

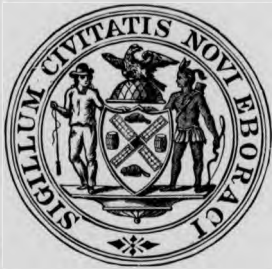

APPROVED PAPERS.

Ordinances and Resolutions passed by the Common Council during the week ending Feb. 13, 1886.

Resolved, That Arthur C. Ewen be and he is hereby appointed a City Surveyor.

Adopted by the Board of Aldermen, January 26, 1886.

Approved by the Mayor, February 9, 1886.

Resolved, That the lamp-post and lamp now on the sidewalk in front of No. 153 Cedar street be removed and placed in front of No. 147 Cedar street, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works.

Resolved, That a lamp-post be erected and street-lamp lighted in front of No. 80 Greenwich street, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works.

Resignation of Francis J. Gallagher as a Commissioner of Deeds.

Resolved, That Eugene Van Schaik be and he is hereby appointed a Commissioner of Deeds in and for the City and County of New York, in place of Francis J. Gallagher, resigned.

Resignation accepted and resolution adopted by the Board of Aldermen, February 9, 1886.

Resolved, That Saturday, the twenty-seventh day of February, A. D. 1886, at twelve o'clock, M., and the chamber of the Board of Aldermen, be and are hereby designated as the time and place when and where the application of "The Broome and Delancey Street Cross-town Railroad Company" to the Common Council of the City of New York for its consent and permission for the construction, maintenance and operation of the street surface railroad proposed to be constructed by the said company as mentioned in their petition for such consent will be first considered, and that public notice be given by the Clerk of this Board, by publishing the same daily for fourteen days, excluding Sundays, in two daily newspapers published in this city, to be designated therefor by his Honor the Mayor according to the provisions of chapter 252 of the Laws of 1884, such advertising to be at the expense of the petitioner.

Adopted by the Board of Aldermen, February 9, 1886.

Approved by the Mayor, February 11, 1886, and the "New York Times" and the "New York Sun" were designated as the newspapers referred to in the resolution.

Whereas, Major-General Winfield Scott Hancock died at his residence on Governor's Island, in New York Harbor, on Monday, the 8th inst., in the sixty-second year of his age, and the sad event imposes upon this Common Council, for themselves and as the representatives of the People of this metropolis, the duty of taking such proceedings as will best tend to manifest sorrow for the death, and respect for the memory, of the deceased soldier; and

Whereas, In the death of Major-General Hancock, the republic loses another illustrious son—one that has shed lustre upon our Republican institutions, and left an indelible impress of greatness upon the epoch in which he lived, second only to that of the other illustrious soldier who preceded him in death only a few months, General U. S. Grant; and

Whereas, To enumerate here the services of the deceased soldier to his country; to portray his character; to recount his noble deeds, his great sacrifices; his fidelity to duty, his love of country, and devotion to its welfare, would be entirely superfluous, as his name and fame are cherished in every household in the land, and extends to every country and clime. As a soldier, he was simply "Hancock the Superb." Dignity and simplicity were inseparably blended in his nature, and his commanding yet benign presence attracted and attached to him all who came within the influence of his personality. He was the Bayard of the American army—a chevalier without fear and without reproach; and

Whereas, One characteristic and eventful act of his brilliant career has, probably more than any other, endeared him to every lover of free government, and has placed his name, in the temple of Fame, next to that of the immortal Washington: Clothed with despotic and unrestricted power as Military Commander of the Department of the South, after the close of the civil war, he controlled the destinies of the people in that department, for good or evil, and had the power to still further crush them under the iron heel of a military despotism, or restore to them the blessings of self-government, at his own will and pleasure. His famous proclamation advising them to reorganize their civil governments, State and local, his promise to aid them in so doing to the full extent of his power and authority, and his immortal declaration that, "In times of peace, the military was subordinate to the civil power," stamped him at once, as the greatest of American military commanders, and secured for him the love and reverence of every true believer in the right of the People to govern themselves; and

Whereas, In the general grief for the death of such a man, it is the sad duty of the People and Government of this city to participate, and this Common Council should adopt such measures as will tend to show the estimation in which he was held, to manifest sorrow for the irreparable loss inflicted upon our country, to give expression to our attachment to his memory, and to sympathize and condole with his bereaved family and sorrowing friends; be it therefore

Resolved, That out of sorrow for the death, and respect for the memory of Major-General W. S. Hancock, it is hereby recommended that our citizens close their respective places of business and refrain from any secular employment on Saturday (to-morrow), the 13th instant, that being the day set apart for the funeral ceremonies; that the public offices of the corporation be closed on that day, except those specially required by law to be kept open; that the flags be displayed at half-staff on all the public buildings in this city; that the owners of private buildings, and the owners or masters of vessels in our harbor, be requested to display their flags at half-mast on said day, and that a

special committee of five members of the Common Council be appointed, with instructions to invite the co-operation of his Honor the Mayor, and the heads of the several executive departments, to represent the City Government at the funeral of the deceased; and be it further

Resolved, That a copy of the foregoing preamble and resolution be suitably engrossed, duly authenticated by the corporate seal of the city, attested by the Clerk of the Common Council, and transmitted to the family of General Hancock, as an additional evidence of respect for the memory and sorrow for the death of the illustrious soldier.

Adopted by the Board of Aldermen, unanimously, by a rising vote, February 12, 1886, and Aldermen Ryan, Morgan, Mooney, Quinn, and Corcoran appointed the Special Committee, to which the President was added.

Hon. E. H. LACOMBE, Counsel to the Corporation:

SIR—An examination, now in progress, of the methods of the several District Civil Courts shows, among other things, that there is a want of uniformity in the rates of fees charged in said courts.

In the First and Fourth Districts, the fee collected for an order of arrest is fifty cents; in the Third District, one dollar; in the remaining districts no fee is charged for an order of arrest. In the First and Fourth Districts, for an attachment fifty cents is charged, and in the Third District, one dollar; in the remaining districts no fee is charged for an attachment. In the Ninth District two dollars is charged as a trial fee in cases involving less than fifty dollars; in all the other districts two dollars and fifty cents is charged. Twenty-five cents is charged as an adjournment fee in the Ninth District; in all other districts no adjournment fee is charged. In the Fourth District, ten cents is charged for a transcript; in the other districts no fee is charged for a transcript. In appeal cases, two dollars and fifty cents is charged in the Third District, and in all the other districts two dollars is charged. For joining issue, fifty cents is charged in the Fourth District, and nothing in the other districts. For subpoenas, twenty-five cents is charged in the Fourth and Seventh Districts; in the others, nothing. In the Fourth and Eighth Districts, fifty cents is charged for jury trial; in the others no jury trial fee is charged. The other fees charged in all the courts are uniformly as follows: for assumpsns, one dollar; for an inquest, fifty cents; for trial fee (fifty dollars or over) three dollars and fifty cents.

In view of the above facts, will you, at your convenience, cause to be prepared and furnished to this office a table of fees which, in your opinion, are properly chargeable in the courts herein mentioned.

For certifying a copy of a paper on file in the Clerk's office, for each folio of one hundred words, except returns upon appeal	10

When the plaintiff's demand is for fifty dollars or more, at the time of issuing any summons, warrant of attachment, or order of arrest, the party applying therefor shall pay to the said clerk an additional sum of one dollar; and if a trial shall be had in the action so commenced the plaintiff therein shall pay to the said clerk an additional sum of three dollars and fifty cents, which said sums shall be received in lieu of all other fees now required by law to be paid to said clerk.

THE CHIEF ENGINEER OF THE CROTON Aqueduct reports to me to-day that during the past twenty days the water in the city reservoirs has gone down three feet three inches, equal to 98,000,000 gallons, showing that this amount of water was used and wasted over and above the supply received through the Croton Aqueduct and the Bronx river conduit. The Department has no means to stop this enormous waste, which is caused by consumers keeping faucets open day and night to prevent freezing in the service-pipes, and can only make this most urgent appeal to them to stop it, and notify them that unless it is stopped the pressures in the water-mains will be so much reduced that in a few days the water will not rise to the basements and cellars in thousands of buildings.
