Hon. HERMAN A. METZ, Comptroller:

Sir—In the matter of a communication of Hon. Bird S. Coler, President of the Borough of Brooklyn, to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, under date of February 25, 1906, requesting the establishment of the position of Consulting Engineer of Public Works, with salary at the rate of \$8,000 per annum, which was referred to a select committee, consisting of the Comptroller and the President of the Board of Aldermen, and which has been submitted to the Investigations Division for examination. I beg to report as follows:

Section 586 of the Greater New York Charter, entitled "Employment of Engineers and Architects," provides as follows:

"The president of each borough may at any time employ, when thereto authorized by the board of estimate and apportionment and the board of aldermen, a consulting engineer, who shall be an expert in all matters relating to sewers and highways, and who shall have had fifteen years' experience as a civil engineer and a consulting engineer of public buildings, who shall be an expert in the matter of construction, repair and maintenance of public buildings; and a consulting architect, who shall be an architect of recognized scientific and artistic standing, of not less than fifteen years' experience. All other engineers or assistant engineers appointed by or under the authority of a borough president must be civil engineers of at least ten years' experience."

The problems requiring the early determination of the President of the Borough of Brooklyn comprise:

First—Complete scientific study of the storm water drainage around various low-lying areas of Brooklyn, where the frequent over-charging of the existing sewers has given legitimate cause for a great amount of provable damage to property.

Second—Important questions involved in the installation of a scientific sewer system and the alteration and repair of old sewers. The present situation in the Borough of Brooklyn is of such a nature that work must be commenced immediately, and appears to necessitate consulting advice and expert services.

Third—The general supervision and design of a new public market and a new municipal building.

The sewer problem requires the collection of all available data and the making of new research, so that the final definite plans to be contracted for may not only be ample in capacity, but of the most economical design and construction possible.

The pressing nature of such work is made apparent by the desire of the City, as expressed in calling for the construction of sewers at the earliest possible time in the several districts most affected by the present overflow of sewers during heavy storms. There are also many other demands for the services of an experienced engineer accustomed to design and construction of municipal works.

It appears from the Civil List that Consulting Engineers employed by the several Departments of the City are paid salaries varying from \$6,000 to \$12,000 per annum.

From the examination thus made, it would seem that the situation in Brooklyn at the present time demands immediate relief, necessitating expert services, and I would therefore respectfully recommend that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment establish the grade of Consulting Engineer of Public Works, Borough of Brooklyn, with salary at the rate of \$8,000 per annum. A form of resolution is attached hereto.

Sir—In regard to the application made by the Comptroller to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, requesting said Board to recommend to the Board of Aldermen the establishment of additional salaries of \$1,650 and \$1,800 for the position of Inspector of Repairs and Supplies in the Department of Finance, referred to this Division for investigation, I beg to report as follows:

The present highest salary for the position of Inspector in the Department of Finance is \$1,500. In many of the other Departments and Bureaus Inspectors of various classes are paid salaries ranging from \$1,650 to \$2,500, there being upwards of forty Inspectors on the different pay-rolls of the City receiving \$1,800 or more per annum, their compensation being fixed presumably with regard to the nature and responsibility of the duties they respectively perform.

Establishment of the additional grades at salaries of \$1,650 and \$1,800, respectively, for which the Comptroller asks, is necessary in order that he may be able to make such promotions above the grade of \$1,500 as may from time to time seem to be warranted by the nature of the services rendered or by the exceptional merit of their performance, in accordance with the approved policy and practice of other Departments.

I therefore recommend that the application be granted.

Hon. HERMAN A. METZ, Comptroller:

Sir—In the matter of a communication from the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, requesting that the salary of the Secretary to the Commissioner be fixed at \$3,500 per annum, which was referred to the Investigations Division for examination, I beg to report as follows:

The salary received at present by the Secretary to the Commissioner is \$2,500 per annum. Commissioner Ellison states that the Secretary, Mr. David Ryan, is an official of exceptional ability and thoroughly qualified to perform the duties of his position. He is also a man of considerable experience, having been Private Secretary in the Board of Health in 1901-2. He was also Chief Clerk and Bookkeeper in the Bureau of Street Openings in the office of the Corporation Counsel (which Bureau he organized), from 1893 to 1898.

The fact that the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity is practically three departments combined in one, and that the annual Budget allowance made for its maintenance is very much larger than the allowance granted to the majority of City departments, would seem to indicate that the work devolving upon the Secretary to the Commissioner is exceptionally heavy, which is stated to be the fact.

In view of the facts noted, some substantial increase in the salary of the Secretary to the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity should be made.

The Select Committee of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, consisting of the Comptroller and the President of the Board of Aldermen, to whom these facts were submitted at a meeting on March 7, 1906, approved of a recommendation to increase said salary to \$3,000 instead of to \$2,500. I would therefore respectfully recommend the approval of the resolution attached hereto.

At a meeting of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, held March 16, 1905, an itemized request from Mr. N. L. Britton, Director-in-Chief of the New York Botanical Garden, for an appropriation of \$70,000, for the year 1906, was presented; this contained the two following items:

The third item, 1,500 feet of park wall and fence, \$12,000, I do not consider an urgent necessity at present. The remainder of the items amount to \$68,000.

In my opinion, the expenditure of these various amounts will be of great benefit to the public, and if the financial condition of the City warrants the expenditure, I think the Board of Estimate and Apportionment may properly authorize the Comptroller, pursuant to section 47 of the Greater New York Charter, as amended by chapter 409 of the Laws of 1904, to issue Corporate Stock to the amount of \$70,000, to provide for the work of construction and improvements in the grounds of the New York Botanical Garden, Bronx Park, Borough of The Bronx.

Sir—The Board of Estimate and Apportionment, at a meeting held November 24, 1905, authorized the institution of condemnation proceedings for the acquisition of a parcel of vacant land at the intersection of the northeasterly side of Flatbush avenue with the southerly side of Sterling place, in the Borough of Brooklyn, as a site for a municipal court building. As was stated in the report presented to the Board at that time, the amount of taxes and sales for the same, together with interest thereon, amounted to more than the value of the property, and the Board took action authorizing the acquisition of the property by condemnation proceedings, in order that the title to the property might be vested in the City. Since the proceedings were started, Mr. Alfred Roelker, Jr., attorney for the estate that owns the property, has made a proposition to this office that he would sell to the City the interest of the estate for the sum of \$1,000. Taking into consideration the fact that the cost of the proceedings, that is, Commissioners' fees and allowance, would probably amount to this sum, I am of the opinion that the offer is an advantageous one and should be accepted by the City. I would therefore respectfully recommend that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment adopt a resolution authorizing the Comptroller to enter into a contract for the acquisition of the property, subject to the taxes, assessments, water rates and sales for the same, at a price not exceeding \$1,000, and that the rescinding of the resolution authorizing the condemnation proceedings be held in abeyance until the title has been vested in The City of New York by acquisition at private sale.

I would further respectfully recommend that a resolution be adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment authorizing the issue of Corporate Stock in the amount of \$1,100 to pay for the acquisition of the property, the examination of title and for surveys of the same.

The President laid before the Board the following communication from the Trustees of the College of The City of New York:

No. 504.

To the Honorable the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York:

Dear Sirs—The Board of Trustees of the College of The City of New York is obliged to petition your Honorable Board for an issue of thirty-five thousand dollars (\$35,000) Revenue Bonds to enable the Board to meet the current year's maintenance need of the College.

In October last the Board asked the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, by petition, a copy of which is hereto annexed, for \$403,978.34, contemplating an increase in the number of students and the increased expense of the maintenance and care of the new college buildings. The appropriation made was \$349,818, and, although this was a supposed increase of \$36,456 over the preceding year, it was in fact only \$23,956, as an additional appropriation of \$12,500 was made by your Honorable Board in June of 1905.

This appropriation of \$349,818 is not commensurate with the growth of the college. The number of students for whom provision had to be made February 1, 1906, was 3,766, as against 3,251 February 1, 1905. The amount asked in October last to meet the necessary increased cost of instructional expenses due to the increased number of scholars was \$29,185, and this is approximately the amount now asked for like purpose (\$28,800).

The same or a larger number of students will probably apply for admission in September, and additional tutors must be provided if these pupils are to be admitted.

Only one of the new college buildings has been occupied, however, and the increased expense of maintenance has not been as great as was estimated in October, 1905, but as we intend to move the college students to the new buildings in September, it will be necessary to make the added provision for increased maintenance on this account from September 1, 1906, to January 1, 1907.

first instance to your Honorable Board for the issue of Revenue Bonds before submitting the question of the additional appropriation to that Board.

Your petitioners therefore respectfully ask that Revenue Bonds to the amount of \$35,000 be issued for the purposes aforesaid.

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Gentlemen—The Board of Trustees of the College of The City of New York hereby reports that there will be required for the payment of the salaries of the President, Professors, Instructors and Tutors of the College, for books, apparatus and other necessary supplies, maintenance and general expenses of said college during the year 1906, the sum of \$403,978.34, in accordance with the attached schedule.

#### Salaries.

No salaries have been increased except such by-law advances of \$100 each, as have been earned by Teachers below the grade of Professors by reason of one year's added service and experience, the maximum salaries not exceeding the amounts heretofore and for many years paid.

The increase of 500 students (3,500 instead of 3,000 at the opening last year) and the increase in the number of admissions to be made next February, which has been shown by the experience of the last two years to be at least 500 new students, explain the added number of Teachers necessary and the addition of \$55,335 to the budget over and above the like appropriation of last year.

The per capita cost of teaching pupils is \$1 less than last year, and the same as similar costs of instruction in the high schools. We cannot with any safety or propriety reduce our salaries lower.

#### General Expenses.

We have commenced the occupancy of the new buildings, having placed upwards of 1,000 students in the new Townsend-Harris Hall. We expect to move the entire body of students during the coming year, abandoning the old buildings, which may then be sold by the City.

The cost of maintaining the new buildings the first year can only be roughly estimated, and it may be that during the year we shall have to apply to your Honorable Body for some additional provision on this account. We have taken pains to get the best estimates we can; and there will be required for fuel \$25,000; and for current departmental supplies, incident to the increased facilities furnished and required by the Departments of Chemistry, Physics and Natural History, \$9,000. Last year these items were respectively \$2,500 and \$2,600 each.

There will be a reduction in the rent charges of \$13,333.66, and all other minor expenses have been kept within the most economical limits.

The Trustees are impressed with the importance of administering the affairs of the College on most economical lines, but the magnitude of the new buildings, the increased size of the Departments of Chemistry and Physics and their demands for the installation of apparatus and enlarged supplies, and the increased and increasing number of students, make necessary our budget submitted herewith.

"Replying to your letter of the 19th inst., inclosing copy of a resolution adopted by the Board of Aldermen in relation to the removal of all overhead wires in the Borough of Queens and placing of same in subways, I beg to advise you that the Board of Estimate passed a resolution some time in December appointing Dr. Cary T. Hutchinson, Mr. Nelson P. Lewis and George F. Sever members of a commission to consider the matter of a comprehensive subway system for Brooklyn and Queens and the placing therein of all municipal and other wires. This is now being undertaken, but pending the results of this investigation, which will not be forthcoming for a long period, I will prepare a list of those streets from which it is most essential that the wires be removed or placed underground.

"To this end I will confer with Mr. J. Burke, the Electrical Inspector in the Borough of Queens, and as I am to make an inspection of the Brooklyn streets on February 28 with Mr. Wynkoop, I will take occasion to visit Queens at or about the same time so as to make a full and complete report."

Resolved, That, in pursuance of the provisions of the Greater New York Charter, the following resolution of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, adopted by that Board on the 9th day of February, 1906, be and the same hereby is approved, and the public work or improvement therein provided for is hereby authorized, and it is hereby determined that the cost and expense thereof shall be borne and paid as therein provided, namely:

"A copy of a resolution of the Local Board of the Staten Island District, duly adopted by said Board on the 29th day of December, 1905, and approved by the President of the Borough of Richmond on the 29th day of December, 1905, having been transmitted to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment as follows, to wit:

"Resolved, That this Board does hereby initiate proceedings for the said local improvement, to wit:

"For improvement of the streets within the 'St. George Ferry Approach Plan' extending from Hannah street on the south to the intersection of Stuyvesant place and Jay street with Richmond terrace on the north—namely, South street, Jay street, Hyatt street, Stuyvesant place to Weiner place, extension of Stuyvesant place to Griffin street and the widening of Griffin street, the work to consist in general of building retaining walls, with their copings and railings, regulating and grading, paving, constructing sidewalks, curbing, turling, planting trees, setting of street lamps, culverts, and all other necessary features in connection with carrying out the work outlined."

—and there having been presented to said Board of Estimate and Apportionment an estimate in writing, in such detail as the Board has directed, that the cost of the proposed work or improvement will be the sum of \$765,300, and a statement of the assessed value, according to the last preceding tax roll, of the real estate included within the probable area of assessment, to wit, the sum of \$1,241,600 to \$44,581,235, having also been presented, it is

"Resolved, That the said resolution of the said Local Board be and the same hereby is approved and the local improvement therein provided for is hereby authorized, and this Board does hereby determine that 30 per cent. of the cost and expense thereof shall be assessed upon the property deemed to be benefited by the said local improvement, and that the remainder of such cost and expense shall be borne and paid by The City of New York, except that where the streets are occupied by a street railway, the cost of paving that part of the roadway occupied by the street railroad company operating thereon, between its tracks, the rails of its tracks, and two feet in width outside of its tracks, shall be paid or repaid to the City, pursuant to law, by the said street railroad company.

"Resolved, That nothing in the above resolutions contained shall prevent the street railway company from paving that portion of the roadway between its tracks, the rails of its tracks, and two feet in width outside of its tracks, at its own cost and expense, under the supervision of the President of the Borough.

"Resolved, That, in the judgment of this Board, the 30 per cent. which is to be assessed in the above proceeding should be distributed over the entire Borough of Richmond."

Reports of Committee on Laws and Legislation—

No. 189—(G. O. No. 88).

The Committee on Laws and Legislation, to whom was referred on January 30, 1906 (Minutes, page 606), the annexed ordinance governing the use of explosives, respectfully

REPORTS:

That the Committee has given the matter the careful consideration its importance demands.

In view of the facts presented at its first hearing, a public hearing was subsequently held, at which the subject was fully discussed. There were present at this hearing the members of the Municipal Explosives Commission and the Secretary of the Commission, who also represented Mr. George E. Murray, Inspector of Combustibles; Dr. Charles F. McKenna, formerly a member of the Commission; representatives of the blasters' organization of this City, a representative of the Legislative Committee of the Building Trades Employers' Association and one or more practical handlers of blasting explosives, all of whom expressed their views at length.

The Committee also received numerous written communications from many branches of trades engaged in building operations in this City.

As the result of the Committee's deliberations, the following conclusions are submitted.

First—That the alarming frequency of serious accidents arising in blasting operations in this City, which have resulted in loss of life, bodily injuries and destruction of property is a public disgrace, and demonstrates that such occurrences are due to the absolute ignorance and incompetence of those engaged in such work or to a reckless and criminal disregard of all measures of prudence necessary to safeguard its operation. This scandalous condition imperatively demands a prompt and radical remedy.

Second—That the primary causes of this condition are the insufficiency and inadequacy of the rules regulating blasting and blasters, the laxity of the methods employed in granting and revoking licenses, and the imperfect and perfunctory manner in which blasting operations are supervised by the City officials having them in charge.

Third—That it is impracticable to legislate against individual negligence.

It is, however, entirely feasible to prescribe efficient rules and means for their due observance and enforcement which will minimize the chance of negligent action.

The fitness for a license as blaster should include the past record or history of the applicant, as well as his knowledge and experience.

Fourth—That the rules and regulations of the Municipal Explosives Commission governing this subject should be revised, both with regard to the qualifications of applicants to be licensed as blasters, and the manner of the examination to determine as to those qualifications.

The rules should be more stringent, and the examination more thorough.

Fifth—That, whenever occasion requires, the authority to revoke a blaster's license should be exercised impartially and without hesitation; and that no licensee should be permitted under any circumstances to shift the burden of incompetence or carelessness upon another.

That the temporary transfer of a license should be punished by its immediate and permanent forfeiture, and that the violation of any regulation with reference to the manner of preparing or exploding a blast should be visited with like punishment.

Sixth—That the City officials charged with the personal supervision of blasting operations should be rigidly held to a more thorough and strict performance of their duties, and their neglect should admit of no excuse.

That, if necessary, the force should be increased, so as to enable proper supervision to be maintained.

Seventh—That, by reason of the provisions of section 43 of the City Charter, prescribing that modifications of existing rules and regulations must originate with the Department affected, the Committee feels that it is without authority to present to the Board an ordinance for adoption.

The Committee, however, recommends that the attention of the Fire Commissioner and of the Municipal Explosives Commission be called to the dangerous conditions at present attending blasting operations in this City, to the end that prompt and radical action be taken to revise the rules and regulations affecting this subject and to insure their proper observance and enforcement, that life, limb and property may secure the full protection to which they are entitled.

The Committee further recommends that said Fire Commissioner and Municipal Explosives Commission be requested to furnish this Board with a copy of such rules and regulations, when so revised.

AN ORDINANCE to add to the provisions of the ordinance governing the use of nitro-glycerine dynamite with explosive base, like dynamite or giant powder.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, as follows:

1. The Municipal Explosives Commission shall preserve in proper form a record of inspections of all magazines made under its directions and of the amount of explosives allowed in each case, and in cases where any magazine or any apparatus or appliances connected therewith shall be deemed by the Commission, after inspection, to be insecure or dangerous.

The Commission shall prescribe such alterations as may render such magazines, apparatus or appliances, secure and devoid of danger, and in the meantime and until such changes and alterations are made, and such appliances attached, such magazine, apparatus or appliances may be taken under control of the Municipal Explosives Commission, and all persons prevented from using the same, and in cases deemed necessary the appliances, apparatus or attachments for limitations of the amount of dynamite taken under control of the Municipal Explosives Commission and no owner or agent of such owner of any magazine to carry dynamite shall employ any person to handle dynamite unless such person shall first obtain a certificate as to the qualifications therefor, from a board of practical blasters, detailed as such by the Municipal Explosives Commission, such certificate to be countersigned by the Fire Commissioner.

2. In order to be qualified to be examined for and to receive such certificates of qualification as a blaster, a person must comply to the satisfaction of said Board with the following requirements:

(a) He must be a citizen of the United States and over twenty-one years old.

(b) He must, on his first application for examination, fill out, in his own handwriting, a blank application to be prepared and supplied by the said Municipal Explosives Commission and which shall contain the name, age and place of residence of the applicant, the place or places where previously employed, and the nature of employment, for five years prior to the date of his application, and a statement that he is a citizen of the United States.

(c) He must be a person who has been employed as blaster's helper or a general assistant under the instruction of a licensed blaster in any building in The City of New York, for a period of not less than five years.

(d) The application shall be verified by him and shall, after the verification, contain a certificate signed by three blasters employed in New York City and registered on the books of said Municipal Explosives Commission as blasters working at their trade, certifying that the statements contained in such application are true.

3. Any person or persons found blasting within the limits of The City of New York, without a certificate from the Municipal Explosives Commission, shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and, when convicted thereof, shall be fined \$100 or six months' imprisonment, or both.

That President Cromwell of the Borough of Richmond and Mr. Louis L. Tribus, Commissioner of Public Works of said borough, appeared before the Committee and explained the necessity for the proposed ordinance. They stated that in making con-



tracts for the restoration of pavement, disturbed through excavations in streets, they were unable to procure such work to be done for the price they were authorized by the existing ordinance to charge parties in whose interest such excavations were made, and that a loss was thereby entailed upon the City in each instance, which will be avoided by increasing the charge per square yard for restoring granite, etc., to \$3.

The Committee is satisfied that the City should not be subjected to such loss, and recommends the adoption of the following ordinance:

**AN ORDINANCE** governing connections with sewers, certain uses of the public streets, and the making of openings in pavements and the restoration thereof in the Borough of Richmond.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York as follows: Section 1. Section 13 of an ordinance governing connections with sewers, certain uses of the public streets, and the making of openings in pavements and the restoration thereof in the Borough of Richmond, approved July 27, 1903, is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

Section 13. Fees, restoration of pavements.  
Fees for the restoration of pavement shall be as follows for areas less than ten (10) square yards:

For restoring granite or other blocks or brick on concrete foundation, per square yard.....	\$3 00
For restoring granite or other blocks or brick on sand foundation, per square yard.....	1 00
For sheet asphalt on concrete foundation, per square yard.....	3 00
For macadam, per square yard.....	80

For areas in excess of ten (10) square yards, special, as may be determined by the President of the Borough or his representative.

Sec. 2. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

**AN ORDINANCE** for the promotion of sanitary conditions in certain public places in The City of New York.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York as follows:

Section 1. There shall be placed in the foyer or lobby of each theatre, on each elevated railway station, in each subway station, in each ferry house, at each bridge terminal and the terminal of each railroad entering The City of New York, a sufficient number of spittoons or cuspidors, made of porcelain or lined with enamel, and to contain such antiseptic solution as may be deemed expedient and designated by the Board of Health, the better to promote sanitary conditions and minimize the danger of propagating disease.

Sec. 2. So far as the provisions of the foregoing section apply, the Commissioner of Bridges is authorized to carry them into effect.

Sec. 3. Each and every company, firm, corporation, individual, person or persons owning, controlling or operating any theatre, elevated railway station, subway station or railroad terminal, for each failure to comply with the provisions of section 1 of this ordinance shall, upon conviction thereof before a City Magistrate, be punished by a fine of fifty dollars (\$50).

Sec. 4. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, as follows:

Section 1. Section 1 of article II. of the ordinance in relation to the rules of the road, approved and signed by the Mayor on the 14th day of December, 1903, is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

1. Speed of vehicles.—The following rates of speed through the streets of the City shall not be exceeded, that is:

Ten miles an hour by surface street railway cars, eight miles an hour by bicycles, tricycles, velocipedes and motor vehicles, however propelled, or by passenger and other vehicles drawn by horses or other animals, except that in portions of the City not built up, where the buildings are at least 100 feet apart, a speed of fifteen miles an hour may be maintained.

Sec. 2. Article IX. of said ordinance in relation to the rules of the road is hereby amended by adding thereto a new section to be section 2, and to read as follows:

2. Any corporation operating a surface street railway, whose officers, agents or servants shall violate the provision of this ordinance relating to the speed of surface street railway cars, shall be liable to a penalty in the sum of twenty-five dollars for each and every offense.

Sec. 3. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

Memorandum in re Appropriations for Memorial Day Observances.

The Legislature passed on May 15, 1905, the following act:

"Chapter 552.

"An Act to amend the Greater New York Charter so as to confer power upon the board of estimate and apportionment to appropriate money for the proper observance of memorial day in the city of New York.

"Section 1. The Greater New York charter, as re-enacted and amended by chapter four hundred and sixty-six of the laws of nineteen hundred and one, is hereby amended by adding to and inserting therein a new section to read as follows:

"Section 245. The board of estimate and apportionment shall have power in its discretion to annually include in its final estimate such sum as it may deem proper for the due observance of memorial day to be expended by the memorial committee of the grand army of the republic in the various boroughs of said city, or in such other manner as to the said board of estimate and apportionment shall seem proper.

"Sec. 2. This act shall take effect immediately."

That, pursuant to the above-named act and to the provisions of section 226 of the Greater New York Charter, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment adopted in the Budget for 1906, at a meeting held on October 31, 1905, the following amounts:

Memorial Day observances, Borough of Queens.....	\$300 00
Memorial Day observances, Borough of The Bronx.....	300 00
Memorial Day observances, Borough of Manhattan.....	2,200 00
Memorial Day observances, Borough of Brooklyn.....	2,500 00
Allowed to Veteran Association (chapter 13, Laws of 1897).....	900 00

The Board of Aldermen adopted the Budget for 1906 on November 17, 1905, and the same was approved by the Mayor November 24, 1905.

By section 226 of the Greater New York Charter it was provided:

"After such Budget is made by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, it shall be submitted by said Board within five days to the Board of Aldermen, whereupon a special meeting of the Board of Aldermen shall be called by the Mayor to consider such Budget, the same shall simultaneously be published in the City Record. The consideration of such Budget by the Board of Aldermen shall continue from day to day until final action is taken thereon, but such consideration shall not continue beyond twenty days, and in the event of said Board of Aldermen taking no action thereon within such period of time the said Budget shall be deemed to be finally adopted as submitted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment. The Board of Aldermen may reduce the said several amounts fixed by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, except such amounts as are now or may hereafter be fixed by law, and except such amounts as may be inserted by the said Board of Estimate and Apportionment for the payment of State taxes and payment of interest and principal of the City debt, but the Board of Aldermen may not increase such amounts nor vary the terms and conditions thereof, nor insert any new items. Such action by the Board of Aldermen on reducing any item or amount fixed by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment shall be subject to the veto power of the Mayor as elsewhere provided in this act, and unless such veto is overridden by a three-fourths vote of the Board of Aldermen the item or amount fixed by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment shall stand as part of the Budget."

Chapter 585 of Laws of 1893.

An Act to authorize the city of Brooklyn to make yearly provision for the celebration of memorial day, including the year eighteen hundred and ninety-three.

Approved by the Governor May 5, 1893. Passed, three-fifths being present.

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. It shall be lawful for the board of estimate of the city of Brooklyn and county of Kings to make provision in its annual estimate for city purposes and appropriation for the celebration of memorial day in the said city of Brooklyn.

Sec. 2. It shall be lawful to expend any moneys heretofore appropriated by the board of estimate and contained in the budget for the year eighteen hundred and ninety-three for the observance of memorial day in said year and in such manner as may be approved by the mayor, comptroller and auditor of said city.

Sec. 3. This act shall take effect immediately.



## Chapter 13 of Laws of 1897.

An Act to amend chapter five hundred and thirty-eight of the laws of eighteen hundred and ninety-five, entitled "An act to amend chapter four hundred and twenty-nine of the laws of eighteen hundred and ninety-four, entitled 'An act to amend chapter five hundred and eighty-five of the laws of eighteen hundred and ninety-three,' entitled 'An act to authorize the city of Brooklyn to make yearly provision for the celebration of memorial day, including the year eighteen hundred and ninety-three.'"

Section 1. Section two of chapter five hundred and thirty-eight of the laws of eighteen hundred and ninety-five, entitled "An act to amend chapter four hundred and twenty-nine of the laws of eighteen hundred and ninety-four, entitled 'An act to amend chapter five hundred and eighty-five of the laws of eighteen hundred and ninety-three,' entitled 'An act to authorize the city of Brooklyn to make yearly provision for the celebration of memorial day, including the year eighteen hundred and ninety-three,' is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

Sec. 2. All moneys raised in pursuance of such appropriation and set apart for the use of the fourteenth, forty-eighth, one hundred and seventy-third, fifty-sixth, sixty-seventh, ninetieth, one hundred and thirty-ninth, one hundred and fifty-eighth and one hundred and fifty-ninth war veterans' association regiments, may, with the approval of the mayor, comptroller and auditor of said city, be paid to the treasurer of each of said war veterans' association regiments.

Sec. 3. This act shall take effect immediately.

This site extends from the Parkway south to Union street, and hence is only one block north of President street.

"At a full meeting of the Board of Trustees of said church, held last evening, it was unanimously adopted that said Board should request your Honor to pass favorably on the proposed grading of New York avenue from President street south to Malbone street, and that such request be and hereby is presented to you on behalf of the interests of said church.

"Done by order and in behalf of the Board of Trustees of the First Baptist Church, Brooklyn, E. D., N. Y.

(Signed) "W. D. LIDDLE, Secretary."

Frederick W. Rowe, representing the petitioners, stated that New York avenue was practically an open street from Fulton street to the Ocean, with the exception of the three or four blocks in question.

The Secretary read a communication from Celestine W. How, Mary E. How, Susan W. How and Sara K. How, owners of property on both sides of the street, protesting against the proposed improvement.

On motion of Alderman Hann, the matter was referred to him for investigation and report.



No. 397.

Beginning at a point in the bulkhead line adopted by the Commissioner of Docks October 14, 1903, and approved by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund November 18, 1903, where the westerly line of Richmond avenue intersects the same, said point being distant 230.69 feet northerly from the northerly line of Richmond terrace, measured along the westerly line of Richmond avenue, as shown on said map; thence southerly along the westerly line of Richmond avenue 100 feet; thence westerly along a line parallel with and distant 100 feet southerly from the said bulkhead line to a point in the easterly line of Ferry street where said parallel line intersects the same, thence northerly along the said easterly line of Ferry street and its northerly prolongation to its intersection with the pierhead line established by the Secretary of War in 1890; thence easterly along said pierhead line to a point where the northerly prolongation of the westerly line of Richmond avenue intersects the same; thence southerly along said northerly prolongation of the westerly line of Richmond avenue to the point or place of beginning.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.
