

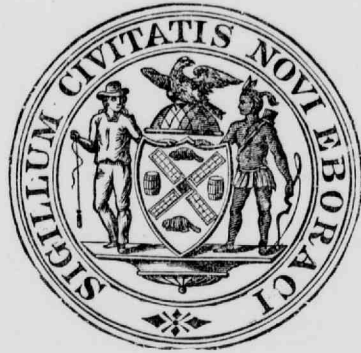

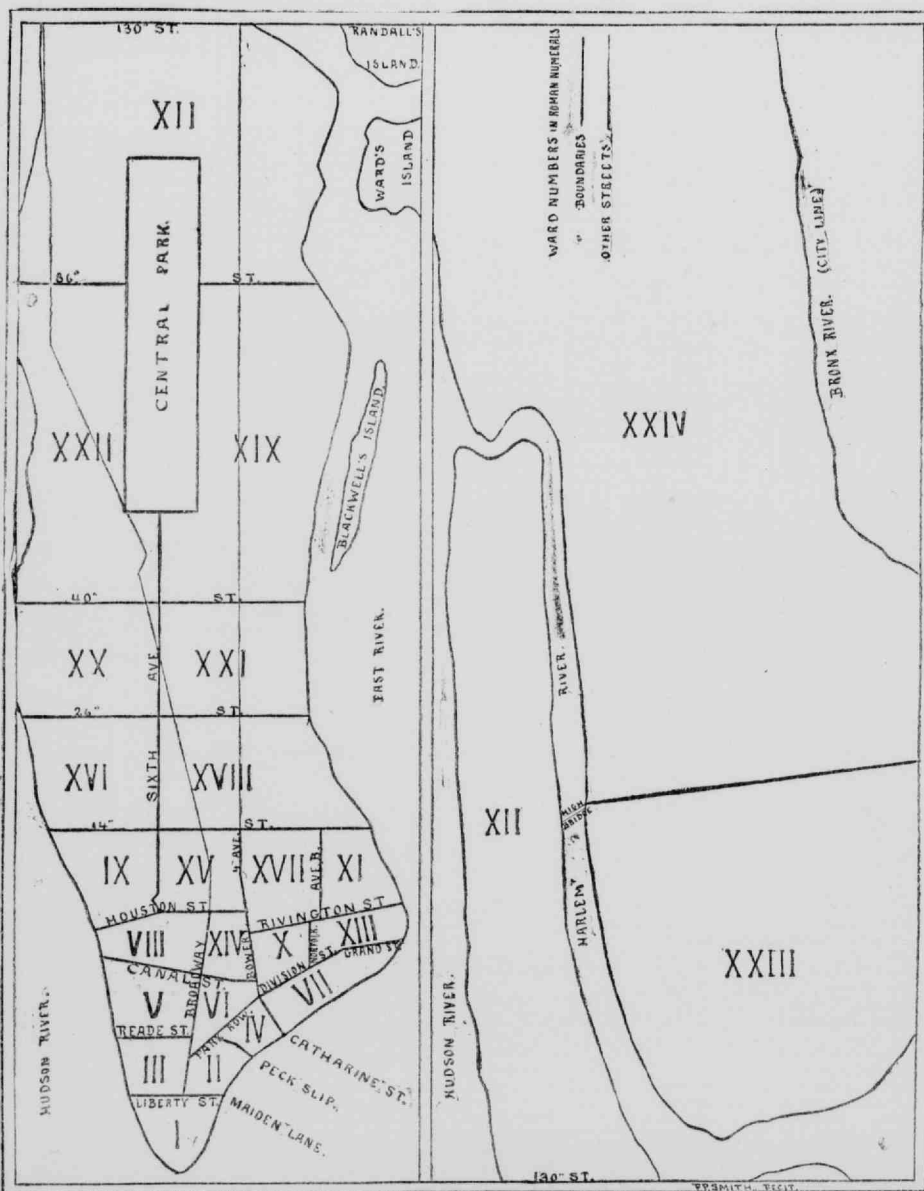

The 889 deaths represent a death-rate of 27.20, against 24.49 for the previous week and 22.22 for the corresponding week of 1890.

Contagious and infectious diseases show a decrease, the number of cases reported of diphtheria, measles, scarlet fever and typhoid fever being respectively 152, 83, 196 and 12, against 149, 126, 175 and 27 for the previous week, a total of 443 against 477. Diphtheria increased markedly between Rivington and Fourteenth streets, east of Avenue B, between Reade and Canal streets, west of Broadway, and between Fortieth and Eighty-sixth streets, East, elsewhere varying little. Measles showed an increase between Rivington and Fourteenth streets, east of Avenue B, between Fortieth and Eighty-sixth streets, West, and north of Eighty-sixth street, decreasing, as a rule, elsewhere. The increase of scarlet fever was most marked between Canal and Fourteenth streets, west of Broadway, the changes elsewhere being slight. One-half of the cases of typhoid fever were below Fourteenth street, and one-third above Fortieth street, leaving only two cases reported between Fourteenth and Fortieth streets.
