## Report for the Quarter ending March 31, 1904.

Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity,  
Commissioner's Office, Nos. 13 to 21 Park Row,  
New York, November 15, 1904.

Hon. GEORGE B. McCLELLAN, Mayor:

Dear Sir—In accordance with the requirements of section 1544 of the Charter, I submit herewith a report of the transactions of the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity for the quarter ending March 31, 1904:

## BOROUGH OF MANHATTAN, THE BRONX, QUEENS AND RICHMOND.

## Water Supply.

Attached hereto and marked "Document No. 1" is the report of the Bureau of Chief Engineer, Boroughs of Manhattan, The Bronx, Queens and Richmond.

No further appropriation by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment was made for the new work during the quarter.

The average daily flow from the Croton watershed during the quarter was 673,000,000 gallons; average daily use, 307,000,000 gallons; rain fall in Croton watershed, 10.87 inches, showing that the Croton watershed furnished more than double the amount of water used by the City.

It being a severe winter, but little work could be done. The reservoirs, aqueducts, etc., were kept in order, and the sanitary patrol of the watershed was continued with a larger force; the weekly tests of water were carried on and extended.

The Bronx and Byram watersheds furnished an average daily amount of 17,000,000 gallons, and the force was employed in keeping the reservoirs, pipe lines, etc., in order and the watersheds patrolled.

The completion of the two fifteen million gallon pumping engines at the One Hundred and Seventy-ninth street station has allowed the Department to furnish a full supply to the high service district and to repair the old pumping engines at Ninety-eighth street and One Hundred and Seventy-ninth street stations.

The pumping stations in the Borough of Queens have been kept at work, subject to the several improvements now being carried on to increase their efficiency.

The pumping station at Tottenville, in the Borough of Richmond, has been run on an average of sixteen hours per day. The several improvements have been started. The accompanying report of the Chief Engineer will furnish the details as to new work and operations of the Bureau of Chief Engineer.

## Lighting.

Details of lighting in the boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx will be found in the report of the Engineer of Surface Construction, marked "Document No. 2"; those of the lighting of Brooklyn, in the report of the Assistant Engineer of that borough, hereto annexed, marked "Document No. 3"; those of the Borough of Queens in the report of the Deputy Commissioner of that borough, hereto annexed, marked "Document No. 4"; those of the Borough of Richmond, in the general report of the Deputy Commissioner for that borough.

As a result of the efforts of this Department a bid was received from the Consolidated Gas Company for lighting the streets by an improved method of mantle burners at a considerably less price than previous years. Immediately upon receipt of such a bid, efforts were made to adjust the bid in such a manner that the City could take advantage of it. As you know, since that time these efforts were successful, and the lighting is now in operation, thereby accomplishing a great improvement in the illumination of the boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx.

## Electricity.

Reports for the Electrical Bureaus in the boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx, Brooklyn, Queens and Richmond are hereto attached and marked respectively "Document No. 5" and "Documents Nos. 6, 7 and 8."

## BOROUGH OF BROOKLYN.

Report of the Deputy Commissioner for the Borough of Brooklyn is hereto attached and marked "Document No. 9"; also report of the Chief Engineer for that borough, marked "Document No. 9-A."

Work was commenced on the removal and relaying of the old tuberculated mains in the lower and older sections of the borough, the contracts at present in force for this work calling for an expenditure of nearly \$700,000. These new mains will greatly add to the efficiency of the supply for fire purposes.

Seven contracts were prepared and forwarded for approval during the quarter, and bids received on two contracts, the work being of a miscellaneous character.

The new engines and boilers for the Millburn station are practically completed, and will enable a greater amount of water to be pumped from the new shed. Recommendation was made for an additional pipe yard as a distribution centre for the laying of new mains in the outlying wards.

A report on the high pressure fire service mains for Coney Island was made on January 26, and on February 27 a preliminary report on a similar service for the congested section of the borough was made. A final report was made on March 14, again recommending a high pressure service for Coney Island, covering the territory within which the large amusement parks and other dangerous fire risks are located, the area protected being about 147 acres. The pressure at the pumping station in this district would be about 150 pounds per square inch.

Recommendation was made for a high pressure fire service with a pressure at the pumps of 300 pounds per square inch for the river front, dry goods and high office building districts, bounded approximately by the East river, Navy Yard, Fort Greene Park, Pacific street, Henry street, Columbia street, Dwight street and Richards street. The total area protected would be about 1,420 acres. Estimated cost of the entire installation, including Coney Island, was \$1,475,000. The general plans were approved and approximately granted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment before the end of the quarter.

The most important work to be undertaken outside of the fire service system would be the extending and remodeling of the Ridgewood station, so as to provide increased pumping capacity and provision for direct pumping from Ridgewood into the Mount Prospect service.

A recommendation was also made for appropriations to continue the work of replacing the small tuberculated mains and removal of dead ends between the high and low pressure systems, filter beds for Valley Stream supply pond, setting hydrants on existing large mains, remodeling the New Lots station, remodeling Spring Creek station and general extension of the distribution system in the outlying wards.

The report of the Superintendent of Distribution and Repairs (Borough of Brooklyn) is hereto annexed and marked "Document No. 9-B."

2—Water Waste Prevention.

Although application has been made for authority to continue the experiments of the tests of the pitometer which showed such valuable results during the past year, we have been unable to get the necessary appropriations, and consequently this work has been discontinued.

3—County Division.

Croton Basin—The work of cleaning up the swamp land and underbrush in the watershed has been done. The laboratory at Katonah was partly shut down during the first quarter of this year, owing to the death of the bacteriologist at this point.

The contract for the paving in the outlet at the East Branch reservoir is progressing satisfactorily, and this work should be completed by the fall of the year. Owing to the severity of the winter it has been necessary to suspend work temporarily.

The flash boards which were placed last year have been in use and have been found to work satisfactorily.

Contract for the building of fences in the Cranberry Pond outlet has been pushed actively and should be completed shortly. Our forces have also been engaged in removing the building situated on lands which were transferred to the City under the Cranberry Pond condemnation proceedings.

Plans for the filter beds situated at the outlet of Lakes Mahopac and Kirk are well under way, and the specifications should be completed by the middle of the summer.

For details of the work in the county division you are respectfully referred to the report of Mr. John E. McKay, Assistant Engineer, herewith attached.

The above is a summary of the work done along the lines of the old and new aqueducts during the quarter ending March 31, 1904, and in addition I would most respectfully report the following:

First Division.

The work on this division has been repairing bridge floor at Croton dam, cleaning ice and snow from gutters on road and around gate houses; also from roof of new gate house, about 279 cubic yards.

Making a sanitary inspection of the streams emptying into Croton Lake. Looking after the telephone line on the old aqueduct. Cleaning floor gratings in the new gate house. Laying blind drains to lead water from Keeper's house. Collecting samples of water for Katonah and Mount Prospect laboratories. Cleaning and repairing screens in the new gate house. Cleaning ice and snow from culverts on line of old aqueduct. Putting in stop plank between sump and screen chamber in new gatehouse. Painting fences and iron work at Shafts Nos. 1 and 2. Cleaning and painting boats. Cleaning privy boxes at the Croton Lake and Pines Bridge school houses. Cleaning drift wood from the lake.

Second Division.

The work on this division has been: Building, repairing and painting fences. Rebuilding stone fences along the Scarborough crossroad and at Ventilator No. 6, and at Carter's place; raked and burned leaves and other debris along the line of the old aqueduct; cleaning snow out of all the culverts and cutting ice from under bridge and in culverts.

Third Division.

The work on this division has been: Cutting and trimming locust posts at Shaft No. 9, new aqueduct. Building retaining wall and tearing down old wall, excavating and filling in necessary for the same. All the sidewalks, gutters, culverts, etc., along the line kept clear of snow and ice.

Fourth Division.

The work on this division has been: Filling and grading, building retaining wall at Hasbrouck bank. Repairing fences, hauling stone, cleaning old and new aqueduct grounds. Removing a large quantity of snow from the buildings. Cleaning crosswalks, drains and gutters.

Fifth Division.

The work on this division has been: Building, repairing and painting fences, filling and grading. Spreading manure, painting barn, cutting ice from culverts and cleaning ice and snow from sidewalks, gutters and culverts; putting in stop plank. Putting new roof on store house, cutting bushes and weeds and cleaning up the aqueduct line.

Sixth Division.

The work on this division has been: Filling and grading, painting fences, cleaning machinery at the gate house. Cleaning and painting around head houses. Cleaning snow from gutters and sidewalks after each storm. Raking leaves and cleaning up line of aqueduct; cleaning out old aqueduct.

Seventh Division.

The work in this division has been: Cleaning out old aqueduct, from One Hundred and Thirty-fifth street gate house to High Bridge. Putting out, hoisting and trimming coal, keeping the reservoir, tower and gate houses clean; the men have been kept busy cleaning the bridge, sidewalks and gutters of snow and ice, cleaning up the line from leaves and brush, etc.

Eighth Division.

The work on this division has been: Relaying sidewalk at Ninety-third street gate house, keeping surface of water clean. Cleaning snow from walks, moving office furniture to High Bridge. Cleaning and maintenance of north, south and One Hundred and Thirty-fifth street gate houses. Cleaning screws at north and new gate houses, painting boat for new reservoir. Cleaning south gate house chamber and pipes. Painting engine room at Ninety-eighth street and cleaning old aqueduct on the Seventh Division.

The following work has been done in the County of Putnam during quarter ending March 31, 1904:

Cutting brush along shores of reservoirs, lakes and rivers. Gate houses, gates, etc., have been kept clean and in good order. Reservoirs, lakes and rivers have been patrolled frequently, and any nuisances found, abated.

The interior of the Electrozone Building has been painted. The electrozone plant has been operated continuously during the quarter. Necessary repairs have been made to the public highway around Middle Branch reservoir.

Work on East Branch reservoir improvement was suspended during the winter. Work was resumed on April 5, 1904.

Work on the fence wall contract at Mahopac Village and along outlet, Cranberry pond, has been carried on as the weather would permit; an increased force are now at work on this contract.

The iron railing along sidewalk in front of New York City property in Main street, Brewster, has been scraped and painted.

Following is report of work done in the Westchester Division of the Croton watershed for the quarter ending March 31:

Owing to the severe winter, extra attention was given the culverts, drains, etc., on the highways around the Titicus and Muscoot reservoirs.

The cutting of brush and weeds along the margin of the reservoirs and streams has been continued.

The necessary water samples have been sent to the laboratory, and all office records accurately kept.

A regular sanitary patrol has been maintained. As in former report, attention is called to the need of repairs to the post and rail fences along the highways surrounding the reservoirs.

Three nuisances have been reported and eleven abatements of nuisances have been secured at Katonah.

Plans for disposal of sewage for the village of Mount Kisco have been submitted to the State Board of Health and are now awaiting the action of said Board.

Since January 28 all tests of Croton and Bronx water have been made at the Mount Prospect laboratory, the work at the Katonah laboratory having been stopped by the death of the Bacteriologist in charge of same.

Bronx and Byram.

The condemnation of the land to be taken under the Bronx and Byram proceedings have been practically completed, and the majority of the buildings removed. For details of the work in this district you are referred to report of Mr. Matthew Betts, as follows:

"In reference to work done by the Bronx river force during the quarter ending March 31, 1904, I have to report that, in addition to the ordinary repairs and maintenance, it has been much employed in keeping the channels near bridges and the reservoirs around the towers and in front of spillways free from ice as far as possible.

"The unusual severity of the winter has made this work much greater than usual.



"The force has also cleared the land along the shore of the Kensico reservoir on the north and along the lower Byram river of bushes and weeds by cutting and burning.

"About 2,500 feet of wire fence has been painted.

"Many buildings, including dwellings, barns and other outbuildings, twenty-three (23) in number, which were condemned and acquired for sanitary purposes, have been destroyed and in some instances have been cleaned."

#### 4—Pipes and Distribution.

Owing to the delays in getting appropriations, no new work in laying mains has been started. Estimates and plans for a number of streets have been prepared, in contemplation of receiving the necessary funds later. No work could be done during this quarter on account of the depth of the frost, but there are a number of contracts which were let last fall, and the amount of pipe laying done during the next quarter should be very large. The reticulation system has been watched very closely. Following is a statement of the work during the quarter:

#### 5—Mechanical Division.

##### Jerome Park Pumping Station.

During this quarter the Jerome Park pumping station, as far as the buildings were concerned, was practically finished. One of the two 10,000,000-gallon vertical triple-expansion Worthington pumping engines contracted for in June, 1901, was erected and should be ready for steam within a short time. Part of the second engine is on the ground, and erection of the same will be begun in the near future. Other work around the station is rapidly nearing completion.

##### One Hundred and Seventy-ninth Street Pumping Station.

The two 15-million gallon pumping engines installed in this station by Henry A. Worthington under contract dated February 9, 1901, are ready for final tests, which will be shortly made, and the engines put into regular service. It may be noted, however, that these engines have been in use for some time. It will be observed from the report of the Assistant Engineer of the Mechanical Division that since the installation of the two engines at One Hundred and Seventy-ninth street it has not been necessary to continue the use of the High Bridge Station, thus creating a saving in the cost of operation by reason of the fact that the engines in the High Bridge Pumping Station are not so economical in operation as those at One Hundred and Seventy-ninth street.

##### Ninety-eighth Street Pumping Station.

Considerable repair work and alteration has been done at this station, which will continue to increase the economy in operation, and all of the engines in this station have been repaired. The engines in this station were in a very bad state of repair owing to the small capacity of the pumping stations prior to the installation of the two new engines at One Hundred and Seventy-ninth street.

For details of the repair work done at these stations, and the cost of operation, please note the following report of Assistant Engineer in charge of the Mechanical Division:

#### BOROUGH OF MANHATTAN AND THE BRONX.

##### Jerome Park Pumping Station.

The work on this station, under Nicholas Ryan's contract, is practically finished, all remaining to be done is the placing of some cast-iron platforms on the tower stairway, finishing the tile flooring in the engine room, doing some glazing and cleaning down the sidewalks, etc. The trestle in the coal house is to be built under separate contract and the 15-ton wagon scales at entrance to coal house are being set by the Fairbanks Company, and the scales in the boiler room are on the ground ready to be set.

The tank, stand-pipe and connections are finished, except for leading a few joints in the 48-inch mains to and from same, and when this is done the tank and stand-pipe will be filled and tested before making final payment to the contractors.

One of the two 10-million gallon vertical triple expansion Worthington pumping engines contracted for in June, 1901, is erected and will be ready for steam in a short time, and part of the second engine is on the ground and erection of same will be begun in the near future.

The main suction and delivery pipes are on the ground and work of laying same is in progress. The three internally fired boilers and the breechings for same are in course of erection.

The plans for the main steam piping from boilers to engines have been approved and work on same is going on in the shop, and plans showing the location and arrangement of the feed pumps, feed and blow-off lines and connections, filters and auxiliary heater are being prepared for approval.

Until the Jerome Park reservoir is finished, this station will get its supply from the old Croton aqueduct, via the Gun Hill road and the Potter place 48-inch lines, the water being fed around and through gate house No. 4 of the reservoir; but, before these pipes can be of service, certain stop-cocks will have to be set by the Aqueduct Commission and connections made. The Commission will have to be requested to do this work at once so that no delay will ensue in getting our plant into commission.

##### One Hundred and Seventy-ninth Street Station.

The two 15-million gallon pumping engines installed in this station by H. R. Worthington under contract dated February 9, 1901, are ready for final test, and when this test is made, which will be in the near future, and if it proves satisfactory, the engines will be taken over by the City and put into regular service, and the repairs on the Blake engines will be gone on with.

Changes have been made in the piping on the Blake engines and pumps to better drain the oil and sweat from the machinery and water ends and to do away with the unclean practice of dipping out the oil from the pans and carrying it in pails to the filter tanks.

Steam was furnished the head house at shaft No. 25 for ninety days during the quarter.

##### High Bridge Station.

Since the installation of the Worthington engines in the One Hundred and Seventy-ninth Street Station it has not been necessary to continue the High Bridge Station in service, and, in consequence, it has been "laid away."

A request for money has been made to take out the present pumping engines in this station and to install two new pumping engines, one of 5-million gallons capacity for the tower service and one of 10-million gallons capacity for the reservoir service, and the necessary boilers and all appurtenances, and also for the necessary larger suction and delivery mains from the station to the reservoir and to the tower.

##### Ninety-eighth Street Station.

During the quarter the 10-million gallon pumping engine in this station was shut down and a feed-water heater was inserted in the main exhaust-pipe and necessary connections made with said heater and the feed pumps, and with the auxiliary feed-water heater, and the engine was thoroughly repacked and some small repairs made on same.

Repair parts are being made for engine No. 2, and when they are finished the work of overhauling this engine will be begun. This engine is in very bad state of repair, and as it is liable to go out of commission at any minute for this reason, and also because this pump is not needed to keep the pressures normal, it was deemed advisable to shut it down and have it in readiness for emergency until such times as it is overhauled.

The hot-water meters have all been set and the changes in the feed lines have been made as planned.

The basement is being thoroughly cleaned and the sidewalls and engine foundation piers are being whitewashed, and drip pans are to be placed under all cold-water pipes and small pumps, and the air compressors and all old dead pipes are being cut out.

The tank and the stand-pipe have been scraped and painted during the quarter and the ceiling and sidewalls are now being painted.

Specifications have been prepared for taking out the two old Worthington 7½-million gallon pumping engines in this station and installing two 15-million gallon engines and new boilers.

The superheater has been accepted by the City and it is now in regular service in connection with the 10-million gallon engine. New grates were put in the furnaces during the quarter.

The materials have been ordered and it is intended to build a suitable store house of enameled brick in the boiler room adjoining the superheater.

The One Hundred and Seventy-ninth street and the Ninety-eighth street stations have been in uninterrupted service during the quarter.

#### BOROUGH OF QUEENS.

##### First Ward.

The new boilers installed in pumping stations No. 1 and No. 3 have not as yet been put into service, and the work of connecting them up with the pumping engines (under contract with Burhorn) is still in progress, and as soon as the steam, feed and blow-off piping is completed in station No. 1 the new boilers will become available and the temporary portable boiler, borrowed from the Brooklyn Water Department, will be returned by Contractor McSwegan.

At station No. 3 the boilers cannot be used till the new stack contracted for is built. As yet none of the materials for this stack and its foundation are on the ground. The contractor has been called upon to push this work more rapidly.

The contract for driving the new wells at this station is completed all but setting gate boxes and connecting the system to the receivers of the pumps. The second pump installed in this system by the Department forces is almost ready for steam.

This station has only one pumping engine in it, and also only one boiler, and any repairs to either, and when necessary to clean boilers, once in two weeks, it is necessary to shut down the station. With the installation of the new boilers and the additional pumping engine, this station will be enabled to operate uninterruptedly throughout the year.

The work of finishing the repairs and painting of the two stations has been in progress during the quarter, the work being done by the Department men.

The work of installing the combination purifiers and feed-water heaters is still in progress.

##### Third Ward.

The new boilers in the Flushing pumping station have been connected temporarily with the existing stack on an order issued to the firm of Donegan & Swift, of New York, and the Department men are connecting up the new boilers to the Snow Pumping engine, and when this work is done the old boilers will be abandoned.

Bids were opened March 16 for driving wells at this station and installing an air lift system, but as yet the contract has not been awarded. These wells cannot be put down too soon, as when the warm weather arrives, without these wells, it will be impossible to maintain the normal pressures throughout the ward.

Bids were opened on March 16 for building brick stacks at Flushing and Bayside stations, but the contract has not been awarded.

The plans have all been approved and the work of building the new 3-million gallon engine for this station is in progress in the works of the Snow Pump Company, Buffalo, N. Y.

##### Bayside Station.

The new boilers installed in this station by Williams & Gerstle cannot be used till the new brick stack is built and till the steam, feed-water and blow-off piping is done. The materials for the piping work have been ordered and our steam fitters will do the work.

While on the subject of improvements for this station, I would recommend that surveys and plans be made for acquiring necessary land and building a drain round Oakland lake and the small pond, to receive the drainage from the side slopes, and convey it to a point below the present dam. This lake property protected and cleaned would be a valuable source of supply to help out the Third Ward. The necessary money for this purpose has been asked for. The available amount of water at this station from the present wells is less than one million gallons per day, and as the demand in this Ward is daily increasing, and as the future has been provided for, in so far as the pumping machinery and improvements to the station are concerned, some action will have to be taken to get an increased supply of water, either by driving more



wells or by making the aforementioned improvements at Oakland lake, or eventually by doing both.

Owing to the numerous complaints from citizens received of roily water being pumped from this station, and demands that some action be taken to relieve the condition, it was necessary to shut off the feed from the small pond, thereby compelling us to depend on the driven wells to supply this station. In consequence of this, and also of the fact that the daily feed to the Flushing pond has fallen off considerably, we have been compelled to drop our pressures at the two stations in this ward during the day, while at night we have carried the regular pressures of about 75 pounds. No complaints were received, however, as a result of this reduction in pressures. The Whitestone station, which is exceedingly expensive to operate, was used only when necessary to help out, the supply to Whitestone being furnished for some time back from Bayside and Flushing stations. When the new large mains now being laid, which will connect up the three stand pipes, and when the proposed wells for Flushing become available, and the large mains from Flushing and Bayside stations to the Flushing stand pipe are laid, the Whitestone station can be abandoned, and in order to get the benefit of the proposed increased supply from Flushing pumping station, it is important that the money necessary for laying these mains be obtained and a contract let without delay.

New lights were put in the ventilators in the Whitestone station, and the whole interior and the gutters and leaders were painted, and materials have been ordered to put the house adjoining the pumping station in proper repair. The stand pipes in this borough have not been painted for some years, and as they were in sore need of scraping and painting, an order has been issued to do this work.

Owing to the small labor force in this borough at our disposal, there has always been difficulty in getting the ponds at the Bayside and Flushing stations cleaned, and during the past quarter these ponds have been fouling up considerably, and as the grounds and property belonging to these two stations are quite extensive, and need constant attention to properly maintain them in the condition that such grounds should be kept in, I requested some time ago the services of six Laborers and a Foreman to attend to this work, and particularly to keep the above mentioned ponds in a sanitary condition. During the warm weather this office is in constant receipt of complaints about the condition of these ponds, and as these ponds are the source of supply partially at Bayside and wholly at Flushing station, of the supply to the Third Ward, it is incumbent upon this Department to keep the water potable, and to do so, as I said before, it is necessary to have the force of men called for; and to get this pond into such condition that it can be more easily kept clean, I would advise that the bottom of the pond be thoroughly cleaned out and filled with clean gravel to a depth of about three inches.

In the First Ward, at pumping stations No. 1 and No. 3, there is much to be done to get the grounds around the station in a presentable condition, and with the men called for we could accomplish this.

From the isolated position of station No. 1 and the exposed position of the coal bin it is a difficult matter to prevent the coal from being stolen, and to properly protect this coal and also the stores in the store house, I would request that the railing called for some time ago, the plans for which are ready, be contracted for at an early date.

Owing to the delay in getting the new boilers into commission, we are still using the temporary boiler set up outside the station, which boiler is very wasteful in the use of coal, and consequently the duties at this station are very low. It is expected, however, that it will not be long now before we get the use of the new boilers, as every effort is being made on our part to push this work to completion.

BOROUGH OF RICHMOND.

Orders have been given out to build the breeching and connect up the new boiler in the Tottenville pumping station with the stack, and to furnish all necessary piping, valves, fittings, etc., and connect up the steam, feed, and blow-off lines, and to set the hot water meter in the feed line. When this work is done and the new boiler is put into commission, the much needed repairs to the old boilers will be made.

Plans have been prepared for a new coal house at this station, but the specifications have not been prepared for this work, nor have the plans or specifications been prepared for the proposed drain through the grounds back of the station. I would request that these matters be given early attention, and also that plans and specifications be prepared for building a larger and more suitable engine house in place of the present small one, which is now entirely out of place alongside the new boiler house. Money for this purpose has been requested. This station has been in continuous daily service for sixteen hours a day throughout the quarter.

## (B) BOROUGH OF QUEENS.

## 1. Pipes and Distribution.

Following will be found a report of the Assistant Engineer in the Borough of Queens. Contracts are now outstanding for a large amount of additional pipe in this borough, which will be laid as soon as the weather permits. It may be well to mention that this will include the main from stations Nos. 3, 4 and 5 of the Citizens' Water Supply Company, at the head of Flushing creek to the boundary line of Long Island City, which will deliver an additional 7 million gallons of water per day to this section, and relieve the present inadequate supply of water. This main should be in operation by September. Following is above referred to report of Assistant Engineer, Borough of Queens:

The force of laborers and mechanics available to properly maintain the present distribution system in the Borough of Queens is very small, thereby causing delay in repairing leaks and in maintaining the system generally, yet I am pleased to inform you that at the present time the general condition of the system throughout the borough is very satisfactory. The demand for the installation of new service mains is increasing daily, as is shown by the numerous petitions referred to this office. Upon examination of the same I find that in nearly every instance, owing to the increased number of houses erected, these mains are absolutely necessary.

In the matter of the amount of water supplied by private water companies, I would report that the Citizens' Water Supply Company is furnishing their usual amount daily. The water supplied by the Bowery Bay Building and Improvement Company, amounting to about 525,000 gallons daily, is, I am sorry to say, showing an increased amount of chlorine during the past week. I have communicated with this company, asking them to take the necessary steps to change this condition as soon as possible.

In reference to contracts lately entered into with Clinton Beckwith and with Thomas F. Tuohy & Co., I would say that work will be commenced on the Beckwith contract as soon as specials are delivered, which will be, I am informed, within a week.

The work on the Tuohy contract, I expect, will be started on Monday, April 11. With reference to a change in the route of this work, I have received from Messrs. Tuohy & Co., application for such change without compensation to them, and will transmit the same for your approval. I would recommend that such application be granted, as the change will, I feel, be absolutely necessary, in order to avoid complications.

The order for the painting of standpipes in the Third Ward of this borough has been received by Messrs. Sweeney & Gray, Long Island City, and the work will be commenced as soon as possible.

I would again respectfully call your attention to the necessity of repairing the water main crossing Little Neck creek in the Third ward of this borough. The necessity for this work is very apparent when you consider that there should be a break in the joints of the pipe at this point, it would result in depriving the village of Douglaston of the supply of water at present afforded them.

The repairs necessary to be made at the Corporation Yard, Willow street, Long Island City, are still held in abeyance, owing to the lack of available funds necessary to complete the same.

As to work done by the Engineering Corps in this borough, I would say that it has been engaged in preparing work necessary to the two contracts lately entered into and carrying on the contract for laying water mains under the earlier Clinton Beckwith contract, also in doing other work incidental to this office. I would again ask that the services of a competent Draughtsman be secured, also that at least two Inspectors of Pipe Laying be assigned to work in this borough.

Inclosed you will please find tables showing the amount and kind of work done by the repair gangs in this borough, tables of water pressures in Long Island City, and I also inclose approximate estimate of cost of laying water mains, as suggested by you, from the proposed Thompson avenue main, running northerly from Thompson avenue to Flushing avenue, Astoria.

2—Mechanical Division.

Repairs to the pumping stations which, as formerly reported, were in frightful physical condition, have progressed rapidly during this quarter, and several of the stations are new in excellent repair.

Contracts and specifications have already been prepared for the mechanical work necessary to put these stations in prime condition; in the fall of 1904 specifications for this work will be completed. These contracts include new pumps, additional stacks, etc., and a new well system at station 3 and at the College Point station. The report of the Assistant Engineer in charge of the Mechanical Division covers details of this work.

(C) BOROUGH OF RICHMOND.

1—Pipes and Distribution.

The pipe line in the Amboy road has been practically completed and should be finished during the next quarter. This will extend the service of the Tottenville station as far as Giffords.

2—Mechanical.

New boilers have been installed at the Tottenville station, and specifications for other work for the improvement of this station have been prepared.

Dear Sir—In accordance with the requirements of section 1542 of chapter 378 of the Laws of 1897 (City Charter), I herein submit a report of the transactions of the Bureau of Lamps and Gas for the three months ending March 31, 1904.

Exhibit "A" is a statement showing the amounts expended during the first quarter of the year 1904 for the lighting of public and department buildings, the fitting up, lighting, maintenance, etc., of public lamps and the necessary expenditures of the Bureau of Lamps and Gas.

Exhibit "B" is a summary of the appropriation for lamps and lighting, 1904, showing an expenditure during the quarter of three hundred and eighty-nine thousand three hundred and fifty-seven dollars and sixty-four cents (\$389,357.64), leaving an available balance of one million two hundred and eighty-six thousand two hundred and fifteen dollars and eighty-six cents (\$1,286,215.86), with outstanding liabilities aggregating one thousand dollars (\$1,000).

Exhibit "C" is a summary of the lamp account, showing the number of new lamps lighted, old lamps relighted and lamps discontinued by each gas and electric company during the quarter. A total of 45 new gas lamps, 1 new naphtha lamp, 8 new Welsbach naphtha lamps and 35 electric lamps have been lighted; 687 old gas lamps and 1 old naphtha lamp have been relighted; 892 gas lamps, 22 naphtha lamps, 8 Welsbach naphtha lamps and 26 electric lamps have been discontinued. The total number of lamps lighted March 31, 1904, was 32,080, of which 17,947 were ordinary open flame gas lamps, 5,498 single Welsbach gas lamps, 1,419 naphtha lamps, 854 Welsbach naphtha lamps, 5,290 electric lamps and 1,072 ordinary gas (open flame) lamps lighted as street signs. Besides there are 144 electric street sign lamps on contract, paid for by special appropriation.

Exhibit "D" is a statement showing the candle power of the gases supplied to the city by such of the gas companies as are within reach of our photometric stations.

The following statement will show the average maximum and minimum pressure in the mains of such companies as connect with our photometric stations, as recorded on the pressure registers during the quarter, the average being for the time during which the lamps are required to be kept lighted:

Dear Sir—I herewith hand you quarterly report of public business transacted in this Bureau, and I beg to say briefly that increased activity in the operations of the Bureau is shown by the fact that applications received and permits and certificates issued are 26 per cent. greater than for the first quarter of 1903. The results of continued effort in the direction of wire burial are becoming evident in the increase in subway operations and the decrease in overhead wire permits. In the first quarter of 1904, as compared with the last quarter of 1903, 118 fewer poles were allowed to be erected, 633 fewer permits for the erection of overhead wires were issued, 19 more miles of overhead wires were removed and 11.103 more miles of conductors were placed underground.

Early in the quarter the Water Revenue Budget, which had been made up in August of last year, was revised and forwarded for action by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, and on February 5 the Board considered this Budget and appropriated \$500,000 to partially meet the expenditures from water revenue. The estimates for the Engineer's Bureau was as follows:

## General Condition of the Supply.

The rainfall during the quarter was less than the average rainfall for the corresponding quarter of last year and less than the average yearly rate. A comparatively large amount of this rainfall was lost, the ground being frozen for almost the entire quarter. The run-off during this period was therefore equal to nearly the full amount of the rainfall and very little reached the underground saturated bed, from which we derive a large proportion of our supply.

The driven well stations on the watershed east of Millburn were not run during the quarter, and a large amount of water went to waste from the five supply ponds, the amount from each supply pond being as follows:

Water was drawn from the Hempstead storage reservoir from January 6 to 22, both inclusive; from January 25 to January 29, both inclusive; from February 4 to February 21, both inclusive, and from February 27 to March 5, both inclusive, and the reduction in the amount of storage was 144,171,000 gallons, or equivalent to an average draught of 1,584,297 gallons per day for the entire quarter. The amount in the Hempstead storage reservoir on March 31, 1903, was 809,215,000 gallons, and on the corresponding date of 1904, 599,377,000 gallons, making the amount in storage at present 209,838,000 gallons less than for the corresponding date of last year. This loss in stored water has been mainly due to the abnormal consumption and waste of the months of January and February and the early part of March, caused by long periods of low temperature during this winter. The following table gives the average consumption for the months of January, February and March for 1903 and for 1904, together with the percentage of increase, which shows that the total amount consumed and wasted during the quarter this year was 1,234,733,800 gallons over that for last year, or an average of 13,568,590 gallons per day:

The large increase in consumption and waste caused a lowering in the distribution reservoirs, and complaints were received of reduction in pressure in the city, this reduction being mainly due to the increased frictional losses in the mains delivering the amount necessary to meet the demands during the cold weather. The new trunk lines being laid will give adequate relief from reduction in pressure from this cause, and the large distribution service mains will probably prevent complaint for many years of lack of pressure, except in possibly a few sections. The available supply has been increased during the quarter by putting into operation the Hempstead filter beds on March 12, and by the operation of the Springfield and Baiseley's filters. If, as would seem likely, we should have a year of low rainfall, we will require additional sources of supply to meet the demands made both by the normal increase in the consumption and also by that due to the higher pressure, which will be obtained after the new trunk mains and large distribution mains in the old section of the borough are laid. There is at present under contract the Wantagh infiltration gallery, which will give material relief, but there should be no delay in commencing work on at least two other infiltration galleries, as the water will probably be needed this year and at the latest next year. Our conduit capacity will also prove inadequate to safely meet the increase in consumption, and provision should be made for an increase in the capacity both east and west of Millburn, so that the work can be commenced within the next year. Reference to this will be made in the discussion of the new work.

## Extension of Distribution.

The plan of purchasing pipe from the foundries and then making contracts for hauling and laying the same, together with their appurtenances, has been put into practical operation, and pipe is now being delivered by John Fox & Co. under their contract dated December 23, 1903. Two contracts have been made for laying the pipe to be furnished under this contract, one for laying water mains in nine different streets and avenues, aggregating 1,875 feet of 12-inch pipe, 2,080 feet of 8-inch pipe and 20,950 feet of 6-inch pipe, and for laying mains in sixty-nine streets and avenues, aggregating 1,800 feet of 20-inch pipe, 1,050 feet of 16-inch pipe, 33,300 feet of 12-inch pipe, 22,100 feet of 8-inch pipe and 30,100 feet of 6-inch pipe. Bids have been asked for the first contract and it is expected that the second contract will shortly be advertised. A contract is now in preparation for additional pipe to cover the probable amount of pipe and special castings required during the balance of the year, and small contracts will be made to lay mains in streets, petitions for which have been reported on favorably. During the quarter the following mains and stop-cocks, etc., were laid:

## Removal of Old Pipe.

Mr. M. J. Dady, who has the contract for removing a portion of the old tuberculated pipe in the section of the borough where the mains were laid when the works were originally constructed, has commenced work on Atlantic avenue laying a 30-inch main, and he has a large portion of the material on the ground required to carry out his first contract, dated September 18, 1903. He also has some material on hand for his contract dated January 22, 1904, and expects to commence work in a few days on this contract. The removal and replacing of this old pipe will do more to relieve the present conditions of the water supply for fire purposes in this borough than any other work which has previously been done, as we have sufficient large trunk mains in the lower section of the borough, but our small distribution mains are entirely inadequate and are so badly tuberculated that their effective diameter is only a small fraction of their nominal diameter. Request has been made for an additional appropriation to continue the work of removing the tuberculated pipe, the present contracts covering the removal and replacing in those streets where the new mains are to be 20 inches or larger in diameter. It is to be hoped that this work will be carried on steadily, from year to year, until the entire distribution system is remodeled.

## PUMPING STATIONS.

## Mount Prospect, Gravesend and New Utrecht.

The large increase for the quarter has been due mainly to the low temperature and the consequent waste of water to prevent freezing of service pipes. It has been difficult to meet the demands with the present pumping equipment at the station and it has been impossible to stop No. 5 engine, which supplies the tower, to give this

engine a thorough overhauling. The engine has been in operation since 1898 and has not been thoroughly overhauled during this time. It is hoped that this work can be done during the coming quarter. A contract was prepared and forwarded for a 6,000,000 turbine engine for the Mount Prospect tower service, and as soon as this engine is installed it will provide a much needed relief for both the tower and reservoir services, as it will be so cross-connected that it can be used for either service. The discharge valve diaphragm for engine No. 1 was cracked and has been taken out and replaced by a new diaphragm. The diaphragm on the suction end is also cracked and a new diaphragm has been delivered and is now ready to be placed as soon as the engine can be stopped for sufficient time to allow the new diaphragm to be set. Minor repairs have been made to the other engines and boilers as required.

At the Gravesend and New Utrecht stations the pumping has been somewhat in excess of the pumping of the corresponding quarter in 1903, but these stations are usually run at a constant rate, and as they are cross-connected to the Ridgewood service any deficiency in the supply is made up from that service. Both these stations are in poor condition, but it is expected that the Gravesend station can be remodeled this year and service at the New Utrecht station discontinued.

## Ridgewood.

The high consumption made it necessary to run all the engines, with the exception of the Davidson plant, during the greater part of January and February, and even when some of the engines should have been stopped for repairs. This caused an excessive wear on the engines and it was more especially noticed in the engines of the South Side plant. This plant should be replaced in the near future, as the engines are not economical and require very large expenditures for repairs. Plans are being prepared to place a new engine on the South Side, and upon the completion of this engine the work of replacing the existing engine should be commenced. Early in January the discharge from the triple expansion Worthington engine No. 1 on the North Side dropped off to about one-third and the engine was shut down and the discharge valves replaced, as it was found that these valves were badly worn. Minor repairs have been made on the other engines in the North Side plant. Four of the Morris boilers have been retubed, but there is difficulty experienced from leaks at the tube sheet, and these boilers will have to be remodeled or replaced before long. It is hoped that an appropriation will be made this year to replace the Beam engine and remodel the buildings so as to provide for boiler and engine capacity for the Mount Prospect service and thus do away with that station.

## New Lots.

This station was run to its full capacity to meet the heavy demand during the winter, and the lack of boiler power prevented a complete test being made of the new deep wells at this plant. The tests made so far indicate, however, that there is sufficient supply to warrant the installation of a deep well system.

## Line Stations.

The temporary plant at Spring creek has not been run, the wells being connected to the old plant. A Foster superheater was put on boiler No. 1, which, during the test period, showed a saving of 20 per cent. It will probably be advisable to provide the No. 2 boiler with the same device.

At Shetucket the plant has been only run for eight hours a day, owing to the poor quality of the water when the draft is increased. The plant has been overhauled and is in good shape.

Minor repairs have been made to the machinery at Oconee, Baiseleys, Jameco, Springfield, Forest Stream, Clear Stream, Watts' Pond and Smith's Pond stations. The following work has been done by the driven well gangs on the stations on the old watershed, no work being done on the new watershed:

New Lots—Eight-inch well No. 4 has been put in and work done in arranging for sinking well No. 5.

Spring Creek—Twenty-four 2-inch wells disconnected and washed.

Jameco—Six 8-inch deep wells disconnected, washed, cleaned and reconnected.

Springfield—Nine 8-inch deep wells disconnected, washed, cleaned and reconnected. New 6-inch drop suction placed in the wells, as the old drop suction were corroded.

Clear Stream—Seventy-three 2-inch wells disconnected, washed and reconnected.

At the Millburn station one of the new engines has been in operation for practically the entire time and the new boilers have also been in use.

Practically no repairs have been made on the five driven well stations on the new watershed, but the wells at these stations will have to be overhauled this spring.

## Ponds, Conduits and Reservoirs.

The general work of patrolling and cleaning the streams on the watershed has been attended to as usual, but the force of men employed on the line has not been sufficient to keep the fences, banks, etc., in good condition. Additional men should be appointed for this work and the appearance of our conduit line improved. The heavy rainfall of February 21 and 22, on frozen ground, caused a backing up of the water at a number of our culverts, and it may be necessary to eventually enlarge these culverts. This work would be very expensive, however, and probably should not be done until the chances of damage from flooding are greater than at present.

The total cost of this work during the quarter was \$1,017.25.

On February 26 Assistant Engineer W. B. Osterhout was put temporarily in charge of the work on ponds and conduit, replacing Assistant Engineer Geo. S. Skilton, who has had temporary charge of this work and who was assigned elsewhere. On March 26 Girdell V. Brower was temporarily assigned to take charge of the work on ponds and conduit, replacing Mr. Osterhout.

## Protection from Pollution.

A party is at present engaged in making surveys of the plots of land where the greatest danger from pollution exists, and a map will be prepared covering the land which can be purchased under the present appropriation. These surveys will be continued so that we will have detailed maps of all the land which it is expected to purchase. It is to be regretted that owing to the pressure of the work under existing contracts, the surveys cannot be conducted with greater speed.

## Filter Plants at Baiseleys and Springfield.

The test of the Springfield plant showed that it complied with all the contract requirements, and is at present in use and giving excellent results. There was some difficulty with the bacterial results of the Baiseleys plant, but the plant is now in daily use, and the results show a very high percentage of bacterial removal.

## Water Analyses.

During the quarter there have been 1,962 samples of the Brooklyn water analyzed, and the total number of analyses of all the boroughs made at the Mount Prospect laboratory has been 2,507. Besides this work the following examinations and analyses have been made:

The turbidity, free ammonia and bacteria are considerably higher than for the same quarter last year, and this has been due to the heavy rainfalls on the frozen ground, washing a large amount of soil with the surface impurities into the supply.

#### Infiltration Galleries.

No work has been done on the Wantagh infiltration gallery on account of the delay in obtaining possession of the necessary land. As soon as the latter is acquired the work will be commenced, and it is hoped that this gallery will be completed in the summer.

No action has been taken towards advertising for bids on the Massapequa gallery on account of the delay in acquiring the land.

#### Filter Beds.

Two filter beds below the Hempstead storage reservoir were completed at the beginning of the quarter, but the water from Horse brook was not turned into them until 11 a. m. on March 12, as the frost made it inadvisable to attempt using the beds. The beds are being run at a slow rate until the regulating weirs have been constructed at the outlet. This work will be done by our own men. The bacterial results from the beds have been very good.

Work has been carried on slowly on the Forest stream filter bed by Mr. Isaac Harris, but the severe winter weather prevented any efficient work. The cleaning of both the upper and lower ponds has been practically completed and the contractor is working on the excavation at the filter beds.

#### New 48-Inch Trunk Main.

Work was stopped on the 48-inch trunk main on December 24, 1903, and recommenced on March 23. The contractor has now practically all his pipe, specials, gates, etc., on the ground and is going to work both from Myrtle avenue and Cypress avenue and from Broadway and Park avenue. Under these conditions the work should be completed during the next quarter.

#### 48-Inch Force Main.

The contractor, John J. Cashman, stopped pipe laying on December 31, 1903, and shut down the entire work on January 4, 1904. At that time the pipe line had been laid from the Ridgewood station to a point just west of the Manhattan crossing of the Long Island Railroad. He commenced work again on March 28, 1904. It is not likely that this contract will be completed before the middle of the summer.

#### Removal of 48-Inch Main on Atlantic Avenue.

The laying of the 36-inch main on Atlantic avenue, from Carlton avenue to Fourth avenue, to replace the 48-inch main which has to be removed on account of the Atlantic avenue tunnel, was practically completed in December. The contractor, however, was not allowed to cut out the 48-inch main during the winter and this work will probably be done in April. At the same time it will be advisable to place two additional gates on the 48-inch main between Fourth avenue and Clinton street so as to divide this main into sections of about three blocks each. The comparatively large number of connections which will be made with this main by Mr. M. J. Dady, under his contracts for removing and relaying pipe, makes it necessary to prevent the shutting off of any long section of the main in case of a break either in the main or in the connections.

#### Engines and Boilers for Millburn Pumping Station.

Both engines at the Millburn station are practically completed, but the contractor is not ready as yet for the official test. The boilers have been in service and have shown good steam capacity. Preliminary tests were run on these boilers on January 6, 12, 19 and 20, and the results indicated that a change in the grate area would be advisable. The contractor made such change in the west boiler, and the final test of this boiler was run on March 21, 22 and 25. The report from the expert in charge of the test has not yet been received.

#### Additional Pipe Yard.

The Department has at present one yard for receiving and storing pipe and special castings used in the distribution system. This yard is situated at the head of the Gowanus canal and is not at all centrally located for the territory which is to be covered in the near future by new mains. It would be economical to obtain an additional yard located probably on Gravesend Bay, where the pipe and special castings could be received by boat and hauled from that point to the streets and avenues in which they are to be laid. This yard could also be used as a repair yard for that district and do away with the Coney Island repair yard, which is situated at a considerable distance from the centre of the territory which has to be covered by the repair gangs of this yard.

#### High Pressure Fire Service.

On January 26 I reported favorably on the proposition to establish a high pressure fire service station at Coney Island, and on February 27 submitted a preliminary report on the high pressure service for the congested section of the borough. This report was followed by the final report on March 14, in which it was recommended that a high pressure service be installed in the following districts:

1. Coney Island district, covering the ocean front from West Fifth to West Seventeenth street, a distance of approximately 3,000 feet. The area protected would be 147 acres.

2. Dry Goods and High Office Building district, bounded by Fort Greene place on the east, the river front on the west, Orange and Tillary streets on the north and Dean street and Atlantic avenue on the south. The area protected is about 575 acres.

3. Lower River Front district, which was divided into two parts, the southerly portion being bounded by Richards, Wolcott, Dwight, Columbia streets, Hamilton avenue, Hicks, Rapelyea, Henry, Harrison, Clinton streets and Atlantic avenue, and the northern section bounded by Tillary and Navy streets, East river, Doughty, Hicks, Orange and Washington streets. The area of the southerly section is about 500 acres, and of the northerly section 345 acres, making the total area protected 845 acres.

It was also deemed advisable to extend the protection around the river front to North Fourteenth street extending back about to Berry street, but it was not considered by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment advisable to grant an appropriation for this section at the present time.

In the Coney Island district provision was made for a maximum pumping of 3,600 gallons per minute at a pressure at the engines of 150 pounds, this being equivalent to a pressure at the hydrant of about 140 pounds. For the other districts provision was made for a main station with a capacity of 14,000 gallons per minute at a pressure of 300 pounds. The minimum hydrant pressure will be about 225 pounds.

The charges for the buildings, engines, etc., and for operating expenses have been included under the Dry Goods and High Office Building district.

The annual charges for the Coney Island district are reduced on account of the station being located adjoining the Sewage Disposal Plant, and the employees of this plant would attend to the operation of the station.

The plans have been approved and the appropriation granted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment. As soon as favorable action is taken by the Board of Aldermen the contracts can be advertised, and it is to be hoped that work may be commenced during the coming Summer.



## New Work.

We have at present appropriations for the Massapequa infiltration gallery, additional driven well station or infiltration gallery, remodeling of Gravesend and Millburn reservoir repairs. No contracts have been let for the first three items, owing to the difficulty in obtaining the necessary land. The repairs to the Millburn reservoir have been delayed, as there has been some question in the past of the advisability of having these repairs carried out.

In compliance with the directions of the Commissioner, I prepared and forwarded to you on March 22 a schedule of the appropriations required for new work which would be needed in 1904. The items of this schedule, mentioned in their order of precedence, were as follows:

While this covered the most urgent work, there is additional work which will be needed in the near future and for which provision should be made next year. This work includes an additional conduit, which it will probably be advisable to construct so that it can be utilized to pump the water directly from the stations on the island into the Ridgewood reservoir. This can be very readily accomplished at the infiltration galleries by installing permanent pumping plants, designed to pump against the head necessary to force the water into Ridgewood reservoir. Additional infiltration gallery stations will be required to keep the supply equal to the demand, and the work of replacing existing tuberculated mains should be continued until the mains in the older section of the City has been entirely replaced.

## Lawsuits.

Surveys were made of seven properties located along the Freeport creek, where the owners had brought suit for the diversion of fresh water along the tidal creek. These cases, together with one other, will probably be tried early in the coming quarter.

Surveys were also made of the I. H. Clothier property at Wantagh, this property covering an acreage of about 571 acres. It was expected this suit would be tried during the past quarter, but it has not yet been reached. A survey of a small plot (11 A ±) near the Hempstead storage reservoir, where the owner claimed damage from the flooding of his lands, was also made.

This work necessitates rather frequent attendance on the part of our men at court and interferes to some extent with the regular work of the office.

## Records.

An effort has been made during the quarter to bring the records up to date while the force was available on account of the suspension of outside work during the winter months. The accumulation of back records, which had to be straightened out, prevented this work being completed, but good progress was made. We have a large number of records in connection with our routine work, as well as with our new work, and the necessity of employing practically our entire force on outside work makes it impossible to keep these records up to date. We, therefore, during the winter months, have to attempt to make our records for the entire year.

## Office Room.

Your attention has been called to and you have had occasion to realize the crowded condition of our offices. The space is entirely inadequate to the requirements, and, as a result, there is not only much personal discomfort, but the work is done at great disadvantage and with much waste of time and labor, the men having to be often interrupted at their desks in order to utilize their space, as emergencies arise. This is true not only of the Assistant Engineers' and Draughtsmen's rooms, but of the rooms occupied by the Chief Engineer's Stenographer and Clerks in the lower floor. I trust that you will take the necessary steps to secure the additional space so urgently needed in order to promote the efficiency of the work.

Dear Sir—I herewith hand you quarterly report of public business from January 1 to March 31, 1904. The following brief statement of special work done by this Bureau for the quarter ending March 31, 1904, is also submitted:

Cut out 343 feet of 6-inch water main, which was frozen solid and split, and replaced same with new pipe.

Lowered 356 feet of 6-inch water main to make same conform to the new grade of street.

Laid 816 feet of new 6-inch water main. All this work was done with great difficulty, owing to the extreme cold and severe weather at that season of the year.

The men of the repair yards were kept extremely busy thawing out fire hydrants, water mains and service pipes, and in many instances were obliged to work nights and on Sundays.

The number of permits issued to plumbers during the above period increased over 50 per cent., thus increasing the work of the Inspectors.

## BELLEVUE AND ALLIED HOSPITALS.

A regular meeting of the Board of Trustees of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals was held in the staff room of Bellevue Hospital on Wednesday, December 27, 1905: Present—Dr. Brannan, the President, in the chair; Messrs. Tack, Robbins, Tierney, Sachs, Paulding, Trustees.

The following bills were presented for payment, and, on motion, duly seconded, it was

Dr. S. T. Armstrong, the General Medical Superintendent, reported as follows: The attorney for the owners of the premises occupied by Harlem Hospital offers to renew the lease at an annual rental of \$7,500, either party having the right to terminate the lease upon giving sixty days' notice. This is as fair an arrangement as can be made, and it is recommended that the matter be referred to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund.

The desirability of installing a vacuum cleaning plant in Bellevue Hospital is submitted for consideration. An eight-sweeper plant can be installed for \$6,750, and the apparatus can be used in the new hospital. If this system is installed, it is believed that a less number of Scrub Women will be needed and that the cleaning will be better.

Authority is requested to obtain estimates on waxing the floors of certain wards in the hospital, at a total expenditure not to exceed \$900.

Authority is requested to have the wall of the general kitchen painted. This work can be done for less than \$300. Proper racks for holding utensils and tables for keeping the food warm are also needed in the general kitchen and can be purchased at \$233.

Three storm doors are needed and can be erected at about \$500. Authority is requested to proceed with this work.

Resolved, That the recommendation of the General Medical Superintendent concerning a renewal of the lease of Harlem Hospital at an annual rental of \$7,500, either party having the right to terminate the lease upon sixty days' notice, be and the same is hereby approved; further

Resolved, That the Sinking Fund Commission be requested to renew this lease on the terms mentioned.

Resolved, That the matter of installing a sweeping plant in Bellevue Hospital be laid over for further consideration.

On motion, duly seconded, it was

Resolved, That the matter of waxing the floors of certain wards in Bellevue Hospital be deferred.

Resolved, That the matter of painting the wall of the general kitchen be and the same is hereby referred to the President, with power.

On motion, duly seconded, it was

Resolved, That authority be given the General Medical Superintendent to purchase racks for holding kitchen utensils and tables for keeping the food warm in the general kitchen at a cost not to exceed \$233.

On motion, duly seconded, it was

Resolved, That authority be given the General Medical Superintendent to erect three storm doors at Bellevue Hospital, at a cost not to exceed \$500.

Fourth—That our first partial and separate report herein will be presented for confirmation to the Supreme Court of the State of New York, Second Department, at a Special Term thereof, for the hearing of motions to be held in the County Court House in the Borough of Brooklyn, in The City of New York, on the 12th day of March, 1906, at the opening of the Court on that day.

##### GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately. The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there.
