Sanitary Bureau.

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending June 5, 1880. The total number of inspections made by the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors was 1,989, as follows:

4 public buildings, 915 tenement houses, 105 private dwellings, 74 other dwellings, 12 manufacturing and workshops, 27 stores and warehouses, 29 stables, 14 slaughter-houses, 1 lime-kiln, 2 manure dumps, 1 garbage dump, 8 public sewers, 21 sunken and vacant lots, 2 garbage scows, 1 lodging house, 2 docks, 1 marsh, 3 lard rendering establishments, 91 yards, courts, and areas, 90 cellars and basements, 114 waste pipes and drains, 302 privies and water-closets, 31 streets, gutters, and sidewalks, 31 dangerous stairways, 9 smoky chimneys, 9 cesspools, 1 piggery, 26 other nuisances, together with 63 visits of the Sanitary Inspectors to cases of contagious disease.

The number of reports thereon received from the Inspectors was 1,049.

During the past week 108 complaints were received from citizens, and referred to the Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.

Permits were issued to the consignees of 99 vessels to discharge cargoes, on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port.

230 permits were granted scavengers to empty, clean, and disinfect privy sinks.

The Disinfecting Corps have visited 67 premises where contagious diseases were found, and have disinfected and fumigated 59 houses, 59 privy sinks, together with clothing, bedding, etc.

One case of measles was removed to hospital by the Ambulance Corps.

Bureau of Vital Statistics.

The certificates of 490 births, 32 still-births, 200 marriages, and 501 deaths, reported to have taken place in this city, were received by this Bureau during the week ending Saturday, June 5, 1880; this shows a decrease of 12 births, 14 still-births, 23 marriages, and 182 deaths, when compared with the number received during the preceding week, but when compared with the corresponding week of the year 1879, there was an increase of 46 births and 11 deaths, and a decrease of 2 still-births and 42 marriages. Compared with the mortality reported during the preceding week, the deaths from small-pox decreased 1; measles, 10; scarlatina, 7; diphtheria, 9; croup, 1; whooping cough, 3; typhoid fever, 3; malarial fevers, 4; puerperal diseases, 7; diarrhoeal diseases, 14; inanition, 2; rheumatism and gout, 5; cancer, 1; phthisis pulmonalis, 6; bronchitis, 15; pneumonia, 36; heart diseases, 10; marasmus, tabes mesenterica, and scrofula, 1; meningitis and encephalitis, 8; convulsions, 20; direct effect of solar heat, 10; apoplexy, 4; all diseases of the brain and nervous system, 50; enteritis, gastritis, and peritonitis, 3; cyanosis and atelectasis, 4; premature and preterm births, 2; suicide, 4; and drowning, 5; while the deaths from cerebro-spinal fever increased 1; aneurism, 1; alcoholism, 6; Bright's disease and nephritis, 7; and surgical operations, 1. The number of deaths from erysipelas and hydrocephalus and tubercular meningitis, was the same in the two succeeding weeks.

Deaths from the principal Zymotic Diseases, Phthisis Pulmonalis, Pneumonia, Bronchitis, and Children under five years of age, reported during the week and compared with the three preceding weeks.

The ages of 112 of the persons who died during the week were reported to be under one year; 157 under two years; 193 under five years, and 35 seventy years and over, which shows that the deaths of children under five years of age were 127 less than the number reported during last week, and represent 38.52 per cent. of the total weekly mortality.

Of the total number of deaths reported for the week, 114 were in institutions, 255 in tenement houses, 113 in houses containing three families or less, 6 in hotels and boarding-houses, 12 in rivers, streets, boats, etc.; 7 were on the basement floor, 92 on the first, 131 on the second, 79 on the third, 51 on the fourth, 14 on the fifth, 0 on the sixth; 492 were stated to be residents of New York city, and 9 non-residents, 72 were stated to be single, 132 married, 57 widowed, and the condition of 240 was not stated; these were children who had not attained a marriageable age.

The total number of burial permits issued during the week are as follows, viz.: City deaths, 501; still-births, 32; bodies in transitu, 21; of the total burial permits issued for city deaths and still-births 81 were upon certificates received from the Coroners; 490 births, 200 marriages, 32 still-births, 501 deaths, 21 applications for transit permits were recorded, indexed and tabulated; 39 searches of the registers of births, marriages and deaths were made, and 2 transcripts of the birth record, 4 of marriage, and 24 of death were issued during the week.

The mean temperature for the week ending June 5, 1880, was 66.1 degrees Fahr., the mean reading of the barometer was 29.976, the mean humidity was 71, saturation being 100, the number of miles traveled by the wind was 1,084, and the total amount of rain-fall was 1.14 inch depth of water, as reported by D. Draper, Director of the New York Meteorological Observatory, Central Park.

LAW DEPARTMENT,
OFFICE OF THE COUNSEL TO THE CORPORATION,
NEW YORK, June 9, 1880.

Hon. JOHN WHEELER, Secretary of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment :

SIR—I duly received a copy of the following resolution, adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on the 3d instant : "Resolved, That the matter of the transfer of the powers, duties, etc., of the Department of Buildings to the Fire Department, be referred to the Counsel to the Corporation for his opinion as to the constitutionality of the act (chapter 521, Laws of 1880), and as to the power of the Board to make such transfer."

Even the Court of Appeals will not pass upon the constitutionality of a statute unless it is necessary to the determination of the appeal (Frees vs. Ford, N. Y., 176. People vs. Board of Supervisors, 2 Keyes, 291), and as a general rule statutes are not declared unconstitutional except by the Courts of last resort, and then only in cases where there is a clear conflict with the constitution, and in which there is no rational doubt. As was said by an eminent judge in the case of Macomber vs. The Mayor (17 Abb., Pr. 35), "No court has a right to declare a legislative act unconstitutional unless it is glaringly so." In view of the reluctance of states, which the highest Courts decide, or even consider, questions in regard to the constitutionality of statutes, I am of the opinion that the act referred to in the above resolution should be treated by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment as a valid and constitutional law; until and unless it shall be decided otherwise by the Courts.

I am also of the opinion that the Board has the power to comply with the request of the Fire Commissioners, and to transfer to their Department the balance of the appropriation heretofore made to the Building Department, over and above such amount as may be necessary to pay all claims heretofore incurred by the latter department. There is some ground for claiming that the legal effect of the provisions of chapter 521 of the Laws of 1880 is to transfer the balance of this appropriation to the Fire Department, but, as a matter of abundant caution, I think the Board of Estimate and Apportionment should adopt a resolution formally making such transfer. In ordinary cases, transfers under the act of 1874 can only be made upon the consent of the department from which the money is taken. In the present case, of course, no consent can be given by the former Superintendent of Buildings, as his office has ceased and determined, and the Department of Buildings has been abolished. If such transfer is necessary at all, I think the Board of Estimate and Apportionment can lawfully make it upon the request of the Fire Department, which is, by the terms of the statute, vested with all the powers and duties formerly devolved upon the Building Department.

THE COMPTROLLER OF THE CITY OF NEW YORK hereby gives notice to owners of Real Estate in said city, that, as provided by chapter 123 of the Laws of 1880, they may now pay any arrears of taxes and Croton water rents levied prior to the year 1877, with interest thereon at the rate of seven per cent. per annum. CHAPTER 123.

AN ACT in relation to arrears of taxes in the City of New York, and to provide for the reissuing of revenue bonds in anticipation of such taxes.

Passed April 15, 1880; three-fifths being present.

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. At any time after the passage of this act, and before the first day of October, eighteen hundred and eighty, any person may pay to the Comptroller of the City of New York the amount of any tax upon real property belonging to such person, heretofore laid or imposed and now remaining unpaid, together with interest thereon at the rate of seven per cent. per annum, to be calculated from the time that such tax was imposed to the time of such payment, provided, also, that the time when such payment may be made on the amount of any such tax laid or imposed

in the years eighteen hundred and seventy-seven, eighteen hundred and seventy-eight, and eighteen hundred and seventy-nine shall extend to the first day of April, eighteen hundred and eighty-one. The comptroller shall make and deliver to the person making any such payment a receipt therefor, and shall forthwith cancel the record of any such tax on the books of the finance department; and upon such payment being made such tax shall cease to be a lien upon the property and shall be deemed fully paid, satisfied and discharged, and there shall be no right to any further interest or penalty by reason of such tax not having been paid within the time heretofore required by law, or by reason of any statute passed requiring the payment heretofore of any penalty or interest over seven per centum per annum upon any unpaid tax.

Sec. 2. Any revenue bond heretofore issued in anticipation of the taxes in the first section specified which may fall due and become payable before said taxes are collected, may be reissued by the comptroller of said city, in whole or in part, for such period as he may determine, not exceeding one year.

Sec. 3. This act shall take effect immediately.
