The street, road or avenue colored red, running from a point south of Burnside avenue, where it meets the Croton Aqueduct, to a point about as far north of the Fordham Landing road as the point of starting is south of sail Fordham Landing road, where it again meets the Croton Aqueduct, shall be called and named Aqueduct avenue;
The street, road or avenue colored red, running from a point in the Croton Aqueduct, shall be called and named avenue; shall be called and named avenue;
The street, road or avenue colored red, running from a point in the Croton Aqueduct, near Featherbed la. e, to a point a short distance north of Gun Hill road, shall be called and named Andrews avenue ;

Featherbed Ia.e, to a point a short distance north of Gun Thill road, shall be called and named Andrews avenue; The street, road or avenue colored red, running from Osborne place to One Hundred and Eighty-fourth street, shall be called and named Loring place; The street, road or avenue colored red, running from Burnside avenue to Fordham Landing road, shall be called and named Sedgwick avenue; The street, road or avenue colored red, west of Sedgwick avenue, running from Burnside avenue to Fordham Landing road, shall be called and named Heath avenue to a street north of Ford-ham Landing road, shall be called and named Harlen River Terrace.
