Hewitt, Mayor of the City of New York, do hereby give notice that I have extended and do hereby extend the time for said act to go into operation, and for said books, maps and indices to be completed, to the thirtieth day of June, in the year one thousand eight hundred and eighty-eight, which is hereby designated by me as the date upon which said act shall go into operation in said Register's office.

Sanitary Bureau.

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending November 19, 1887:

There were 5,720 inspections made by the Sanitary Inspectors and the Sanitary Police.

There were 535 complaints returned by the Sanitary Inspectors and the Sanitary Police.

There were 210 complaints received from citizens and referred to the Sanitary Inspectors and Sanitary Police for investigation and report.

There were issued to the consignees of vessels to discharge cargoes, on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port, 38 permits.

There were issued to consignees, to discharge rags (in bulk, under bonds), 5 permits.

There were issued, under the Sanitary Code, 11 miscellaneous permits.

There were issued to scavengers to empty, clean and disinfect privy sinks, 65 permits.

The certificates of 654 births, 67 still-births, 310 marriages and 670 deaths, reported to have taken place in this city, were received by this Bureau during the week ending Saturday, November 19, 1887.

This shows a decrease of 82 births and an increase of 16 still-births, 36 marriages and 12 deaths, when compared with the number received during the preceding week, but when compared with the corresponding week of the year 1886 there was an increase of 13 births, 9 still-births and 82 marriages and a decrease of 13 deaths.

Compared with the mortality reported during the preceding week, the deaths from small-pox decreased 1; diphtheria, 7; croup, 4; diarrhoeal diseases, 4; inanition, 2; cancer, 2; bronchitis, 10; meningitis and encephalitis, 1; convulsions, 2; all diseases of the brain and nervous system, 2; Bright's disease and nephritis, 16; suicide, 1; drowning, 2; while the deaths from measles increased 2; scarlatina, 4; whooping cough, 1; erysipelas, 1; typhoid fever, 4; cerebro-spinal fever, 3; puerperal diseases, 3; alcoholism, 3;

rheumatism and gout, 2; phthisis pulmonalis, 7; pneumonia, 6; heart diseases, 9; aneurism, 3; marasmus, tabes mesenterica and scrofula, 6; hydrocephalus and tubercular meningitis, 3; apoplexy, 1; cirrhosis and hepatitis, 2; gastritis, gastro-enteritis, enteritis, and peritonitis, 4; cyanosis and atelectasis, 1; premature and preterm births, 5; surgical operations, 2. The number of deaths from malarial fevers was the same in the two successive weeks.

Deaths from the principal Zymotic Diseases, Phthisis Pulmonalis, Pneumonia, Bronchitis, and Children under five years of age, reported during the week and compared with the three preceding weeks.

Of the total number of deaths reported for the week, 139 were in institutions, 350 in tenement-houses, 164 in houses containing three families or less, 9 in hotels and boarding-houses, 8 in rivers, streets, boats, etc.; 7 were on the basement floor, 115 on the first, 168 on the second, 123 on the third, 73 on the fourth, 34 on the fifth, 3 on the sixth; 654 were stated to be residents of New York City, and 16 non-residents; 81 were stated to be single, 210 married, 99 widowed, and the condition of 280 was not stated; these were children who had not attained a marriageable age.

The total number of burial permits issued during the week are as follows, viz.: City deaths, 670; still-births, 67; bodies in transit, 12; of the total burial permits issued for city and still.

births, 66 were upon certificates received from the Coroners; 654 births, 310 marriages, 67 still-births, 670 deaths; 12 applications for transit permits were recorded, indexed and tabulated; 162 searches of the registers of births, marriages, and deaths were made, and 4 transcripts of the birth record, 17 of marriage, and 93 of death were issued during the week.

The mean temperature for the week ending November 19, 1887, was 42.0 degrees Fahr.; the mean reading of the barometer was 29.696; the mean humidity was 65, saturation being 100; the number of miles traveled by the wind was 1,429, and the total amount of rain-fall was 0.61 inch depth of water, as reported by D. Draper, Ph. D., Director of the New York Meteorological Observatory, Central Park.

The disposition of 663 deaths and still-births, or 89.96 per cent. of the total number reported, was in the following 14 cemeteries: Bayside (Jewish), 20; Calvary (Roman Catholic), 241; City pauper burial-ground (undenominational), 108; Greenwood (undenominational), 51; Lutheran (undenominational), 102; Cypress Hills (undenominational), 21; Evergreen (undenominational), 37; Woodlawn (undenominational), 28; St. Michael's (Protestant Episcopal), 8; Union (Methodist Protestant), 3; Holy Cross (Roman Catholic), 11; Macphelah, L.
