Sanitary Bureau.

The following is a report of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending March 1, 1884

The number of inspections made during the week was 5,100; the number of complaints received from the Inspectors during the week was 855. During the past week 156 complaints have been received from citizens and referred to the Sanitary

Inspectors for investigation and report. 41 permits were issued to the consignees of vessels to discharge cargoes, on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port.

Health Otheer of the Port.
59 permits were granted scavengers to empty, clean and disinfect privy sinks. The number of miscellaneous permits issued was 1. The Disinfecting Corps have visited 54 premises where contagious diseases were reported, and have performed 51 disinfections and 17 fumigations.
4 patients sick with contagious diseases were removed to Riverside Hospital. The total number of vaccinations performed was 837, of which 114 were primary and 723

The Meat and Fish Inspectors have seized and condemned 5,015 pounds of meats and 13,250 pounds of fish.

The Milk Inspectors have examined 62 specimens, and destroyed 80 quarts of adulterated milk.

Bureau of Vital Statistics.

Bureau of Vital Statistics. The certificates of 700 births, 48 still-births, 247 marriages, and 628 deaths, reported to have taken place in this city, were received by this Bureau during the week ending Saturday, March I, 1884. This shows an increase of 177 births, 65 marriages and 36 deaths, and the same number of still-births, when compared with the number received during the preceding week; but when com-pared with the corresponding week of the year 1883, there was an increase of 140 births, and 119 marriages, and a decrease of 11 still-births, and 50 deaths. Compared with the mortality reported during the preceding week, the deaths from measles decreased 3; croup, I; malarial fevers, 5; cancer, I; bronchits, 2; pneumonia, 14; heart diseases, 4; hydrocephalus and tubercular menin-gitis, 11; apoplexy, 4; gastritis, enteritis, and peritonitis, 15; cyanosis and atelectasis, I; while the deaths from scarlatina increased, 4; diphtheria, 3; whooping cough, I; erysipelas, 5; typhoid fever, 4; puerperal diseases, 3; diarrhoeal diseases, 2; inantition, 4; rheumatism and gout, 2; phthsis pulmonalis, 21; marasmus, tabes mesenterica and scrofula, 13; meningitis and encephalitis, 9; convulsions, I; all diseases of the brain and nervous system, 5; cirrhosis and hepatitis, I; Bright's disease and nephritis, I; premature and preternatural births, 2; surgical operations, I; suicide, I; and drowning, 2. The number of deaths from cerebro-spinal fever and alcoholism, was the same in the two successive weeks.

Of the total number of deaths reported for the week, 146 were in institutions, 321 in tenement-houses, 147 in houses containing three families or less, 8 in hotels and boarding-houses, 5 in rivers, streets, boats, etc.; 8 were on the basement floor, 105 on the first, 155 on the second, 121 on the third, 63 on the fourth, 22 on the fifth, 2 on the sixth; 628 were stated to be residents of New York City, and — non-residents; 85 were stated to be single, 167 married, 89 widowed, and the condition of 287 was not stated; these were children who had not attained a marriageable age.



A^T 9.30 P. M. ON THURSDAY THE 15TH instant, the aqueduct had to be shut off to repair a large leak that could not be repaired in the usual manner from the exterior. This leak had suddenly devoloped in the section south of Yonkers, where smaller fissures had reminently occurred

The section south of Yonkers, where smaller insures had previously occurred. The examination showed fissures aggregating a, ooo feet m length. The repairs were finished and water was again turned on by 4 P. M., on Saturday, the 17th instant. While the flow through the aqueduct was interrupted the supply in the Central Park reservoir was drawn down five eet.

This loss of supply in the central rark reservoirs was drawn down five eet. This loss of supply in the city reservoirs, occurring now, as winter is approaching, makes it necessary to take extra precautions against waste of water. Being aware of the temptation to leave faucets open in cold weather to prevent freezing in the pipes, I specially protest against that practice, and appeal to all citizens to abstain from wasteful use of water in any manner whatever. The present condition of the supply and the possibility of a recurrence of similar leaks in the aqueduct make it my duty to give this public notice that I shall hereinafter resort to the peremptory measure of shutting off the water in all places where persistent waste is discovered.
