Gen. EMMONS CLARK, *Secretary Board of Health*:
SIR—601 deaths were registered in this office during the week ending at noon of Saturday, October 25, 1890, representing an annual death-rate of 19.04 per 1,000 on an estimated population of 1,647,048.

The Construction or Executive Committee present the following communication received from the Chief Engineer:

NEW YORK, October 22, 1890.

To the Honorable the Committee on Construction:

GENTLEMEN—You are aware of the importance of the pumping-station at Shaft 25, also of the necessity of keeping in perfect working order the numerous gates and other machinery on the line of the New Aqueduct, including two portable hoisting plants which are going to be delivered shortly by the West Point Manufacturing Company. Moreover, the experience acquired by emptying, several times, the siphon under Harlem river, shows that, although the plant has proven very effective, it would be desirable to effect a few changes in the buckets and other details of the machinery connected therewith; changes which can very well be done, and more economically, by our men. For these reasons I think it important for the proper conduct of the work that we keep permanently some of the men who have been employed in connection with the mechanical department. I consequently recommend that the following men be retained permanently on the pay-rolls:

Schedule of the flow at Croton Dam into the New Aqueduct, as per request of the Chief Engineer of the Croton Aqueduct:

No water has been flowing in the New Aqueduct from Tuesday, September 30, until 5.30 P. M. of Saturday, October 18, when the gates at the New Croton Gate-house were opened and regulated for a flow of fifty million gallons in twenty-four hours.

There being an ample waste of water at Croton Dam, and owing to the fact that work had taken place in the Aqueduct at Section 9 and at Shaft 24 during the past two weeks, the water flowing in the Aqueduct was allowed to pass through the blow-off at Harlem river, in order to wash the Aqueduct thoroughly.

The flow reached the Central Park Reservoir at 7.30 A. M. of the 20th instant.

The rate of flow was increased to one hundred million gallons per twenty-four hours at noon of yesterday, the 21st instant.

During the past two weeks further repairs have been done at Shaft 24, which is now water-tight.

You authorized me to proceed with the work and report later the estimate of cost of the same.

The cost of the work and materials necessary, for the present, in connection with the lead pipe which has been placed at Croton Dam and Pocantico Gatehouse, will not exceed \$150, exclusive of the price of the lead pipe itself, which you authorized me to purchase.

The cost of the work and materials at Shaft 11A, to build a temporary dam and other incidental details, will not exceed \$50.

The cost of the work and materials in connection with the examination of the siphon under Gould's swamp will not exceed \$150.

The cost of the work and materials in connection with the removal of the platform from Section 9 will not exceed \$800.

The cost of the work and materials in connection with the plastering of the invert in the neighborhood of Section B will not exceed \$250.

The cost of the labor and materials in connection with the repairs of Shaft 24 will not exceed \$2,000, a portion of which is covered by a former appropriation for work on Section A. In order to meet all the requirements, an appropriation of \$1,000 for the repairs on Shaft 24 is recommended.

The cost of labor and materials in connection with the pumping at Shaft 25, and preparing for final use the siphon under Harlem river, will not exceed \$1,500, which is covered by former appropriations.

The cost of labor and materials in connection with the stoppage of the water for all the rest of the Aqueduct, outside of the work above described, will not exceed \$250.

ATTENTION IS CALLED TO THE RECENT act of the Legislature (chapter 449, Laws of 1889), which provides that whenever any streets or avenues in the city, described in any grant of land under water, from the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty, containing covenants requiring the grantees and their successors to pave, repave, keep in repair or maintain such streets, shall be in need of repairs, pavement or repavement, the Common Council may, by ordinance, require the same to be paved, repaved or repaired, and the expense thereof to be assessed on the property benefited; and whenever the owner of a lot so assessed shall have paid the assessment levied for such paving, repaving or repairing, such payment shall release and discharge such owner from any and every covenant and obligation as to paving, repaving and repairing, contained in the water grant under which the premises are held, and no further assessment shall be imposed on such lot for paving, repaving or repairing such street or avenue, unless it shall be petitioned for by a majority of the owners of the property (who shall also be the owners of a majority of the property in frontage) on the line of the proposed improvement.

The act further provides that the owner of any such lot may notify the Commissioner of Public Works, in writing, specifying the ward number and street number of the lot that he desires, for himself, his heirs and assigns, to be released from the obligation of such covenants, and agrees that said lot shall be thereafter liable to be assessed as above provided, and thereupon the owner of such lot, his heirs and assigns shall thenceforth be relieved from any obligation to pave, repair, uphold or maintain said street, and the lot in respect of which such notice was given shall be liable to assessment accordingly.

The Commissioner of Public Works desires to give the following explanation of the operation of this act: When notice, as above described, is given to the Commissioner of Public Works, the owner of the lot or lots therein described, and his heirs and assigns, are forever released from all obligation under the grant in respect to paving, repaving or repairing the street in front of or adjacent to said lot or lots, except one assessment for such paving, repaving or repairs, as the Common Council may, by ordinance, direct to be made thereafter.

No street or avenue within the limits of such grants can be paved, repaved or repaired until said work is authorized by ordinance of the Common Council, and when the owners of such lots desire their streets to be paved, repaved or repaired, they should state their desire and make their application to the Board of Aldermen and not to the Commissioner of Public Works, who has no authority in the matter until directed by ordinance of the Common Council to proceed with the pavement, repavement or repairs.

TO THE PEOPLE OF THE CITY OF NEW YORK.

It becomes my duty as Commissioner of Public Works and custodian of the many and immense interests involved in the City's water supply, to briefly present to the people of the City the present condition of the supply, and the extreme necessity for care and economy in the use of the water.

For a number of years past and up to the present time, the old Aqueduct and the Bronx river conduit have delivered in the City all the water which they are capable of carrying, the supply thus remaining stationary when the City has been constantly growing in population, buildings, manufactures and commerce, creating new and additional demands upon the water service. The consequence is that at certain seasons of the year, notably in extreme cold weather, when the habit of wasting water from faucets to prevent freezing in the pipes prevails, and in warm and dry weather, when various methods of waste are in vogue, the daily consumption exceeds the supply which can by any possibility be received through the old Aqueduct and the Bronx river conduit, the excess of consumption being drawn from the city reservoirs, diminishing the depth of water and the pressure in the distributing mains. There is no possibility of increasing the water supply received in the City until the new Aqueduct is brought into operation, and in the meantime the only reliance for a fair and equal distribution of water throughout the city is care and economy in its use on the part of the people. Already the depth of water in the reservoirs is being diminished at the rate of one inch per day, and if this should continue for any length of time, the pressure in the distributing mains would be so reduced that it would be impossible to deliver water in thousands of houses located on high ground, and in some other locations even in the basements or cellars.

I, therefore, most earnestly appeal to all citizens, residents and people carrying on business in this city to be careful and economical in the use of water, in justice to themselves, to the people at large, and especially to those who are so located as to be already suffering inconvenience from insufficient supply of water.

PUBLIC NOTICE AS TO WATER RATES.

PUBLIC NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN THAT in compliance with the provisions of chapter 559, Laws of 1887, amending sections 350 and 921 of the New York City Consolidation Act of 1882, passed June 9, 1887, the following changes are made in charging and collecting water rents:

1st. All extra charges for water incurred from and after June 9, 1887, shall be treated, collected and returned in arrears in the same manner as regular rents have heretofore been treated.

2d. In every building where a water meter or meters are now, or shall hereafter be in use, the charge for water by meter measurement shall be the only charge against such building, or such part thereof as is supplied through meter.

3d. The returns of arrears of water rents, including the year 1887, shall be made as heretofore on the confirmation of the tax levy by the Board of Aldermen, and shall include all charges and penalties of every nature.

4th. A penalty of five dollars (\$5) is hereby established, and will be imposed in each and every case where the rules and regulations of the Department prohibiting the use of water through hose, or in any other wasteful manner, are violated, and such penalties will be entered on the books of the Bureau against the respective buildings or property, and, if not collected, be returned in arrears in like manner as other charges for water.

5th. Charges for so-called extra water rents of every nature, imposed or incurred prior to June 9, 1887, will be canceled of record on the books of the Department.
