

The 979 deaths represent a death-rate of 26.08 against 25.88 for the previous week, and 25.28 for the corresponding week of 1893. Contagious and infectious diseases continue to decrease, the number of cases reported of diph-theria, measles, scarlet fever, typhoid fever and small-pox being respectively 192, 61, 53, 9 and 11, against 223, 86, 63, 7 and 9 for the previous week, a total of 326 against 388. The increase of diphtheria was mainly in the Ninth and Twenty-third Wards, and the decrease in the Tweltth, Sixteenth and Twentieth Wards. The increase of measles was most marked in the Sixth and Fourteenth Wards, and the decrease in the Thirteenth, Nineteenth and Twenty-second Wards. The increase of scarlet fever was chiefly in the Thirteenth Ward, and the decrease in the Sixteenth and Twenty-third Wards. Two of the 9 cases of typhoid fever were above Fortieth street, and 4 were below Fourteenth street. Three of the 11 cases of small-pox were above Fortieth street, and 6 were below Canal street, mostly east of Broadway. By order of the Board.
