REPORT OF THE COMMISSIONER OF PUBLIC WORKS.

Offices of Commissioner of Public Works,
Nos. 13 to 21 Park Row,
Borough of Manhattan, August 6, 1909.

Hon. JOHN F. AHEARN, President, Borough of Manhattan:

Dear Sir—In accordance with section 1544 of the Greater New York Charter, I transmit herewith a report of the transactions of the various offices under my jurisdiction for the quarter ending June 30, 1909.

The Superintendent of the Bureau of Public Buildings and Offices states that of the three public baths under construction two are nearing completion, and should be ready for use within a very short time. He also states that frequent and continuous inspection of all the new construction work has been made and as a result the Bureau of Public Buildings and Offices is thoroughly conversant with the exact status of all the work performed under the jurisdiction of this Bureau.

The seemingly lengthy period of time which has been consumed in the alterations to the offices of the Commissioner of Records and the Corporation Counsel in the Hall of Records Building was occasioned by the building being constantly occupied during working hours by the various Departments. Superintendent Voorhis reports, however, that the work is about 75 per cent. completed.

During the quarter which has just elapsed the following contracts were entered into: Thirty-three paving and repaving contracts at an estimated cost of \$511,229.75; 5 sewer and receiving basin contracts at an estimated cost of \$26,839.18; and 11 miscellaneous contracts at an estimated cost of \$652,384.17.

The following contracts were completed: Twelve paving and repaving contracts at a cost of \$128,131.39; 4 sewer contracts at a cost of \$18,530.23; 3 regulating, grading, etc., contracts at a cost of \$2,450.92, making a total of 19 completed contracts at a total cost of \$149,112.54.

The total length of the sewerage system in the Borough on March 31, 1909, was 520.61 miles. During this quarter 2,925 linear feet were added, making a total length at the end of this period of 521.17 miles.

Six new receiving basins were placed, making the number of receiving basins on June 30, 6,332.

The Superintendent of Sewers reports that the sewer on Broadway, from Two Hundred and Fourteenth street to the Ship Canal Bridge; in Two Hundred and Eighteenth street, between Broadway and Ninth avenue, and in Ninth avenue, between Two Hundred and Sixteenth and Two Hundred and Eighteenth streets, have been accepted in behalf of the City.

The work in this section of the city is now nearing completion and contracts for all the remaining sewers that are required in the territory north of Dyckman street and east of Broadway have been let and the work is now progressing on practically all of them.

I desire to call your attention to that part of the report of the Superintendent of Sewers in which he refers to cases where real estate companies have applied for and received permits to construct sewers at their own expense in territory which they are developing. He states in substance that as this Department is well equipped for the purpose of constructing all the public sewers in the City, and the sewers constructed under private permits cannot of necessity be as satisfactory to this Department as if they were constructed under our immediate charge and as this Department is fully capable of carrying on all of the construction work of this nature without any increase of the force now employed, which force must be maintained in any event, he does not favor the adoption of such a practice.

The public contracts which are now in force in rebuilding and reconstructing small portions of sewers have proven a very satisfactory method of promptly attending to emergency work, and has done much to eliminate the delay which previously existed when this work had to be done pursuant to orders issued by this Department.

During this period there were 281,531 feet of pipe sewer cleaned, 47,222 feet of brick sewer were cleaned, 3,965 basins were cleaned, 10,736 loads of dirt were removed, 193,819 feet of brick sewer were examined, and 56,165 feet of pipe sewer were examined.

All of the above, in addition to the work necessary to the proper maintenance, cleaning and repairing of brick and pipe sewers.

For subways, steam mains and various connections, 6,131 openings were made during this period, 1,832 openings for construction and repairs to railways. There were 52,949 feet of electric main conduits laid, 5,250 feet of gas mains, 11,407 feet of water mains, and 3,206 feet of pneumatic tubes also laid. The total length of new mains laid or overhauled and of long services laid amounted to 21,677 miles.

For the construction of vaults, placing of guy posts, tar kettles, boilers, banner poles, and for repairs to pavements at the expense of the applicant, 527 permits were issued.

During the quarter 29,513.90 square yards of sheet asphalt, 924.80 yards of block asphalt, 1,152.70 yards of wood block pavement, 5,452 yards of granite block pavement were completed and accepted in behalf of the City, making a total of 37,043.40 yards of pavement completed during this period.

The Inspection Division of the Bureau of Highways reported 12,204 defects in the pavement, 16,986 repairs to the pavement, and they received 8,767 complaints from the Police Department.

During the past quarter I have given the matter of restoring the various openings in the asphalt pavement about the City my personal attention and am pleased to say that my efforts to secure speedy repairs to the pavement have been fraught with success. With the possible exception of a few streets where construction conditions are such as to prevent their being put in good condition at the present time, I feel I am justified in stating that the street pavements in this Borough are in first-class condition.

The report of the Engineer of Street Openings contains a complete account of the reports, maps for filing, profile maps, damage and benefit maps and rule maps made and filed during the period, and field and office work accomplished in the same time.

The report of the Division of Roads shows in detail the work done in maintaining the unpaved roadways in this Borough.

STATEMENT NO. 2.

July 8, 1909.

Hon. FRANK J. GOODWIN, Superintendent of Sewers:

Dear Sir—As directed by the Commissioner of Public Works, I herewith transmit a report of the operations of the Bureau of Sewers during the second quarter of the year 1909:

This report contains a statement of the work done in constructing new sewers and a statement of the work done in alteration and improvement of old sewers, with a summary of the contract work done under the appropriation for Reconstruction and Repairs to Sewers.

Also a report of the work done by the mechanics and laborers of the Bureau, and of the new work in progress as well as the work projected for the betterment of the system of sewerage of the Borough.

The total length of the sewerage system on March 31, 1909, was 2,748,860 linear feet, or 520.61 miles, to which was added during the second quarter of 1909, 2,925 linear feet, making the total length at the end of the second quarter 2,751,785 linear feet, or 521.17 miles.

The total number of receiving basins in the Borough March 31, 1909, was 6,326, to which six (6) were added during the quarter, making a total of 6,332 on June 30, 1909.

The work done in reconstructing, altering and improving the system during the quarter amounted to 250 linear feet, but this does not give any idea of the importance of the work done under this head, for most of the work was in deep cutting and of large size sewer, which was undertaken to afford improved drainage for the new Bellevue Hospital.

The following sewers were completed during the quarter:

Sewer in Fifty-fifth street, between Avenue A and East River.

Alteration and improvement to sewer in One Hundred and Eighteenth street, between Third and Lexington avenues.

Sewer in West One Hundred and Forty-second street, from end of present sewer to Harlem River.

Sewer in One Hundred and Fifty-third street, between Riverside drive and Broadway.

There are now under contract and in course of construction the following new works, payable from the Street Improvement Fund, amounting to \$73,095.14, viz.:

Sewer in West One Hundred and Sixty-eighth street, between Fort Washington avenue and Broadway.

Sewer in West One Hundred and Sixty-ninth street, between Broadway and Fort Washington avenue.

Sewer in West One Hundred and Seventy-second street, between Fort Washington avenue and Broadway.

Sewer in One Hundred and Seventy-fourth street, between Audubon avenue and Wadsworth avenue.

Sewer in West One Hundred and Seventy-seventh street, from Fort Washington avenue to Riverside drive.

Sewer in Broadway, both sides, between Isham and Emerson streets.

Sewer in Post avenue, between Academy street and Tenth avenue.

Sewer in Emerson street, between Vermilyea avenue and Cooper street.

Receiving basin at the northeast corner of One Hundred and Eleventh street and Riverside drive.

Receiving basin, north side of Manhattan street, 87 feet west of Twelfth avenue.

The reconstruction work in progress during the quarter was:

Reconstruction of outlet sewers in Twenty-eighth and Twenty-ninth streets, between East River and First avenue; and in First avenue, between Twenty-eighth and Twenty-ninth streets.

Under the contract head of "Reconstruction and Repairs to Brick, Pipe and Flume or Box Sewers," the following sewers were repaired or reconstructed during the quarter:

Sewers at Fourteenth street, between East River and Avenue D.

Sewer in Twenty-fourth street, between Sixth avenue and Broadway.

Sewer in Twenty-sixth street, intersection of Seventh avenue.

Sewer in Eighty-fourth street, between Columbus avenue and Central Park West.

Sewer in One Hundred and Seventeenth street, between First and Second avenues.

Sewer in One Hundred and Forty-eighth street, between Riverside drive and Broadway.

The contract prices for the above work, payable from the Street Improvement Fund amount to \$73,095.14.

The contracts payable from Corporate Stock amount to \$31,945.

During the quarter contract forms and specifications for the following have been completed and forwarded, with the request that the same be advertised and let:

Sewer in Third avenue, west side, between Twelfth and Thirteenth streets.

Outlet sewer at the foot of One Hundred and Eighteenth street and Harlem River.

Receiving basins at the northeast and southeast corners of One Hundred and Ninety-third street and Fort George avenue.

Sewer and appurtenances in Emerson street, between Vermilyea avenue and summit east.

The following sewers have been petitioned for by property owners, and preliminary steps have been taken toward constructing the same:

Sewer in One Hundred and Seventieth street, between Fort Washington and Haven avenues.

Sewer in Bennett avenue, between Broadway and One Hundred and Eighty-first street.

Extension of sewer in One Hundred and Twentieth street, at East River.

Receiving basin on northeast corner of Avenue A and Twenty-second street.

Sewer in One Hundred and Seventy-seventh street, between Audubon and St. Nicholas avenues.

Reconstruction of outlet sewer at the foot of Seventy-ninth street, East River.

Outlet sewer, Harlem River, between One Hundred and Thirty-fourth and One Hundred and Thirty-fifth streets, and in Park avenue, between One Hundred and Thirty-fourth and One Hundred and Thirty-fifth streets.

Reconstruction of outlet sewer at the foot of Market street, East River.

Reconstruction of outlet sewer at West and Albany streets.

Rebuilding of sewer in Twenty-sixth street, between Fifth and Sixth avenues.

Rebuilding of sewer in Liberty street, Greenwich to West street.

Rebuilding of sewer in Liberty street, Nassau street and Maiden lane.

Rebuilding of sewer in John street, Broadway to Pearl street.

Rebuilding of sewer in Cedar street, between Broadway and Nassau street.

Alteration and improvement to sewer in Mercer street, between Spring and Prince streets, except portion recently repaired.

Extension of sewer in Eighteenth street and East River, and other work in connection with the same.

Sewer in One Hundred and Fifty-first street, between Broadway and Riverside drive.

Extension of box sewer under pier at Clarkson street.

Sewer in Third avenue, west side, between Twelfth and Thirteenth streets.

Reconstruction of outlet sewer under Pier (old) 8, North River.

The work of constructing new sewers during the past quarter has progressed satisfactorily and in the usual manner. The tables accompanying this report show sewers which have been finished and accepted and those which are now in progress.

The largest contract which was finished and accepted during the quarter was Broadway, both sides, from Two Hundred and Fourteenth street to Ship Canal Bridge; in Two Hundred and Eighteenth street, between Broadway and Ninth avenue, and in Ninth avenue, between Two Hundred and Sixteenth and Two Hundred and Eighteenth streets. The work in this section of the City is now nearing completion.

Contracts have been made for all the remaining sewers that are required in the territory north of Dyckman street and east of Broadway, and work is now progressing on all of them with but one exception.

There is some territory still undeveloped in the northern end of the City, extending along the ridge west of Broadway, from One Hundred and Eighty-first street north to the Ship Canal. Some new streets will be laid in this territory and in the course of time will be required to be sewered.

In a number of cases within the past year where real estate companies have developed tracts of considerable area they have applied for and received permits to build sewers at their own expense, but under the supervision of this Department and the plans approved by it. These applications were made on the ground of avoiding the delays incident to following the forms of law and the rules of the Board of Apportionment for making such work assessable on the property.

I am not in favor of doing work in this way except in cases where absolute necessity requires it, for the reason that the Department is well equipped and organized for the purpose of constructing all the public sewers in the City according to plans previously devised and approved, having a uniform and properly designed system.

We are fully capable of carrying on all this work without any increase of the force now employed, which must be maintained in any event.

Furthermore, sewers constructed under private permits are never as satisfactory to us as if they were done under our immediate charge.

Some of the new rules introduced in the Board of Apportionment have a tendency to still further complicate matters and cause delay. At present two resolutions are required by that Board, one authorizing surveys and plans to be made and requiring a full detailed report thereon, at another meeting of the Board, when final resolution authorizing the construction will be adopted.

I can see nothing particular to be gained in this Borough by this additional resolution, whatever usefulness it may have in other Boroughs.

As noted in my last report, an application was made to the Corporation Counsel for an opinion as to the right to assess the rebuilding of outlet sewers where the same were built under piers. This opinion having been received, and being to the effect that such work is assessable, several jobs of this sort are about to be undertaken. I might mention in this connection the sewer at West Fortieth street and sewer in East Twenty-sixth street, both of which are in absolute need of being rebuilt.

In the matter of maintenance, I beg to say that public contracts are now in force for rebuilding and reconstructing small portions of sewers, which work was formerly

done under orders. This contract work is very satisfactory, as we are now able to promptly attend to emergency work, where formerly there was considerable delay.

On account of numerous cases of interference with our sewer system by corporations and by private owners in making small changes and extensions, we have found that the data on our general plan, which we desired to have entirely accurate, was more or less defective.

In order to remedy this trouble I have detailed an Assistant Engineer with proper help to inspect upon the ground and to take such measurements as are necessary to correct our map and make it entirely reliable.

Dear Sir—In accordance with your recent instructions, I desire to submit herewith my report of the transactions of this Bureau for the quarter ending June 30, 1909.

Requisitions for supplies and repairs numbering 484, and orders to the number of 528 were drawn and issued.

The total amount of vouchers transmitted to your office was \$317,314.58.

Departmental orders for repairs to the various public buildings, baths and comfort stations by the Bureau Mechanics were issued to the number of 484; 500 communications, including the reports to your office and the Bureau of Correspondence were made.

During the quarter frequent and continuous inspection of all the new construction work was made, including the erection of three new public baths, two of which are nearing completion and should be turned over to the City within a short time. Examinations have been made from time to time of the alterations in the Hall of Records Building in the offices of the Commissioner of Records and the Corporation Counsel. This work is progressing necessarily in a slow manner on account of the building being constantly occupied during working hours by the various Departments. However, I can report at this writing that the work is about 75 per cent. completed.

The repairs and alterations to the free floating baths preceding their assignment for the summer bathing season were advertised, and bids received thereon, but owing to the excessive prices, the lowest of which amounted to \$13,499, it was recommended that the matter be readvertised, which was done and new bids received, of which the lowest was \$9,875, showing the wisdom of the action taken in the matter. Negotiations were conducted during the past quarter with the Department of Docks and Ferries and the Department of Health in order to provide berths on the North and East rivers for the various floating baths of which the following is a list:

- Battery Baths, Nos. 1 and 2.
- Pike Street Bath, No. 15.
- East Fifth Street Bath, No. 10.
- West Fifty-first Street Bath, No. 13.
- West One Hundred and Thirty-sixth Street Bath, No. 9.
- West Eighty-second Street Bath, No. 3.
- East Ninety-sixth Street Bath, No. 12.
- West Ninety-eighth Street Bath, No. 14.
- Corlears Street Bath, No. 11.
- Harlem Ship Canal, Two Hundred and Eighteenth Street Bath, No. 8.
- Randalls Island Bath, No. 7.

We are still using our efforts to increase the number of assignments of docking facilities, so that we may get as many of these baths as possible in operation. Considerable difficulty is experienced in this respect, owing to the great commercial demand for the use of docks, which is increasing each year. The summer force of male and female Attendants were appointed and nearly all of them assigned to duty. Special inspection of the public baths has been made and data gathered as a basis for working material during the fall and winter months, when it is proposed to make extensive repairs to the concreting, plumbing and steam systems of the older baths, and also to repaint the same and place them in first-class condition. Inspection of all the large court buildings is also in progress, and a great many changes and alterations will be made during the summer recess to place these buildings in a thoroughly sanitary state.

I attach hereto the statistics relating to the bathing patronage at the interior public baths for the quarter.

The greatest width of the proposed taking along the aqueduct is 650 feet, which occurs across Parcels Nos. 1136 and 1137, and the least width of the said taking is 25 feet, which occurs across Parcels Nos. 1151, 1152, 1153, 1154, 1161, 1162, 1163, 1164 and 1165.

In case any real estate hereinbefore described is used for highway or other public purposes, such use shall continue until such time as The City of New York may acquire the right to close the same.

NOTICE TO CONTRACTORS.

GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately.

The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there.
