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BOARD OF ELECTIONS.

Meeting of the Board of Elections, held Tuesday, August 7, 1906, at 12 o'clock m.

Present—Commissioners Voorhis, Page and Dady.

The reading of the minutes of the meeting of the Board, held July 31, 1906, was dispensed with.

The following communications were received and disposed of, as stated, viz.:

From Wm. A. Willis, Executive Secretary, Mayor's office, dated August 2, 1906, referring to an included copy of a letter signed "John Williams," dated July 31, 1906, in relation to the provisions of chapter 454 of the Laws of 1902 and compliance therewith. Answered by the President on August 2. Filed.

From William A. Willis, Executive Secretary, Mayor's office, dated August 3, 1906, and inclosing a letter of inquiry, dated July 27, 1906, from E. D. Newman, Crawford, Neb., relative to securing a certificate as to residence in this City. Answered by the President August 4, 1906. Filed.

From William Dall, dated 30 York place, Dunedin, New Zealand, July 7, 1906, referring to a certain voting machine of his invention. Filed.

From R. D. Tolman, dated Worcester, Mass., July 24, 1906, inclosing an advertisement of and a printed approval by the Board of Voting Machine Examiners of Boston, Mass., of a certain "Perfection Ballot Box." Filed.

From J. F. Devlin, Deposit Clerk of the Finance Department of The City of New York, dated July 31, 1906, giving receipt for two deposit checks of \$1,000 each, and also for \$1,000 in cash, as security for bids for contract to furnish the Board of Elections with stationery, printing and supplies for election purposes in 1906. Filed.

From N. Taylor Phillips, Deputy and Acting Comptroller, Department of Finance, dated August 3, 1906, inclosing, with approval of the adequacy and sufficiency of the sureties thereto, the proposal of Martin B. Brown Company to furnish the Board of Elections with stationery, printing and supplies for election purposes in 1906. Filed.

From the several borough offices of the Board of Elections, reports up to and including August 7, 1906, of supplies received by them from Martin B. Brown Company, C. A. Chadsey and W. P. Mitchell & Son. Referred to the Chief Clerk of the Board for use in checking off bills for the same that may be rendered, and to be filed.

From the several borough offices of the Board, reports for the month of July, 1906, as to the use made of the telephone in their respective offices. Filed.

From same reports for the week ending August 4, 1906, as to attendance of employees in their respective offices. Filed.

From Herbert Parsons, president, Republican County Committee, New York County, dated August 1, 1906, giving information as to the number of ballots, with size of same, that will probably be required by the Republican party in New York County in the coming primary election. Filed.

From J. E. Smith, Secretary, Kings County Republican General Committee, dated August 3, 1906, giving information similar to that in preceding communication. Filed.

On motion the following resolution was adopted, to wit:

Resolved, That, pursuant to the provisions of the Primary Election Law, the Board of Elections, as custodian of primary records, hereby prescribes the ballot to be used at the primary elections to be held September 18, 1906, as follows:

The size of the ballot in the County of New York for the Democratic party shall be 8½ inches by 28 inches, and in the counties of Kings, Queens and Richmond shall be 8½ inches by 14 inches.

The size of the ballot in The City of New York for the Republican party shall be 8½ inches by 14 inches.

The weight of the paper shall be thirty-two pounds to the ream of 480 sheets, double cap, for each sheet 17 inches by 34 inches, one or more water marks to be in each ballot.

The color of the Democratic ballot shall be pale green, and the color of the Republican ballot shall be light yellow, with each color uniform throughout.

Each ballot shall have printed or written upon its face the party name, the Assembly district number, also the election district number, when the election district number is a unit of representation; the title or names of the positions to be filled and the names of the persons to be voted for to fill such positions. All to be printed in black ink.

Resolved, That the President be and hereby is authorized to invite sealed proposals for furnishing to party organizations, committees and qualified electors paper for ballots for use at the primary elections, to be held September 18, 1906, in accordance with the foregoing requirements.

The Board then adjourned.

BOARD OF ELECTIONS.

Meeting of the Board of Elections, held Tuesday, August 14, 1906, at 12 o'clock m.

Present—Commissioners Voorhis, Page and Maguire.

The reading of the minutes of the meetings of the Board held July 31 and August 7 was dispensed with.

The following communications were received and disposed of as stated, viz.:

Four from the Secretary of State: (1) dated August 6, notice that at the general election to be held November 6 a Representative in the Fifty-ninth Congress of the United States for the Eighth Congressional District may be lawfully voted for to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of Timothy D. Sullivan—filed; (2) dated August 7, in regard to election notices as to officers to be voted for in Kings, Queens and Richmond counties—answered and filed; (3) dated August 11, giving notice of officers that may be lawfully voted for at the general election to be held November 6—filed; (4) dated August 13, in regard to registry books and cards to be used at the general election to be held November 6—referred to the President for answer.

From N. Taylor Phillips, Deputy Comptroller, dated the 1st inst., monthly statement of the unexpended balances remaining to the credit of the Board out of its appropriations for 1906. Referred to the Chief Clerk of the Board for comparison and filing.

From the Municipal Civil Service Commission, dated August 13, asking for a list of employees falling within "legitimate division" of the Board for purposes of promotion, etc. Referred to the President for answer.

From Peter C. Kelly, dated August 8, asking what attitude the Board would take at the coming primary election in regard to an enrolled elector having since his enrollment moved from one election district in the same Assembly district. Referred to the President for answer.

Two orders of County Court, Queens County: (1) in the matter of the application of Fred G. Dewitt for correction of primary enrollment; (2) similar application of George J. Scheibel. Both orders complied with and filed.

Two estimates for furnishing one thousand ballot boxes for use at the coming elections: (1) from Havilah M. Smith & Son, dated July 17, 1906, for the sum of nine hundred and eighty dollars (\$980); (2) dated July 21, 1906, from Westervelt & McIntyre, West Eleventh street, Manhattan, for the sum of nine hundred and ninety-eight dollars (\$998).

On motion, duly carried, the estimate or bid of Havilah M. Smith & Son to furnish the boxes for the sum of nine hundred and eighty dollars, being the lowest bid, was accepted.

From Hon. Rhinelander Waldo, Acting Commissioner of the Police Department, dated August 9, 1906, acknowledging receipt of the President's letter of the 7th inst., stating that "notification cards, addressed and arranged by police precincts," had been forwarded. Resolved, That the Board of Elections, in compliance with the provisions of chapter 473, section 6, Laws of 1899, hereby approves and selects as the paper to be used for the ballots at the annual official primary elections to be held September 18, 1906, that represented by samples marked "A," submitted and filed with the proposal this day received from the J. W. Pratt Company, Nos. 52 to 58 Duane street, Borough of Manhattan, City of New York, containing the watermark "Interborough," on condition that the said J. W. Pratt Company duly execute and file within five days herefrom, in consideration of such selection, an agreement to promptly furnish from September 1, 1906, to September 18, 1906, in conformity with the requirements set forth in the resolution of the Board adopted August 7, 1906 (relating to paper for the primary ballots), such quantity or quantities of said paper as may be ordered by organizations, committees or persons desiring the same, and at the prices named in said proposal of the J. W. Pratt Company, viz., one dollar and seventeen cents (\$1.17) per one thousand ballots of size 8½ by 14 inches, and two dollars and thirty-four cents (\$2.34) per one thousand ballots of size 8½ inches by 28 inches, with the express understanding and agreement that all payments and liabilities for paper furnished in accordance herewith are to be accepted from or assumed by the persons or parties respectively who furnish, order or receive the same, and that in no event will a claim of any nature whatever be entertained or created against The City of New York or the Board of Elections of said City for any paper or ballots furnished or supplied by the said J. W. Pratt Company of New York City in conformity with the terms and conditions of this resolution.

Resolved, in compliance with the requirements of chapter 473, section 4, subdivision 3, Laws of 1899, the several Assembly districts in The City of New York be and are hereby divided by election districts into primary districts for the purposes of the official primary elections to be held September 18, 1906, which primary districts are hereby composed and constituted as herein recorded, and are also set forth in the schedules submitted by the Chief Clerks of the branch offices in the Boroughs of Manhattan, The Bronx, Brooklyn, Queens and Richmond, and ordered on file, being marked respectively "A," "B," "C," "D" and "E."

From O. M. Meyers, dated August 13 (with enclosed proposed resolution), as to use of the United States Standard Voting Machine at the coming elections. Laid on the table.

NOTICE TO CONTRACTORS.

GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately. The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there.
