### DEPARTMENT OF DOCKS AND FERRIES.

At a regular meeting of the Board of Docks held Friday, May 24, 1901, at 2 o'clock P. M.  
Present:—The full Board.

The minutes of the meeting held May 17, 1901, were approved.  
The communication from the Engineer-in-Chief submitting plan for the proposed improvement of the water front, between Ninety-fourth and Ninety-eighth streets, North river, was taken from the table; and

On motion, the following resolution was adopted:  
Resolved, That the map or plan submitted by the Engineer-in-Chief for improving the water front on the North river, between Ninety-fourth and Ninety-eighth streets, be and hereby is approved, and the Secretary be and hereby is directed to transmit the same to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund for their approval.

The communication from Ryan & Jones, attorneys for the New Jersey and Staten Island Ferry Company, stating that a new license to operate the ferry between Howland Hook, Staten Island, and Miscellaneous, New Jersey, has been granted to said company by the County Judge of Richmond County for a further period of five years, and protesting against the Department exercising any control over said ferry, was referred to the Corporation Counsel for advice as to what steps should be taken to enforce the rules for rental for each franchise.

The report of the Engineer-in-Chief on Secretary's Order No. 26899 submitting cost of laying water-pipe at the Pier foot of East Twenty-second street, amounting to \$64, was referred to the Treasurer for collection from Al Foster.

The following communications were also referred to the Treasurer:  
From Douglas Brothers—Requesting permission to maintain a floating boat-house at the foot of One Hundred and Fiftieth street, North river.

From John H. Stacy—Requesting permission to land the Glen Island steamers at the Pier foot of North Second street, Brooklyn.

The following permits were granted, to continue during the pleasure of the Board:  
E. F. McGirr, to load manure on scows at the north side of the Pier foot of Nineteenth street, North river, compensation to be fixed by the Treasurer.

James J. Duffy, to load cellar dirt on scows at Pier 11, East river, the consent of the owners of said pier having been obtained.

John McBurnett & Son, to maintain a portable steam derrick on the Pier foot of East Twenty-eighth street.

William Hasterf, to reopen the dumping-board at the foot of East Thirtieth street, compensation to be at the same rate as was charged prior to the suspension of the privilege.

The following permits were granted, the work to be done under the supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief:

New York Steam Company, to make general repairs to Pier, new 6, North river, during the coming six months.

Hoboken Ferry Company, to repair the ferry premises foot of Christopher street, North river, and to lay an asphalt pavement under the awning in front of the ferry-house thereat.

Benjamin Griggs, to lay a water-pipe for the steamer "William V. Wilson" at Pier, old 56 1/2, North river, all pavement to be taken up and rebuilt by the force of the Department at the expense of said Griggs.

Brown & Fleming, to dredge under the dumping-board foot of Fifty-fifth street, North river.

T. A. S. Sheridan, to dredge at the dumping-board foot of Ninety-sixth street, North river.

Albert H. Hasterf, to dredge at the dumping-boards between Forty-third and Forty-fourth streets, North river, and between Ninety-fourth and Ninety-fifth streets, East river.

James Monahan, to drive mooring piles for bath-house and to dredge in front of the bulkhead between Jackson and Corlears streets, East river.

M. Goodwin, to dredge at the foot of One Hundred and Seventh street, Harlem river.

Fireproof Manufacturing Company, to construct a factory building at the foot of One Hundred and Fiftieth street, on the east side of the Harlem river.

United States Projectile Company, to repair the cribwork at the foot of Fifty-third street, Brooklyn.

The following permits were granted, to continue during the pleasure of the Board, the work to be done under the supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief:

James Tilley, to place a new scale on the bulkhead between Twenty-fourth and Twenty-fifth streets, North river.

American Ice Company, to place a new scale on the bulkhead foot of Rivington street, East river.

Flushing Boat Club, to reconstruct the cribwork, runway and float at Point Ruth, Flushing Bay, Borough of Queens, the work to be done in accordance with plans to be hereafter submitted to and approved by the Engineer-in-Chief.

M. Seitz, to construct a runway and float on the south side of the Flushing dike, Flushing Bay, Borough of Queens, the work to be done in accordance with plans submitted.

The following communications were ordered on file:

From the Fire Department—Consenting to the granting of a permit to the New York and College Point Ferry Company to land a steamboat on Sundays and holidays at the Pier foot of East Ninety-ninth street, provided all expenses incurred are borne by the ferry company, and that the company employ a watchman to patrol the pier while the fire-boat is absent at fires or elsewhere.

On motion, the application of the New York and College Point Ferry Company for permission to land a steamboat at said pier was taken from the table, placed on file, and permission granted to land thereat, subject to the conditions imposed by the Fire Department, the privilege to continue during the pleasure of the Board and the compensation therefor to be fixed by the Treasurer.

From the Department of Public Buildings, Lighting and Supplies—Requesting that berths be assigned for the free floating baths for the season of 1901.

On motion, the action of the Board of March 1, 1901, in setting aside a berth for a public bath at the Pier foot of Fifth street, East river, was rescinded, the pier having been ordered removed, and the following resolution adopted:

Resolved, That berths at the following locations be set aside for the free floating baths during the season of 1901, and that the Engineer-in-Chief be and hereby is directed to prepare said berths, and at the close of the season to restore same for commercial use.

Also at the bulkhead foot of Corlears street and One Hundred and Thirty-sixth street, East river, provided the written consent of the owners is obtained.

From the New York, New Haven and Hartford Railroad Company—Requesting that the Board reconsider its decision and grant a new lease of Pier, new 36, North river.

From the H. B. Claflin Company and others—Requesting that an additional pier on the East river be kept open for the use of the Oriental trade. Secretary directed to state that every possible facility will be afforded.

From the Catskill and New York Steamboat Company—Requesting that repairs to the piles at Pier, new 33, North river, be made by the Department. Secretary directed in reply that the piles must be repaired by said company, they having been placed at the pier at its request.

From Edmund C. Strong, John Keeley, Jr., and Frederick Green—Transmitting copy of application to be made to the Commissioners of the Land Office for a grant of land under water easterly of Flatbush avenue, Jamaica Bay, Borough of Brooklyn.

From Henry Henjes—Transmitting agreement in connection with the proposed extension of coal piers on the easterly side of Bay Nineteenth street, Gravesend Bay, Borough of Brooklyn.

On motion, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That permission be and hereby is granted Henry Henjes to construct two extensions, ten by fifty-two feet and fourteen by fifty-two feet respectively, in the present coal piers situated on the easterly side of Bay Nineteenth street, between Coney avenue and Gravesend Bay, in the Borough of Brooklyn, the work to be done under the direction and supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief of this Department, in accordance with plans submitted as aforesaid, said Henry Henjes having filed with this Department an agreement that no additional item of value shall be claimed beyond the actual value of the said extensions in the event of the Department requiring the premises for the improvement of the water front.

From William H. Jenke—Requesting an extension of time on Contract No. 608.

On motion, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That the time for the completion of the work of building the pier ends of Piers, new 29 and 30, East river, under Contract No. 608, William H. Jenke, contractor, be and hereby is extended to and including August 12, 1901, provided the written consent of the parties to said contract be filed in this Department.

From the Treasurer—

1st. Recommending that the charge of \$497 against Stegman & Hays for the cost of repairing the Battery landing where damaged be canceled, the damage having been caused by the boats using the wharf generally striding the piles. Recommendation adopted.

2d. Recommending that the compensation to be charged Anning T. Smith for the privilege of landing the steamers "Victor" and "Isabel" at the Battery wharf be fixed at the rate of \$5 per day for each boat, payable at the end of each week to the Dock Master. Recommendation adopted.

3d. Recommending that the compensation to be charged James W. Seitz for the use of the bulkhead between Piers, old 56 and 57, East river, be fixed at the rate of \$1,200 per annum, payable monthly in advance to the Treasurer. Recommendation adopted.

4th. Recommending that the compensation to be charged Michael Mayers for the berth occupied by scow at the foot of Sixth street, East river, be fixed at the rate of \$4 per day, payable at the end of each week to the Dock Master. Recommendation adopted.

5th. Recommending that the compensation to be charged John Barry for the privilege of maintaining a house and float at the foot of One Hundred and Thirty-eighth street, Port Morris, East river, be fixed at the rate of \$1 per month, payable monthly in advance to the Dock Master. Recommendation adopted.
