



THE SANITARY BUREAU.

The following is a summary of the operations of the Sanitary Bureau, which is charged with the duty of inspecting and reporting, in proper form, all nuisances or causes of danger to the public health, with the execution of the orders of the Board, and with the care of contagious diseases.

The number of inspections made by the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors was 23,376, as follows:

The number of complaints received from citizens during the three months ending September 30, 1878, was 2,885, all of which were referred to the Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report. The Sanitary Superintendent during the same period granted, under instructions and authority of the Board, 1,183 permits to vessels to discharge cargoes upon proper vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port; 1,603 permits to scavengers to empty privies, their work being inspected by officers of this Board detailed for that purpose; 19 permits to remove and transport manure; 36 permits to land rags (in bulk) under bonds; 73 miscellaneous permits were granted under the Sanitary Code.

The number of premises disinfected where contagious diseases existed was 486, and the number of cases removed to hospital 11.

The amount of meat, fish, and offal, etc., received at the offal dock for the quarter ending September 30, 1878, was: Horses, 1,422; cows, 85; cats and dogs, 8,093; carcasses of dogs received from the Pound, 5,622; sheep, 127; calves, 33; goats, 60; offal, 6,327 barrels; eggs, 377 barrels; meat, 2,000 pounds, and fish, 1,800 pounds.

During the three months ending September 30, 1878, seven thousand six hundred and forty-seven (7,647) permits were granted for burial. During the same period three hundred and ninety-seven (397) applications for transit permits were received and permits granted; five hundred and seventy (570) permits were granted for the burial of still-born children; eight hundred and twenty-three

(823) Coroner's certificates were received and recorded; three hundred and ninety-two (392) searches of the records of births, marriages, and deaths were made, and two hundred and ninety-eight (298) transcripts of the records of deaths, forty-eight (48) of marriages, and forty-six (46) of births, from said records were issued. There were three thousand three hundred and ninety-four (3,394) persons registered as married during the quarter, and six thousand seven hundred and sixty-two (6,762) children were born during the same period.

OFFICE OF THE SECRETARY—NOTICES OF THE BOARD.

The notices of the Board for the abatement of nuisances are issued upon the facts and evidence contained in the written reports of the Sanitary Inspectors, the result of personal inspection of the premises complained of. During the three months ending September 30, 1878, the number of notices issued by the Board was 3,892; these notices call attention of owners, lessees, and agents to a violation of the Sanitary Code in each case, and require the necessary alteration, repair, cleansing, and improvement of the premises named within five days from the receipt of the notice. If, upon reinspection, it is found that the requirements of the notice have not been complied with, a suit for penalty is commenced against the delinquent under Section 82, Chap. 335, Laws of 1873.

At a meeting of the Board of Examiners, held at the office of the Superintendent of the Department of Buildings, at No. 2 Fourth avenue, on Tuesday, November 26, 1878, at 3 o'clock P. M., in pursuance of the call of the acting Superintendent of Buildings, Henry J. Dudley, Esq.

There being present thereat—Deputy Superintendent Henry J. Dudley (acting Superintendent), John Banta, Edwin Dobbs, Henry Dudley, and James M. McLean.

Acting Superintendent Henry J. Dudley presiding.

The minutes of the previous meeting having been read for the information of the Board, the Chairman submitted for the action of the Board the hereinafter-named petitions and applications, to wit:

Petition of Thomas E. S. Dwyer for permission, in the erection of six three-story brick dwellings on premises at southeast corner of Fourth avenue and One Hundred and Twelfth street (each 17x47, 45 feet in height) to so far vary the provisions of the Building Law as to permit the gable wall of said buildings but twelve inches in thickness, in conformity with New Building Plans and Specifications No. 654, filed November 1, 1878. Petition, upon motion, granted.

Petition of James E. Ware, architect, for and on behalf of Richard Hennessy, owner, for permission, in the erection of two brick and brown-stone front, three-story and basement buildings, on premises on north side of Seventieth street, commencing one hundred and five feet distant westerly from Third avenue, each to be 12.6x55, 45 feet in height, to be permitted to so far vary the provisions of the Building Law as to allow of the construction of the centre or party wall thereof and the easterly independent wall of same but eight (8) inches in thickness, in conformity with the Plans and Specifications for New Buildings No. 660, filed November 4, 1878. Petition, upon motion, denied.

There being no further business before the Board, the minutes of the meeting were read, and, upon motion, approved, and the Board adjourned, subject to the call of the Superintendent of Buildings. New York, November 26, 1878.
