The Committee on Streets, to whom was referred the annexed resolution in favor of permitting the P. & W. Ebling Brewing Co. to lay an iron pipe for conducting steam from their boiler on the east side of Eagle avenue overhead of the avenue to the opposite side of the avenue, respectfully

REPORT:

That, having examined the subject, they believe that such permission should be granted. They therefore recommend that the said annexed resolution be adopted:

Resolved, That permission be and the same is hereby given to the P. & W. Ebling Brewing Co. to lay a six (6) inch iron pipe, for conducting steam from their boiler, on the east side of Eagle avenue, between One Hundred and Fifty-sixth and One Hundred and Fifty-seventh streets, overhead of the avenue to the opposite side of the avenue, as shown on the accompanying diagram; provided, the said P. & W. Ebling Brewing Co. shall stipulate with the Commissioner of Street Improvements of the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards to save the City harmless from any loss or damage that may be occasioned during the progress or subsequent to the completion of the work of laying said pipe, the work to be done at their own expense, under the direction of the Commissioner of Street Improvements, Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards; such permission to continue only during the pleasure of the Common Council.

Contagious and infectious diseases show a considerable increase, the number of cases reported of diphtheria, measles, scarlet fever, typhoid fever and small-pox being respectively 177, 140, 59, 22 and 5, against 129, 135, 59, 25 and 14, for the previous week, a total of 415 against 362. The increase of diphtheria was mainly in the Eighth, Tenth, Eleventh, Twelfth, Seventeenth, Nineteenth, Twenty-second and Twenty-fourth Wards, while there was a marked decrease in the Ninth and Twenty-third Wards. The increase of measles was chiefly in the Eleventh, Thirteenth and Eighteenth Wards, and the decrease in the Tenth and Seventeenth Wards. There was an increase of scarlet fever in the Twelfth, Thirteenth and Nineteenth Wards, and a decrease in the Seventh, Sixteenth, Twenty-first and Twenty-fourth Wards. Thirteen of the 22 cases of typhoid fever were above Fortieth street, and 6 of the remaining 9 were below Fourteenth street. The cases of small-pox were scattered, only 2 of them being below Fourteenth street.
