BOARD OF ESTIMATE AND APPORTIONMENT.

Minutes of Meeting of Board of Estimate and Apportionment, Held in Room 16, City Hall, Thursday, October 19, 1911.

FINANCIAL AND FRANCHISE MATTERS.

The Board met in pursuance of an adjournment.

Present—William J. Gaynor, Mayor; William A. Prendergast, Comptroller; John Purroy Mitchel, President, Board of Aldermen; George McAneny, President, Borough of Manhattan; Alfred E. Steers, President, Borough of Brooklyn; Cyrus C. Miller, President, Borough of The Bronx; Maurice E. Connolly, President, Borough of Queens, and George Cromwell, President, Borough of Richmond.

The President of the Board of Aldermen, Hon John Purroy Mitchel, presided at the request of his Honor, the Mayor.

After disposing of the Public Improvements Calendar, the following Financial and Franchise Matters were considered:

The minutes (Financial and Franchise Matters) of the meeting held October 11, 1911, were approved as printed in the City Record October 18, 1911.

FRANCHISE MATTERS.

Rapid Transit Railways.

Revocation of Fifty-Ninth Street-Queensboro Bridge Route, and Adoption of Fifty-Ninth Street, Woodside and Astoria Route, and the Roosevelt Avenue Route.

The Secretary presented the following:

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of The City of New York:

The Public Service Commission for the First District on July 17, 1911, transmitted to your Board for your approval and the approval of the Mayor of the City as required by law certified copies of resolutions adopted by it on July 14, 1911, determining and establishing a route and general plan of construction for an additional rapid transit railroad in the Boroughs of Manhattan and Queens to be known as the Fifty-ninth Street-Queensboro Bridge Route, or Route No. 36.

The Commission is informed that these resolutions were received by your Board at a meeting held on July 20, 1911, and at a subsequent meeting held on July 27, 1911, were referred to your Franchise Committee. Section 5 of the Rapid Transit Act provides that within sixty days after a copy of the routes and general plans of construction for a new rapid transit railroad or railroads adopted by the Commission shall have first been received by your Board, a final vote shall be taken thereon, by ayes and nays, according to the number of votes by law pertaining to each member of the Board, in the form of a vote upon a resolution to approve the same and to consent to the construction of a railroad or railroads in accordance therewith. As more than sixty days have elapsed since July 20, 1911, and no final vote has been taken by your Board upon the resolutions of the Commission establishing the said Fifty-ninth Street-Queensboro Bridge Route, and as the Commission furthermore deems it advisable to include within one route the lines embraced within the said Fifty-ninth Street-Queensboro Bridge Route as well as certain extensions of those lines in the Borough of Queens, the Commission, acting pursuant to the provisions of Section 26 of the Rapid Transit Act, by resolutions adopted on this date, has rescinded and revoked its resolutions of July 14, 1911, adopting said Fifty-ninth Street-Queensboro Bridge Route, and in lieu thereof has adopted a new route to be known as the Fifty-ninth Street, Woodside and Astoria Route, or Route No. 36, which includes not only the connection between the proposed line under Broadway and Seventh avenue in Manhattan and the Borough of Queens, by means of the Queensboro Bridge, provided by the former route, but also two extensions in Queens, one running from the Queensboro Bridge Plaza along the Queens Boulevard Viaduct, Thompson avenue, Greenpoint avenue and Skillman avenue to a point near Woodside avenue, and the other running from the Queensboro Bridge Plaza along Jackson avenue and Second (formerly Debevoise) avenue to Ditmars avenue. The Commission has also, by resolutions adopted on this date, established a new route to be known as the Roosevelt Avenue Route, or Route No. 37, extending from the terminus of the Woodside branch of the Fifty-ninth Street, Woodside and Astoria Route, near Woodside avenue, along the proposed Roosevelt avenue to Prime street, near Flushing. Certified copies of the resolutions establishing these two new routes are herewith transmitted to you for your approval and the approval of the Mayor of the City, as required by law.

The lines embraced in these new routes are all included among those recommended for construction in the report dated June 5, 1911, of the Select Committee of your Board and of the members of the Commission, which report was later approved by your Board.

These new routes, like the former Fifty-ninth Street-Queensboro Bridge Route, besides meeting the all-important need of putting Queens on an all-rail through connection with Manhattan, will furnish additional crosstown facilities for the district in and around Fifty-ninth Street. In addition, however, they will furnish needed transportation facilities for Astoria and for Woodside, Corona and Flushing. The necessity of these routes is therefore so apparent that the Commission does not deem it necessary to enlarge upon its reasons for adopting them.

FINANCIAL MATTERS.

The following transfer of appropriation was made upon the recommendation of the Comptroller:

\$100 within the appropriation made to the office of the Public Administrator, New York County, for the year 1911.

To the Honorable, The Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Gentlemen—In the Budget of 1911 I was allowed by your Board three hundred dollars (\$300) for General Supplies, and three hundred dollars (\$300) for Contingencies. I have had to pay out from the three hundred dollars allowed as contingencies the sum of two hundred thirty-three dollars and eighty-eight cents (\$233.88) to date. I will need \$166 more, and therefore request the transfer of \$100. As I have sufficient funds in General Supplies for the balance of the year, I beg to request the transfer from General Supplies, Code No. 2019, to Contingencies, Code No. 2020, of one hundred dollars (\$100).

Gentlemen—On September 6, 1911, the Public Administrator of the County of

New York requested a transfer of \$100 from the General Supply to the Contingency account in his office for the year 1911.

Gentlemen—Request is hereby made that the Budget Schedule Lines, supporting the salaries appropriations as made to the Department of Finance for the year 1911, be modified, in order to provide for the following changes:

1. For the transfer of a Clerk at \$1,050 from the Auditing Bureau to the Executive Division.
2. For the transfer of an Assistant Engineer at \$3,600 from the Auditing Bureau to the Bureau of Municipal Investigation and Statistics.
3. For the promotion of an Examiner of Accounts of Institutions from \$1,650 to \$2,100.
4. For the promotion of a Clerk at \$750 to the position of Bookkeeper, salary \$1,050, and transfer from Executive Division to Auditing Bureau.
5. For the promotion of Clerks in the Bureau of Municipal Investigation and Statistics as follows:
 - 1 from \$1,800 to \$2,100.
 - 1 from 1,350 to 1,500.
 - 1 from 600 to 750.
6. For abolishing one position of Expert Accountant in the Bureau of Municipal Investigation and Statistics at \$4,000, and establishing one additional position in the said Bureau at \$2,500.
7. For abolishing two positions of Stenographer and Typewriter at \$750 each, in the Bureau of Municipal Investigation and Statistics, the said positions being vacant.

9. For the promotion of the Clerk in Charge of the Record Room from \$1,650 to \$1,800.
10. For abolishing one position of Clerk at \$750 and one position of Stenographer and Typewriter at \$750, now vacant, in the Executive Division.
11. For the promotion of two Messengers, both of whom have been in the service of the Department for over thirteen years, from \$1,350 to \$1,500 each.
12. For abolishing one position of Searcher at \$1,050 in "Revenue."
13. For the promotion of a Bookkeeper from \$1,950 to \$2,100 per annum in the Awards Division.
14. For the promotion of a Financial Clerk in the Office of the City Paymaster from \$1,500 to \$1,650.
15. For abolishing one position of Clerk at \$2,400, now vacant in the City Paymaster's office, and establishing one position at \$1,500 and one at \$1,050.
16. For changing "Balance Unassigned" from \$460 to \$10, in the Executive Division; \$50 to \$1,250, in the Auditing Bureau, and from \$360 to \$660, in "Revenue."

Gentlemen—In behalf of the Committee on New Sources of City Revenue, I

acknowledge receipt of a copy of a resolution adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on October 5, 1911, requesting the Committee to submit to your Board forthwith such statements, facts and recommendations respecting ways and means to increase the revenues of the City as it may be prepared to make.

The Committee at the inception of its labors deemed it necessary to collect and collate information affecting not only existing sources of revenue in the City of New York, but also similar information in regard to other important cities in the United States and foreign countries. A large mass of such information has already been collected, and the entire data will soon be at hand, but the statistics and reports from other cities have not been digested by the Committee, nor is it at present prepared to make any definite report thereon.

The information obtained is of course at the service of the Board of Estimate, but it is not believed that the members of the Budget Committee would be able, within the short time at their disposal, to reach conclusions therefrom which would be of utility in connection with the framing of the Budget for 1912. Unless, therefore, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment desires to have laid before it the information obtained, in its present shape, it is hoped that additional time will be afforded the Committee.

The Secretary presented communications relative to retirements (chapter 669 of the Laws of 1911) as follows:

From the Commissioner of Parks, Boroughs of Manhattan and Richmond, transmitting application of John J. Odell, Chief Bookkeeper of the Department of Parks, Boroughs of Manhattan and Richmond, for retirement, and recommending said retirement on an annual sum or annuity of \$1,400, representing one-half of his annual compensation;

From the Commissioner of Public Charities requesting that John McCarthy, pilot in the Department of Public Charities, at a salary of \$1,350 per annum, be retired; Which were referred to the Committee on Salaries and Grades, consisting of the Comptroller and the President of the Board of Aldermen.

The Secretary presented communications (2) from the South Brooklyn Board of Trade and the Broadway Men's Club of Flushing, Borough of Queens, endorsing the petition of the firemen and engineers of steamers of the Fire Department, for increases in salaries.

Which was referred to the Committee on Standardization of Salaries and Grades, consisting of the Comptroller, the President of the Borough of Manhattan, and the President of the Borough of Brooklyn.

The Secretary presented a report of the Committee, consisting of the Comptroller and the Chief Engineer of the Board, to whom was referred on October 21, 1910, a communication from the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, relative to the acquisition of private water companies, in which he recommended that a special appropriation be made to conduct an investigation to determine the value of the private companies, etc., and a communication from the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, referring to the above report.

Which was laid over four weeks—November 16, 1911.

(On July 6, July 13, and again July 20, 1911, the above matter was laid over for one week, and on July 27, 1911, was laid over until the fall.)

(On September 21, 1911, the matter was laid over for four weeks.)

The Secretary presented the following report of the Comptroller, recommending that the resolution adopted June 1, 1911, relative to the acquisition of a plot of land, with the buildings and improvements thereon on the easterly side of Pennsylvania avenue, 280 feet southerly from the corner formed by the intersection of the southerly side of Liberty avenue with the easterly side of Pennsylvania avenue, Brooklyn, as a site for school purposes, at a price not exceeding \$12,000, be amended, so as to provide for the acquisition of said property by condemnation proceedings, as an examination of the title to these premises discloses the fact that there are restrictive covenants against the property as well as an outstanding title:

City of New York, Department of Finance, Comptroller's Office, October 13, 1911.

To the Honorable the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Gentlemen—Under date of June 1, 1911, your Board adopted a resolution approving of the acquisition of a plot of land, with the buildings and improvements thereon, on the easterly side of Pennsylvania avenue distant 280 feet southerly from the corner formed by the intersection of the southerly side of Liberty avenue with the easterly side of Pennsylvania avenue; running thence easterly and parallel with Liberty avenue, 110 feet; thence southerly and parallel with Pennsylvania avenue, 51 feet 3 inches; thence westerly and again parallel with Liberty avenue, 110 feet to the easterly side of Pennsylvania avenue; thence northerly along the easterly side of Pennsylvania avenue, 51 feet 3 inches to the point or place of beginning; said property being in the Borough of Brooklyn, for use of the Department of Education, and the Comptroller was authorized to enter into contract for the acquisition of the same at private sale, at a price not exceeding \$12,000.

An examination of the title to these premises discloses the fact that there are restrictive covenants against the property, as well as an outstanding title.

This property is required as a school site. One of the adjoining pieces has been purchased at private sale, and another adjoining piece is in condemnation.

In view of these facts, I respectfully recommend that the resolution adopted by your Board on June 1, 1911, providing for the acquisition of the above-mentioned site at private sale, be amended so as to provide for acquisition of the same by condemnation proceedings. I transmit herewith a resolution providing therefor.

Gentlemen—On June 29, 1911, the Commissioner of Parks, Boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens, requested approval of plans, specifications and estimate of cost, in the sum of \$49,885, for the erection of the first part of laboratory building and greenhouses for the Brooklyn Botanic Garden. On September 20, 1911, an amended request was made increasing the estimate of cost to \$52,035.

The increase is stated to be on account of an amendment in the contract and plans by the Architects, whereby a permanent instead of a temporary heating plant is to be installed.

The complete designs for the improvement of the Botanic Garden include the construction of a main laboratory building about 240 feet long by 50 to 70 feet in width, and four greenhouses with a central pavilion, and heating appliances, etc. The estimated cost of the entire improvement is \$250,000.

The plans now submitted provide for the erection of the southerly end of the main building and one of the greenhouses, with permanent boilers and chimney for the heating system.

The proposed expenditure is to be paid from corporate stock issues approved by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, as follows:

To the Board of Education:

The Committee on Finance respectfully reports that the Committee on Supplies has presented to it the following communication:

New York, June 9, 1911

To the Committee on Finance:

Gentlemen—The Committee on Supplies respectfully requests that you present a report at the meeting of the Board of Education to be held on the 14th inst. requesting an issue of special revenue bonds sufficient to enable the Committee on Supplies to complete the furnishing of all necessary supplies to the schools for the current year. The following appeared in the Budget Estimate as presented by your Committee for the year 1911:

"After looking into each detail carefully, it has been decided to attempt to carry on the schools, as now in operation, with the same amount for the year 1911 as was appropriated for the year 1910. It is necessary, however, to request additional funds for increased register during 1911, and for the enlargement of special activities enumerated above."

The supplies furnished to the schools during the years 1907, 1908, 1909 and 1910, under the closest supervision, amounted to the following:

The extra amount asked for in the Budget for 1911, for all new activities, including new pupils, represented \$139,467.57. The Committee on Supplies is of the opinion that this amount should be allowed, in the best interests of the children.

The Committee was given to understand that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment would not allow funds for the extension of new activities such as workshops, kitchens and kindergartens, etc. Allowing for this disposition of the matter, it is obviously necessary to secure a minimum of \$100,000 in order that the schools may be adequately supplied.

During the years 1908 and 1909 the principals seemed to be fairly well satisfied with the amounts allowed, although we did not furnish all the supplies demanded. It is a fact that we curtailed extra appropriations and supplies for the year 1908 aggregating \$54,939.70; for the year 1909 \$49,892.42; for the year 1910 \$57,754.22.

In explanation of the decreased volume of supplies furnished to the schools for 1910, as compared with each of the two previous years, the Committee wishes to state that it realized that the funds available were limited, and therefore an arbitrary cut of \$57,457.90 was made.

Besides this, we reduced requisitions and refused requests for extra moneys aggregating \$57,764.22.

So that when you take the actual deliveries to the schools, the arbitrary cut, and the amount of supplies and applications for additional funds refused, you will see that the amount for 1910 would be in excess of each of the two previous years if we had given the schools all they demanded.

This proves that every care was taken by the Committee on Supplies to keep the Budget of 1911 down to the lowest point. You are, therefore, urged to ask the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for at least \$100,000, so that we may be able to give the schools an adequate quantity of supplies.

The Committee would have liked to ask for a much larger appropriation for 1911, so as to have some money available to purchase stock at the end of the year, in order that there might be no difficulty in furnishing the schools for the February promotions (because contracts are not approved until after the first of the year and there must necessarily be delay in supplying the schools on account of this fact); but the Committee was reluctant to ask for an enlarged appropriation for this purpose when the Budget for 1911 was being prepared, although it now sees that it would have been wise to have done so.

NICHOLAS J. BARRETT, Chairman of the Committee on Supplies.

The statement above is self-explanatory, and this Committee recommends that a request be made for the issuance of special revenue bonds for the required purposes.

The President of the Board of Education and Chairman of the Committee on Finance have consulted with the Comptroller in regard to this matter, and it is understood that the request will receive favorable attention.

The following resolution is submitted for adoption:

Resolved, That the Board of Aldermen be, and it is hereby, respectfully requested to adopt a resolution requesting the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to authorize the issue of special revenue bonds to the amount of one hundred thousand dollars (\$100,000), pursuant to the provisions of subdivision 8 of section 188 of the Revised Charter, for the purpose of replenishing the Supplies Account for the current year; and that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment be, and it is hereby respectfully requested to authorize such issue upon the request of the Board of Aldermen.

Department of Finance, City of New York, Bureau of Municipal Investigation and Statistics, October 17, 1911.

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Gentlemen—On October 3, 1911, the Board of Aldermen requested the issue of special revenue bonds to the amount of seventy-five thousand dollars, the proceeds whereof to be used by the Board of Education for the purpose of replenishing the General Supplies account for 1911. My report on the matter is as follows:

For schools in operation at the time the estimate for 1911 was prepared, the Board of Education requested \$973,000, which sum was the same as the allowance for the year preceding. For increased attendance during the current year an additional sum of \$139,467.57 was requested, but disallowed. The stock on hand January 1, 1911, was \$138,917.56, which sum, together with the \$973,000 allowed in the Budget, made a total amount of \$1,111,917.56 available for the current year, as against \$1,161,185.77 consumed during 1910, and \$1,218,754.56 consumed during 1909. The average amount consumed during 1907, 1908, 1909 and 1910 aggregates \$1,189,306.22, or \$79,388.66 in excess of the total amount available for the current year.

It is therefore evident that a substantial deficit exists in this account at the present time, especially when the growth of the system is taken into consideration. Mr. Patrick Jones, Superintendent of School Supplies, states that he has at the present time \$50,000 worth of requisitions which he is unable to fill, and that unless the fund is replenished as proposed, he will have no stock on hand at the opening of next year. This would seriously interfere with the work of the schools, as goods could not be purchased after the 1912 appropriation became available and delivered in time for the opening of the new term in February.

Therefore, I recommend that the request hereinbefore mentioned be granted and that special revenue bonds in the sum of \$75,000 be authorized at this time by the adoption of the resolution attached hereto. Respectfully,

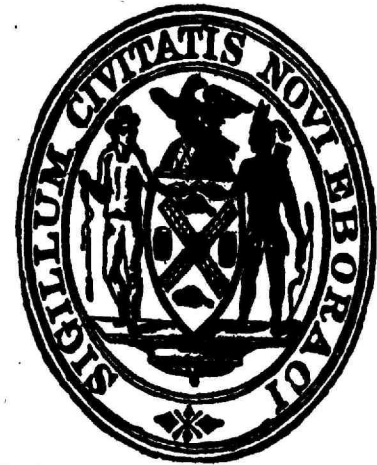

If in any case the annual rate shall not be fixed prior to the termination of the original term of this contract, then the Company shall pay the annual rate thereafter prevailing until the new rate shall be determined, and shall then make up to the City the amount of any excess of the annual rate then determined over the previous annual rate. The compensation and expenses of the said appraisers shall be borne jointly by the City and the Company each paying one-half thereof.

Third—The Company shall pay to the City for the privilege hereby granted the following sums of money:

(a) The sum of two thousand five hundred dollars (\$2,500) in cash on or before the date on which operation over any portion of the route hereby authorized is commenced.

(b) During the first term of five (5) years an annual sum which shall in no case be less than one thousand dollars (\$1,000), and which shall be equal to three (3) per cent. of its gross annual receipts if such percentage shall exceed the sum of one thousand dollars (\$1,000).

During the second term of five (5) years an annual sum which shall in no case be less than seventeen hundred dollars (\$1,700) and which shall be equal to five (5) per cent. of its gross annual receipts, if such percentage shall exceed the sum of seventeen hundred dollars (\$1,700).

During the remaining term expiring March 1, 1924, an annual sum which shall in no case be less than nineteen hundred dollars (\$1,900), and which shall be equal to five (5) per cent. of its gross annual receipts if such percentage shall exceed the sum of nineteen hundred dollars (\$1,900).

The gross annual receipts mentioned above shall be that portion of the gross receipts of the Company from all sources within the limits of the City as shall bear the same proportion to its whole gross receipts as the length of the extension hereby authorized shall bear to the entire length of the railway of the Company in operation within the limits of the City.

The annual charges shall commence from the date upon which this contract is signed by the Mayor.

(c) For the use of the Washington Bridge and its approaches during the term expiring March 1, 1914, an annual sum of one thousand dollars (\$1,000); during the succeeding term of five (5) years expiring March 1, 1919, an annual sum of one thousand two hundred and fifty dollars (\$1,250); and during the remaining term of five (5) years expiring March 1, 1924, an annual sum of one thousand five hundred dollars (\$1,500). The compensation herein reserved shall commence from the date on which this contract is signed by the Mayor.

All annual charges as above shall be paid into the treasury of the City on November 1 of each year and shall be for the amount due to September 30 next preceding. Provided that the first annual payment shall be only for that proportion of the first annual charge as the time between the date upon which this contract is signed by the Mayor and September 30 following shall bear to the whole of one year.

Whenever the percentage required to be paid shall exceed the minimum amount as above, then such sum over and above such minimum shall be paid on or before November 1 in each year for the year ending September 30 next preceding.

The annual charges herein provided are intended to include the percentages of gross receipts now required to be paid by railway companies to the City pursuant to the Railroad Law as amended, and such charges as are required under chapter 340 of the Laws of 1892 to be paid by the Company for this extension if said act applies to or controls the Company in relation to the right and privilege hereby granted.

The City does not and shall not demand or require the payment by the Company of a percentage of gross receipts under the provisions of chapter 340 of the Laws of 1892 on the gross receipts earned on the extension constructed pursuant to this contract.

Any and all payments to be made by the terms of this contract to the City by the Company, shall not be considered in any manner in the nature of a tax, but such payments shall be made in addition to any and all taxes of whatever kind or description, now or hereafter required to be paid by any ordinance of the City, or resolution of the Board, or any law of the State of New York.

Fourth—The annual charges or payments shall continue throughout the whole term of this contract (whether original or renewal), notwithstanding any clause in any statute or in the charter of any other railway or railroad company providing for payment for railway or railroad rights or franchises at a different rate, and no assignment, lease or sublease of the rights or privileges hereby granted (whether original or renewal), or of any part thereof, or of any of the routes mentioned herein, or of any part thereof, shall be valid or effectual for any purpose unless the said assignment, lease or sublease shall contain a covenant on the part of the assignee or lessee that the same is subject to all the conditions of this contract; and that the assignee or lessee assumes and will be bound by all of said conditions, and especially said conditions as to payments, anything in any statute or in the charter of such assignee or lessee to the contrary notwithstanding; and that the said assignee or lessee waives any more favorable conditions created by such statute or its charter, and that it will not claim by reason thereof or otherwise exemption from liability to perform each and all of the conditions of this contract.

Fifth—Nothing in this contract shall be deemed to affect in any way the right of the City to grant to any individual or other corporation a similar right or privilege, upon the same or other terms and conditions, over the route hereinbefore described.

The use of the railway constructed by the Company under this contract, including the tracks, wires and other equipment, or any structures used in connection therewith, in streets and avenues hereinbefore described, shall be permitted by the Company to any individual or corporation to which the City may have granted, or may hereafter grant, the right or privilege to use such streets and avenues for street railway purposes, upon payment of an annual sum by such individual or corporation to the Company which shall equal the legal interest on such proportion of the actual cost of the construction of such railway and structures, and additions and betterments thereto, as the number of cars operated by such individual or corporation shall bear to the number of cars operated by the companies then using the same; and also such proportion of the cost of keeping the tracks and electrical equipment in repair, and the cost of additions and betterments thereto, such proportion of laying and repairing of pavement and removal of snow and ice, and all other duties imposed upon the Company by the terms of this contract in connection with the maintenance or the operation of said railway so used, as the number of cars operated by such individual or corporation shall bear to the number of cars operated by the companies then using the same, together with the actual cost of the power necessary for the

operation of the cars thereon of such individual or corporation. Provided, however, that if, in the opinion of the Company, the legal rate of interest upon the cost of such railway shall be an insufficient sum to be paid for the use of such tracks, it may appeal to the Board and the Board may fix a percentage upon the cost to be paid to the Company, at a sum in excess of the legal rate of interest, if, in its opinion, such action is justified.

The Company shall not at any time oppose but shall upon the request of the Board, consent to the construction or operation of any street surface railway which may necessitate the use of any portion of the railway which shall be constructed by the Company, pursuant to this contract.

Sixth—The rights and privileges hereby granted shall not be assigned, either in whole or in part, or leased or sublet in any manner, nor shall the title thereto, or right, interest or property therein, pass to or vest in any other person or corporation whatsoever, either by the act of the Company, or by operation of law, whether under the provisions of the statutes relating to the consolidation or merger of corporations or otherwise, without the consent and approval of the Board, evidenced by an instrument under seal, anything herein contained to the contrary thereof in anywise notwithstanding, and the granting, giving or waiving of any one or more of such consents shall not render unnecessary any subsequent consent or consents.

Seventh—Upon the termination of this original contract, or if the same be renewed, then at the termination of the said renewal term, or upon the termination of the rights hereby granted for any cause, or upon the dissolution of the Company before such termination, the tracks and equipments of the Company constructed, pursuant to this contract, within the streets and avenues and upon the bridge shall become the property of the City without cost, and the same may be used or disposed of by the City for any purpose whatsoever, or the same may be leased to any company or individual.

If, however, at the termination of this contract as above, the Board shall so order by resolution, the Company shall, upon thirty (30) days' notice from the Board, remove any and all of its tracks and other equipment constructed pursuant to this contract and the said streets and avenues and bridge shall be restored to their original condition at the sole cost and expense of the Company.

Eighth—The Company shall commence construction of the railway hereby authorized within three (3) months from the date upon which the consents of the property owners are filed with the Board or from the date of the order of the Appellate Division of the Supreme Court, made pursuant to section 174 of the Railroad Law, confirming the determination of the Commissioners appointed thereunder that such railway ought to be constructed, and shall complete the construction and place the same in full operation within six (6) months from the date of filing such consents or the date of such order, otherwise this right shall cease and determine, and all sums paid, and the sum of two thousand dollars (\$2,000) deposited with the Comptroller of the City, as hereinafter provided, shall thereupon be forfeited to the City; provided that the period for commencement and the period for completion and placing the railway in full operation may be extended by the Board, but the total extension of time for either of such periods shall not exceed in the aggregate six (6) months; and provided further that when the commencement or completion of said construction shall be prevented by legal proceedings in any Court, or by works of public improvement, or from other causes not within the control of the Company, the time for the commencement or completion of such construction may be extended for the period of such prevention, but no delay shall be allowed for unless the Court proceedings shall be diligently prosecuted by the Company, and provided further, that in no case shall such delay be deemed to begin until the Company shall have given written notice to the Board of any such Court proceedings or other occasion of delay, and deliver to the Board copies of any injunction or other orders, and the papers upon which the same shall have been granted, and unless upon the request of the Board the Company shall, in writing, consent that the Board, either in its own name as a party or in the name of the City as a party, may intervene in any such proceedings.

Ninth—Said railway shall be constructed and operated in the latest approved manner of street railway construction and operation, and it is hereby agreed that the Board may require the Company to improve or add to the railway equipment, including rolling stock and railway appliances, from time to time, as such additions and improvements are necessary, in the opinion of the Board. Upon failure on the part of the Company to comply with the direction of the Board within a reasonable time, the rights hereby granted shall cease and determine.

Tenth—Said railway shall be constructed, maintained and operated subject to the supervision and control of all the authorities of the City who have jurisdiction in such matters, as provided by the Charter of the City.

No construction upon said railway shall be commenced until written permits have been obtained from the proper City officials. In any permits so issued such officials may also impose such conditions, as a condition of the granting of the same, as are necessary for the purpose of protecting any structures in the streets and avenues and upon the bridge, over which such officials have jurisdiction and the Company shall comply with such conditions. The electrical equipment to be installed by the Company for the operation of the railway within the limits of the City, whether the same be upon streets and avenues, or upon the bridge and its approaches, or upon private property, shall be constructed and maintained under the supervision and control of the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity.

Eleventh—Said railway may be operated by overhead electric power substantially similar to the overhead electric system now in use by street surface railways in the Borough of The Bronx, or by any other motive power, except locomotive steam power or horse power, which may be approved by the Board, and consented to by the abutting property owners, in accordance with the provisions of law, and by the Public Service Commission for the First District of the State of New York.

Provided, however, that the Board, upon giving to the Company one (1) year's notice, may require the Company to operate its railway upon the whole or upon any portion of the route herein authorized to be constructed, except upon the Washington Bridge structure, by underground electric power substantially similar to the system now in use on the street surface railways in the Borough of Manhattan, or upon the whole or any portion of said route by any other practical motive power then in use which does not require the use of poles and overhead wires in the streets and avenues and upon the bridge and its approaches, and thereupon to discontinue the use of the overhead trolley system, and to remove its poles, wires and other structures used by it for that purpose from the streets, avenues and bridge of the City upon said route.

Twelfth—Upon six (6) months' notice by the Board to the Company, all wires for the transmission of power, except trolley wires, for the operation of the railway, upon all or any portion of the route hereby authorized, shall be placed in conduits beneath or alongside of the railway. The Company shall provide in such conduits two

(2) ducts not less than three (3) inches in diameter for the exclusive use of the City. Such ducts shall be used only by the Company for the operation of its railway and by the City, as above.

Thirteenth—The rate of fare for any passenger upon said railway shall not exceed five (5) cents and the Company shall not charge any passenger more than five (5) cents for one continuous ride, from any point on its road or on any road, line or branch operated by it or under its control to any other point thereof, or any connecting branch thereof within the limits of the City.

The Company shall carry free upon the railway hereby authorized during the term of this contract all members of the Police and Fire Departments of the City, when such employees are in full uniform.

Fourteenth—No cars shall be operated upon the railway hereby authorized, other than passenger cars and cars necessary for the repair or maintenance of the railway, and no freight cars shall be operated upon the tracks of said railway.

Fifteenth—The Company shall attach to each car run over the said railway proper fenders and wheel guards, in conformity with such laws and ordinances as are now in force, or may hereafter, during the term of this contract, be enacted or adopted by the State or City authorities, or as may be required by resolution of the Board.

Sixteenth—All cars which are operated on said railway shall be heated during the cold weather, in conformity with such laws and ordinances as are now in force, or may hereafter, during the term of this contract, be enacted or adopted by the State or City authorities, or as may be required by resolution of the Board.

Seventeenth—All cars operated on said railway shall be well lighted by electricity, or by some lighting system equally efficient, or as may be required by resolution of the Board.

Eighteenth—Cars on the said railway shall run at intervals of not more than thirty (30) minutes both day and night, and as much oftener as reasonable convenience of the public may require, or as may be directed by the Board.

Nineteenth—The Company, so long as it shall continue to use any of the tracks upon the streets and avenues or bridge in or upon which said railway shall be constructed, shall cause to be watered at least three (3) times every twenty-four (24) hours when the temperature is above thirty-five (35) degrees Fahrenheit, the entire width of the streets, avenues and bridge, except when the width of such streets, avenues and bridge shall exceed sixty (60) feet between curb lines, in which case the Company shall cause to be watered only sixty (60) feet in width of such roadway, and the Company shall provide for such purpose at least one tank car, the capacity of which shall be sufficient to water such streets, avenues and bridge in a satisfactory manner.

Twentieth—The Company shall at all times keep the streets, avenues and bridge, upon which the said railway is constructed, between its tracks, the rails of its tracks and for a distance of two (2) feet beyond the rails, on either side thereof, free and clear from ice and snow provided, however, that the Company shall, at the option of the Commissioner of Street Cleaning, enter into an agreement for each winter season, or part thereof, to clean an equivalent amount of street surface from house line to house line.

And provided further, that the Company shall, at the option of the Commissioner of Bridges, enter into an agreement for each winter season, or part thereof, to clean an equivalent amount of roadway upon the bridge and its approaches.

Twenty-first—As long as said railway, or any portion thereof, remains in any street or avenue, or upon the bridge, the Company shall pave and keep in permanent repair that portion of the surface of the street, avenue or bridge in or upon which the said railway is constructed, between its tracks, the rails of its tracks and for a distance of two (2) feet beyond the rails on either side thereof, under the supervision of the local authorities, whenever required by them to do so, and in such manner as they may prescribe.

In case of the neglect of the Company to pave or repair the pavement on the streets after the expiration of thirty (30) days' notice to do so from the President of the Borough having jurisdiction, or in case of the neglect of the Company to pave or repair the pavement on the bridge after the expiration of thirty (30) days' notice to do so from the Commissioner of Bridges, said President or said Commissioner, as the case may be, may pave or repair the same at the expense of the Company. And the City shall have the right to change the material or character of the pavement of any street or avenue, and in that event the Company shall be bound to replace such pavement in the manner directed by the proper City official, at its own expense, and the provisions as to repairs herein contained shall apply to such renewed or altered pavement.

Twenty-second—Any alteration to the sewerage or drainage systems, or to any other substructure or to any surface structures in the streets, required on account of the construction or operation of the railway, shall be made at the sole cost of the Company, and in such manner as the proper City officials may prescribe.

Twenty-third—It is agreed that the right hereby granted to operate a street surface railway shall not be in preference or in hindrance to the public work of the City, and should the said railway in any way interfere with the construction of public works in the streets and avenues, or upon the bridge, whether the same is done by the City directly or by a contractor for the City, the Company shall, at its own expense, protect or move the tracks and appurtenances in the manner directed by the City officials having jurisdiction over such public work.

Twenty-fourth—Should the grades or lines of the streets and avenues in which the railway is hereby authorized be changed at any time after the railway has been constructed and during the term of this contract, the Company shall, at its own expense, change its tracks and appurtenances to conform with such new grades and lines, and during the construction of any public improvement upon said streets and avenues the Company shall take care of and protect the tracks and appurtenances at its own expense, also to be done subject to the direction of the City official having jurisdiction over the construction of such change.

Twenty-fifth—Upon one (1) year's notice from the Board the Company shall, if the Board shall so determine by resolution, cease the operation of the stub-end terminal at East 181st street and Broadway, and shall within sixty (60) days from the date of such notice make application to the Board for the right to construct, maintain and operate a loop terminal upon streets to be designated by the Board and shall on or before the expiration of said one (1) year enter into a contract for such loop terminal in substitution for the stub-end terminal hereby authorized.

Twenty-sixth—The Company shall keep and maintain the tracks and the electrical equipment upon the bridge and the approaches necessary for the operation of cars thereon in good order and repair and in such manner as shall be approved and directed by the Commissioner of Bridges, and shall furnish all motive power required by the Commissioner of Bridges for the operation of its cars. If deemed necessary by the Commissioner of Bridges, the Company shall install and operate a system of signals to insure the safe and efficient operation of cars, such system to be approved by the Commissioner of Bridges. In the event of any necessity for changing the layout of tracks, curves, switches, sidings or platforms on the bridge in order to facilitate operation of cars by the Company, said Company must do all the work and furnish all the labor and tools necessary for effecting such changes, which shall all be made

under the control and direction of the Commissioner of Bridges, and no such changes or construction connected therewith, or relating thereto, shall be made unless the plan or plans for the same have been first submitted to the Commissioner of Bridges and approved by him.

Twenty-seventh—Before beginning the operation of cars, the Company shall file with the Commissioner of Bridges a statement for his approval and assent as to the type of car which it proposes to operate and a sketch showing clearance dimensions, weight on axles and wheel spacing or such other information as may be required by said Commissioner. All cars operated over the bridge by the Company and all equipment and appliances relating to such operation shall be subject at all times to the inspection of the Commissioner of Bridges or his authorized representatives, who shall have power to forbid the entrance to the bridge of cars which may for any reason be unsatisfactory, and who shall have power to direct the removal of any old or inadequate appliances and the substitution thereof of appliances of approved character.

Said Commissioner may adopt rules and regulations in regard to the number of cars to be operated over the bridge, the rate of speed of said cars, the movement and headway thereof, the type and weight of cars to be used and the condition thereof, the switching of cars and the use of platforms and the control of the electrical current used by the Company, and the said Commissioner may alter and amend any such rules and regulations so as to secure the safety and comfort of persons using the bridge and preserve the purposes for which the bridge was constructed, and upon serving notice upon the Company that such rules and regulations have been made, amended or altered, the Company shall comply with all the requirements thereof.

Twenty-eighth—Nothing in this contract shall be deemed to affect in any way the right of the Commissioner of Bridges to make alterations or changes in the construction, operation or management of the bridge or to affect in any way the control of such Commissioner over such bridge, as provided by the Charter of the City.

Twenty-ninth—The Company shall submit to the Board a report not later than November 1 of each year for the year ending September 30 next preceding, and at any other time, upon request of the Board, which shall state:

1. The amount of stock issued, for cash, for property.
2. The amount paid in as by last report.
3. The total amount of capital stock paid in.
4. The funded debt by last report.
5. The total amount of funded debt.
6. The floating debt as by last report.
7. The total amount of floating debt.
8. The total amount of funded and floating debt.
9. The average rate per annum of interest on funded debt.
10. Statement of dividends paid during the year.
11. The total amount expended for same.
12. The names of the directors elected at the last meeting of the corporation held for such purpose.
13. Location, value and amount paid for real estate owned by the Company as by last report.
14. Location, value and amount paid for real estate now owned by the Company.
15. Number of passengers carried during the year.
16. Total receipts of Company for each class of business.
17. Amounts paid by the Company for damage to persons or property on account of construction and operation.
18. Total expenses for operation, including salaries—and such other information in regard to the business of the Company as may be required by the Board.

Thirtieth—The Company shall at all times keep accurate books of account of the gross receipts from all sources within the limits of the City, and shall, on or before November 1 of each year, make a verified report to the Comptroller of the City of the business done by the Company, for the year ending September 30 next preceding, in such form as he may prescribe. Such report shall contain a statement of such gross receipts, the total miles in operation within the limits of the City and the miles of railway constructed and operated under this contract, and such other information as the Comptroller may require. The Comptroller shall have access to all books of the Company for the purpose of ascertaining the correctness of its report, and may examine its officers under oath.

Thirty-first—In case of any violation or breach or failure to comply with any of the provisions herein contained, or with any orders of the Board or of the Commissioner of Bridges acting under the powers herein reserved, the franchise or consent herein granted may be forfeited by a suit brought by the Corporation Counsel, on notice of ten (10) days to the Company, or at the option of the Board by resolution of said Board, which said resolution may contain a provision to the effect that the railway constructed and in use by virtue of this contract shall thereupon become the property of the City without proceedings at law or in equity. Provided, however, that such action by the Board shall not be taken until the Board shall give notice to the Company to appear before it on a certain day not less than ten (10) days after the date of such notice, to show cause why such resolution declaring the contract forfeited should not be adopted. In case the Company fails to appear, action may be taken by the Board forthwith.

Thirty-second—If the Company shall fail to give efficient public service at the rates herein fixed, or fail to maintain its structures and equipment as herein provided in good condition throughout the whole term of this contract, the Board may give notice to the Company specifying any default on the part of the Company, and requiring the Company to remedy the same within a reasonable time; and upon failure of the Company to remedy such default within a reasonable time, the Company shall, for each day thereafter during which the default or defect remains, pay to the City the sum of two hundred and fifty dollars (\$250), as fixed or liquidated damages, or the Board, in case such structures or equipment which may affect the surface of the streets or of the bridge shall not be put in good condition within a reasonable time after notice by the Board as aforesaid shall have the right to make all needed repairs at the expense of the Company, in which case the Company shall pay to the City the amount of the cost of such repairs, with legal interest thereon, all of which sums may be deducted from the fund hereinafter provided for.

Thirty-third—The Company shall assume all liability to persons or property by reason of the construction or operation of the railway authorized by this contract and it is a condition of this contract that the City shall assume no liability whatsoever to either persons or property on account of the same, and the Company hereby agrees to repay to the City any damage which the City shall be compelled to pay by reason of any acts or default of the Company.

Thirty-fourth—This grant is upon the express condition that the Company, within thirty (30) days after the signing of this contract by the Mayor, and before anything is done in exercise of the rights conferred hereby, shall deposit with the Comptroller of the City the sum of two thousand dollars (\$2,000), either in money or securities, to be approved by him, which sum together with any and all sums of money or any securities heretofore deposited with the Comptroller by the Company under and pursuant to franchises heretofore granted to it by the City for the faithful performance

ance by the Company of the several franchisees so granted, shall form a fund for the performance by the Company of all of the terms and conditions of this contract and compliance with all orders of the Board or of the Commissioner of Bridges acting under the powers herein reserved, especially those which relate to the payment of the annual charges for the privilege here granted, the rendering of efficient public service at the rates herein fixed, the repairs of the street and bridge pavement, the repair and maintenance of tracks and equipment upon the bridge and its approaches, and the removal of snow and ice and the quality of construction of the railway and the maintenance of the property in good condition throughout the whole term of this contract, and in case of default in the performance by the Company of such terms and conditions or compliance with such orders, or either or any of them, the City shall have the right to cause the work to be done and the materials to be furnished for the performance thereof after due notice, and shall collect the reasonable cost thereof from the said fund without legal proceedings; or after default in the payment of the annual charges, shall collect the same with interest, from the said fund after ten (10) days' notice to the Company; or in case of failure to observe the said terms and conditions of this contract and orders of the Board hereunder, relating to the headway, heating and lighting of cars, fenders, wheel guards and watering of street pavements, the Company shall pay a penalty of fifty dollars (\$50) per day for each day of violation, and the further sum of ten dollars (\$10) per day for each car that shall not be properly heated, lighted or supplied with fenders or wheel guards, in case of a violation of the provisions relating to those matters.

The procedure for the imposition and collection of the penalties in this contract shall be as follows:

The Board, on complaint made, shall give notice to the Company, directing its President, or other officer to appear before the Board on a certain day not less than ten (10) days after the date of such notice, to show cause why the Company should not be penalized in accordance with the foregoing provisions. If the Company fails to make an appearance, or, after a hearing appears in the judgment of the Board to be in fault, said Board shall forthwith impose the prescribed penalty, or where the amount of the penalty is not prescribed herein, such amount as appears to the Board to be just, and without legal procedure direct the Comptroller to withdraw the amount of such penalty from the security fund deposited with him. In case of any drafts made upon the security fund the Company shall, upon ten (10) days' notice in writing, pay to the City a sum sufficient to restore said security fund to the original amount, and in default thereof this contract shall be canceled and annulled at the option of the Board, acting in behalf of the City. No action or proceeding or right under the provisions of this contract shall affect any other legal rights, remedies or causes of action belonging to the City.

Thirty-fifth—The words "notice" or "direction," wherever used in this contract, shall be deemed to mean a written notice or direction. Every such notice or direction to be served upon the Company shall be delivered at such office in the City as shall have been designated by the Company, or if no such office shall have been designated, or if such designation shall have for any reason become inoperative, shall be mailed in the City, postage prepaid, addressed to the Company at the City. Delivery or mailing of such notice or direction as and when above provided shall be equivalent to direct personal notice or direction, and shall be deemed to have been given at the time of delivery or mailing.

TERMS AND CONDITIONS UNDER WHICH BUILDINGS, ETC., WILL BE SOLD FOR REMOVAL FROM CITY PROPERTY.

THE BUILDINGS AND APPURTENANCES thereto will be sold to the highest bidder, who must pay cash or certified check, drawn to the order of the Comptroller of The City of New York, and must also give a certified check or cash in full the amount of the purchase price as security for the faithful performance of the terms and conditions of the sale. Where the amount of the purchase price does not equal or exceed the sum of \$50, the sum of \$50 shall be the amount of the security to be deposited. This security may at any time after the expiration of the contract period be applied by the City to the cost of completing any of the work required under the contract, but unfinished at the expiration of the contract period.

The purchaser shall not lease, occupy, cause or permit the building or buildings, etc., purchased by him to be used or occupied for any purpose other than that of their speedy removal, nor shall he collect any rental or other revenue for the use of either the land or the buildings, etc., situated thereon. Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a Department, chief of a Bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.
