#### Street Cleaning.

Resolved, That upon the recommendation of the Inspector of the Bureau of Street Cleaning, the proposal of Daniel Dailey to tow and unload the Department Scows loaded with ashes and street-sweepings, at Thirty-eighth and Forty-sixth streets, East river, upon the terms as follows, to wit:

Resolved, That the persons named in list marked "S" be selected as Poll Clerks in the place and stead of those previously selected, who have failed to qualify, etc. That said list be approved and ordered on file in the Bureau of Elections, and the Chief of the Bureau directed to issue the necessary notices, and qualify them according to law.

#### Commissioner Nichols offered the following:

Whereas, It is provided by section 7 of section 1, chapter 675 of the Laws of 1872, that the Board of Police shall appoint a Chief of the Bureau of Elections in the City and County of New York; and

Whereas, It is provided by section 10 of said act that the Chief of the Bureau of Elections shall, amongst other things, furnish instructions for the use of the Inspectors of Election who shall be appointed pursuant to the provisions of section 13 of said act; and

Whereas, It is provided by section 19 of said act that the said Inspectors shall have full authority to preserve order while discharging any of the duties imposed on them, and also to prevent any improper practice tending to the intimidation or obstruction of voters, and also to protect the voters from intimidation and violence; and

Whereas, It is further provided by section 64 of said act, that it shall be deemed a felony upon conviction thereof, for any one, by force, threat, or menace to prevent any person having a lawful right to register or be registered from duly exercising such right; and

Whereas, It is further provided by section 67 of said act that any Inspector who shall willfully exclude any vote duly tendered, knowing that the person offering the same is lawfully entitled to vote at such election, upon conviction thereof shall be guilty of a felony; and

Whereas, It is further provided by section 79 of said act that if any person shall knowingly or willfully obstruct or interfere with any Inspector in the performance of any duty required of him, or which he may be by law authorized or permitted to perform, shall be guilty of a misdemeanor; and

Whereas, By the provisions of subdivisions 2 and 4 of section 21 of said act the said Inspectors are required to receive the applications of such male residents of their respective districts as would be entitled to vote at the ensuing election, and to register their names as therein provided, if found qualified; and

Whereas, It is provided by section 4 of chapter 740 of the Laws of 1865, which said section is not inconsistent with the provisions of chapter 675 of the Laws of 1872, that the production of a certificate of naturalization from a court of competent jurisdiction shall be evidence of the citizenship of any one not born in the United States; and

Whereas, Many naturalized citizens having certificates from courts of competent jurisdiction of their naturalization have presented themselves and made application to be registered as qualified voters in their respective election districts, and have been prevented from exercising such rights by threats, menace, and intimidation; now, therefore

Resolved, That the Chief of the Bureau of Elections be and he hereby is directed to prepare at once and issue to the several Inspectors of Election in the various election districts in the city and county of New York instructions directing them to place upon the registers kept by them, pursuant to the provisions of chapter 675 of the Laws of 1872, the names of each and every applicant who shall be able to properly answer the questions required to be propounded to him, who shall at the same time exhibit to the said Inspectors a certificate of his naturalization, issued out of a court of competent jurisdiction, properly certified and having the seal of said court thereon.

Resolved, That instructions shall be issued forthwith to the officers of the police who may be on duty at the several election districts where such registration is being carried on, directing them to take the name and address of any person thus applying for registration who may be deprived of such right, as well as the names of the inspectors of said election district, and forward the same, in the form of an affidavit setting forth the facts, to the Chief of the Bureau of Elections as soon thereafter as possible; provided furthermore, that if any intimidation or threats have been used by any one to hinder or prevent such registration, then also the name of such person or persons shall be included in the said affidavit of such officer.

Resolved, That the Chief of the Bureau of Elections shall submit such affidavits to the Board of

Police, at their next regular meeting after the receipt of the same, for action thereon, pursuant to the provisions of chapter 575 of the said Laws of 1872.

Commissioner Wheeler moved that the preamble and resolutions be referred to the Counsel to the Board for opinion on or before Thursday, 24th instant, at 12 M. Adopted.

Resolved, That under the provisions of section 15 of chapter 908 of the Laws of 1867, the Board of Health approves of the following plan, which has been duly submitted, for light and ventilation in the premises No. 100 Madison street, in the building 25 feet by 82 feet, viz.: that a light shaft to be built on each side of the building 2 feet 8 inches by 6 feet, to the full height of the building, which is 35 feet, and that said shafts are not to be covered by sky lights and are to be connected with each other by a hallway with a window on each side.

Whereas, The Sanitary Superintendent has certified to this Board that the building situated upon lot No. 307 East Forty-sixth street, New York City, has become dangerous by reason of want of repair;

Ordered, That all persons in said building situated on lot No. 307 East Forty-sixth street be required to vacate said building on or before November 3, 1878, for the reason that said building is dangerous to life by reason of want of repair; and further, that this order be affixed conspicuously on the front of said building, and be served as the law requires, under the direction of the Sanitary Superintendent; and further, that said building be not again used as a human habitation without a written permit from this Board.

Resolved, That orders on premises 215 East Broadway, and 405 West Fifty-first street, be and are hereby suspended until May 1, 1879.

Resolved, That the application for relief from order on premises No. 7 Strykers lane be and is hereby denied and the order will be enforced.

#### Sanitary Bureau.

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending October 19, 1878:

The total number of inspections made by the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors was 1,541, as follows: 6 public buildings, 750 tenement-houses, 59 private dwellings, 76 other dwellings, 14 manufactories and workshops, 31 stores and warehouses, 33 stables, 4 market places, 60 slaughter-houses, 4 head-picking establishments, 11 lard-rendering establishments, 1 lime kiln, 6 tripe houses, 12 manure dumps, 1 garbage dump, 60 sunken and vacant lots, 1 bladder-dyeing establishment, 17 fat-rendering establishments, 2 wool-pulling establishments, 2 public sewers, 1 mill, 34 yards, courts, and areas, 38 cellars and basements, 72 waste pipes and drains, 88 privies and water-closets, 116 streets, gutters, and sidewalks, 3 dangerous stairways, 3 smoky chimneys, 37 other nuisances.

The number of reports thereon received from the Inspectors was 712.

During the past week 88 complaints were received from citizens, and referred to the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.

Permits were issued to the consignees of 111 vessels to discharge cargoes, on vouchers from the Health Officer of the port.

Permits were granted 74 scavengers to empty, clean, and disinfect privy-sinks.

The Disinfecting Corps have visited 70 premises where contagious diseases were found, and have disinfected and fumigated 68 houses, 68 privy-sinks, together with clothing, bedding, etc.

Three patients sick with contagious diseases were removed to hospital by the Ambulance Corps.

The Special Disinfecting Corps have disinfected 323 privies and water-closets, 30 yards, courts, and areas, 246 cellars and basements, 284 garbage boxes, and 108 1-10 miles of street gutters.

#### Bureau of Vital Statistics.

The number of deaths reported to have occurred in this city during the week ending Saturday, October 19, 1878, was 505, this is a decrease of 11, as compared with the preceding week, and 29 less than the number reported during the corresponding week of last year. The actual mortality for the week ending October 12, was 497, which is 9.2 less than the average number of deaths for the corresponding weeks of the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 23.76 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,087,645.

The highest number of deaths reported for the week was from phthisis pulmonalis, 93, which is an increase of 5 compared with the preceding week; bronchitis increased 5, pneumonia, 11; diseases of the brain and nervous system, 13; premature and preterm births, 3; cancer, 8; rheumatism and gout, 3; alcoholism, 1; inanition, 2; while scarlatina decreased 2; diphtheria, 6; croup, 4; whooping-cough, 11; erysipelas, 2; typhoid fever, 1; cerebro-spinal fever, 1; puerperal diseases, 2; diarrhoeal diseases, 10; diseases of the heart, 2; marasmus and scrofula, 7; hydrocephalus and tubercular meningitis, 1; cirrhosis and hepatitis, 4; enteritis, gastritis, and peritonitis, 3; Bright's disease and nephritis, 11; and cyanosis and atelectasis, 2. The increase of the mortality from phthisis pulmonalis, bronchitis, and pneumonia was 21 compared with the preceding week. The deaths from zymotic diseases showed a decrease of 27, local diseases 16, and violence 19, compared with the corresponding week of 1877, while constitutional diseases increased 33, and developmental diseases caused the same number of deaths (35).

Of the total number of deaths reported for the week, 79 were in institutions, 276 in tenement houses, 138 in houses containing 3 families or less, 7 in hotels and boarding-houses, 5 in rivers, streets, boats, etc.; 4 were on the basement floor, 115 on the first, 152 on the second, 89 on the third, 48 on the fourth, 12 on the fifth. 501 were stated to be residents of New York City and 4 non-residents. 66 were stated to be single, 107 married, 73 widowed, and the condition of 259 was not stated, these were children who had not attained a marriageable age.

The disposition of 487 deaths and still-births, or 89.36 per cent. of the total number reported, was in the following 14 cemeteries: Bayside (Jewish), 5; Calvary (Roman Catholic), 213; City (pauper burial ground—undenominational), 69; Greenwood (undenominational), 40; Lutheran (undenominational), 75; Cypress Hills (undenominational), 15; Evergreen (undenominational), 32; Woodlawn (undenominational), 18; St. Michael's (Protestant Episcopal), 1; Union (Methodist Protestant), 1; Holy Cross (Roman Catholic), 7; Machpelah, L. I. (Jewish), 3; St. Raymond's (Roman Catholic), 3; Washington (undenominational), 5.

The mean temperature for the week ending October 19, was 62.2 degrees Fahrenheit, the mean reading of the barometer was 29.857, the mean humidity 81, saturation being 100, the number of miles traveled by the wind, 1,112, and the amount of rainfall, .96 inch depth of water, as reported by D. Draper, Director of the N. Y. Meteorological Observatory, Central Park.

During the week ending October 19, 1878, there were issued from this Bureau 505 burial permits for city deaths, 29 for bodies in transitu, and 40 for the interment of still-born infants. There were recorded 505 deaths, 161 marriages, 539 births, 40 still-births, 29 applications for transit permits, and 49 returns from coroners. There were 23 searches of the registers of births, marriages, and deaths, and 2 transcripts of birth records, 3 of marriage, and 18 of death were issued from this Bureau.

STR.—There were 505 deaths reported to have occurred in this city during the week ending Saturday, October 19, 1878, which is a decrease of 11, as compared with the number reported the preceding week, and 29 less than were reported during the corresponding week of the year 1877. The actual mortality for the week ending October 12, 1878, was 497, which is 9.2 below the average for the corresponding week of the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 23.76 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,087,645.

## BOARD OF REVISION AND CORRECTION OF ASSESSMENTS.

A meeting of the Board of Revision and Correction of Assessments was held at the Comptroller's office, in the New Court House, on Tuesday, October 22d, 1878, at 12.20 o'clock P.M.  
Present—Hon. John Kelly, Comptroller; Hon. William C. Whitney, Counsel to the Corporation.  
Absent—Hon. John K. Hackett, Recorder.

The minutes of the meeting held August 14, 1878, were read and approved.

The Comptroller presented to the Board the following assessment lists received from the Board of Assessors with communications dated September 13, 1878, viz.:

1. Basin on northwest corner of Fourth street and Sixth avenue.
2. Seventieth street, regulating and grading, setting curb and gutter stones, and flagging between Third avenue and East river.
3. Twenty-second street (north side), flagging between First avenue and Avenue A.
4. Ninety-ninth street, sewer, between Boulevard and Tenth avenue.
5. Twelfth avenue, sewer, between One Hundred and Thirtieth and One Hundred and Thirty-first streets, with objections filed with the Board of Revision by estate of William Bloodgood.
6. Basins on northwest corner of One Hundred and Tenth street and Madison avenue, and on the northwest corner of One Hundred and Sixteenth street and Lexington avenue.
7. Lexington avenue, crosswalks on north and south sides of Eighty-fourth street.
8. Fencing vacant lots on south side of Seventy-ninth street, and on north side of Seventy-eighth street, and on the east side of Madison avenue, between Seventy-eighth and Seventy-ninth streets.
9. Fifty-fifth street, flagging, between Madison and Fourth avenues, and fencing vacant lots thereon.
10. Fencing vacant lots on south side of Eighty-third street, and on north side of Eighty-second street, and on east side of Fifth avenue, between Eighty-second and Eighty-third streets.

The foregoing assessment lists being in proper form, and no objections having been filed, on motion, they were severally confirmed—all the members of the Board present voting in the affirmative.

The assessment list for laying crosswalks across Fourth avenue, at intersections of One Hundred and Tenth, One Hundred and Eleventh, One Hundred and Twelfth, and One Hundred and Thirtieth streets, with objections filed with the Board of Revision by estate of William Bloodgood, was presented to the Board by the Comptroller, having been received from the Board of Assessors, with communication dated September 13, 1878.

After hearing Mr. F. W. Bloodgood, on motion, the said objections were overruled, and the assessment list was confirmed—all the members of the Board present voting in the affirmative.

The assessment list for paving with Belgian or trap-block pavement One Hundred and Fourteenth street, between Second and Fourth avenues, and objections of Dr. William H. Jackson and reply of the Commissioner of Public Works thereto, were presented to the Board by the Comptroller, the same having been received from the Board of Assessors, with communication dated September 13, 1878.

After hearing Mr. P. A. Hargons, attorney for Dr. Jackson, on motion, the said assessment list was ordered to be returned to the Board of Assessors for a re-examination as to said objections.

The assessment list for building receiving-basins on the northeast and southeast corners of Sixty-first street and First avenue, and objections of F. Buse, were presented by the Comptroller, having been received from the Board of Assessors, with a communication dated September 13, 1878.

After hearing the representative of Mr. Buse and Mr. Towle, engineer in charge of sewers in said matters, on motion, the objections were overruled and the assessment list was confirmed, all the members of the Board present voting in the affirmative.

The Comptroller presented to the Board the assessment list for setting curb and gutter stones and flagging in Fourth avenue, from Seventy-first to Seventy-ninth street, and objections of William Beaman, the same having been received from the Board of Assessors, with a communication dated September 13, 1878.

After a consideration of the said objections, on motion, they were overruled and the assessment list was confirmed—all the members of the Board present voting in the affirmative.

The assessment list for regulating, grading, setting curb and gutter stones and flagging Ninety-ninth street, from Eighth to Eleventh avenue, with record of awards made by the Board of Assessors for damages to buildings by reason of change in grade, and applications and objections of Ann McManus, Richard Byrne and others, as to the awards in said matter, laid over at the meeting of this Board of August 14, 1878, was, on motion, taken up.

After hearing Mr. Roswell D. Hatch, attorney, in behalf of Ann McManus, and Mr. W. W. Adams, Superintendent of Buildings, relative to damages in said case, also Mr. Charles H. Kitchell, attorney for M. M. Kellogg, and others, on motion, the said assessment list with all papers received, was ordered to be returned to the Board of Assessors for a re-examination of the awards made by them in said matter.

At 1 o'clock P. M., on motion, the Board adjourned to meet on Thursday, 24th instant, at 12 o'clock, noon.

At a meeting of the Board of Examiners, held at the office of the Superintendent of Buildings, No. 2 Fourth avenue, on Tuesday the 22d day of October, 1878, at 3 o'clock P. M., in pursuance of the call of the Superintendent of Buildings.

Their being present thereat:

Superintendent Walter W. Adams, James McLean, Edwin Dobbs, Henry Dudley, and John Banta. Superintendent Walter W. Adams, presiding.

The minutes of the previous meeting having been read for the information of the Board.

The Chairman submitted for the action of the Board the hereinafter-named petitions and applications, to wit:

Petition of John H. Jerring for permission in the erection of two small three-story brick dwellings, each 15 x 45 and 30 feet in height, on north side of East One Hundred and Fifth street, 305 feet distant easterly from Second avenue, to be allowed to so far deviate or vary from the provisions of the building law, as to permit him to construct and carry up the side and party walls of said buildings above the second tier of beams but eight inches in thickness, and in all other respects in conformity with the statement of Specifications and Plans No. 604 of New Buildings relative thereto, submitted and filed October 2, 1878. Petition, upon motion, granted.

Petition of Patrick Whelan for permission, in erection of the three three-story and basement, 16 feet 8 inches by 48 feet, brick and brown-stone buildings proposed to be erected on the south side of One Hundred and Tenth street, 205 feet distant easterly from Fourth avenue, to be allowed to so far vary the provisions of the Building Law as to permit him to construct the third-story walls of said buildings but eight (8) inches in thickness instead of twelve (12) inches, the buildings in all other respects to be constructed in conformity with the requirements of the law, as per Plans and Specifications, relative thereto, of New Buildings No. 594, filed September 24, 1878. Petition, upon motion, granted.

Petition of Thomas J. O'Reilly for permission, in proposed alteration of the three (3) story brick building known as No. 206 East Forty-third street, by the erection of a brick extension thereto on the lots known as Nos. 208 and 210 East Forty-third street, to so far vary the provisions of the Building Law as to permit him to use and build upon the wall on the east side of the building No. 206 East Forty-third street as a party wall (the wall being 78 feet in depth, 3 stories in height, the first story being 16 inches thick, the second and third stories 12 inches thick), in conformity with the Plans and Specifications for Alterations No. 917, filed September 24, 1878. Petition, upon motion, granted, upon condition that two (2) extra lines of girders and posts are set under each floor in the "new extension."

Application of the New York, Lake Erie and Western Railroad Company, for permission to erect a frame shed for temporary use as a Collector's Office (during changes in progress on their other buildings), on the premises (or bulkhead) between piers 30 and 31 North river, such shed to be constructed of wood one story in height, 16 feet in width, 12 feet in height, with tin or felt roof, and to be 40 feet in depth, in conformity with special application and plan No. 493 relative thereto, filed October 10, 1878. Petition upon motion granted upon condition that the said temporary structure shall be removed when the repairs or changes contemplated have been made and completed to the present buildings on said premises.

Petition of Gage Inslee, Architect, for and on behalf of Jane Byrnes, owner, for permission in the erection of the four-story brick store and dwelling, proposed to be built upon the premises Third avenue, northwest corner Sixty-ninth street, 22 feet 5 inches by 61 feet, and 49 feet in height (with a rear 12 inch brick partition wall about 51 feet from the front), to be allowed to so far vary the provisions of the building law as to permit him to construct the cellar side wall of the building but twenty (20) inches in thickness of stone laid in cement mortar, and the upper walls 12 inches thick in conformity with specifications and plans for New Buildings relative thereto, No. 602 filed October 2, 1878. Petition upon motion granted.

Petition of James Donohue for permission, in the erection of six (6) four-story brick and brown stone dwellings (each 17 x 40 feet and 45 feet in height) on the premises on Lexington avenue, northwest corner Eighty-first street, to so far vary the provisions of the Building Law as will allow the bearing-wall of the corner building on line of Eighty-first street to be constructed but twelve (12)

inches in thickness from foundation wall to line of roof, in conformity with New Building Specifications and Plans No. 574, relative thereto, filed September 16, 1878. Petition, upon motion, granted.

Petition of Jacob Gilbert for permission, in the erection of the one-story brick stable (25 x 68 feet and 15 feet in height) proposed to be erected on the west side of Broadway, 52 feet south of Fifty-sixth street, to so far deviate from the provisions of the Building Law as to permit the walls of the proposed building to be constructed but eight inches in thickness, in conformity with New Building Plans and Specifications No. 610, relative thereto, filed October 5, 1878. Petition, upon motion, granted.

Petition of Thom & Wilson, architects, for and in behalf of the Hebrew Orphan Asylum, for permission to so far vary or deviate from the provisions of the Building Law as to permit them to erect a two-story brick extension (46 feet 5 inches by 21 feet and 22 feet in height) to the present asylum building on the south side of East Eighty-sixth street, about 200 feet west of Second avenue, in conformity with the Specification and Plans for New Buildings No. 634, relative thereto, filed October 17, 1878, and which plans provide for the erection of the second story walls of the extension with 8-inch walls. Petition, upon motion, granted.

Petition of John Brandt, Architect, for and on behalf of Joseph Hahn, owner, for permission in the erection of a two (2) story brick store and dwelling (for the occupation of one family only) on east side of Avenue A, 100 feet north of Seventy-fourth street, 20x36, and 23 feet in height (from curb level) to so far vary the provisions of the Building Law as to permit the walls of said building to be constructed above the foundation walls only eight (8) inches in thickness, with the exception of the front wall, which will be twelve (12) inches in thickness, in conformity with new building plans and specifications No. 620 relative thereto, filed October 12, 1878.

Petition upon motion granted, so far as relates to the side walls of the proposed building only, and upon the condition only that the rear wall of the building be constructed 12 inches in thickness as well as the front wall.

Motion that the action of the Board and the vote taken at Board meeting held October 1st, 1878, upon and denying the petition of John Jardine, Architect, on behalf of Mrs. C. S. Stewart, owner, for permission to alter the building No. 62 Wall street, by the erection of an additional story thereon, in conformity, with plans and specifications for alteration to buildings No. 936, filed September 30th, 1878, be reconsidered.

Was, upon motion, laid on the table, and upon motion the Superintendent of Buildings was requested to make a further examination of the building No. 62 Wall street, referred to in said petition.

Petition of James E. Ware, Architect, for and on behalf of James McKenny, owner, for permission in the erection of two brick three-story dwellings, each 20 x 48 with extension thereto on south side of One Hundred and Fifty-second street, 125 feet east of Tenth avenue, to so far vary from the provisions of the Building Law as to permit of the construction of the outside walls of the extension thereto but eight (8) inches in thickness, and the party walls of the same 12 inches in thickness, in conformity with the New Building Plans and Specification No. 623, filed October 14, 1878. Petition, upon motion, granted.

Petition of Charles L. Fleming, by James E. Ware, Architect, for permission in the erection of a brick three-story and basement building 26 x 50, 40 feet in height, to so far vary the provisions of the Building Law as to permit the erection of the same on the northwest corner of St. Nicholas avenue and One Hundred and Fifty-third street, with the gable or bearing wall on line of One Hundred and Fifty-third street but 12 inches in thickness, and also to permit of the construction of the extension thereto two (2) stories in height, with 8 inch walls, in conformity with the Plans and Specifications for New Buildings No. 554, filed September 5, 1878. Petition, upon motion, granted.

There being no further business before the Board.

The minutes of the meeting, were, upon motion, read and approved, and the Board, upon motion, adjourned, subject to the call of the Superintendent of Buildings.

Persons "enrolled" as liable must serve when called or pay their fines. No mere excuses will be allowed or interference permitted. The fines, received from those who, for business or other reasons, are unable to serve at the time selected, pay the expenses of this office, and if unpaid will be entered as judgments upon the property of the delinquents.

All good citizens will aid the course of justice, and secure reliable and respectable juries, and equalize their duty by serving promptly when summoned, allowing their clerks or subordinates to serve, reporting to me any attempt at bribery or evasion, and suggesting names for enrollment. Persons between sixty and seventy years of age, summer absentees, persons temporarily ill, and United States and District Court jurors are not exempt.

Every man must attend to his own notice. It is a misdemeanor to give any jury paper to another to answer. It is also punishable by fine or imprisonment to give or receive any present or bribe, directly or indirectly, in relation to a jury service, or to withhold any paper or make any false statement, and every case will be fully prosecuted.
