## DEPARTMENT OF PARKS.

## QUEENS.

## Bellevue and Allied Hospitals.

A regular meeting of the Board of  
Trustees of Bellevue and Allied Hos-  
pitals was held on Tuesday, May 16, 1916,  
at 3.30 p. m.

Present—Dr. Brannan, the President,  
in the chair; Messrs. Paulding, Farley,  
Sachs and Robbins, Trustees. Excused,  
Mr. O'Keefe, Mr. Stern and Mr. Kings-  
bury, Commissioner of Public Charities.

The minutes of the meeting of May  
2, 1916, were held as read and approved.

Doctor George O'Hanlon, the General  
Medical Superintendent, reported as fol-  
lows:

The administratrix of Margaret Nob-  
loch, who died at this hospital on Nov.  
8, 1915, following amputation of the leg,  
has filed a claim against the city for  
\$5,000, it being alleged that the amputa-  
tion was not justified, and consent was  
not given. This claim has been referred  
to the Finance Department.

On the 14th instant, at four o'clock  
in the afternoon, some paper wrapped  
around chairs in the basement entrance  
to pavilions A and B, became ignited,  
either from a match or cigarette. It

was immediately extinguished; no dam-  
age was done.

In the Preparedness Parade on the 13th  
instant, Bellevue Hospital was repre-  
sented in the afternoon by 65 of the at-  
tending and resident staff. The Nurses  
marched in the evening.

I am in receipt of a request from Dr.  
Norris for the appointment of Dr. Alice  
B. Louis, for the position of Assistant  
Pathologist at \$600 per year.

The construction of the out-patient  
building at Gouverneur Hospital is pro-  
gressing. The balconies at Neponset are  
nearly ready for the tile floors. At Ford-  
ham, the openings for transoms have  
been cut through, and this work is mak-  
ing fair progress. Nothing has yet been  
done on the balconies at Bellevue.

I am in receipt of the following com-  
munication from Mr. White, Chief Clerk  
and Auditor:

"It is apparent at this time that bal-  
ances in several of the appropriations for  
supplies, materials, etc., are not suffi-  
cient to meet the needs of the Department  
for the remainder of the year 1916. The  
exact amounts required, however, have  
not as yet been determined, but an ap-  
proximate estimate of anticipated defi-  
cits will be as follows: 2069, Food Su-  
plies, \$40,000; 2071, Fuel, \$15,000; 2073,  
Laundry, Cleaning and Disinfecting Su-  
plies, \$3,000; 2077, Motor Vehicle Su-  
plies, \$3,000; 2080, Motorless Vehicles and  
Equipment, \$200; 2085, General Plant Ma-  
terials, \$17,000; total, \$78,200.



"In most instances the deficits are due to increased costs in supplies and materials. This is especially true in regard to fuel, Motor Vehicle Supplies which includes gasoline, and metal materials. The appropriation for the purchase of Plant Materials has already been exhausted.

"There are other appropriations for which additional funds may be required later in the year, viz.: Refrigerating Supplies, Medical and Surgical Supplies, Medical and Surgical Equipment and Wearing Apparel. It seems inadvisable to consider these anticipated deficits in connection with a request for special revenue bonds at this time as the need for additional funds in these appropriations is not urgent.

"I beg leave to recommend that a request be made of the Board of Aldermen to authorize an issue of special revenue bonds to provide funds to meet the anticipated deficits as shown in the foregoing list."

On separate motion, duly seconded and carried in each instance, action was taken upon the report of the General Medical Superintendent as follows:

The General Medical Superintendent was directed to issue instructions to obtain in writing the consent of adult patients to be operated upon.

Dr. Alice B. Louis was appointed to the place of Assistant Pathologist at \$600 a year.

It was resolved to request the Board of Aldermen for an issue of special revenue bonds to meet the anticipated deficit in the appropriations of the department as soon as the amounts are accurately determined.

#### COMMITTEE REPORTS.

The President presented a tabulation of bids received at the office of the Central Purchase Committee on Tuesday, May 16, 1916, for coal. On the recommendation of the Central Purchase Committee, awards were made to the lowest bidder on line 13 for buckwheat coal, bids on line 14 for stove coal were rejected on account of the high price, and on line 15 for buckwheat coal for Fordham Hospital, bids were rejected as the department could not await the results of this opening, and has been obliged to place an order for this coal.

The Building Committee reported that they had inquired into the application of the M. J. Callahan Company for final payment on their contract, reviewed all the facts set forth in the communications from J. H. Freedlander, dated April 17 and May 9, 1916, and M. J. Callahan Company, dated May 6th, 1916, and prepared a certificate of completion and acceptance. After consideration, it was moved, seconded and carried, to adopt the certificate of completion and acceptance presented by the Building Committee on the contract of the M. J. Callahan Company for the installation of the steam-heating and ventilating work in the power house and ambulance station of Harlem Hospital.

Reference was made to the fact that the lease of the premises at 225 E. 26th st., used as part of the School of Midwives, will expire on Sept. 1st, 1916. After consideration, on motion, duly seconded and carried, it was

Resolved, To request the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund to renew this lease for a period of three years, with a privilege of renewal.

Mr. Paulding presented a letter from the Committee on the Prevention of Tuberculosis, dated May 13, in regard to the proposed amendment to the new building code, by which the size of side yards adjacent to dwellings other than tenements is to be reduced from four to three feet. After discussion, it was

Resolved, In the interests of public health to instruct the Secretary to write to the Committee on Buildings of the Board of Aldermen in opposition to the proposed amendment.

On motion, duly seconded and carried, the Budget Committee was instructed to make provision in the departmental estimate for 1917 for a salary for the Director of the Tuberculosis Clinics in the Out-Patient Department of Gouverneur Hospital.

Dr. Brannan referred to the experience of the department in tree planting and placing tree boxes under the supervision of architects and our own employees, and called particular attention to the difficulty in growing trees about Bellevue and Gouverneur. After discussion, it was moved, seconded and carried, to request the assistance of the Park Commissioner to obtain the kinds of trees adaptable for growth in the streets surrounding these hospitals and in preparing the specifications for planting such trees, their inspection and care.

#### COMMUNICATIONS.

A letter was presented from McKim, Mead and White, calling attention to the delays in completing the building for the out-patient department of Gouverneur Hospital on account of the delay in receiving the approval of the height of

outlets from the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity. Dr. Brannan reported that under date of May 11, he requested Commissioner Williams to have his engineers give this matter their early attention. On motion, duly seconded and carried, the action of the President was approved.

A communication was presented from A. W. King requesting an extension of 60 days' time on his contract for the installation of the radiographic department in pavilions I and K on account of changes in the plans since the work was started, incomplete plumbing work and his inability to obtain copper. A letter relating thereto was presented from McKim, Mead and White. After consideration, on the recommendation of the Building Committee, it was moved, seconded and carried, to grant the request of the contractor to date from May 13, 1916.

The minutes of the Medical Board of Harlem Hospital for April 26, were presented. On motion, duly seconded and carried, the application of Dr. Charles M. McKinley for appointment to the pediatric clinic in the out-patient department, the recommendation that Dr. Philip Jager be appointed as Assistant to Dr. Bates in the eye clinic of the out-patient department, the nominations of Dr. Somerville and Dr. Leber as Adjunct Assistant Visiting Physicians and the request for the transfer of Dr. G. E. Farr from Fordham to Harlem Hospital in the position of Adjunct Assistant Visiting Surgeon as well as the reference to the previous communication of the Medical Board in regard to the nomination of Dr. Falk as Adjunct Assistant Visiting Surgeon, were referred to the Conference Committee; the recommendation that a Zander Mechanic Therapeutic Outfit be installed in the out-patient department was referred to the General Medical Superintendent with instructions to make provisions in the departmental estimate for 1917 for this purpose.

The minutes of the Medical Board of Fordham Hospital for May 8, were presented. On motion, duly seconded and carried, the recommendation in regard to placing physicians and surgeons in the out-patient department on a salaried basis was noted, and provision will be made in the departmental estimate for 1917 for the payment of such salaries; the request for a Graflex camera was referred to the General Medical Superintendent.

The minutes of the Board of Managers of the Bellevue Training School for April 7, were presented. On motion, duly seconded and carried, the resolution appointing a Committee of the Officers of the Board with power to arrange the transfer of the strip of land to the east of Osborn Hall, was noted and referred to a Special Committee, consisting of Dr. Brannan and Mr. Paulding, who were authorized at a previous meeting to negotiate to obtain this property; and it was further

Resolved, To extend a vote of thanks to the Board of Managers for this strip of land.

A letter, dated May 13, was presented from the Simes Company, stating that they could not complete their contract for the installation of lighting fixtures in pavilions I and K on account of the unfinished condition of the gas piping in that building. On motion, duly seconded and carried, this communication was referred to the Building Committee, with power.

A communication, dated May 12, was presented from Dr. John F. Connors, of the Medical Board of Harlem Hospital, urging upon the Trustees the appointment of a Nurse to investigate the follow-up work of surgical cases, reported in the minutes of the Medical Board for Feb. 29, 1916. After discussion, it was

Resolved, To make provision for the appointment of a Nurse at each hospital in the department for this service, and it was further

Resolved, To instruct the General Medical Superintendent to adopt a card system for this purpose in all the hospitals of the department.

A letter, dated May 15, was presented from the Art Commission, transmitting a resolution approving the designs and location of pavilions F and G of Bellevue Hospital. On motion, duly seconded and carried, this communication was ordered placed on file.

A communication was presented from the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, transmitting a certified copy of a resolution adopted by that Board on May 5, approving the issue of \$5,000 special revenue bonds for the purchase of the boat "Helen C. Juilliard." It was moved, seconded and carried, to request the Board of Aldermen for permission to buy this boat in the open market, without public letting.

A letter, dated May 1, 1916, was presented from the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, transmitting certified copy of resolution adopted by that Board on April 28, 1916, authorizing \$26,000 special

revenue bonds to meet the anticipated deficit in the appropriations for 1916. On motion, duly seconded and carried, this communication was ordered placed on file.

It was moved, seconded and carried, to adjourn to meet Tuesday, May 23, 1916, at 1 o'clock.

#### COMMITTEE REPORTS.

The Board considered a tentative report from the Budget Committee on the departmental estimate for 1917. The subject of salary increases was discussed, but definite action upon the policy to be pursued was deferred until more information could be obtained thereon, and Dr. Brannan and Dr. O'Hanlon were delegated as a Special Committee to confer with the representatives of the Bureau of Standards with that end in view.

#### COMMUNICATIONS.

A letter was presented from the Reliance Engineering Company requesting an extension of three weeks' time on their contract for the installation of grate bars, etc., in the power plant of Bellevue Hospital on account of the great difficulty in obtaining foundry supplies at the present time.

On the recommendation of the Building Committee, it was moved, seconded and carried, to approve this request.

A letter was presented from Commissioner F. J. H. Kracke, of the Department of Plant and Structures, replying to a communication from the Trustees in regard to the automobile service and stating that application for a car to be assigned to Bellevue and Allied Hospitals should be made to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment or the Mayor. After discussion, it was moved, seconded and carried, to present such a request to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

A communication was presented from the Department of Public Charities stating that the general drug division is being moved to its new quarters in the old morgue building at the foot of E. 26th st., and requesting additional steam pressure for that building. On motion, duly seconded and carried, the General Medical Superintendent was instructed to comply with this request.

A letter was presented from the Department of Plant and Structures asking for certain information by June 1, in regard to buildings, materials, tools, vehicles, etc., used for repair purposes. On motion, duly seconded and carried, the General Medical Superintendent was instructed to furnish this information, if possible, by June 1.

It was moved, seconded and carried, to adjourn to meet on Monday, May 29, 1916, at 2 o'clock.

An adjourned regular meeting of the Board of Trustees of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals was held on Monday, May 29, 1916, at 2 p. m.

Present—Dr. Brannan, the President, in the chair; Messrs. Paulding, Farley, Sachs, O'Keeffe, Stern and Robbins, Trustees. Excused—Mr. Kingsbury, Commissioner of Public Charities.

The minutes of the meetings of May 16 and May 23, 1916, were held as read and approved.

Doctor George O'Hanlon, the General Medical Superintendent, reported as follows:

The Board of Aldermen passed a resolution authorizing the closing of offices at four o'clock during the months of June, July and August when the heads of departments consider it possible to do so. Your approval is requested.

Dr. Freed, Resident Obstetrician at the School for Midwives, is resigning from July 1, and it is recommended that Dr. F. W. Gravelle, the assistant, be promoted to the vacancy caused by Dr. Freed's resignation, and that Dr. Robinson, now completing his internship at the hospital, be appointed to the position of Assistant Resident Obstetrician.

I am in receipt of a request from Mr. Tinker for permission to appoint an assistant Protestant Chaplain at Bellevue Hospital. The Protestant Episcopal Mission Society will pay his salary. It is requested that he be given his maintenance at the hospital. Your approval is requested.

Dr. Gregory, who has had charge of the Clinic for Atypical Children, for which, at the request of Commissioner Kingsbury, we have temporarily cared since last July, with the understanding that full authority as well as responsibility would be vested in this department's reports that owing to the difficulty with which he is constantly confronted (by reason of lack

of authority being given him, and failure of co-operation on the part of the Department of Public Charities) he no longer can assume responsibility for the work, and asks that the Commissioner of Charities be communicated with and the original agreement fulfilled, or that this department be relieved of the Clinic for Atypical Children, as it cannot, under the present conditions, be satisfactorily administered.

Authorization is requested for the annual auction sale of waste material, old iron, etc.

On separate motion, duly seconded and carried in each instance, action was taken upon the report of the General Medical Superintendent, as follows:

It was Resolved to authorize the closing of the offices of the department at 4 o'clock during the months of June, July and August whenever it is possible to do so.

The promotion of Dr. F. W. Gravelle to the place of Resident Obstetrician and the appointment of Dr. W. T. Robinson as Assistant Resident Obstetrician at the School of Midwives were approved.

Permission was granted to appoint an Assistant Protestant Chaplain at Bellevue Hospital.

After consideration, it was Resolved, to bring to the attention of Commissioner Kingsbury the arrangement now in operation for the care of the Clinic for Atypical Children and to inform him that unless the present unsatisfactory conditions can be relieved in the near future it will be impossible for this department to continue the conduct of the clinic.

The annual auction sale of waste materials was authorized.

#### COMMITTEE REPORTS.

Mr. Farley reported that on May 23rd, 1916, the Building Committee met with the architects at Harlem Hospital to consider the plans for the layout of the grounds at that hospital, and that they instructed the architect to modify his plans with a view to a simpler arrangement. On motion, duly seconded and carried, this report was approved.

Mr. O'Keeffe reported that at a meeting held that morning the Conference Committee of Harlem Hospital unanimously nominated Dr. Henry M. Pascal as Surgeon to Out-Patients and Adjunct Assistant Visiting Surgeon. On motion, duly seconded and carried, this report was approved and the appointment made accordingly.

The Conference Committee further reported that they considered and approved the recommendations of the Medical Board of Harlem Hospital, as follows:

Transfer of Dr. C. E. Farr from the place of Surgeon to Out-Patients and Adjunct Assistant Visiting Surgeon at Fordham Hospital to a similar one at Harlem. W. A. Somerville, (promotion) and Otto H. Leber, Physicians to Out-Patients and Adjunct Assistant Visiting Physician. Charles M. McKinley, Assistant Physician to Out-Patients (pediatrics). Philip Jager, Assistant Surgeon to Out-Patients (eye).

On motion, duly seconded and carried, this report was approved and appointments made accordingly.

Mr. Paulding referred to the sale by the St. John's Guild of the "Helen C. Juilliard" for the use of this department as a day camp for the tuberculosis patients in the Gouverneur district at a price less than what was offered by those who desired to purchase the boat for commercial purposes. After discussion, it was moved, seconded and carried, to extend a vote of thanks to the St. John's Guild for their generous action in the sale of this boat which the Trustees regard as an example of disinterested public service.

It was reported that the St. John's Guild desires to retain the name "Helen C. Juilliard" for its new hospital boat and have this department give another name to the one sold to replace the "Westfield". After discussion, it was moved, seconded and carried, in view of the great interest taken in the tuberculosis day camp at Gouverneur by the late Dr. John H. Huddleston and the signal service rendered by him, to name the boat in his memory, but before doing so to consult the wishes of Mrs. John H. Huddleston.

#### COMMUNICATIONS.

The minutes of the Executive Committee of the Medical Board of Bellevue Hospital for May 10 and 21, 1916, were presented. On motion, duly seconded and carried, the nomination of the Second Division of Dr. Walter H. McNeil as Assistant Surgeon to Out-Patients, urological service, and the First Division of Dr. Edward Percy Eglee as Assistant Physician to Out-Patients, tuberculosis service, were referred to the Conference Committee of their respective divisions; the resignation of L. W. Hotchkiss as Visiting Surgeon on the First Division was accepted, with regret, and his appointment to the consulting staff of the hospital was approved.

A letter was presented by Frank Nebeling applying for payment of his contract for the installation of the lighting



fixtures in the main building at Harlem Hospital. A report relating thereto was presented from the Supervising Engineer of the department under date of May 6, recommending the payment of \$2,150. on account of this contract. On the recommendation of the Building Committee, it was moved, seconded and carried, to authorize this partial payment.

A communication was presented from the Shevlin Engineering Company requesting an extension to June 19 on their contract for the installation of power plant equipment at Gouverneur, Harlem and Fordham Hospitals, on account of the difficulty in obtaining tounary supplies at the present time. A letter relating thereto was presented from John C. Quinn, under whose direction this work is being done, approving this request. On the recommendation of the Building Committee, it was moved, seconded and carried, to grant the request of the Shevlin Engineering Company.

A letter, dated May 26th, 1916, was presented from Henry Pearson, resigning as Instructor in Anaesthesia on the Second Division of Bellevue Hospital. On motion, duly seconded and carried, this resignation was accepted, with regret.

A communication, dated May 22, 1916, was presented from the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, transmitting certified copies of resolutions adopted by that Board on May 19th, (1) applying \$7,000. corporate stock from the fund C. F. M. 24 to C. B. H. 15, in order to provide for the layout of the grounds to the north and east of pavilions L and M of the new Bellevue Hospital and (2) approving the form of contract, plans and specifications and estimate of cost in the sum of \$7,000. for the layout of these grounds around pavilions L and M of Bellevue Hospital.

A motion to adjourn the meeting was seconded and carried.

A regular meeting of the Board of Trustees of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals was held on Tuesday, June 6, 1916, at 2 p. m.

Present—Dr. Brannan, the President, in the chair; Messrs. Paulding, O'Keefe, Farley, Stern and Robbins, Trustees. Excused—Mr. Sachs and Mr. Kingsbury, Commissioner of Public Charities.

The minutes of the meeting of May 29 were held as read and approved.

#### COMMITTEE REPORTS.

Mr. Paulding reported that a copy of the letter to the Mayor, dated May 16, in regard to the Department of Plant and Structures had been sent to each member of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment personally, and he presented a draft of a communication addressed to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment relating to the same subject. After discussion, it was moved, seconded and carried, to accept and authorize the formal transmission of this letter to that Board.

The subject of the purchase and the transfer of the Helen C. Juilliard was discussed, and after consideration, it was moved, seconded and carried, to direct the General Medical Superintendent to move it as soon as possible alongside the Westfield, and it was also resolved to authorize the sale of the Westfield as she stands.

Dr. Brannan presented a tabulation of information obtained from the records of the department in regard to its experience in planting trees around Bellevue Hospital and submitted a draft of a letter addressed to the architect, setting forth the substance of a report from the Purchasing Agent on tree planting. After discussion, it was moved, second and carried, to authorize the transmission of this communication to McKim, Mead and White.

#### COMMUNICATIONS.

A letter was presented from James Alexander Miller in regard to the reorganized tuberculosis service of Bellevue Hospital and asking that provision be made for the appointment of two salaried resident physicians. After discussion, it was moved, seconded and carried, to make provision in the departmental estimate for 1917 for the appointment of ten paid resident physicians at \$900 a year in order to provide a salaried resident staff for the entire hospital.

A letter, dated May 31, was presented from the New York City Visiting Committee of the State Charities Aid Association, asking for information in regard to the Trustees' action on their request for the establishment of a separate gynaecological service at Harlem Hospital. On motion, duly seconded and carried, it was resolved to inform this Committee that the Trustees obtained a report from the General Medical Superintendent on the number of gynaecological cases at Harlem Hospital that would be assigned to such a service. As the average was only ten patients a day, which number was too small to justify the department to create a separate ward and the appointment of an additional staff, together with the fact that the surgeons at Harlem Hospital do not recommend the creation of such a service, the Trustees decided to make no

change in the organization for the present.

A letter, dated June 1, was presented from the Cornell University in regard to the plan of organization for the laboratory service of Bellevue Hospital and recommending the appointment of Russell L. Cecil to take charge of the clinical pathological work under the title of Adjunct Assistant Visiting Physician to the Second Division of Bellevue Hospital. After discussion, it was moved, seconded and carried, to request the Conference Committee to arrange the details necessary for the organization of this special service and to authorize the appointment of Dr. Cecil, subject to the approval of his credentials by the President.

The minutes of the Medical Board of Gouverneur Hospital for June 1 was presented. On motion, duly seconded and carried, the Conference Committee was requested to inquire into the recommendation to create the position of Director of the Medical Service and the appointment of Dr. C. N. B. Camac to the place. The report that Dr. Waitzfelder retires from service on July 20 by limitation was noted.

A letter was presented from the Architectural Contracting Company, requesting another extension of time to complete their contract for the construction of balconies at Neponsit Beach Hospital on account of the delay in originally obtaining supplies due to freight congestion. A communication relating thereto was presented from McKim, Mead and White. On the recommendation of the Building Committee and the architect, it was moved, seconded and carried, to grant this company a further extension of time to June 1 to complete the work.

A letter, dated May 12, was presented from P. F. Kenney Company and one, dated May 23, from P. J. Brennan and Son, applying for payment of the retained percentage on the contract for the plumbing and gasfitting work and the general construction work, respectively, in the new ward wing at Harlem Hospital. A communication, dated June 3, relating thereto was presented from J. H. Freeland. On the recommendation of the Building Committee, it was moved, seconded and carried, to authorize these payments.

The minutes of the Board of Managers of the Bellevue Training School for Nurses for May 5, 12 and 19 were presented. On motion, duly seconded and carried, the report relating to the repairs in the women's alcoholic ward was referred to Dr. O'Hanlon with a request to make the repairs as far as possible; the remarks on the manner of addressing patients at Bellevue Hospital by their surname without title or prefix were noted and referred to the General Medical Superintendent with instructions to have the practice stopped; the conditions around the morgue and the yard outside the doctors' kitchen, mentioned in the minutes of May 19, were discussed and the Board was informed that since that time the situation has been very much improved.

A letter, dated June 3, was presented from McKim, Mead and White recommending final payment on the contract of Levin and Gewertz for the alterations to the fourth floor of the Neponsit Beach Hospital for Children. On motion, duly seconded and carried, this communication was referred to the Building Committee for the preparation of the required certificates.

A motion to adjourn the meeting was seconded and carried.

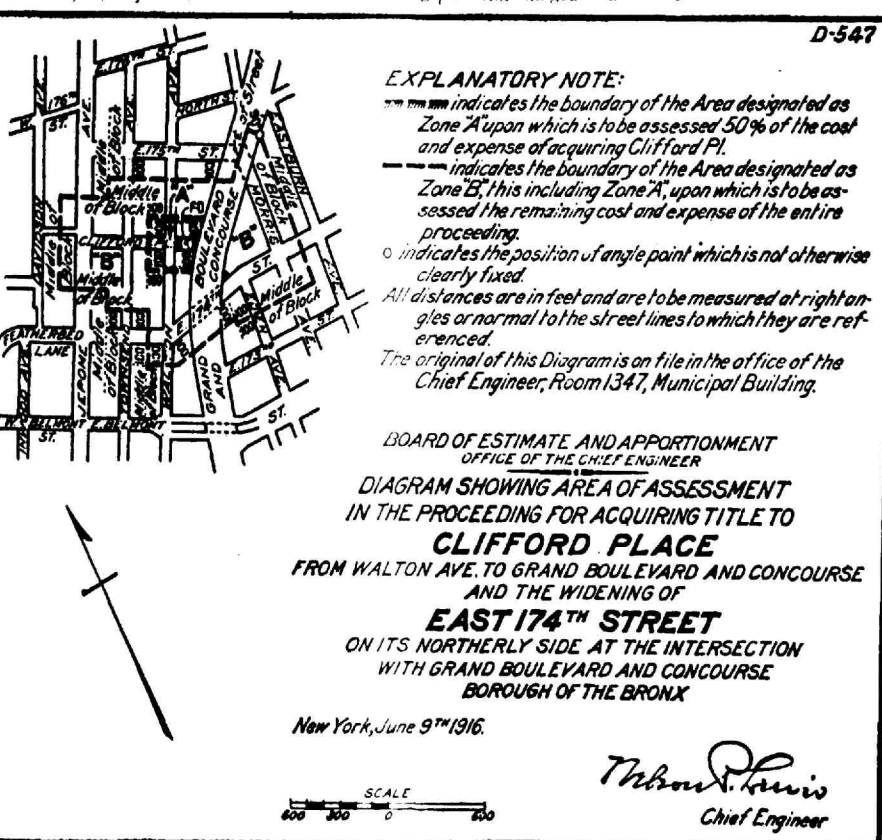

Whereas, This Board has made inquiry as to the money value of the franchise or right applied for and proposed to be granted to the City Island Motor Bus Co., Inc., and the adequacy of the compensation to be paid therefor; now, therefore, it is

Resolved, That the following form of the resolution for the grant of the franchise or right applied for by the City Island Motor Bus Co., Inc., containing the form of proposed contract for the grant of such franchise or right, be hereby introduced and entered in the minutes of this Board, as follows, to wit:

Apportionment hereby grants to the City Island Motor Bus Co., Inc., the franchise or right fully set out and described in the following form of proposed contract for the grant thereof, embodying all of the terms and conditions, including the provisions as to rates and charges upon and subject to the terms and conditions in said proposed form of contract contained, and that the Mayor of the City of New York be and he hereby is authorized to execute and deliver such contract in the name and on behalf of The City of New York, as follows, to wit:

PROPOSED FORM OF CONTRACT.  
This contract, made and executed in duplicate this day of June, 1916, by and between The City of New York, hereinafter called the City, party of the first part, by the Mayor of said City, acting for and in the name of said City, under and in pursuance of the authority of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of said City (hereinafter called the

Board), and the City Island Motor Bus Co., Inc. (hereinafter called the Company), party of the second part, witnesses:

In consideration of the mutual covenants and agreements herein contained, the parties hereto do hereby covenant and agree as follows:

SECTION 1. The City hereby grants to the Company, subject to the conditions and provisions hereinafter set forth, the right and privilege to maintain and operate a stage or omnibus route for public use in the Borough of The Bronx, in the City of New York, to wit:

Beginning in City Island Avenue at the southerly end thereof on City Island; thence along City Island Avenue to the bridge connecting City Island with the Pelham Bay Park; thence upon and along said bridge and the approaches thereto to City Island Road in Pelham Bay Park; thence along said City Island Road to Pelham Bridge Road; thence along Pelham Bridge Road and Eastern Boulevard to Fordham Road or to the prolongation of the Bronx and Pelham Parkway in Pelham Bay Park; thence along Fordham Road or the prolongation of the Bronx and Pelham Parkway in Pelham Bay Park to the Bronx and Pelham Parkway; thence along the Bronx and Pelham Parkway to Boston Road; thence along Boston Road to 177th Street.

And to cross such other streets and avenues, named and unnamed, as may be encountered in said route.

SECTION 2. The grant of this privilege is subject to the following conditions:

First—The said right to maintain and operate said stage or omnibus route shall be held and enjoyed by the Company from the date upon which this contract is signed by the Mayor until September 30, 1921, with the privilege of renewal of said contract for the further period of five (5) years upon a fair revaluation of such right and privilege.

If the Company shall determine to exercise its privilege of renewal, it shall make application to the Board, at any time not earlier than two (2) years and not later than one (1) year before the expiration of the original term of this contract. The time within which such application for renewal must be made is of the essence of this contract, and a failure of the Company to present its application within the time fixed shall be considered as an election on the part of the Company not to take advantage of the renewal privilege and as a relinquishment of its right to such renewal, which event the franchise shall terminate on the last day of the original term of this contract. The determination of the revaluation shall be sufficient if agreed to in writing by the Company and the Board, but in no case shall the annual rate of compensation to the City be fixed at a less amount than the sum required to be paid during the last year prior to the termination of the original term of this contract. The annual rate for the renewal term shall be determined by three disinterested persons chosen in the following manner:

One disinterested person shall be selected by the Board; one disinterested person shall be chosen by the Company; these two shall choose a third disinterested person, and the three so chosen shall act as appraisers and shall make the revaluation aforesaid. Such appraisers shall be chosen at least six (6) months prior to the expiration of the original term of this contract, and their report shall be filed with the Board within three (3) months after they are chosen. They shall act as appraisers and not as arbitrators. They may base their judgment upon their own experience and upon such information as they may obtain by inquiries and investigations without the presence of either party. They shall have the right to examine any of the books of the Company and its officers under oath. The valuations so ascertained, fixed and determined shall be conclusive upon both parties, but no annual sum shall, in any event, be less than the sum required to be paid for the last year of the original term of this contract unless the Board shall, during the original term of this contract, permit another company or an individual to operate stages or omnibuses over all or a portion of the route herein authorized. If in any case the annual rate shall not be fixed prior to the termination of the original term of this contract, then the Company shall pay the annual rate therefore prevailing until the new rate shall be determined, and shall then make up to the City the amount of any excess of the annual rate then determined over the previous annual rate. The entire expense of such appraisal shall be borne jointly by the City and the Company, each paying one-half thereof.

Second—The Company shall pay to the City for the original term of the privilege hereby granted the following sums of money:

(a) The sum of five hundred dollars (\$500) in cash within thirty (30) days after the date on which this contract is signed by the Mayor.

(b) During the first term of two (2) years an annual sum which shall be equal to five (5) per cent of its gross annual receipts, but which sum shall not be less than one hundred dollars (\$100).

During the succeeding term of two (2) years, an annual sum which shall be equal to five (5) per cent of its gross annual receipts, but which sum shall not be less than one hundred and fifty dollars (\$150).

During the remaining term, expiring September 30, 1921, an annual sum which shall be equal to five (5) per cent of its gross annual receipts, but which sum shall not be less than two hundred dollars (\$200).

The gross annual receipts mentioned above shall be the gross annual receipts of the Company from whatever source, derived either directly or indirectly, in any manner, from or in connection with the operation hereby authorized.

The annual charges shall commence on the date upon which this contract is signed by the Mayor.

The annual charges, as above, shall be paid into the Treasury of the City on November 1 of each year and shall be for the amount due to September 30 next preceding. Provided that the first annual payment shall be only for that proportion of the first annual charge as the time between the date upon which this contract is signed by the Mayor and September 30 following shall bear to the whole of one year.

Any and all payments to be made by the terms of this contract to the City by the Company, whether during the original or renewal term thereof, shall not be considered in any manner in the nature of a tax, but such payments shall be made in addition to any and all taxes of whatever kind or description, now or hereafter required to be paid by any ordinance of the City, or resolution of the Board, or any law of the State of New York.

Third—The annual charges or payments shall continue throughout the whole term of this contract, whether original or renewal, notwithstanding any clause in any statute or in the charter of any other company providing for payment for similar rights or franchises at a different rate.

Fourth—Nothing in this contract shall be deemed to affect in any way the right of the City to grant to any individual or other corporation

a similar right or privilege upon the same or other terms and conditions, over the same streets and avenues, hereinafter described.

Fifth—At the termination or forfeiture of this grant, the City at the election of the Board, shall have the right to purchase all or any part of the property and plant of the Company used for the purpose of the operation of the stage or omnibus route hereby authorized, at a sum equal to a fair valuation of such property and plant, exclusive of any value which such property and plant may have by reason of this contract. Such property and plant are to be valued as if the Company had not exercised the right and privilege granted by this franchise for the said period of this contract, and no allowance shall be made to the Company in such valuation by reason of such exercise.

If the Company and the City cannot agree upon such valuation of such property and plant, then such valuation thereof shall be determined and fixed by three arbitrators selected in the following manner:

One disinterested person shall be chosen by the Company; one disinterested person shall be chosen by the Board, and the two so chosen shall choose a third disinterested person. The decision under oath of any two of such persons, who shall be so selected, shall be final and conclusive.

If either the Company or the City fails to appoint an arbitrator as herein provided, or should the first two arbitrators fail to agree on the selection of the third arbitrator within thirty (30) days after the first two arbitrators shall be chosen, or if no two arbitrators so selected shall agree upon the valuation of such property within sixty (60) days after the arbitrators shall be so selected, then such valuation may be fixed by a commissioner appointed by the Supreme Court on the application of either party.

Sixth—The rights and privileges hereby granted shall not be assigned, either in whole or in part, or leased or sublet in any manner, nor shall title thereto, or right, interest or property therein, pass to or vest in any other person or corporation whatsoever, either by the act of the Company, or by operation of law, whether under the provisions of the statutes relating to the consolidation or merger of corporations or otherwise, without the consent of the City, acting by the Board, evidenced by an instrument under seal, anything herein contained to the contrary thereof in any-wise notwithstanding, and the granting, giving or waiving of any one or more of such consents shall not render unnecessary any subsequent consent or consents; and no assignment, lease or sublease of the rights or privileges hereby granted, or of any part thereof, or the route mentioned herein, for any purpose unless the said assignment, lease or sublease shall contain a covenant on the part of the assignee or lessee that the same is subject to all the conditions of this contract; and that the assignee or lessee assumes and will be bound by all of said conditions, and especially said conditions as to payments, anything in any statute or in the charter of such assignee or lessee to the contrary notwithstanding, and that the said assignee or lessee waives any more favorable conditions created by such statute or its charter, and that it will not claim by reason thereof or otherwise exemption from liability to perform each and all of the conditions of this contract.

Seventh—The Company shall commence operation within three (3) months from the date on which this contract is signed by the Mayor; provided that such period may be extended by the Board for a period or periods not exceeding in the aggregate six (6) months; and provided, further, that when the commencement of said operation shall be prevented by legal proceedings in any court or by works of public improvement, or from other causes not within the control of the Company, the time for the commencement of such operation may be extended for the period of such prevention, but no delay shall be allowed for unless the court proceedings shall be diligently prosecuted by the Company, and provided further that in no case shall such delay be deemed to begin until the Company shall have given written notice to the Board of any such court proceedings or other occasion of delay, and deliver to the Board copies of any injunction or other orders, and the papers upon which the same shall have been granted, and unless upon the request of the Board the Company shall, in writing, consent that the Board, either in its own name as a party, or in the name of the City as a party, may intervene in any such proceeding.

Eighth—Nothing herein contained shall be construed as permitting the grantee to erect any structures whatsoever upon City streets, and the Company shall not construct or maintain any fixture or structure in the street unless especially authorized by resolution of the Board.

Ninth—All vehicles which may be operated pursuant to this contract shall comply with the following general requirements:

1. They shall be propelled by power generated or contained within the vehicle itself, but no power shall be used which will in its generation or use produce smoke or noxious odors sufficient in the opinion of the Board or its authorized representatives to constitute a nuisance.

2. The maximum weight, including fuel, water, oil or any other material or any accessories used in operation, shall not exceed six thousand (6,000) pounds.

3. The maximum width shall not exceed seven feet two inches (7'2").

4. The maximum height shall not exceed eleven feet eight inches (11'8").

5. The maximum length shall not exceed twenty-two feet (22').

6. They shall be designed and constructed in a manner which will permit ease and freedom of movement under all conditions.

7. The distribution of weight on axles, length of wheel base and other features of design shall be such as to avoid skidding as far as possible and shall be such as to permit easy steering and control.

8. They shall be fitted with brakes capable of stopping and holding the same under all conditions.

9. They shall be so constructed that the oil or grease cannot drop on the roadway.

10. All parts shall be so constructed that no undue noise or vibration shall result from operation.

11. All wheels shall be equipped with either pneumatic tires or tires which shall be approved by the Board or its authorized representatives but in no event shall solid tires be used.

Tenth—No stage or omnibus shall be operated pursuant to this contract unless there shall be painted thereon in letters sufficiently large to be clearly visible from a distance of seventy-five feet:

(a) The name of the Company owning and operating such vehicle.

(b) The number of the vehicle which is assigned to it upon receiving the approval of the Board or its authorized representatives.

(c) The number of adults for which the vehicle has seating space.

Eleventh—No advertising signs shall appear on the outside of any stage or omnibus.

Twelfth—The destination of each stage or omnibus shall be plainly indicated on the front of the vehicle, and shall be illuminated at night.

Thirteenth—The number of passengers to be carried in any vehicle shall at no time exceed the seating capacity of the vehicle.

Fourteenth—The inclosed portion of all stages or omnibuses which are operated on said route shall be heated during the cold weather, in conformity with such laws and ordinances as are now in force affecting surface railway cars or such laws and ordinances affecting stages or omnibuses

as may hereafter, during the term of this contract, be in force, as may be required by resolution of the Board.

Fifteenth—The inclosed portion of all stages or omnibuses operated on said route shall be well lighted as may be required by resolution of the Board.

Sixteenth—Before any stage or omnibus is put in service it must be submitted to the Board or its authorized representatives and receive the approval thereof. If any vehicle which may be so submitted for approval shall not conform with the requirements herein or should any such vehicle for any reason be considered by the Board or its authorized representatives unfit for public use, then the Board or its authorized representatives may refuse such approval, in which case the Company shall not operate such vehicle. If after a vehicle shall have been so approved, defects develop which in the opinion of the Board or its authorized representatives render it unsuitable for public service, then the Board or its authorized representatives may require the withdrawal of such vehicle from service.

Upon being approved by the Board or its authorized representatives, each vehicle shall be given a number which shall not be changed so long as such vehicle shall be operated by the Company, unless and until the Company shall notify the Board that it proposes to change the number of the vehicle and of the new number which it is proposed to use.

Seventeenth—All vehicles operated pursuant to this grant shall be maintained in good and safe repair and in a manner which will in all ways render the vehicle fit for public service. The Company shall permit the Board or its authorized representatives to inspect at all reasonable times any or all the vehicles used by the Company. If upon inspection any vehicle shall appear in the judgment of said Board or its authorized representatives to be unfit for public service, then the Company shall, upon notice, immediately withdraw such vehicle from service, and shall remedy the defect and notify the Board or its authorized representatives that the defect has been remedied before such vehicle shall be restored to service.

Eighteenth—All laws and ordinances affecting the operation of stages or omnibuses now in force or which may be in force during the term of this contract shall be complied with by the Company. The Company shall also comply with and enforce the carrying out of any orders or regulations which may be issued by the Board designed for the protection of persons, of property or of the comfort and health of the public.

Nineteenth—The rate of fare for any passenger upon the stage or omnibus route herein authorized shall not exceed twenty-five cents (25c.) and the Company shall not charge any passenger more than twenty-five cents (25c.) for one continuous ride from any point on the stage or omnibus route hereby authorized to any other point on the said route.

Twentieth—Stages or omnibuses shall be run on said route each day at intervals of not more than one hour between the hours of 7 o'clock A. M. and 7 o'clock P. M. and as much oftener as reasonable convenience of the public may require, as may be directed by resolution of the Board, and shall be operated on such route and at such intervals between the hours of 7 o'clock P. M. and 7 o'clock A. M. as reasonable convenience of the public may require and as may be directed by resolutions of the Board; provided, however, that during the months of December, January, February and March the Company is hereby required to operate stages or omnibuses on said route only between the hours of 8 o'clock and 10 o'clock A. M. and between 5 o'clock and 7 o'clock P. M., unless the Board shall, by resolution, direct the Company to operate during other periods of the day.

Twenty-first—The Company shall, at its own expense, do anything and everything within its power to keep its vehicles in operation on regular schedules during the existence of snow and ice in the streets and avenues upon which the Company is hereby authorized to operate, and if it shall be necessary to remove such snow and ice to the side of the roadway in order to so operate, then such removal shall be done under the supervision and to the satisfaction of the Commissioner of Street Cleaning or the Park Commissioner, but in no event shall snow or ice so removed be allowed by the Company to obstruct the crosswalks of any street.

Twenty-second—It is understood that the Company shall operate, pursuant to this contract, only the route herein authorized, but should vehicular traffic be diverted from any portion of any of the streets or avenues upon which the Company is herein authorized to operate because of fires, parades or because of any other event which will close the street to vehicular traffic temporarily, then the Company may use such other streets or avenues as are necessary to continue the operation. If, however, for any reason any of the streets and avenues in which the operation is hereby authorized shall be closed to vehicular traffic for a longer period than twenty-four hours, then the Company shall communicate with the Board or its authorized representatives and obtain authority for the operation upon other streets and avenues for the period during which said street or avenue may be closed.

Twenty-third—Should it be deemed advisable by the Board at any time during the term of this contract to require the Company to operate extensions to the route herein authorized, additional route or routes in substitution for the route herein authorized or any portion thereof, and the Board shall so order, then the Company shall, upon notice by the Board, apply for a franchise or right to operate such extension, additional or substituted routes and accept a franchise therefor upon terms and conditions similar to those contained herein, and for a term expiring not later than the date of the expiration of this contract, provided that the Board shall not hereunder require the Company to extend its route for a distance greater than one mile during any calendar year.

Twenty-fourth—The Company shall submit to the Board a report not later than November 1 of each year for the year ending September 30 next preceding, and at any other time, upon request of the Board, which shall state:

2. The amount paid in as by last report.

3. The total amount of capital stock paid in.

4. The funded debt by last report.

5. The total amount by funded debt.

6. The floating debt as by last report.

7. The total amount of floating debt.

8. The total amount of funded and floating debt.

9. The average rate per annum of interest on funded debt.

10. Statement of dividends paid during the year.

11. The total amount expended for same.

12. The names of the directors elected at the last meeting of the corporation held for such purpose.

13. Location, value and amount paid for real estate owned by the Company as by last report.

14. Location, value and amount paid for real estate now owned by the Company.

15. Number of passengers carried during the year.

16. Total receipts of Company for each class of business.

17. Amounts paid by the Company for damage to persons or property on account of construction and operation.



18. Total expenses for operation, including salaries, and such other information in regard to the business of the Company as may be required by the Board.

**Twenty-fifth**—The Company shall at all times keep accurate books of account of its gross receipts and shall, on or before November 1 of each year, make a verified report to the Comptroller of the City of the business done by the Company, for the year ending September 30 next preceding, in such form as he may prescribe. Such report shall contain a statement of such gross receipts, the total miles in operation within the limits of the City and the miles operated under this contract, and such other information as the Comptroller may require. The Comptroller shall have access to all books and records of the Company for the purpose of ascertaining the correctness of its report, and may examine its officers and employees under oath.

**Twenty-sixth**—The Company shall keep accurate books of the performance of different types of vehicles and the different services rendered and the cost thereof, and shall at any time furnish the Board, or its authorized representatives, such information with respect thereto as shall be requested.

**Twenty-seventh**—In case of any violation or breach of failure to comply with any of the provisions herein contained or with any orders of the Board or its authorized representatives, acting under the powers herein reserved, the right or privilege herein granted may be forfeited by resolution of said Board, without proceedings at law or in equity. Provided, however, that such action by the Board shall not be taken until the Board shall give notice to the Company to appear before it on a certain day not less than ten (10) days after the date of such notice, to show cause why such resolution declaring the contract forfeited should not be adopted. In case the Company fails to appear, action may be taken by the Board forthwith.

Any false entry in the books of the Company or false statement in the reports to the Comptroller as to a material fact, knowingly made by the Company, shall constitute such a violation or breach of failure to comply with the provisions herein contained as to warrant the forfeiture of the franchise.

Nothing herein contained shall affect in any way the right of the Company to apply to a court of competent jurisdiction for review of any action of the Board forfeiting the franchise or consent herein granted.

**Twenty-eighth**—If the Company shall fail to give efficient public service at rates not exceeding those herein fixed, or fail to maintain its equipment as herein provided in good condition throughout the whole term of this contract, the Board may give notice to the Company, specifying any default on the part of the Company, and requiring the Company to remedy the same within a reasonable time; and upon failure of the Company to remedy such default within a reasonable time, the Company shall, for each day thereafter during which the default or defect remains, pay to the City the sum of fifty dollars (\$50) as fixed or liquidated damages, or at the option of the Board, this contract may be forfeited upon ten (10) days' notice to the Company.

**Twenty-ninth**—The Company shall assume all liability for damages to persons or property occasioned by reason of the operation or maintenance of the stage or omnibus route hereby authorized, and it is a condition of this contract that the City shall assume no liability whatsoever to either persons or property on account of the same, and the Company shall repay the City any damage which the City shall be compelled to pay by reason of any acts or default of the Company.

**Thirtieth**—This grant is upon express condition that the Company, within thirty (30) days after the signing of this contract by the Mayor, and before anything is done in exercise of the rights conferred hereby, shall deposit with the Comptroller of the City the sum of five hundred dollars (\$500), either in money or securities, to be approved by the Board, which fund shall be security for the performance by the Company of all of the terms and conditions of this contract and compliance with all orders of the Board acting under the powers herein reserved, especially those which relate to the payment of the annual charges for the privilege hereby granted, the rendering of efficient public service at the rates herein fixed, and the maintenance of vehicles in good condition throughout the whole term of this contract; and in case of default in the performance by the Company of such terms and conditions or compliance with such orders or either or any of them, the City shall have the right to cause the work to be done and the materials to be furnished for the performance thereof after due notice, and shall collect the reasonable cost thereof from the said fund without legal proceedings; or after default after ten (10) days' notice to the Company; or in case of failure to observe the said terms and conditions of this contract and orders of the Board acting hereunder, relating to the heading, repair, maintenance or withdrawal from service of vehicles, the Company shall pay to the City as liquidated damages the sum of fifty dollars (\$50) per day for each day of violation, and the further sum of ten dollars (\$10) per day for each vehicle that shall not be properly heated or lighted in case of the violation of the provisions relating to those matters, all of which sums may be deducted from said fund.

The procedure for the imposition and collection of the sums as fixed or liquidated damages in this contract shall be as follows:

The Board, on complaint made, shall give notice to the Company, directing its President or other officer to appear before the Board on a certain day not less than ten (10) days after the date of such notice, to show cause why the Company should not pay such liquidated damages in accordance with the foregoing provisions. If the Company fails to make an appearance, or after a hearing, appears in the judgment of the Board to be in fault, said Board shall forthwith require the payment of said sums herein provided for, or where the damages are not liquidated by the terms of this contract, such amount as appears to the Board to be just, and without legal procedure direct the Comptroller to withdraw such amount from the security fund deposited with him. In case of any drafts made upon the security fund, the Company shall, upon ten (10) days' notice, pay to the City a sum sufficient to restore said security fund to the original amount of five hundred dollars (\$500), and in default thereof, this contract may be cancelled and annulled at the option of the Board, acting in behalf of the City. No action or proceeding or right under the provisions of this contract shall affect any other legal rights, remedies or causes of action belonging to the City. These provisions for the recovery of such damages are in addition to the right to forfeit the franchise conferred by Section 2, Subdivision Twenty-seventh of this contract.

**Thirty-first**—The words "notice" or "direction," wherever used in this contract, shall be deemed to mean a written notice or direction. Every such notice or direction to be served upon the Company shall be delivered at such office in the City as shall have been designated by the Company, or if no such office shall have been designated, or if such designation shall have for any reason become inoperative, shall be mailed in the City, postage prepaid, addressed to the Company at the City. Delivery or mailing of such notice or direction as and when above provided shall be equivalent to direct personal notice or direction, and shall be deemed to have been given at the time of delivery or mailing.

**Thirty-second**—The words "streets or avenues" and "streets and avenues" wherever used in this contract, shall be deemed to mean streets, avenues, highways, parkways, driveways, concourses, boulevards, bridges, viaducts, tunnels, public places or any other property to which the City has title encountered in the route hereinabove described and upon or in which authority is hereby given to the Company to operate stages or omnibuses.

**Thirty-third**—If at any time the powers of the Board or any other of the authorities herein mentioned or intended to be mentioned, shall be transferred by law to any other board, authority, officer or officers, then and in such case such other board, authority, officer or officers shall have all the powers, rights and duties herein reserved to or prescribed for the Board or other authorities, officer or officers.

**Section 3.** Nothing in this contract shall be construed as in any way limiting the present or future jurisdiction of the Public Service Commission under the laws of the State of New York.

**Section 4.** The Company promises, covenants and agrees on its part and behalf during the entire term of this contract, whether original or renewal, to conform to and abide by and perform all the terms, conditions and requirements in this contract fixed and contained.

The lines as amended are shown as follows: Corona avenue, between the westerly line of Junction avenue and the northerly line of Alstine avenue, is laid down upon a "Map showing a change in the street system heretofore laid out within the territory bounded by Junction avenue, Alstine avenue, Southern avenue and Gerry avenue, in the Second Ward, Borough of Queens, in The City of New York," dated June 4, 1915, approved by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment October 15, 1915, by the Mayor November 1, 1915, and filed in the office of the County Clerk of Queens County at Jamaica February 14, 1916, at the office of the Corporation Counsel of The City of New York February 14, 1916, and at the office of the President of the Borough of Queens on February 16, 1916, and is bounded and described as follows:

**THE BUILDINGS AND APPURTENANCES** thereto will be sold to the highest bidder, who must pay cash or certified check, drawn to the order of the Comptroller of The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureau or officers, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York, is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the price thereof.
