Assessment and Taxation of Bank Shares for the Year 1904.

Section 24 of chapter 550 of the Laws of 1901, as amended by chapter 126 of the Laws of 1902, provides: "That in The City of New York the statement of bank assessment and tax herein provided for shall be made by the Board of Tax Commissioners of said city on or before the 15th day of December in each year, and by them forthwith mailed to the respective banks and banking associations located in said city, and a certified copy thereof sent to the Receiver of Taxes of said city. The tax shall be paid by the respective banks in said city to the said Receiver of Taxes on or before the 31st day of December in said year, and said tax shall be collected by the said Receiver of Taxes and shall be by him paid into the Treasury of said city to the credit of the General Fund thereof. This act is not to be construed as an exemption of the real estate of banks or banking associations from taxation."

SURVEYOR'S OFFICE.

The following summary shows the work done in the Surveyor's office during the quarter ending March 31, 1905:

Lot Alterations.

BOROUGH OF MANHATTAN.

Alterations were made affecting 276 lots in the 37 volumes of the block tax assessment maps.

BOROUGH OF THE BRONX.

Alterations were made affecting 410 lots in the 31 volumes of block tax assessment maps and in the 6 volumes of tentative maps.

BOROUGH OF BROOKLYN.

Alterations were made affecting 900 lots in the 66 volumes of block tax assessment maps and in the 27 volumes of tentative maps.

BOROUGH OF QUEENS.

Alterations were made affecting 604 lots in the 31 volumes of tentative maps.

BOROUGH OF RICHMOND.

Alterations were made affecting 158 lots in the 13 volumes of tentative maps.

The duplicate copies of the tax maps used by the Deputy Commissioners in all the boroughs, the copies of the block tax assessment maps in offices of the Bureau of Arrears and Water Registrar in the boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx, the copies of sections 1 to 11 in the Bureau of Arrears and sections 1 to 12 in the office of the Water Registrar in the Borough of Brooklyn were corrected to correspond with the alterations made on the original maps.

The necessary searches, surveys, calculations and drafting for the preparation and completion of sections 15 and 16 of the Borough of Brooklyn, comprising in all 44 volumes of new maps, were in progress during the quarter.

Street Openings.

Lands acquired in 26 proceedings were properly shown on the tax maps; one of the proceedings was in the Borough of Manhattan, three were in the Borough of The Bronx, twelve in the Borough of Brooklyn and ten in the Borough of Queens.

Change of Street Names.

Pursuant to ordinances two changes were made in street names; one in the Borough of The Bronx and one in the Borough of Brooklyn.

All corporations liable to a real estate tax not heretofore entered were numbered and entered on the tax maps.

NOTICE TO CONTRACTORS.

GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, the names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately. The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there.
