

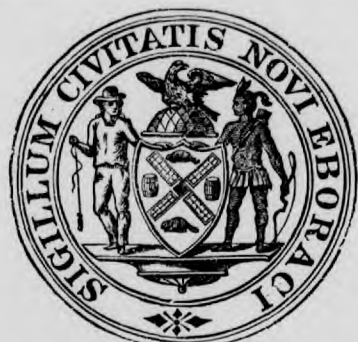

APPROVED PAPERS.

Ordinances, Resolutions, etc., approved by the Mayor during the week ending January 11, 1879.

Whereas, Great destitution and suffering now exists among the poor of this city; and
Whereas, The sum of \$40,000 is now available for the support of this unfortunate class of our population, having been appropriated for that purpose by the city authorities, to be disbursed by the Commissioners of Charities and Correction; be it therefore
Resolved, That the Board of Commissioners of Charities and Correction be and is hereby requested to take immediate steps to afford the relief contemplated in making such appropriation to the poor of this city, by the distribution of coal, etc., as has heretofore been the annual custom.

Adopted by the Board of Aldermen, January 6, 1879.

FIRE DEPARTMENT.

HEADQUARTERS FIRE DEPARTMENT, CITY OF NEW YORK,
DECEMBER 30, 1878.

Pond, Manager of the Union Fire Alarm Telegraph, to place twelve non-interfering signal boxes in service on the wires of this Department, be accepted, the said party to furnish a good and sufficient bond indemnifying the city in case of any litigation that may arise in consequence of the use of said signal boxes; the same to be subject to a trial or test of six months, and, if then proved satisfactory to the uses of the Department, to be paid for at the rate of \$75 each, and that a Westchester box-circuit be equipped with the said boxes, under the direction and supervision of the Superintendent of Telegraph. Laid over.
