Report for the Quarter ending March 31, 1900.

SIR-I have the honor to submit herewith the quarterly report of the operations and financial condition of the Department of Parks of the boroughs of Manhattan and Richmond, required by the Charter, for the three months ending March 31, 1900.

Work Performed by the Landscape Gardener and Force.

The pruning in the various parks was begun in December last and was carried on until completed in a satisfactory manner in the latter part of March. A number of the trees located in streets adjacent to the parks which had died from various causes, mainly from the leakage of gas, were removed and spaces left vacant prepared for replanting.

A large quantity of manure was distributed over the bare spots in the Central Park where the soil had been importaished through washouts and other causes, and the lawns in all the parks were given a similar treatment. The work was somewhat delayed owing to the difficulty in obtaining proper material for the purpose, but the late snowfall aided in the work, which will be of great struce to the lawns. The gardening force aided the other employees of the Department in removing snow from the walks.

The propagation of plants for summer bedding was continued during the quarter and the houses were well stocked with a large variety for summer display. The new conservatory was open to the public daily during the quarter, two exhibitions of special interest having been held, one being a display of orchids and other mid-winter flowers and the other a spring exhibition of bulbs, genistas, acacias, cinerarias and florist's flowers. The attendance was very satisfactory, 106,000 visitors being present during the quarter.

The spring planting was delayed until the latter part of March, owing to the late frosts, Sodding was commenced at about the same time and large areas in the parks were made ready for seeding by spading the defective portions.

Work Performed by General Foreman and Force.

In the Central Park, in addition to the routine work, the lakes and ponds were prepared for the use of skaters and curlers, and the public enjoyed winter sports daily until 10 o'clock, P. M.,

whenever the weather permitted.

About 2,400 loads of rubbish were collected on the park and removed to the various dumps available for the purpose. The park walks and the transverse roads were cleared of snow, which, owing to the heavy fall on several occasions, required considerable labor. A number of the large receiving-basins in the park were cleaned during the quarter, as well as the shores of the lakes, and in the Second Division about 550 feet of drain-pipe was dug up, cleaned and relaid in working order. Several of the other sewers in the park were also cleaned and put in proper order.

order.

Particular attention was given to the removing of stones, harrowing and otherwise caring for the bridle road, and portions of the dirt walks were surfaced with trap-rock screenings. The drives and roadways at the park entrances received especial attention during the frosty weather. Specially constructed machines for the distribution of sand and gravel were experimented with in this connection and their use made the driving at those points much less dangerous.

The cottages in the Central Park were kept open from 8 A. M. to 5 P. M. during the quarter.

In the other City parks the usual maintenance work was performed. The snow was removed from the walks, the refuse removed and disposed of and the parks otherwise kept in proper condition for public use.

The mechanical forces were engaged during the quarter in repairing the various buildings and constructing bedding-boxes, ladders and other equipment, including the making of over 1,000 park settees. tion for public use.

Forty pieces of new rolling stock were made at the shops and 31 pieces repaired. The repairs made at the Eighty-sixth Street Stables were of considerable magnitude, the carpenters, painters, iron-workers and masons being employed there at various times.

Engineering Corps.

Work on the contract for the improvement of Hamilton Fish Park was continued during the quarter, 2 exedras and 2 electric-light towers having been completed and 800 square feet of asphalt walk laid. Construction work upon the building to the amount of \$6,000 was done.

Under the contract for the removal of the Forty-second Street Reservoir 26,330 cubic yards of material was taken down and removed, and, in addition to this, under section 4 of the contract, 4,425 cubic yards of earth was removed below grade 97, 91 cubic yards of rock was excavated and 338 linear feet of test borings made.

Under the contract for the sewer from the Swedish School House, Central Park, 163 linear feet of 10 inch pipe sewer was laid and 202 cubic yards of rock excavated.

At the entrance to Central Park, Fifth avenue, Fifty-eighth to Sixtieth street, 240 cubic yards of excavating was done and 60 linear feet of 8-inch curb taken up and redressed.

In addition to the above the Engineer Corps was engaged on the following work:

Survey, estimate of cost and preparation of plans, etc., for new drainage system in Central Park, at the East drive, between Eighty-fifth and Ninety-seventh streets.

Survey and estimate of cost of repairs to drainage and gutters, the East drive, Central Park, from Marble Arch to Seventy-second street.

Topographical survey, preparation of maps and estimate for shaping grounds adjoining Conservatory, Central Park.

Survey, plans, specifications, etc., for completion of sea-wall, East River Park.

Survey, plans, etc., for bridge, East River Park.

Survey, plans, etc., for repairing pavement of Cathedral parkway.

Survey, plans, etc., for preparing tree plots for planting in Riverside Park, Ninety-sixth to One Hundred and Twenty-fourth street.

Survey, etc., for regulating and grading Thomas Jefferson Park.

Preparation of Damage Map, St. Nicholas Park.

Topographical survey, etc., Riverside Park, Eighty-first to Eighty-third street; also Riverside Park, between Seventy-second and Seventy-ninth streets.

Preparing Topographical Map of One Hundred and Twenty-second street to One Hundred and Twenty-fourth street, Riverside drive and Claremont place.

Surveys, etc., for improvement of cycle path, bridle road, walks, etc., Riverside drive, between Ninety-sixth and One Hundred and Twentieth streets.

Surveys, etc., relative to Soldiers and Sailors' Memorial Monument.

Final estimates on completed contracts, measurements of materials delivered and excavated, and general office compilations, reports, etc.

SIR-Herewith you will find quarterly report of work done under my supervision for the quarter ending March 31, 1900:

1. Furnishing all the labor and furnishing and erecting all the materials necessary to erect and complete, so far as herein specified, in the Botanical Gardens in Bronx Park, in the City of New York, the new Museum building, and Power-house and Stable and Closet Group, etc.

John H. Parker Company, contractors; Robert W. Gibson, architect. This contract was completed March 8, 1900, at a cost of \$347,893.

2. For furnishing and delivering hardware, etc.

Charles Edel & Son, contractors. This contract was executed February 7, 1900, and

completed March 19, 1900, at a cost of \$944.95.

3. For furnishing and delivering paints, oils, etc.
C. A. Harper, contractor. This contract was executed February 14, 1900, and completed February 28, 1900, at a cost of \$794.39.

4. Regulating, grading and constructing a roadway and appurtenances, and otherwise improving the Spuyten Duyvil parkway from New York Central & Hudson River Railroad to Broadway, in the Twenty-fourth Ward of the City of New York.

James Oliver, contractor. This has been in progress, but was suspended on account of the weather February 1, 1900, and ordered resumed March 19, 1900.

5. Furnishing all the labor and furnishing and erecting all the materials necessary to erect and complete, so far as herein specified, in the Botanical Gardens in Bronx Park, in The City of New York, the range of horticultural buildings, etc.

John R. Sheehan, contractor. This contract has been in progress and the building was

put entirely under roof this quarter.

6. Furnishing all the materials and labor for erecting complete the approach to the public building, also grading and improving the grounds surrounding in Crotona Park, at Third and Tremont avenues, in The City of New York.

Thomas Kelly, contractor. This work was suspended January 9, 1900, on account of the weather and ordered resumed on April 2, 1900.

7. Regulating and grading a portion of the Bronx and Pelham parkway in The City of New

York John B. McDonald, contractor. This work has been in progress during the entire quarter.

8. Regulating, grading, constructing retaining-walls and pools for use of New York Zoological Society in Bronx Park, in The City of New York.

John C. Rodgers, Jr., contractor. This work has been in progress, but was ordered suspended on account of weather February 16, 1900, and ordered to be resumed on April 4, 1900. 9. Furnishing all labor and all materials for constructing four entrances to the New York Zoological Park, in Bronx Park, in The City of New York.

John R. Sheehan, Contractor. This work has been in progress, but has been practically suspended on account of the weather.

10. Improving small park on the west side of Fulton avenue, between One Hundred and Sixty-ninth and One Hundred and Seventieth streets, in the Borough of The Bronx, of The City

of New York. William J. Moore, Contractor. This work has been in progress, but was suspended January 1, 1900, and was ordered resumed April 2, 1900.

11. Furnishing and delivering 200 park settees in the Zoological Park, in Bronx Park, in The

City of New York.
V. L. Dunne, Contractor. This work is in progress.

12. Furnishing all labor and all materials for constructing a public-comfort building in the New York Zoological Park, in Bronx Park, in The City of New York.

T. W. Timpson & Co. (Incorporated), contractors. This work has been practically suspended on account of the weather, as no masonry could be laid.

13. Regulating, grading and paving the existing roads near the Botanical Museum, in Bronx Park, in The City of New York.

John B. Devlin, Contractor. This contract was executed January 10, 1900, and, on account of the weather, work was not ordered commenced until April 2, 1900. 14. Furnishing and delivering trap-rock screenings, where required, in the New York

Zoological Park, in Bronx Park, Borough of The Bronx. J. Frank Quinn, Contractor. This contract was executed February 13, 1900, and the

contractor was notified to commence work March 12, 1900, but on account of the weather

15. (a) The topographical survey of Pelham Bay Park has been in progress.

(b) A survey, map with plan and profile, and approximate has been made of the follow-

Improving Bronx and Pelham parkway in Bronx Park.
Improving road from Eastern Boulevard to Spencer lane, in Pelham Bay Park.

STATEMENT OF WORK PERFORMED BY THE DEPARTMENT OF PARKS OF THE BOROUGHS OF BROOKLYN AND QUEENS DURING THE THREE MONTHS FROM JANUARY I TO MARCH 31 INCLUSIVE, 1900.

Prospect Park.

As a large number of men were laid off the latter part of December, 1899, and early in January, 1900, the force remaining were kept busy with the regular work of maintenance. The walks, roads, shelters, etc., were kept clean and in good order and were cleaned of snow after the several storms.

A large number of men were employed in cleaning the ice of the lake, and they also acted as guards during the skating season, which, owing to the cold weather in January, was enjoyed for several weeks by thousands of people.

Over 3,000 cubic yards of composted manure were received and distributed over the lawns and plantations, and unleached wood ashes were spread upon the meadows.

The work of pruning and taking care of the trees was carried on, the open winter being very favorable for this work.

The Greenhouses.

The new Palm House having been completed, all the palms in the old house were removed to their new home, and the old house prepared for the spring exhibitions.

All the available force was kept busy, both in the propagating houses and at the hot-beds on the East Side Lands, in potting and growing the thousands of plants to be used in the different parks throughout the boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens.

A new bridge over the bridle-road on Sullivan Heights is being built by park workmen (to take the place of the old Vandal Bridge), and the work is now nearing completion.

East Side Lands (Institute Gardens).

On the East Side Lands over nine thousand cubic yards of top-soil have been received, to be used in the work of forming the terrace.

Mechanical Work.

The mechanics have been kept busy in making, repairing and painting all the shelters, fountains, fences, comfort-houses, sprinklers, etc., throughout the entire Park system. They also built and shingled a new shelter at Red Hook Park, built a new temporary bridge on Sullivan Heights, as well as a large number of settees, loam boxes and stands for use in the greenhouses, picnic tables, engineers' stakes, etc. They also erected a new building on the East Side Lands, to be used for storing plants and tools. Walks, steps and heat guards were constructed in the new palm-house, new brick basins at Ninety-second street and Fort Hamilton avenue, and the necessary work of keeping the tools, wagons, trucks, carts, etc., in good working order was regularly attended to. regularly attended to.

Parade Grounds.

The old wooden fence along Franklin avenue and Prospect Park sides of the Parade Grounds was taken down, and the sidewalks were graded with top soil and the trees trimmed.

The lockers in the buildings, for the use of baseball and football players, were changed and

Tompkins Park.

In addition to the regular work of cleaning and keeping the park in order, one hundred truck loads of manure were received and spread on the lawns. The walks were cleaned of snow after each snowstorm, and the trees and shrubbery were trimmed as the weather permitted.

Fort Greene.

As most of the men employed at Fort Greene were laid off the latter part of the year, only the regular work of keeping the park clean and in good order was carried on. Three hundred truck loads of manure and twenty tons of unleached wood ashes were received and spread on the lawns and meadows.

Red Hook Park.

The work of construction in this park is rapidly nearing completion, over 3,000 cubic yards of soil having been worked over with manure, mounds built and shaped, the walks graded and excavation for a fountain made.

The Smaller Parks.

All of the smaller parks, including Winthrop, Bushwick, Bensonhurst, Underhill, Highland, Carroll, City, Zindel, Bedford, Long Island City, Flushing, College Point, Popenhausen, Municipal, Woodpoint, Dyker Beach, Kings, Lincoln Terrace, Linton, Stuyvesant, City Hall, Brooklyn Heights, Canarsie, Cooper, Cuyler, Cooper Gore parks and Irving and Saratoga squares have been kept clean and in good condition. Over seven hundred truck loads of composted manure were received and spread over the lawns in the different parks. The snow was removed after each storm, and the basins were cleaned and kept open.

The trees and shrubbery were trimmed when the weather permitted, and all necessary work to make the parks attractive to visitors was attended to.

Forest Park and Sunset Park.

The regular forestry work of thinning and removing dead trees, and guarding these parks from fires and depredations, has been continued.

Roads and Parkways.

Owing to the reduction in the force on January 1st, only the regular work of keeping the parkways, roads and gutters clean and in good condition has been carried on, with the exception of the grading of DeNyse street, adjoining fort Hamilton Park, from which 630 cubic yards of earth were removed and the roadbed covered with gravel.

All the trees on Ocean parkway, extending from Prospect Park to Coney Island, have been carefully trimmed, and the work of taking out old and diseased trees below Coney Island creek has been commenced. The trimming of trees on Eastern parkway has also been attended to.
