PETITIONS.

By Alderman Morris—

Petition of the officers and agents of insurance companies of the City and County of New York, asking the adoption of a resolution (G. O. 333), providing for an increased supply of Croton water. Which was referred to the Committee on Public Works.

By Alderman Gilon—

Petition of the officers of the Father Mathew U. B. T. A. B. Society, Branch No. 1, to be repaid money expended by them in improving Jefferson Market Assembly Rooms. Which was referred to the Committee on Law Department.

By Alderman Guntzer—

Bill of F. T. Beard, for reporting proceedings of Committee on Streets, in case of charges against Abraham Disbecker, Police Commissioner. Which was referred to the Committee on Finance.

By Alderman Morris—

Remonstrance against erection of a shed over the sidewalk in Vesey street, opposite the entrance to the Astor House. Which was referred to the Committee on Streets.

By the President—

Demand of Isaac P. Martin, for payment of award in the matter of opening Eleventh avenue. Which was ordered on file.

By Alderman McCarthy—

Petition of owners of property for permission to improve Fifty-fifth street, between Avenue A and First avenue, at their own expense. The President put the question whether the Board would agree to grant the prayer of the petitioners. Which was decided in the affirmative.

MOTIONS.

(G. O. 465.)

Alderman Morris moved that the Committee on Public Works be discharged from the further consideration of the resolution for laying Croton-mains in Forty-fourth street, between Second and Third avenues, as follows:

Resolved, That Croton-mains be laid in Forty-fourth street, between Second and Third avenues, where not already done, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works.

The President put the question whether the Board would agree with said motion. Which was decided in the affirmative.

Alderman Morris moved that the paper be laid over.

The President put the question whether the Board would agree with said motion. Which was decided in the affirmative.

RESOLUTIONS.

By Alderman Seery—

Whereas, In view of the renown reflected upon our country by the triumphs of the Team of American Rifle-men, in their recent victories over the marksmen of Great Britain, and the honor they have earned for themselves, individually and collectively, as the representatives of the American people, in the contests at Dollymount, Wimbledon, and elsewhere, it is eminently proper that the Common Council of this city should, on behalf of its people, participate in the demonstrations of commendation and welcome to be extended to them upon their arrival, now daily expected; be it therefore

Resolved, That the Special Committee of this Board, appointed at the meeting of May 27, 1875, consisting of Messrs. Cole, Purroy, and Billings, to accompany the American Rifle Team to the Irish capital, be and is hereby instructed to tender the Team the congratulations of this Common Council upon the triumphant success that has attended their efforts to maintain the reputation of Americans as experts in the use of the rifle, and the honors they have achieved in their victories over the riflemen of Great Britain, and to tender them the use of the Governor's Room, in the City Hall, in order that our citizens may have the opportunity, personally, to tender their congratulations, and to extend to the Team a cordial welcome home, on any day that will suit their convenience.

The President put the question whether the Board would agree with said preamble and resolution.

Which was decided in the affirmative.

By Alderman Purroy—

Resolved, That the Department of Public Parks be and is hereby requested to cause the roadway of Washington avenue, from First to Fifth street, in the Twenty-third Ward, to be raised to a proper height, so that water will not settle thereon and become stagnant, and otherwise repair the avenue and put it in good order, fit for travel.

The President put the question whether the Board would agree with said resolution. Which was decided in the affirmative.

By Alderman Guntzer—

Resolved, That the Commissioner of Public Works be and he is hereby requested to cause the carriageway of Fifteenth street, from First avenue to Avenue C, to be repaired and put in good order, as it is in its present condition almost impassable.

The President put the question whether the Board would agree with said resolution. Which was decided in the affirmative.

By Alderman Power—

Resolved, That permission be and the same is hereby given to Josh Hart to keep two ornamental lamp-posts and lamps on the sidewalk in front of his theatre (The Eagle), No. 545 Sixth avenue, the gas to be supplied from his own metre, the work to be done at his own expense, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works; such permission to continue only during the pleasure of the Common Council.

The President put the question whether the Board would agree with said resolution. Which was decided in the affirmative.

By Alderman Blessing—

Resolved, That the sidewalks on both sides of Sixty-fourth street, between the Eighth avenue and the Boulevard, be flagged four feet wide, where not already done, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works; and that the accompanying ordinance therefor be adopted.

Which was referred to the Committee on Streets.

By Alderman McCarthy—

Resolved, That a large lamp-post and lamps, similar to the post and lamps in the public place bounded by Tryon Row, Chatham and Centre streets, be placed in or near the centre of the Bowling Green, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works.

Which was referred to the Committee on Streets.

By Alderman Robinson—

Resolved, That Charles W. Edgar be and he is hereby appointed a Commissioner of Deeds in and for the City and County of New York, in place of Franz Buehler, who has failed to qualify.

The President put the question whether the Board would agree with said resolution.

Which was decided in the affirmative by the following vote:

Affirmative—The President, Aldermen Billings, Blessing, Gilon, Gross, Guntzer, McCarthy, Morris, Power, Robinson, Seery, Simonson, and Vance—13.

By Alderman Seery—

Resolved, That Fortieth street, between First and Second avenues, be paved with Belgian or trap-block pavement, and that at the several intersecting streets and avenues crosswalks be laid where not now laid, and relaid where those now laid are, in the opinion of the Commissioner of Public Works, not in good repair, or are not upon a grade adapted to the grade of the proposed new pavement, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works; and that the accompanying ordinance therefor be adopted.

Which was laid over.

By Alderman Gilon—

Resolved, That Gansevoort Street, from West street to the North river, be paved with Belgian or trap-block pavement, and that at the several intersecting streets and avenues crosswalks be laid where not now laid, and relaid where those now laid are, in the opinion of the Commissioner of Public Works, not in good repair, or are not upon a grade adapted to the grade of the proposed new pavement, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works; and that the accompanying ordinance therefor be adopted.

Which was referred to the Committee on Street Pavements.

By Alderman Vance—

Whereas, A large proportion of the citizens of New York have felt for many years that the management of the Croton water supply has not been characterized by that skill and judgment demanded by the vast interest at stake.

They have found that year by year the distribution of water has been increased until it has reached an enormous extent, demanding a daily supply at one time as high as 120,000,000 of gallons, while the force upon which this vast distribution depends has not been increased in the slightest degree, nor has any suggestion or proposition or plan emanated from that Department to increase that force beyond the force of gravity upon which the water supply was originally based, and, at the present time, this force of gravity is barely sufficient to overcome the resistance due to the friction of the distribution pipes, and the city is to-day almost universally deprived of water, except on the lower floors of the houses. In fact, a dreadful calamity has been gradually falling upon the city, while, at the same time, the outlay and expense in management of this Department have increased year by year until their magnitude has become enormous.

A very large and populous portion of the city depends for the supply of water in houses either upon steam engines, windmills, or hand pumps, increasing largely the cost of water without in the least diminishing the taxation.

Furthermore, it is asserted and believed that the aqueduct upon which the city depends entirely for its water supply, is in many places insecure and liable at any moment to be destroyed, thus depriving the city of its only security against a disastrous conflagration.

It is further asserted and believed that the lower storage reservoir in Westchester County is in a filthy and unwholesome condition; that it has never been cleaned or purified since its original construction; that it is so constructed that it cannot be cleaned without shutting off the water supply, and that it has been for thirty years the cess-pool of the large drainage basin of which it constitutes the centre.

It has been asserted in the public press that to this source is due the large infant mortality which has afflicted the city this summer.

In view of the foregoing, be it

Resolved, That the Commissioner of Public Works be requested to report, without delay, to this Board—

1st. What means are necessary to secure a proper head of water which will insure its delivery to consumers in such quantities as they have a right to receive, and for which they are taxed.

2d. What is the present actual condition of the Croton Aqueduct as verified by the certificates of the engineers in charge of the line of the work.

3d. What is the character and form of construction of the lower receiving reservoir in Westchester County. Has it ever been cleansed or purified, and does its construction admit of being cleansed without shutting off the water supply.

4th. What was the original cost of the works for water supply, and what has been the amount expended upon these works during the last ten years.

The President put the question whether the Board would agree with said resolution.

Which was decided in the affirmative.

REPORTS.

The Committee on Streets, to whom was referred the annexed petition of William Russell, for permission to construct a bay-window on the Ninety-third street front of the building on the southeast corner of Lexington avenue and Ninety-third street, respectfully

REPORT:

That, upon examination, your Committee find Mr. Russell has complied with the requirements of the ordinances of the Corporation in respect to the erection of bay-windows, and that no objection has been made to granting his application.

The following resolution is therefore respectfully offered for your adoption:

Resolved, That permission be and is hereby granted to William Russell to construct a bay-window on his building on the southeast corner of Lexington avenue and Ninety-third street, as shown on the accompanying diagram, at his own expense, and under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works.

That, having examined the subject, they believe the proposed removal to be necessary, as the pole is a serious impediment to the free use of the street. They therefore recommend that the said resolution and ordinance be adopted.

Resolved, That the pole now standing in the carriageway of the Eighth avenue, east side, near the southeast corner of Thirty-third street, be removed forthwith, as it is a dangerous obstruction to the free use of the street; the work to be done under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works.

COMMUNICATIONS FROM THE DEPARTMENTS AND CORPORATION OFFICERS.

The President laid before the Board the following communication from the Counsel to the Corporation:

LAW DEPARTMENT,
OFFICE OF THE COUNSEL TO THE CORPORATION,
NEW YORK, August 12, 1875.

To the Honorable the Common Council:

GENTLEMEN—I am in receipt of a copy of a resolution, adopted by your Honorable Body on the 5th instant, authorizing the Counsel to the Corporation to take the necessary legal measures to have One Hundred and Sixty-first street, from Kingsbridge road to Eleventh avenue, opened according to law.

I presume that this resolution has been adopted by your Honorable Body under a misapprehension as to the present state of the law in regard to proceedings for opening streets and avenues in this city. Formerly the Common Council possessed the exclusive right to initiate proceedings, but by a series of statutes this power has been taken from the Common Council, and is now vested as follows:

First.—As to streets and avenues below Fifty-ninth street, in "The Board of Street Opening and Improvement," created by section 105 of the Charter of 1873.

Second.—As to streets and avenues between Fifty-ninth street on the south, and the Harlem river and Spuyten Duyvil creek on the north, in the Commissioner of Public Works.

Third.—As to parks and public places throughout the whole city, and as to streets and avenues in the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards, in the Commissioners governing the Department of Parks.

You will perceive, therefore, that I am unable to proceed under the resolution adopted by you, without the authority of the Commissioner of Public Works.

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

GENTLEMEN—In reply to Circular No. 21 from the Department of Finance, addressed to me, notifying the heads of all the city Departments and the officers of the City and County of New York to prepare their "Departmental estimates for the year 1876," and send the same to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment prior to the first day of September, 1875, I respectfully submit the following statement of the amount and character of the expenditure required in the office of the Clerk of the Common Council for the year 1876. The estimate is similar to that of the present year, and when it is considered that in this office is now concentrated, in addition to the work formerly pertaining to the office of the Clerk of the Common Council, the duties heretofore performed by the Clerks of the Board of Assistant Aldermen and the Board of Supervisors, whose combined salaries, as revised in September, 1871, amounted to nearly \$100,000, it must be admitted that the sum of \$20,000 asked for clerk-hire for the year 1876 is very moderate. The sum of five hundred dollars (\$500) will be required to pay the contingent expenses of the office.

Whereas, Joseph Seligman, Cornelius H. Delamater, Jordan L. Mott, Lewis B. Brown, and Charles J. Canda, by appointment of the Mayor, Commissioners to locate a railway or railways in this city, under the provisions of chapter 606, Laws of 1875, have, through his Honor the Mayor, made application to the Common Council for its consent to the location, construction, and operation of a steam railway or railways upon such of the streets, avenues, and places in this city as said Commissioners may deem most advantageous and convenient for the use of the inhabitants thereof, and of the traveling public generally, such railways to be constructed upon plans, and in a manner to be prescribed by said Commission, and upon special routes to be selected by them; and

Whereas, It is deemed for the public interest that said Commissioners shall be unembarrassed during the full time allowed them to determine and fix the routes of such railway or railways and connections, and be free, during such period, to select, in the exercise of the discretion conferred upon them by the Legislature, for such route or routes, any street, avenue, or place, or a part thereof, in this city, limited only by the terms of the act under which they are organized; therefore,

Resolved, That consent is hereby given for the location, construction, and operation of steam railways or connections thereof in, over, under, through or across any and all streets, avenues, lands and places in this city subject to the control of this Common Council, over, under, through or across which said Commissioners are now authorized by the act aforesaid to locate railways or connections thereof, provided that such of such railways and connections as are to be above the surface of the ground shall be constructed as elevated railways, not less than fourteen feet above the surface of the ground or water, except in River street, along the Harlem river, where the same may be built on piles on or near the surface of the water; and further provided, that any company constructing such railway on River street shall first stipulate in writing, for itself, its successors, and assigns, to change their railway on said street to an elevated railway of the description aforesaid whenever said street shall be filled in, and such change shall be required by the local authorities having control of said street at the time of such requirement.

Alderman Blessing moved that the message be referred to the Committee on Law Department.

Alderman Billings, as an amendment, moved that the message be laid over.

Which was accepted by Alderman Blessing.

The President then put the question whether the Board would agree with said motion.

Which was decided in the affirmative.

UNFINISHED BUSINESS.

Alderman Gilon called up G. O. 447, being a resolution, as follows:

Resolved, That the Comptroller be and he is hereby authorized and directed to lease the second and third floors of the premises known as Nos. 5 to 11 Seventh street, corner of Hall place, as a regimental armory and drill-room for the several companies of the Fifty-fifth Regiment, N. G. S. N. Y., for a period of three years, at an annual rental of five thousand dollars.

On motion of Alderman Billings, the general order was again laid over.

Alderman McCarthy called up G. O. 460, being a resolution, as follows:

Resolved, That the Counsel to the Corporation be and he is hereby authorized and directed to take the necessary legal measures to have Eighty-second street, from Avenue A to First avenue, opened according to law.

He then moved to amend by striking out the words "Counsel to the Corporation be and he is hereby authorized and directed," and inserting in lieu thereof the words "Commissioner of Public Works be requested."

The President put the question whether the Board would agree with said motion.

Which was decided in the affirmative.

The resolution, as amended, was again laid over.

MOTIONS AND RESOLUTIONS RESUMED.

Alderman Morris moved to take from on file a preamble and resolution offered by him (see page 558, Proceedings of August 12, 1875), requesting the Commissioner of Public Works to employ Messrs. Alfred W. Craven and George S. Green to examine and report in detail information in relation to the supply and distribution of Croton water in this city.

The President put the question whether the Board would agree with said motion.

Which was decided in the negative, on a division called by Alderman McCarthy, viz.:

Persons "enrolled" as liable must serve when called or pay their fines. No mere excuse will be allowed or interference permitted. The fines, received from those who, for business or other reasons, are unable to serve at the time selected, pay the expenses of this office, and if unpaid will be entered as judgments upon the property of delinquents.

The Commissioner will receive applications for relief from those jurors who have served continuously and promptly for several years, or have done excessive jury service in the State Courts.

All good citizens will aid the course of justice, and secure reliable and respectable juries, and equalize their duty by serving promptly when summoned, allowing their clerks or subordinates to serve, reporting to me any attempt at bribery or evasion, and suggesting names for enrollment. Persons between sixty and seventy years of age, summer absentees, persons temporarily ill, and United States and District Court jurors are not exempt.

Every man must attend to his own notice. It is a misdemeanor to give any jury paper to another to answer. It is also punishable by fine or imprisonment to give or receive any present or bribe, directly or indirectly, in relation to a jury service, or to withhold any paper or make any false statement, and every case will be fully prosecuted. No fees of any kind exist or are allowed in regard to jury notices, and any one asking, receiving, or giving any such "fee" or "present" will be arrested, and, if possible, punished to the full extent of the law.
