The Honorable Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Gentlemen—On September 13, 1909, the President of the Borough of The Bronx addressed a communication to your Board, which at the meeting held September 17, 1909, was referred to a Select Committee consisting of the Comptroller and the President of the Board of Aldermen for consideration. In connection therewith we submit the following report:

The President states that in September, 1907, the salary of John Hanan, a Clerk employed in the Bureau of Buildings, Borough of The Bronx, was fixed at \$2,700 per annum, and from that time received compensation at such rate until August 1, 1909, when an examination made in the Department of Finance disclosed the fact that the grade at \$2,700 had never been fixed pursuant to section 56 of the Greater New York Charter as amended.

The President has stated that the character of service rendered by Mr. Hanan is such as to justify the rate of compensation which he has received up to August 1, and the omission in not having applied for the establishment of the grade is an oversight which he now desires to rectify.

In view of the facts, we respectfully recommend that the request be approved.

The Honorable Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Gentlemen—In the matter of a request made by the President of the Borough of Manhattan, that the Foreman and Assistant Foreman on the payrolls of his Department be changed from a per diem to a per annum wage, which was referred to me for consideration, I submit the following:

It is my opinion that the question of changing per diem employees to a per annum basis should not be confined to any one department, but that all city employees paid a per diem wage should be considered, to determine the actual increased cost such action would mean to the City.

A report showing the number of per diem men in all the City offices and departments, giving the number of days each worked during the previous year, or a general average paid to each class of labor, would necessitate an examination of the weekly payrolls of a number of the City departments for one year, which, owing to the rush in my department caused by the labor necessary in preparing the Budget for the year 1910, I have been unable to make.

From an examination made in the office of the President of the Borough of Manhattan I find that in 1908, after deducting Sundays, holidays and inclement weather, the average amount earned by the Foreman and Assistant Foreman was much below the allowance made for their services in the Budget of that year.

I submit below a statement showing the effect such a change as contemplated would have had upon the payrolls for the Bureau of Highways, under the jurisdiction of the President of Manhattan, for the year 1908, using only the Foreman and Assistant Foreman as a basis:

This shows an increased cost to the City of about 25 per cent., but it is only applicable to the Bureau of Highways, as in the Bureau of Buildings and the Bureau of Sewers the per diem employees generally work the full number of days provided for.

The Foreman and Assistants in the Bureau of Highways are giving the City valuable services at a moderate wage, and it is, in my opinion, only fair that the City should pay them upon a per annum basis, for they are called upon by night as well as by day in cases of emergency, and in an emergency case inclement weather is not used as an excuse to lay them off.

In view of these facts I would recommend favorable consideration of this matter, and recommend that the Foreman and Assistant Foreman in the Bureau of Highways, Borough of Manhattan, be paid upon a per annum basis, their yearly compensation to be fixed by allowing them 300 working days at their present per diem rate.

Gentlemen—At the meeting of your Board held May 7, 1909, there was referred to this Committee a request from the Commissioner of the Department of Docks and Ferries, dated May 5, 1909, for the establishment of an additional grade of the position of Assistant Engineer in the said department at \$2,700 per annum. As stated in the Commissioner's communication, the grades now existing for the position of Assistant Engineer are as follows: \$1,500, \$1,800, \$2,100, \$2,400, \$3,000 and \$4,000. It is desired to have created an intermediate grade of \$2,700 so as to permit of promotions, when justified, from the \$2,400 grade without advancing the salary of incumbents \$600 a year all at one time. As this would seem to be a reasonable request, we would recommend its approval.

In the past six years Mr. Sweet has received no increase in salary from his present salary of \$1,800 per annum. It is the purpose of the Armory Board to increase Mr. Sweet's salary from \$1,800 per annum to \$2,100 per annum. To this end your committee requests that you recommend to the Board of Aldermen the establishment of the additional grade of position of Stenographer and Typewriter to the Armory Board at \$2,100 per annum as per resolution hereto attached.

Hon. PATRICK F. MCGOWAN, President, Board of Aldermen, City Hall:

Dear Sir—The connecting of lateral mains with the large distributing pipes is now done without having to shut off the supply of water or reduce the pressure in the main pipe, thereby avoiding any inconvenience to the consumer and the danger of placing hydrants out of commission.

The purchase of the machines which are employed on this work has already been authorized by the Board of Aldermen. The sleeve with valve attached, which is set in position by the same machine which does the boring, is specially constructed to fit the machine and is of standard sizes to conform to the pipe dimensions. The cutters and extensions which are used on each particular job are also necessary to complete the outfit.

It is impossible to draft specifications which would permit of competitive bidding for these supplies and in consequence I would respectfully ask that the Honorable Board of Aldermen empower me to purchase these sleeves and valves, cutters, extension pipes, etc., to an amount not exceeding \$7,500.

In announcing the death of Mr. O'Donohue, the President, said:
It is my sad duty to call you together this morning to announce the death of one of our members, Mr. Thomas J. O'Donohue, who died at Red Bank, N. J., on Tuesday last, of typhoid fever. He was apparently in very good health all summer, and his loss is a great shock to the community and to all of us. Mr. O'Donohue was one of our public-spirited citizens. He was connected with a great many of the charities of New York City and educational activities outside of this Board, and his death will be a great loss. He became a member of the Board of Education in January, 1906, and served as a member of the Committee on Supplies for three years, as a member of the Committee on Sites for two years, and on the Committee on Finance for one year. This year he was a member of the Committee on Vocational Schools and Industrial Training and of the Executive Committee on the Nautical School. Mr. O'Donohue was always very attentive to his duties here, and I feel that we have lost one of our active members. His death is a great loss to the Department and to the City.

The funeral services will be held to-morrow, at 10.30 o'clock, at St. Patrick's Cathedral, and I am requested to announce that seats will be provided for all the members of the Board of Education who can attend.

Mr. Barrett said:
Mr. President—As you so well stated, it is our sad duty here this morning to take action in relation to our late colleague. Once again within a very short period of time the hand of death has claimed one of our members. For quite a long time Colonel O'Donohue was a member of the Committee on Supplies, and there we had learned to love and admire him because of his zeal for his work, his fearlessness and his impartiality. He probably was even better known outside of educational circles for his charitable work; he was ever ready to help the poor and the unfortunate and the distressed; and so great was his interest in that particular line of work that it consumed a great deal of his zeal and took up a great deal of his time. He also was conspicuous as a citizen, at times taking a very prominent part in civic affairs, and always bringing to bear those qualities of loyalty and truthfulness and high-mindedness which are so essential in this City, and for which many of its sons are renowned. I offer, Mr. President, the following resolution:

Resolved, That a special committee of three be appointed by the President to prepare appropriate resolutions in reference to the death of our colleague Hon. Thomas J. O'Donohue, and present the same at the next meeting of the Board of Education.

The resolution was seconded by Mr. Cunliffe.
The President put the question whether the Board would adopt the resolution offered by Mr. Barrett, and it was decided in the affirmative by a unanimous vote.

The President thereupon appointed Messrs. Barrett, Aldcroft and Greene as the committee provided for in the resolution.

Mr. Barrett moved that the Secretary of the Board be designated to attend the funeral of Hon. Thomas J. O'Donohue as the official representative of the Board of Education.

The motion was seconded and adopted.

The Board thereupon adjourned.



Beginning at a point on the prolongation of a line midway between Essex street and Shepherd avenue, where it is intersected by a line distant 100 feet northerly from and parallel with the northerly line of Jamaica avenue, the said distance being measured at right angles to Jamaica avenue, and running thence eastwardly along the said line parallel with Jamaica avenue to the intersection with the prolongation of a line midway between Hale avenue and Norwood avenue; thence southwardly along the said line midway between Hale avenue and Norwood avenue, and along the prolongation of the said line, to the intersection with a line distant 100 feet northerly from the northerly line of Esna street, the said distance being measured at right angles to Esna street; thence eastwardly and always distant 100 feet northerly from and parallel with the northerly line of Esna street to the intersection with a line midway between Norwood avenue and Logan street; thence southwardly along the said line, midway between Norwood avenue and Logan street, to the intersection with a line distant 100 feet northerly from the northerly line of Ridgewood avenue, the said distance being measured at right angles to Ridgewood avenue; thence eastwardly and parallel with Ridgewood avenue to the intersection with a line midway between Logan street and Richmond street; thence southwardly along the said line midway between Logan street and Richmond street, to the intersection with a line distant 100 feet northerly from the northerly line of Dinmore place, the said distance being measured at right angles to Dinmore place; thence eastwardly and parallel with Dinmore place and the prolongation thereof to the intersection with a line distant 100 feet easterly from the easterly line of Chestnut street, the said distance being measured at right angles to Chestnut street; thence southwardly and parallel with Chestnut street to the intersection with the prolongation of a line distant 100 feet southerly from and parallel with the southerly line of Dinmore place, the said distance being measured at right angles to Dinmore place; thence westwardly along the said line parallel with Dinmore place, and along the prolongations of the said line, to the intersection with a line midway between Norwood avenue and Logan street; thence northwardly along the said line midway between Norwood avenue and Logan street to the intersection with a line distant 100 feet southerly from the southerly line of Fulton street, the said distance being measured at right

angles to Fulton street; thence westwardly and always distant 100 feet southerly from and parallel with the southerly line of Fulton street to the intersection with a line midway between Hale avenue and Norwood avenue; thence northwardly along the said line midway between Hale avenue and Norwood avenue to the intersection with a line distant 100 feet southerly from the southerly line of Ridgewood avenue, the said distance being measured at right angles to Ridgewood avenue; thence westwardly and always distant 100 feet southerly from and parallel with the southerly line of Ridgewood avenue to the intersection with a line midway between Shepherd avenue and Dresden avenue; thence northwardly along the said line midway between Shepherd avenue and Dresden avenue to the intersection with a line distant 100 feet southerly from the southerly line of Jamaica avenue, the said distance being measured at right angles to Jamaica avenue; thence westwardly and parallel with Jamaica avenue to the intersection with a line parallel with Shepherd avenue and passing through the point of beginning; thence northwardly along the said line parallel with Shepherd avenue to the point or place of beginning.

Resolved, That this Board consider the proposed area of assessment at a meeting of the Board to be held in The City of New York, Borough of Manhattan, in the City Hall, on the 5th day of November, 1909, at 10.30 a. m., and that at the same time and place a public hearing thereon will then and there be had.

Franchise Matters.

PUBLIC NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that at the meeting of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment held this day, the following proceedings were had:

Whereas, The New York and Queens County Railway Company has, under date of April 14, 1908, made application to this Board for a grant of the right, privilege and franchise to construct, maintain and operate an extension to its existing street surface railway system, beginning and connecting with the tracks of the company in Jackson avenue, opposite the Queensboro Bridge plaza, in the Borough of Queens; thence in and upon the Queensboro Bridge plaza to the easterly bridge approach to the Queensboro Bridge; thence upon and along said approach and across intersecting streets and avenues to the Queensboro Bridge; thence upon and along the Queensboro Bridge to the westerly approach; thence upon and along said westerly bridge approach to the westerly terminus thereof at Second avenue, in the Borough of Manhattan; and

Whereas, Section 92 of the Railroad Law, and sections 72, 73 and 74 of the Greater New York Charter, as amended by chapters 629 and 630 of the Laws of 1905, provide for the manner and procedure of making such grants; and

Whereas, In pursuance of such laws, this Board adopted a resolution on May 1, 1908, fixing the date for a public hearing thereon as June 12, 1908, at which citizens were entitled to appear and be heard, and publication was made for at least fourteen days in the Long Island City "Daily Star" and the Flushing "Evening Journal," newspapers designated by the Mayor, and in the City Record for ten days immediately prior to the date of hearing, and the public hearing was duly had on such date; and

Whereas, At the meeting of this Board held September 17, 1909, the Select Committee to whom the matter had been referred submitted a report recommending certain amendments in the form of contract previously presented, and the Chief Engineer was thereupon directed to prepare a contract in accordance with such recommendations, which amended contract was presented to this Board September 24, 1909; and

Whereas, This Board has made inquiry as to the money value of the franchise or right applied for, and proposed to be granted to the New York and Queens County Railway Company, and the adequacy of the compensation proposed to be paid therefor; now therefore it is

Resolved, That the following form of the resolution for the grant of the franchise or right applied for by the New York and Queens County Railway Company, containing the form of proposed contract for the grant of such franchise or right, be hereby introduced and entered in the minutes of this Board, as follows, to wit:

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment hereby grants to the New York and Queens County Railway Company the franchise or right fully set out and described in the following form of proposed contract for the grant thereof, embodying all of the terms and conditions, including the provisions as to rates, fares and charges upon and subject to the terms and conditions in said proposed form of contract contained, and that the Mayor of The City of New York be and he hereby is authorized to execute and deliver such contract in the name and on behalf of The City of New York, as follows, to wit:

Proposed Form of Contract.

This contract, made this day of 1909, by and between The City of New York (hereinafter called the City), party of the first part, by the Mayor of said City, acting for and in the name of said City, under and in pursuance of the authority of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of said City (hereinafter called the Board), and the New York and Queens County Railway Company (hereinafter called the Company), party of the second part, witnesseth:

In consideration of the mutual covenants and agreements herein contained, the parties hereto do hereby covenant and agree, as follows:

Section 1. The City hereby grants to the Company, subject to the conditions and provisions hereinafter set forth, the right and privilege to operate passenger cars, upon two tracks only, upon and across the Queensboro (Blackwells Island) Bridge, as an extension to its existing lines in the Borough of Queens, upon the following route, to wit:

Beginning and connecting with the tracks of the Company in Jackson avenue, opposite the Queensboro Bridge plaza, in the Borough of Queens; thence in and upon the Queensboro Bridge plaza to the easterly approach to the Queensboro Bridge; thence upon and along said approach and across intersecting streets and avenues to the Queensboro Bridge; thence upon and along the Queensboro Bridge to the westerly bridge approach; thence upon and along said westerly bridge approach to the westerly terminus thereof at Second avenue, in the Borough of Manhattan, all in The City of New York.

Sec. 2. The grant of this right or privilege is subject to the following conditions, which shall be complied with by the Company:

First—The said right and privilege shall be held and enjoyed by the Company for a term of ten (10) years from the date upon which this contract is signed by the Mayor, and may continue for a further term not exceeding in any case fifteen (15) years, which further term shall

be terminable at the option of the Board at any time during the said fifteen (15) years, upon six months' notice by the Board to the Company.

Second—The Company shall pay to the City for the privilege hereby granted the following sums of money:

(a) The sum of two thousand five hundred dollars (\$2,500) in cash within thirty days after the date on which this contract is signed by the Mayor, and before anything is done in exercise of the privilege hereby granted.

(b) During the first term of five years an annual sum which shall in no case be less than one thousand two hundred dollars (\$1,200), and which shall be equal to three (3) per cent. of its gross annual receipts, if such percentage shall exceed the sum of one thousand two hundred dollars (\$1,200).

During the second term of five years an annual sum which shall in no case be less than two thousand two hundred dollars (\$2,200), and which shall be equal to five (5) per cent. of its gross annual receipts if such percentage shall exceed the sum of two thousand two hundred dollars (\$2,200).

During the third term of five years, or during such portion of said term as this contract shall be in force, an annual sum which shall in no case be less than two thousand four hundred dollars (\$2,400), and which shall be equal to five (5) per cent. of its gross annual receipts, if such percentage shall exceed the sum of two thousand four hundred dollars (\$2,400).

During the fourth term of five years, or during such portion of said term as this contract shall be in force, an annual sum which shall in no case be less than two thousand six hundred and seventy-five dollars (\$2,675), and which shall be equal to five (5) per cent. of its gross annual receipts, if such percentage shall exceed the sum of two thousand six hundred and seventy-five dollars (\$2,675).

During the remaining term of five years, or during such portion of said term as this contract shall be in force, an annual sum which shall in no case be less than two thousand nine hundred dollars (\$2,900), and which shall be equal to five (5) per cent. of its gross annual receipts, if such percentage shall exceed the sum of two thousand nine hundred dollars (\$2,900).

The gross receipts mentioned above shall be that portion of the gross earnings of the Company from all sources as shall bear the same proportion to such gross earnings as the length of the route hereby authorized shall bear to the entire length of the railway of the Company in operation.

The payment of such minimum sums shall begin from the day on which this contract is signed by the Mayor.

(c) For the use of the bridge structure and approaches thereto, the sum of five cents for each round trip, or the sum of two and one-half cents for each single trip of each and every car operated upon the bridge.

The number of such cars shall be certified by the Commissioner of Bridges to the Comptroller once each month, in such form as shall be designated by the Comptroller.

(d) For the use of the tracks owned by the City upon the bridge and approaches, a sum equal to four (4) per cent. per annum upon the valuation of thirty thousand dollars (\$30,000) per mile of single track used—provided, however, that if such tracks are used by any other company or companies, then the Company shall pay only such portion of such four (4) per cent. per annum upon the cost thereof as shall be proportionate to the use of such tracks by the Company. The Commissioner of Bridges shall compute the sums due the City for the use of such tracks and certify the same to the Comptroller.

(e) For the use of terminal loops and other terminal facilities which are the property of the City a sum equal to four (4) per cent. upon the cost of the tracks in the terminals, and all overhead equipment necessary for the operation of the cars, provided, however, that if such terminal loops and other terminal facilities are used by any other company or companies, then the Company shall pay only such portion of four (4) per cent. per annum upon the cost thereof as shall be proportionate to the use of such facilities by the Company.

The Commissioner of Bridges shall compute the sums due the City for the use of such terminal facilities and overhead equipment; and certify the same to the Comptroller.

All such sums as above shall be paid into the treasury of the City on November 1 of each year and shall be for the amount due to September 30 next preceding.

Whenever the percentage required to be paid shall exceed the minimum amount as above, such sum over and above such minimum shall be paid on or before November 1 in each year for the year ending September 30 next preceding. The fiscal year shall end on September 30 next preceding said date of payment, and provisions of the Railroad Law, as it now exists or as it may hereafter be amended, relating to the matter of payments and statements of percentages of gross receipts of street railway companies not inconsistent with this contract shall be strictly complied with.

Any and all payments to be made by the terms of this contract to the City by the Company, except the payment of three (3) per cent. of the gross receipts during the first five years of the contract, and five (5) per cent. of the same thereafter, shall not be considered in any manner in the nature of a tax, but such payments shall be made in full and free of all taxes of whatsoever kind or description now or hereafter required to be paid by any ordinance of the City, or any law of the State of New York.

Third—The annual charges or payments shall continue throughout the whole term of this contract, whether original or renewal, notwithstanding any clause in any statute or in the charter of any other railway or railroad company providing for payment for railway or railroad rights or franchises at a different rate, and no assignment, lease or sublease of the rights or privileges hereby granted, whether original or renewal, or of any part thereof, or of the route mentioned herein, or of any part thereof, shall be valid or effectual for any purpose unless the said assignment, lease or sublease shall contain a covenant on the part of the assignee or lessee that the same is subject to all the conditions of this contract and that the assignee or lessee assumes and will be bound by all of said conditions, and especially said conditions as to payments, anything in any statute or in the charter of such assignee or lessee to the contrary notwithstanding, and that the said assignee or lessee waives any more favorable conditions created by such statute or its charter, and that it will not claim by reason thereof or otherwise exemption from liability to perform each and all of the conditions of this contract.

Fourth—The rights and privileges hereby granted shall not be assigned, either in whole or in part, or leased or sublet in any manner, nor shall title thereto, or right, interest or property therein, pass to or vest in any person or corporation whatsoever, either by the act of the Company or by operation of law, whether under the provisions of the statutes relating to the consolidation or merger of corporations, or otherwise, without the consent of the City, acting by the Board, evidenced by an instrument under seal, anything herein contained to the contrary thereof in anywise notwithstanding, and the granting, giving or waiving of any one or more of such consents shall not render unnecessary any subsequent consent or consents.

Fifth—The Company shall use only such tracks and terminal facilities as shall be assigned to the Company by the Commissioner of Bridges, and nothing in this contract shall be deemed to affect in any way the right of the City to grant to any individual or other corporation a similar right or privilege upon the same or other terms and conditions, or to affect the right of the Commissioner of Bridges to assign the same or other tracks and terminal facilities to such individual or other corporation.

Such tracks, terminal facilities and all electrical equipment necessary for the operation of cars thereon shall be installed at the expense of the City, and shall remain the property of the City, but the Company shall pay the cost of keeping and maintaining such tracks and electrical equipment in good order and repair, and in such manner as shall be approved and directed by the Commissioner of Bridges, and shall furnish all motive power required by the Commissioner of Bridges for the operation of its cars. If deemed necessary by the Commissioner of Bridges, the Company shall install and operate a system of signals to insure the safe and efficient operation of cars; such system to be approved by the Commissioner of Bridges. In the event of any necessity for changing the layout of tracks, curves, switches, sidings or platforms on the bridge in order to facilitate operation of cars by the Company, said Company must do all the work and furnish all the labor and tools necessary for effecting such changes, which shall all be made under the control and direction of the Commissioner of Bridges, and no such changes, or construction connected therewith, or relating thereto, shall be made unless the plan or plans for the same have been first submitted to the Commissioner of Bridges and approved by him. If, however, the tracks, terminal facilities, electrical equipment or signal system are used by any other company or companies, and should any change in the layout of such tracks, curves, switches, sidings or equipment be made necessary while used by any other company, then, and in that event, the Company shall bear only that proportion of the cost of such signal system and the cost of making such changes in the layout of the tracks, curves, switches, sidings or platforms as the use of such track, electrical equipment and signal system by the Company shall bear to the entire use of such appliances.

Sixth—Before beginning the operation of cars the Company shall file with the Commissioner of Bridges a statement for his approval and assent as to the type of car which it proposes to operate, and a sketch showing clearance dimensions, weight on axles and wheel spacing, or such other information as may be required by said Commissioner. All cars operated over the bridge by the Company, and all equipment and appliances relating to such operation shall be subject at all times to the inspection of the Commissioner of Bridges or his authorized representatives, who shall have power to forbid the entrance to the bridge of cars which may for any reason be unsatisfactory, and who shall have power to direct the removal of any old or inadequate appliance and the substitution thereof of appliances of approved character.

Said Commissioner may adopt rules and regulations in regard to the number of cars to be operated over the bridge, the rate of speed of said cars, the movement of headway thereof, the type and weight of cars to be used and the condition thereof, the switching of cars and the use of platforms and the control of the electrical current used by the Company, and the said Commissioner may alter and amend any such rules and regulations so as to secure the safety and comfort of persons using the bridge and preserve the purposes for which the bridge was constructed, and upon serving notice upon the Company that such rules and regulations have been made, amended or altered, the Company shall comply with all the requirements thereof.

Seventh—A sufficient number of cars from the lines of the Company operated in the Borough of Queens shall at all times be operated across the bridge to accommodate passengers desiring to ride upon such cars. Nothing in this contract shall be construed as permitting the Company to operate local bridge cars back and forth upon the bridge between the bridge plaza in the Borough of Queens and the bridge approach in the Borough of Manhattan.

Eighth—The rate of fare for any passenger upon said railway shall not exceed five (5) cents, and the Company shall not charge any passenger more than five (5) cents for one continuous ride from any point on said railway or line or branch operated in connection therewith to any point thereof, or of any connecting line or branch thereof within the limits of the City.

The Company shall carry free upon the railway hereby authorized during the term of this contract all members of the Police and Fire Departments of the City when such employees are in full uniform, and shall carry free upon the bridge and its approaches such employees of the Department of Bridges as may be designated by the Commissioner of Bridges.

Ninth—All cars operated on said railway shall be well lighted by electricity or by some lighting system equally efficient, or as may be required by resolution of the Board.

Tenth—All cars which are operated on said railway shall be heated during the cold weather, in conformity with such laws and ordinances as are now in force or may hereafter, during the term of this contract, be enacted or adopted by the State or City authorities, or as may be required by resolution of the Board.

Eleventh—The Company shall at all times keep accurate books of account of the gross earnings from all sources, and shall, on or before November 1 of each year, make a verified report to the Comptroller of the City of the business done by the Company for the year ending September 30 next preceding, in such form as he may prescribe. Such report shall contain a statement of such gross earnings, the total miles in operation and the total miles of railway constructed and operated under this contract, and such other information as the Comptroller may require. The Comptroller shall have access to all books of the Company for the purpose of ascertaining the correctness of its report, and may examine its officers under oath.

Twelfth—In case of any violation or breach or failure to comply with any of the provisions herein contained, this contract may be forfeited by a suit brought by the Corporation Counsel, or on notice of ten (10) days to the Company, or at the option of the Board by resolution of said Board, which said resolution may contain a provision to the effect that the railway constructed and in use by virtue of this contract shall thereupon become the property of the City without proceedings at law or equity.

Provided, however, that such action by the Board shall not be taken until the Board shall give notice to the Company to appear before it on a certain day, not less than ten (10) days after the date of such notice, to show cause why such resolution declaring the contract forfeited should not be adopted. In case the Company fails to appear, action may be taken by the Board forthwith.

Thirteenth—Nothing in this contract shall be deemed to affect in any way the right of the Commissioner of Bridges to make any alterations or changes in the construction, operation or management of the bridge, or to affect in any way the control of such Commissioner over such bridge, as provided by the Charter of the City.

Fourteenth—If the Company shall fail to give efficient public service at the rates herein fixed, or shall fail to maintain the structures and equipment, as herein provided, in good condition throughout the whole term of this contract, the Board may give notice to the Company, specifying any default on the part of the Company and requiring the Company to remedy the same within a reasonable time, and upon failure of the Company to remedy such default within a reasonable time, the Company shall, for each day thereafter during which the default or defect remains, pay to the City the sum of two hundred and fifty dollars (\$250), as fixed or liquidated damages; or the Board, in case such structures or equipment shall not be put in good condition within a reasonable time, after notice by the Board as aforesaid, shall have the right to make all the needed repairs at the expense of the Company, in which case the Company shall pay to the City the amount of the cost of such repairs, with legal interest thereon, all of which sums may be deducted from the fund hereinafter provided for.

Fifteenth—The Company shall assume all liability to persons or property by reason of the construction or operation of the railway authorized by this contract, and it is a condition of this contract that the City shall assume no liability whatsoever to either persons or property on account of the same, and the Company hereby agrees to repay to the City any damage which the City shall be compelled to pay by reason of any acts or default of the Company.

Sixteenth—This grant is upon the express condition that the Company, within thirty (30) days after the signing of this contract by the Mayor, and before anything is done in exercise of the rights conferred hereby, shall deposit with the Comptroller of the City of New York the sum of five thousand dollars (\$5,000), either in money or securities to be approved by him, which fund shall be security for the performance by the Company of all of the terms and conditions of this contract, especially those which relate to the payment of the annual charges for the privilege hereby granted, the efficiency of the public service rendered, and the repair and maintenance of tracks and equipment upon the bridge, and in case of default in the performance by the Company of such terms and conditions the City shall have the right to cause the work to be done and the materials to be furnished for the performance thereof, after due notice, and shall collect the reasonable cost thereof from the said fund without legal proceedings; or, after default in the payment of the annual charges, shall collect the same, with interest, from the said fund after ten (10) days' notice in writing to the Company; or, in case of failure to keep the said terms and conditions of this contract relating to the rules and regulations made by the Commissioner of Bridges and the heating and lighting of cars, the Company shall pay a penalty of fifty dollars (\$50) per day for each day of violation, and the further sum of ten dollars (\$10) per day for each car that shall not be properly heated or lighted in case of the violation of the provisions relating to those matters.

The procedure for the imposition and collection of the penalties in this contract shall be as follows:

The Board, on complaint made, shall give notice to the Company, directing its president, or other officer, to appear before the Board on a certain day not less than ten (10) days after the date of such notice, to show cause why it should not be penalized in accordance with the foregoing provisions. If the Company fails to make an appearance, or, after a hearing, appears, in the judgment of the Board, to be in fault, said Board shall forthwith impose the prescribed penalty, or, where the amount of the penalty is not prescribed herein, such amount as appears to the Board to be just, and, without legal procedure, direct the Comptroller to withdraw the amount of such penalty from the security fund deposited with him. In case of any drafts made upon the security fund, the Company shall, upon ten (10) days' notice in writing, pay to the City a sum sufficient to restore said security fund to the original amount of five thousand dollars (\$5,000), and in default thereof this contract shall be canceled and annulled at the option of the Board, acting in behalf of the City. No action or proceeding or right under the provisions of this contract shall affect any other legal rights, remedies or causes of action belonging to the City.

Seventeenth—The words "notice" or "direction," wherever used in this contract, shall be deemed to mean a written notice or direction. Every such notice or direction to be served upon the Company shall be delivered at such office in the City as shall have been designated by the Company, or if no such office shall have been designated or if such designation shall have for any reason become inoperative, shall be mailed in the City postage prepaid, addressed to the Company at the City Delivery or mailing of such notice or direction as and when above provided shall be equivalent to direct personal notice or direction and shall be deemed to have been given at the time of delivery or mailing.

Eighteenth—If at any time the powers of the Board or any other of the authorities herein mentioned, or intended to be mentioned, shall be transferred by law to any other Board, authority, officer or officers, then and in such case such other Board, authority, officer or officers shall have all the powers, rights and duties herein reserved to or prescribed for the Board or other authorities, officer or officers.

Sec. 3. Nothing in this contract shall be construed as in any way limiting the present or future jurisdiction of the Public Service Commission under the laws of the State of New York.

Sec. 4. This grant is also upon the further and express condition that the provisions of the Railroad Law applicable thereto shall be strictly complied with by the Company.

Sec. 5. The Company promises, covenants and agrees on its part and behalf to conform to and abide by and perform all the terms, conditions and requirements in this contract fixed and contained.

In witness whereof the party of the first part, by its Mayor, thereunto duly authorized by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of said City has caused the corporate name of said City to be hereunto signed and the corporate seal of said City to be hereunto affixed; and the party of the second part, by its officers, thereunto duly authorized, has caused its corporate seal to be hereunto signed and its corporate seal to be hereunto affixed, the day and year first above written.
