persons removed from overcrowded apartments. The 804 deaths, represent a death-rate of 21.02, against 24.07 for the previous week and 23.07 for the corresponding week of 1896.

Contagious and infectious diseases continue to decrease, the number of cases reported of Contagious and infectious diseases continue to decrease, the number of cases reported of diphtheria, measles, scarlet fever, typhoid fever and small-pox being respectively 133, 135, 71, 34 and 0, against 166, 145, 80, 23 and 0 for the previous week—a total of 373 against 414. The increase of diphtheria was mainly in the Twentieth and Twenty-third Wards, and the decrease in the Twelfth, Seventeenth, Nineteenth and Twenty-second Wards. The increase of scarlet faver was chiefly in the Thirteenth Ward, and the decrease in the Nineteenth Ward. The increase of scarlet fever was chiefly in the Thirteenth Ward, and the decrease in the Nineteenth Ward. Twenty-four of the 34 cases of typhoid fever were above Fortieth street, and 8 were below Fourteenth street. No case of small-pox was reported. By order of the Board.
