#### REPORT OF THE BUREAU OF SEWERS.

April 17, 1912.

Hon. E. V. FROTHINGHAM, Commissioner:

Dear Sir-I have the honor to present the following report of the operations of the Bureau of Sewers for the quarter ending March 31, 1912: On March 31, 1912, the sewerage system of the Borough consisted of 516.43 miles

sewers and 6,412 receiving basins. During the quarter 383 linear feet of sewer and one manhole were built as new work, and 576 linear feet of sewer and 3 manholes as reconstruction, alterations

and improvement work. The following works were completed during the quarter:

Sewer in 141st st., between Riverside drive and Broadway; rebuilding sewer in 33d st., between 6th and 7th aves.

The contract prices for the above work payable from the street improvement fund amounted to \$4,110.01.

The work completed under the head of reconstruction and payable from corporate stocks amounted to \$7,067. The work under construction March 31, 1912, payable out of the street improve-


