BELLEVUE AND ALLIED HOSPITALS.

A regular meeting of the Board of Trustees of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals was held in the staff room of Bellevue Hospital on Tuesday, June 2, 1908, at 2 o'clock.

Present—Dr. Brannan, the President, in the chair; Messrs. Barry, Stern, Robbins and Paulding, Trustees. Mr. O'Keeffe excused.

The minutes of the meeting of May 26 were amended (page 5, Reports of Committees), as follows: Dr. Brannan reported in the matter of dental clinics and, on motion, duly seconded, it was

Resolved, That the subject be referred to the President for further investigation, with the understanding that a beginning shall be made by caring for the teeth of the children in the wards of Bellevue Hospital.

Mr. M. J. Rickard, the Acting Superintendent, reported as follows:

From May 24 to May 30, inclusive, thirty-one operations were performed at Bellevue Hospital, six at Gouverneur Hospital, seven at Harlem Hospital and thirteen at Fordham Hospital, at all of which the Attending Surgeons or their Assistants were present.

During the past week a fire drill was held at each of the hospitals of the Department.

Regarding the matter of caring for the teeth of the children, the operating room adjoining Ward 16, on the fourth floor, is immediately adjacent to one of the children's wards, and is above two of the other children's wards. There is an excellent light in this room, and it is recommended that a dentist's chair be placed there and the necessary dental instruments, and that arrangements be made with the Second Surgical Division regarding the fixing of hours for the Dentist, so that such service may not conflict with the regular surgical service. Should there be need at any time for an emergency operation, there is an operating room belonging to that service on the same floor, with but two wards between. It is recommended that a fairly good tooth brush be purchased, as in the cheaper grades the bristles become loose and are likely to lodge in the gums.

It is recommended that an advertisement be inserted in the CITY RECORD, calling for bids on 200,000 pounds of potatoes, crop of 1908, which will be required for the remainder of the year.

On visiting Harlem Hospital yesterday it was found that the sidewalk in One Hundred and Thirty-seventh street, a few feet west of the ambulance stable, was in a very dangerous condition, and Messrs Kelly and Kelley, the contractors, were immediately notified and promised to attend to the matter to-day, June 2.

Permission has been given to a United States Government Inspector to interview all the patients of foreign birth in this institution, the object being that, if possible, some of them will be deported to their homes.

Dr. Norris recommends the appointment of Dr. Bowman C. Crowell, who is third on the list of persons eligible for appointment to the position of Pathologist, and his recommendation is indorsed.

On motion, duly seconded, it was

Resolved, To refer the matter of purchasing tooth brushes for the children patients to the Superintendent for investigation and report.

On motion, duly seconded, it was

Resolved, To insert an advertisement in the CITY RECORD, calling for bids on two hundred thousand pounds of potatoes of the crop of 1908, required by the Department during the remainder of the year 1908.

On motion, duly seconded, it was

Resolved, To refer the matter of the condition of the sidewalk in One Hundred and Thirty-seventh street to the Superintendent for further report.

On motion, duly seconded, it was

Resolved, To request the Superintendent to make inquiries concerning the law applying to the deportation of inmates of public hospitals.

On motion, duly seconded, it was

Resolved, To appoint (upon the recommendation of Dr. Charles Norris, Director of Laboratories, and the indorsement of the Acting Superintendent), Dr. Bowman C. Crowell, whose name appears third on the list of persons eligible for appointment to the position of Pathologist, salary, \$1,500 a year, appointment to date from July 2, 1908.

On motion, duly seconded, it was

Resolved, That the bid of Messrs. Hahn & O'Reilly, amounting to \$4,250, be accepted, it being the lowest of the seven bids received, and that the contract for painting Pavilions A and B, of the new Bellevue Hospital, be and the same is hereby awarded to Messrs Hahn & O'Reilly, No. 3311 Third avenue, subject to the approval of the sureties by the Comptroller of The City of New York, in accordance with the provision of section 420, chapter 10 of the Greater New York Charter.

Mr. Barry, of the Building Committee reported in the matter of the second payment on the contract of Mr. John Fury for the coal vault at Gouverneur Hospital, and recommended that no such payment be made until Mr. Fury complies with the terms of his contract and builds the sump-pit as shown on the plans, the recommendation being based on certain questions submitted to the architect and answered by him.

On motion, duly seconded, it was

Resolved, To approve and adopt the report of the Building Committee.

Mr. Barry, of the Building Committee, recommended that the ejector placed in the north pit of Fordham Hospital be left there, and, on motion, duly seconded, it was

Resolved, Upon the recommendation of the architect and the Building Committee, an expenditure of \$76.50 be authorized for the same.

Dr. Brannan reported upon the formal opening of the day camp, and extended an invitation to the members of the Board of Trustees to be present. Dr. Brannan also mentioned that he had been informed by Dr. Potter, of the Comptroller's office, that a second ferryboat was at the disposal of the Board of Trustees should it wish to establish a second day camp.

On motion, duly seconded, it was

Resolved, To instruct the Superintendent to make inquiries concerning the possibility of obtaining an anchorage for a boat along the water-front opposite Gouverneur Hospital.

Communications.

A communication dated May 29 was received from Messrs. McKim, Mead & White, with copy of a letter to the John H. Parker Company, regarding defective work in the saddles leading from the wards to the large balconies of Pavilions A and B.

On motion, duly seconded and carried, the course taken by the architects in this matter was approved by the Board of Trustees, and the Secretary was instructed to communicate with Mr. Frees, Inspector of Construction, requesting from him an explanation of his failure to notice and report the defective work.

A communication dated June 2 was received from Messrs. McKim, Mead & White, with an estimate of \$120 from the John H. Parker Company for twenty-four wire screens behind the bars at the elevator in the new building.

On motion, duly seconded, it was

Resolved, To approve this estimate and authorize the expenditure of \$120 for the work.

A communication dated May 28 was received from Messrs. McKim, Mead & White, with copy of a letter from Messrs. Peck Brothers & Co., contractors for the sinks of Pavilions A and B.

On motion, duly seconded, it was

Resolved, To accept the offer of Messrs. Peck Brothers & Co. to install such sinks as can be supplied at the present time and to replace the imperfect ones later, provided this is done without additional cost.

A communication dated May 27 was received from the Department of Finance, transmitting a report from the Chief Engineer regarding the contract of Messrs. John R. Sheehan & Co. for the completion of Gouverneur Hospital, and recommending the final payment of \$41,854.50 in full settlement of said contract (a deduction of \$11,538). A communication dated June 1 was received from Mr. Raymond F. Almirall, Architect, recommending final payment to Messrs. John R. Sheehan & Co.

On motion, duly seconded, it was

Resolved, To approve the final payment on the Gouverneur Hospital contract, such course having been recommended both by the Architect and the Department of Finance.

On motion, duly seconded, it was further

Resolved, To request the permission of the Board of Aldermen to conclude the necessary work at Gouverneur Hospital without public letting.

A communication dated June 1 was received from Mr. Raymond F. Almirall, with copies of two letters from Messrs. Blake & Williams, in regard to their proposition for testing the brine pipes at Fordham Hospital.

On motion, duly seconded, it was

Resolved, To return these communications to the Architect, requesting his advice in the matter.

A communication dated May 26 was received from the Board of Estimate and Apportionment transmitting a certified copy of a resolution amending the resolution authorizing the issue of Corporate Stock for the erection and completion of the Bellevue Hospital Training School for Women Nurses by striking therefrom the words "the erection and completion of a building" and inserting in place thereof the words "the erection, completion and equipment of a building."

On motion, duly seconded and carried, this communication was placed on file.

A communication dated May 29 was received from the Board of Aldermen with a resolution authorizing the Trustees of Bellevue and Allied Hospital to purchase in the open market, instead of by contract at public letting, for the use respectively of Gouverneur, Harlem and Fordham hospitals, three ambulances at an expense not to exceed the sum of twenty-one hundred dollars.

On motion, duly seconded and carried, this communication was placed on file.

The minutes of the Harlem Hospital Medical Board for the meeting held on May 26 were received from Dr. Irving S. Haynes, Secretary. The matter of granting a compensation for the X-ray work was referred to the Superintendent for investigation as to the probable cost. The increase in the house staff from eight to ten members was approved. The rule that no patient be allowed to leave the hospital until he has been seen and examined by the Attending Physician or Surgeon on duty or a duly authorized substitute was approved by the Trustees with the addition of the words "so far as practicable." The plans for seats to be used by the visiting physicians witnessing operations were referred to the Superintendent.

The minutes of the Bellevue Hospital Medical Board for the meeting held on June 1 were received from Dr. C. J. Strong, Secretary.

Upon the recommendation of the Medical Board the resignation of Dr. Frederick Gwyer, Attending Surgeon to the Second Division, was accepted with regret, and Dr. John A. Hartwell was promoted to take his place, dating from July 1.

Upon the recommendation of the Conference Committee and the Medical Board Dr. Isidor N. Kahn was appointed Assistant Physician to Out-Patients, Third Division, tuberculosis service.

Dr. Robert Buchanan Kennedy, No. 233 East One Hundred and Ninth street, was, upon the recommendation of the Medical Board, appointed as one-year Intern on the Third Division, in place of Dr. Edward Irving Ives, resigned, the service to date from July 1, 1908.

Applications for leaves of absence were received from Dr. W. K. Draper and Dr. Charles H. Chetwood, and, on motion, duly seconded, it was

Resolved, To grant leave of absence to Dr. Draper from June 5 to June 22, inclusive, and to Dr. Chetwood from June 1 to July 31, inclusive.

A communication dated May 31 was received from Dr. Elsworth Eliot of Gouverneur Hospital in explanation of his absence during the month of May, twenty-two visits having been made by him and nine by Dr. Kellogg during that month.

On motion, duly seconded and carried, this communication was placed on file.

Sir—Pursuant to section 27, chapter 230 of the Laws of 1898, I beg to submit the following report of the proceedings of my Bureau for the three months ending June 30, 1908:

Number of estates reported to and investigated by the Bureau..... 160
Number of estates upon which letters of administration were granted to the Public Administrator upon the application of creditors or next of kin..... 21
Number of estates upon which letters were granted upon the application of the Public Administrator..... 63

Three hundred and sixty-nine estates are at present under administration.

The accounts of proceedings of the Public Administrator have been judicially settled and allowed by the Surrogate in thirty-six estates, and the estates distributed pursuant to the decree of the Surrogate.

GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.
