plans and specifications for the alterations to the power house and ambulance station at Harlem Hospital, and calling attention to the necessity for letting contracts for the equipment of the new ward wing at that hospital. On motion, duly seconded and carried, the plans and specifications were referred to the Building Committee for consideration and report; and it was

Resolved, To take no action at this time on the question of letting contracts for the equipment of the new ward wing, as an appropriation for this purpose had not been granted.

A communication was presented from J. H. Freedlander, transmitting copy of a letter from Pattison Brothers, Consulting Engineers, stating that the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity would not approve of the plans for the alterations to the present Harlem Hospital until the rewiring of that building was included in the specifications. It was reported that this would involve an expenditure of \$6,000 in excess of the appropriation available, but that a request for funds for this purpose had been included in the Departmental Estimate for 1914. It was moved, seconded and carried to refer this to the Building Committee, to obtain, if possible, the approval by the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity of the plans as submitted.

A communication was presented from McKim, Mead & White, transmitting estimate of \$997 from the Lincoln-Steele-Fleming Company for the erection and completion of one additional balcony on Pavilion B of the new Bellevue Hospital. On the recommendation of the Architects and of the Building Committee, this proposal was accepted.

A communication was presented from McKim, Mead & White, in regard to the completion of the contract for lighting fixtures in the laundry building of the new Bellevue Hospital by the Century Gas and Electric Fixture Company, and recommending, in view of the insolvency of this firm that steps be taken to have the work completed either by the bondsmen or by a new contractor. After consideration, on motion, duly seconded and carried, it was

Resolved, To ask the sureties to complete this contract, and should they fail to do so, to request the Corporation Counsel to begin abandonment proceedings.

A letter dated September 2 was presented from McKim, Mead & White, confirming the selections made on that day of the colors for the floors in Pavilions L and M of the new Bellevue Hospital. On motion, duly seconded and carried, these colors were approved and the letter ordered placed on file.

The President submitted a copy of a communication which he had addressed to McKim, Mead & White, under date of August 25, in reference to the stretcher guards placed in the halls of Pavilions L and M, together with their reply. After discussion, it was moved, seconded and carried, to refer this matter to the Building Committee for consideration and report.

A communication dated August 18 was presented from the Department of Finance, transmitting executed copy of the lease for the premises at 197 Monroe st., to be used as a residence for the Nurses of Gouverneur Hospital. This communication was ordered placed on file.

Copies of four resolutions adopted by the Board of Aldermen on July 15 and approved by the Mayor on August 20, were presented, authorizing the issue of corporate stock, as follows: (1) \$8,500 for enclosing ends of balconies on Pavilions A and B of the new Bellevue Hospital, (2) \$45,000 for making alterations to the present building at Harlem Hospital, (3) \$75,000 for the construction of an addition to the power house and ambulance station at Harlem Hospital, and (4) \$30,000 in addition to corporate stock heretofore authorized for the construction of additional ward wing at Harlem Hospital. These resolutions were ordered placed on file.

Unfinished Business.

Consideration was given to the reawarding of the contracts for the (1) construction of the new ward wing extension of Harlem Hospital, and for the (2) steamheating and ventilating and (3) plumbing and gasfitting in that building, bids for which were opened on July 31, inasmuch as the corporate stock appropriation to which these contracts were chargeable was not signed by the Mayor until August 20. On motion, duly seconded and carried, it was

Resolved, To accept the lowest bid received in each case, and to award contracts to P. J. Brennan, E. Rutzler Company, and P. F. Kenney Company.

A motion to adjourn the meeting was seconded and carried.

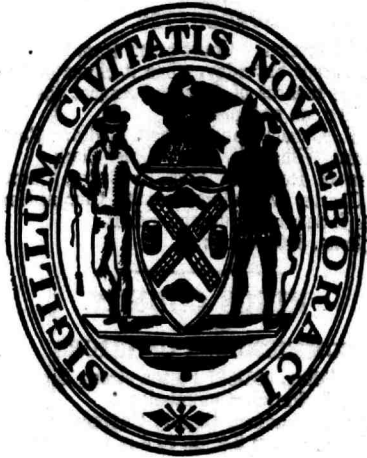

The City and the Interborough Rapid Transit Company will both be parties to the contract; the Interborough Rapid Transit Company being a party for the purpose of disbursing part of its contribution toward the cost of construction, as provided in the contract dated March 19, 1913, between The City of New York, acting by the Commission, and Interborough Rapid Transit Company, for the equipment, maintenance and operation of additional rapid transit railroads. TERMS AND CONDITIONS UNDER WHICH BUILDINGS, ETC., WILL BE SOLD FOR REMOVAL FROM CITY PROPERTY.

THE BUILDINGS AND APPURTENANCES thereto will be sold to the highest bidder, who must pay cash or certified check, drawn to the order of the Comptroller of The City of New York, and must also give a certified check or cash in half the amount of the purchase price as security for the faithful performance of the terms and conditions of the sale. Where the amount of the purchase price does not equal or exceed the sum of \$50, the sum of \$50 shall be the amount of the security to be deposited. This security may at any time after the expiration of the contract period be applied by the City to the cost of completing any of the work required under the contract, but unfinished at the expiration of the contract period.

The purchaser shall not lease, occupy, cause or permit the building or buildings, etc., purchased by him to be used or occupied for any purpose other than that of their speedy removal, nor shall he collect any rental or other revenue for the use of either the land or the buildings, etc., situated thereon. Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a Department, chief of a Bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.
