LABOR.

AT BELLEVUE HOSPITAL.

Carpenters' work, in repairing 27 spring beds, making two fracture beds, 4 water beds, 30 pairs crutches, boarding sides of Pavilions and making 5 storm doors to same. Painting the doors and entrances to Pavilions and glazing throughout the building. Painting portions of wards and hallways, repairing ceilings and white-washing throughout the building.

AT PENITENTIARY.

Average daily number of prisoners, 787 males; 140 females; total, 927.

At Blacksmiths' and Tinsmiths' Shops there have been made 434 pairs pail ears, 200 pairs hinges, 404 handles for cell-buckets, 450 rivets, 160 bolts and nuts, 150 iron stays, drilling tackle, 380 feet stove-pipe, all the iron work for wagons, carts, ambulances, vans, etc., 488 cast steel points for quarries and stone cutters, 2 large locks for prison, all new tin-ware, boilers, kettles, coffee and soup, mess-pans, etc. Sharpening and keeping in repair all the points, chisels, drills, sledges, hammers, and other tools, general repairs in and about the prison and a large number of minor articles for other institutions. Shoeing 80 horses, making 150 iron window bars, 25 wall anchors, preparing tin for roof, and a large amount of work for new shop building, etc.

At Painters' and Carpenters' Shop—Making 203 cell-buckets, 401 sledge and hammer handles, 62 wheelbarrows, 15 hand-barrows, 1 ox cart, 1 cart for store house, 18 sky-light sashes, 19 large soup tubs, 6 shoe benches, 2 pumps for quarry, boat-house, stone-shed, 3 wagons, 1 ambulance, 1 stone drag, 1 lumber wagon, wheels for dead wagon, ambulances repaired and painted, glazing 497 lights, all repairs in and about the prison, plumbing, painting, etc.

The Tailors and Cot-makers have made 318 pairs woolen pants, 186 jackets, 72 vests, 46 cots; repaired 850 pairs woolen pants, 499 jackets, 205 vests, 36 woolen caps, 41 cot bottoms.

At Shoemakers' shop, made 1,727 pairs men's shoes, 171 pairs women's shoes, repaired 232 pairs men's shoes.

In Sewing Room, made 597 woolen caps, 411 pairs pants, 371 jackets, 168 vests, 1,045 shirts, 361 flannel shirts, 150 flannel petticoats and sacques, 384 women's dresses, petticoats and gowns, 372 sheets, 156 pillow-cases, 212 bed and pillow ticks, 48 bed spreads, 46 roller towels, 5 window curtains, repaired 3,310 shirts, 1,389 pants, 2,484 women's dresses, petticoats, etc., 147 pillows, 44 sheets, 41 pillow-cases, 33 towels, 163 pairs stockings.

Outside labor, 6,372 cubic feet stone-wall built at New Shop Building, 3,500 cubic feet brick and stone wall for same.

6,078 cubic feet of sea-wall built.

24,500 cubic feet of foundation road built.

45,165 cubic feet of grading and filling in.

A large quantity of stone has been broken for building and repairing roads.

35 barge loads of dirt, ashes, sand loaded and discharged.

40 tons of hay cut on Randall's Island.

The average (140) female prisoners have been employed in sewing-room, work-house, scrubbing and domestic work.

AT ALMSHOUSE.

Carpenters—Making 402 coffins, 2 wheelbarrows, 4 fenders for steamboats, 59 snow shovels; putting up storm porches; 178 days' work on carts, wagons, drays, etc.; 342 days' work on barge at Workhouse, Central office, Incurable Hospital, Bakery and other Institutions; repairing floor in shed and dining room, stools, chairs, doors, spring-beds, etc., by 10 Alms-house and 10 Workhouse inmates.

Blacksmiths—Making and repairing grate-bars, bands, handles, braces, bedsteads, sewing machines, locks, barrows, hydraulic pump, shears, scissors, etc., by 2 Alms-house and 4 Workhouse inmates.

Tinsmiths—Making 1,250 mess dish pans, cups, and wash basins; 1,396 feet stove pipe and elbows, 24 pails, 100 baking pans, 11 large mess pans, 12 water cans, 12 soap cans, and repairing a large number of articles for other Institutions, by 1 Alms-house and 3 Workhouse inmates.

Coopers—Repairing 4,367 flour, bread and beef barrels, 5 tubs, 57 pails, etc., by 1 Alms-house, 3 Workhouse inmates.

Painters—Painting coffins, carts, wagons, drays, glazing, by 2 Alms-house inmates.

Plasterers—Repairing ceilings, in sixteen wards, by 2 Alms-house inmates.

Shoemakers—Making 6 pairs of shoes for deformed feet; repairing 561 pairs boots and shoes, by 7 Alms-house inmates.

Tailors—Making 78 winter jackets, 402 pants, 78 caps, 5 vests; repairing 138 jackets, 271 pants 25 vests, by 12 Alms-house inmates.

Sewing Room—Making 2,937 gowns, aprons, sacques, petticoats, pillow-cases, dresses, skirts, sheets, caps, bed-ticks, etc.; knitting 7 pairs stockings, 304 pairs socks; repairing 4,269 dresses, shirts, sheets, socks, blankets, ticks, spreads, etc.

AT WORK-HOUSE.

The inmates (males) have performed 25,276 days' labor at steamboats, bakery, kitchen, stables, Store House, and in other positions as tailors, gardeners, masons, carpenters, shoemakers, etc. The shoemakers have made 893 pairs slippers, and 255 pairs shoes; repaired 1,150 pairs shoes, 19 pairs boots. The tailors have made 2,601 pants, jackets, coats, caps, overalls, caps, mitts, vests, etc., repaired 511 pants, 212 jackets. Weavers have made 372 yards rag carpet.

The females have performed 17,920 days' labor, and have made 8,706 dresses, petticoats, sheets, shirts, aprons, etc., and have repaired 5,268 articles of clothing, bound 1,143 pairs slippers and shoes, and knit 129 pairs stockings.

AT LUNATIC ASYLUM, B. I.

Engineers' Department—Completing main sewer, repairing steam boilers, cleaning, repairing and painting tanks, laying 230 feet water pipe, gas pipes in Pavilion; repairing stoves and cooking range; painting all steam pipe in main building and engine room; repairing large and small steam pumps, and connecting waste water pipes to feed hot water tanks.

The Carpenters have been employed in fitting up an Amusement Hall, dressing room, water-closets, etc.; repairing washing machines, furniture, dead house window sashes and other work.

The Painters—Painting roof of chapel, and fire engine house, roofs of Warden's and Summer house, outside of Lodge, room in middle house, glazing, etc.

The female inmates have made 5,803 articles of clothing, viz: petticoats, chemises, sheets, towels, drawers, etc.

The Blacksmith has performed all the work required in and around the Asylum.

Under the Attendants, 2,367 square yards of grading and soiling, 1,539 square feet of Macadamized road, and 1,503 feet wire ticket have been made.

General Utility men have been employed in plastering and white-washing in 8 Pavilions, Retreat, Halls, Lodge, and cleaning daily around the building.

AT N. Y. CITY ASYLUM, WARD'S ISLAND.

Out-door Department—Making and repairing roads and walks, carting coal, filling excavations, building wall, grading, digging vegetables, digging and carting sand, and loading barge, grinding bones for compost.

Carpenters—Building meat house, repairing bone grinder, ferry house steps, wheel-barrows, tables, carts, doors, windows, locks, and general repairs throughout the building.

Engineers and Blacksmith—Repairing ranges, chisels, cart-wheels, wheel-barrows, steam tables, sinks, bath-tubs, gas pipes and burners, shoeing horses, etc.

Sewing Room—Made 22 shrouds, 48 towels, 4 canvas suits, 218 bed ticks, 36 pillow ticks; 1,516 cotton, and 1,244 woolen articles repaired.

AT INDUSTRIAL SCHOOL, HART'S ISLAND.

By labor of inmates, 224 mittens have been made, and 2,176 articles repaired by tailors; 74 pairs men's shoes, and 16 pair women's shoes made; 514 pairs repaired.

In Sewing-room—44 articles made and 1,839 repaired.

OUT DOOR LABOR.

470 bodies have been interred at City Cemetery, 4 bodies have been removed by friends; 4 trenches 45 feet long, 14 feet wide, 8 feet 6 inches deep have been opened, 414 feet of roadway built, and about 1½ acre of land graded; 760 bushels potatoes, 55 bushels carrots, 130 bushels turnips, 50 bushels parsnips, 2,600 heads cabbage, 50 bushels beets, 115 bushels onions collected, and completing sea wall to an extent of 375 lineal feet; 2,525 days' work was performed at foundation of the hospital buildings, carpenters and blacksmiths have been employed in repairing wheel-barrows, carts, quarry tools, etc., and erecting a receiving vault; building a picket fence 192 feet long. Also repaired 2 dormitories, made 2 stone boats, and provided the barn with 900 feet sheathing and new cell plates.

AT CONVALESCENT HOSPITAL, HART'S ISLAND.

The carpenters have completed the altar and pulpit, and the hospital is provided with a suitable place for public worship. In the wash-house new flooring has been laid, and the floors of the several pavilions repaired and other work performed.

The Painters—Seven storm-houses, 16 park benches, 135 stools have been renovated and painted, and seven large pavilion stoops have been attended to.

Whitewashing has been done on and outside of all the buildings whenever the cleanliness and sanitary condition of Institution required.

The roofs of all the buildings have been thoroughly overhauled by men from Workhouse, sent for that purpose.

RANDALL'S ISLAND FARM.

The men from Workhouse have been employed in general garden work, planting fall crops, and have collected and distributed 147 barrels beets, 142 barrels carrots, 24 barrels parsley, 177 barrels turnips, 45 barrels lettuce, 5 barrels squash, 2 barrels beans, 11 barrels onions, 178 barrels celery, 27 barrels radishes, 3 barrels lima beans, 26 barrels spinach, 2 barrels oyster plant, 16 bushels tomatoes, 6,200 heads cabbage, 375 ears corn, 360 peppers, 22 egg plants, 22¼ tons hay.

Remaining on hand 300 barrels turnips, 120 barrels carrots, 100 barrels beets, 6,000 heads of cabbage, 5 tons hay.

The men have also been employed in gathering manure and sea drift, preparing compost heaps, removing tree stumps, etc.

Sanitary Bureau.

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending February 5: The total number of inspections made by the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors was 1,594, as follows, viz.: 14 public buildings, 817 tenement houses, 93 private dwellings, 80 other dwellings, 8 manufactories and workshops, 8 stores and warehouses, 58 stables, 76 slaughter-houses, — cemeteries, — coal yards, 2 fat-rendering establishments, — stock yards, — manure dumps, — markets, — gut-cleaning establishments, 7 sunken and vacant lots, 33 yards, courts, and areas, 85 cellars and basements, 113 waste-pipes and drains, 89 privies and water-closets, 7 street-gutters and sidewalks, 9 dangerous stairways, — cisterns and cesspools, 1 piggery, 3 dangerous chimneys, 6 violations of Code, 9 other nuisances, and 74 visits to contagious and infectious diseases.

The number of reports thereon received was 479. During the past week 40 complaints were received from citizens, and referred to the Inspectors for investigation and report.

25 permits were issued to consignees of vessels to discharge cargoes, on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port.

67 permits were granted to scavengers to empty, clean, and disinfect privy-sinks.

The Disinfecting Corps have visited 149 houses where contagious diseases were found, and have disinfected and fumigated 43 dwellings, 43 privy-sinks, together with clothing, bedding, etc.

Persons sick with small-pox were removed to Hospital and 1 dead body to the Morgue by the Ambulance Corps.

The following is a Comparative Statement of Cases of Contagious Diseases reported at this Bureau for the two weeks ending January 29 and February 5, 1875.

364 cans and 45 tanks of night-soil were removed by the scavengers from the privy-vaults of the city during the week ending February 5, 1876.

The following amount of meat and fish was condemned by the officers as unfit for human food during the week ending February 5, 1876: Calves (bob), 22 carcasses; sheep, 6 carcasses; veal, 60 pounds; and fish, 775 pounds.

During the week ending February 5, 1876, there were issued from this bureau 566 burial permits for city deaths, 30 for bodies *in transitu*, and 44 for the interment of still-born infants. There were recorded 566 deaths, 137 marriages, 447 births, 44 still-births, 30 applications for transit permits, and 51 returns from Coroners. There were 31 searches of the registers of births, marriages, and deaths, and 4 transcripts of birth record, 4 of marriage, and 20 of death were issued from this bureau.

SIR—During the week ending February 5th inst., 566 deaths were reported in this city, being an increase of 35 compared with the number reported the previous week, and 34 less than were reported the corresponding week of the previous year. The actual number of deaths from all causes which occurred during the week ending January 29th, was 512, or 92 less than occurred during the corresponding period of 1875, showing an annual rate of mortality of 25.23 in a thousand persons living, the population estimated at 1,055,007. The annual mortality rate per 1,000 for the week ending January 15 in London was 26; in Edinburgh, 31; in Glasgow, 27; in Dublin, 33; and from the most recent returns from Calcutta was 42.3; Bombay, 28.7; Paris, 26.1; Amsterdam, 28.6; Rotterdam, 31.2; The Hague, 24.5; Christiania, 37.9; Berlin, 26.9; Hamburg, 21.6; Breslau, 27.8; Munich, 32.7; Vienna, 27.8; Naples, 38.6; Turin, 20.6; Alexandria, 37.4.

The mean temperature of the week was 24.6 Fahr., as reported by Daniel Draper, Director of New York Meteorological Observatory, Central Park, or 11.3 degrees lower than the previous week.

There was an increase during the week ending February 5, compared with the previous week, of 4 deaths from Diphtheria, 1 of Membranous Croup, 4 of Typhoid Fever, 6 of Puerperal Diseases, 2 of Diarrhoeal Diseases, 4 of Cancer, 15 of Phthisis Pulmonalis, 5 of Pneumonia, 2 of Marasmus, 10 of Tubercular Meningitis and Hydrocephalus, 2 of Apoplexy, 3 of Bright's Disease and Nephritis, 2 of persons 70 years old and over, 13 of children under five years of age, of 18 in institutions, and a decline of 2 of Small-pox, 1 of Measles, 7 of Whooping Cough, 1 of Bronchitis, 1 of Heart Disease, 1 of Meningitis and Encephalitis, and 3 of Convulsions.

Of the 61 deaths reported from Diphtheria, 30 occurred in houses containing over 3 families, and 2 in institutions. 30 of the 61 deaths reported from Diphtheria, 11 of the 13 from Scarlatina, 11 of the 16 from Membranous Croup, and the total reported from Cerebris Spinal Fever, occurred in houses containing over 3 families, 2 from Diphtheria, and 1 from Croup in institutions, and 27 of Diphtheria, 2 of Scarlatina, and 4 of Croup in houses containing 3 families and under. Of the 61 deaths from Diphtheria, 22 were reported to have occurred on the first floor, 17 on the second, 11 on the third, 3 on the fourth, and 5 on the top; the highest number of deaths were reported in the Twenty-second Ward (9), 8 in the Twenty-Third, 7 in the Nineteenth, 6 in the Twentieth, and none in the First, Third, and Seventh Wards. Five of the deaths from Scarlatina took place on the third floor, 4 on the first, 2 on the second, 1 on the fourth, and 1 on the top; the highest number of deaths from this disease occurred in the Twentieth Ward (4). Of the 16 deaths from Membranous Croup, 5 were on the first floor, 5 on the second, 3 on the third, 1 each on the fourth and top floors; the largest number of deaths from this disease occurred in the Seventeenth Ward (5). The average age of deaths for the week from Diphtheria was 4 years, 7 months, 10 days; of Scarlatina, 5 years, 3 months, 14 days; and of Membranous Croup, 2 years, 8 months, 11 days. The most fatal hours of the 96 deaths reported from Diphtheria, Scarlatina, Membranous Croup, Malarial and Cerebro Spinal Fevers, were 7 and 11 A. M. (7 deaths each), and 6 each took place at 6 and 10 A. M. and 1 P. M., and the least fatal, 2 and 3 A. M. and 1 P. M., which were credited with but one death each.

DEATHS FROM DIPHTHERIA, SCARLATINA, MEMBRANOUS CROUP, MALARIAL AND CEREBRO-SPINAL FEVERS, REPORTED DURING THE WEEK ENDING FEBRUARY 5, 1876, DISTRIBUTED AS FOLLOWS:
