HEARING ON PROPOSED PLANS FOR TERMINAL FACILITIES IN BROOKLYN.

Public notice is hereby given that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, in pursuance of a resolution duly adopted by said Board on the 14th day of November, 1912, in accordance with the provisions of chapter 776 of the Laws of 1911, known as the New York City Freight Terminals Act, will hold a public hearing in Room 18 (Aldermanic Chamber) of the City Hall, in the Borough of Manhattan, City of New York, at 10.30 o'clock in the forenoon, on Thursday, the 5th day of December, 1912, relative to the application of the Commissioner of Docks to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for authority to adopt plans for terminal facilities and equipment thereof and therefor, to be located upon the lands and lands under water, situate, lying and being on, adjacent or near to the shores of the East River, Buttermilk Channel, Gowanus Bay and Upper Bay, between the foot of Fulton street and the foot of 65th street, Borough of Brooklyn, City of New York.

Notice is further given that at such meeting all parties in interest will be heard by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment prior to the adoption of any resolution by said Board in the premises.

FIRE DEPARTMENT.

Report for the Three Months Ending September 30, 1912.

Hon. WILLIAM J. GAYNOR, Mayor, City of New York:

Sir—Pursuant to the provisions of section 1544 of the Greater New York Charter, I have the honor to transmit herewith report of the operations and action of this Department for the quarter ending September 30, 1912.

Financial.

The budget appropriations made to this Department in the several boroughs for the year 1912 aggregate \$8,537,365.55. Of this amount there was expended during the third quarter \$2,070,336.47, which, added to the outlay during the first and second quarters (\$4,112,584.87) made a total of \$6,182,921.34 for the three quarters, leaving available for use during the remainder of the year a balance of \$2,354,444.21.

Uniformed Force.

On September 30, 1912, the uniformed force in all the boroughs aggregated 4,384. On that date there were in service 259 apparatus companies. During the quarter 22 probationary firemen were appointed and 18 having satisfactorily completed their probationary period of service were appointed fourth-grade firemen. There were three promotions made during the quarter—from Fireman first grade to Engineer of Steamer. The number of retirements, on one-half pay, on own application, was 13. For disability there were six retirements on one-half pay and three on one-third pay, a total of nine. The aggregate number of retirements was 22. The dismissals numbered five and the reinstatements two. There were four deaths on the active list. The deaths of retired and relieved members of the uniformed force totaled nine. There were 365 cases of illness and 122 of injury, being 487 in all, and the time lost from each cause was 5,276 and 2,692 days, respectively, a total of 7,968 days.

Civil Force.

The civilian force on September 30, 1912, numbered 718.

Fire Alarm Telegraph.

At the close of the third quarter the fire alarm telegraph system in the various boroughs consisted in mileage of cable and conductors in subways and of aerial conductor and circuit mileage—the latter both underground and aerial—as follows:

During the period covered by this report several important improvements have been initiated affecting the organization of this Bureau, the results of which, it is believed, will add materially to the efficient conduct of this important branch of the service. Included in this number is the assembling of data essential to a complete and intelligent understanding of the nature, scope and extent of the duties devolving upon the Bureau, the work actually performed therein, and the arrangement of such data in convenient form for reference through the agency, in part, of card indexes and illustrative charts. Another progressive step has been the assignment of a force, under the direction of the Chief Inspector, to inspect and improve conditions of all local apparatus, embracing that in the various fire houses throughout the several boroughs.

In connection with the rehabilitation of the telegraph system, which work is moving onward, it is worthy of note that plans for the new isolated fireproof central station for Manhattan, to front on Transverse Road No. 2, Central Park, are practically completed and that the contract for the erection of the building will be ready for public letting at an early day. Work is also in progress on the plans for similar structures in Crotona Park in The Bronx, and in Prospect Park, Brooklyn. The providing of these stations at the proposed locations is of vital importance to the successful maintenance and operation of an effective fire alarm telegraph system and will render the buildings practically immune from destruction by conflagration or explosion, thereby ensuring the stability and permanence of the system. It is, therefore, essential that at the earliest practicable day the projected buildings should be erected and ready for utilization.

Fire Prevention.

The results achieved since the establishment of the Bureau of Fire Prevention have been in many respects gratifying (notably that of a reduction of \$2,864,022 in the estimated fire loss for the first nine months of 1912 as compared with the like period of 1911), despite the fact that its efforts to accomplish the full measure of good inherent in the law which created it and the subsequent amendments thereto have been seriously circumscribed by the fact that the working force provided for the Bureau is insufficient in numerical strength to meet, as they should be met, the insistent demands with which this branch of the service is confronted. The elimination of fire perils in this city, with its more than five millions of population, is a herculean proposition, but the Department, through the Bureau of Fire Prevention, is resolutely devoting all its energies to the accomplishment of this important duty, and is doing all that lies within its power to correct the conditions which the statute was enacted to remedy. Following is a statement of the operations and action of the Bureau for the third quarter of the current year.

Violations and Auxiliary Fire Appliances.

During the third quarter 1,366 original inspections and 4,655 reinspections were made by inspectors assigned to the Division of Violations and Auxiliary Fire Appliances, other than places of public assembly, to which the fire prevention law is applicable. The total number of orders served during the quarter to remove violations of various kinds was 4,731, of which 2,013 were complied with. Reports of inspections based on complaints investigated, 249 in all, were forwarded for action to those branches of the city government having jurisdiction in the premises. The number of orders rescinded by the Fire Commissioner was nine. The total of applications granted for surveys was four, and the orders upon which they were based were upheld as reasonable by the Board of Survey. Plans, 228 in all, for standpipes, sprinklers, fire-escapes, etc., were examined and approved, and one was examined and disapproved.

During the quarter 56 new installations of sprinklers and repairs to 26 equipments were ordered, 36 being installed or repaired. The number of standpipes ordered installed was 46, and 165 to be repaired. The number installed or repaired during the quarter was 73. Orders to provide 216 new fire-escapes were issued during the quarter and to repair a like number. These orders were complied with in 102 instances. Orders to provide 716 fire-proof waste receptacles were issued, and for repairs to two. As a result there were installed or repaired 235. Structural repairs were directed to the number of 447, and made in 94 instances.

The inspection force of the Division of Places of Public Assembly made 1,613 original inspections, 769 of these at the request of the Police Department, the Bureau of Licenses and the New York State Athletic Commission. The reinspections made numbered 3,404. Monthly moving picture reports from Company Commanders were received and examined in 1,875 cases. The number of standee violations was three. Orders to remove violations were served to the number of 153, of which 44 were complied with, 3 modified, 2 withdrawn, and 22 forwarded to the Legal Division, leaving 82 pending at the end of the quarter. Cases of dangerous conditions to the number of 654 were remedied. Standpipe and sprinkler equipments, five in each instance, were installed and alterations to these types of equipment made in nine and two cases, respectively. Tank alterations were made to one building. Iron balcony fire-escapes were installed to the number of six, portable fire appliances, in all 950, were provided, as was telegraphic communication with Department Headquarters in the case of five buildings, and effective action was taken in various other directions with a view to ensure the safety of the audiences at places of amusement, entertainment or instruction.

Combustibles and Explosives.

In the Division of Combustibles of the several boroughs the total amount of receipts for licenses, permits and penalties was \$28,562. Surveys to the number of 6,944 were made on application to determine the fitness of premises for the storage of combustibles and of explosive material. Blasting operations to the number of 3,748 were supervised by civilian inspectors of blasting, and in 13,793 cases by members of the uniformed force, an aggregate of 17,541 in all. There were 574 seizures of fireworks and 49 of explosives. Orders to the number of 649 were served, of which 182 were complied with. Permits to the number of 3,750 were issued. Certificates of fitness to blast were issued to the number of 352. Orders were issued to provide 198 fireproof receptacles and retainers and to repair 4, which orders were complied with in 92 instances. Orders were also issued to provide 254 miscellaneous fire appliances and to repair 1, and compliance was had in 113 cases.

Fires and Losses.

In the Division of Fire Marshal, Boroughs of Manhattan, The Bronx and Richmond, there were 2,187 fires, involving a total estimated loss of \$1,016,511, representing

an average loss of \$464.79 per fire. In the Boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens the total number of fires was 1,171, total estimated loss \$436,925, average loss per fire \$373.12. The aggregate number of fires in all boroughs was 3,358, with an estimated loss of \$1,453,436.

The total estimated loss by fire in all boroughs of the Greater City for the third quarter of 1911 was \$1,745,207, and for the corresponding period of the current year \$1,453,436, a decrease of \$291,771. The total number of fires for the third quarter of 1911 was 3,173, and for the like period of 1912, 3,358, an increase of 185.

The total estimated loss by fire in all boroughs of the Greater City for the first three quarters of 1911 was \$10,136,459, and for the corresponding period of the current year \$7,272,437, a decrease of \$2,864,022.

The total number of fires for the first three quarters of 1911 was 10,985, and for the corresponding period in the current year 11,811, an increase of 826.

It will thus be observed that as compared with the first three quarters of 1911, while there has been for the corresponding period of the current year an increase of 826 in the number of fires, there has been a decrease in the estimated total loss of \$2,864,022.

The total number of original inspections made by the Division of Fire Marshal in the various boroughs for the third quarter was 232, and of reinspections 459. The number of orders served was 122, of which 43 were complied with.

Arson, Etc.

During the third quarter of the current year there were 10 arrests for arson in the Boroughs of Manhattan, The Bronx and Richmond and 12 in the Boroughs of Richmond and Queens, a total of 22. During the corresponding period of 1911 these figures were 7 and 6, respectively, a total of 13, showing an increase of 9 in the total number of arrests in the third quarter of 1912. The number of convictions in the Boroughs of Manhattan, The Bronx and Richmond during the third quarter of the current year was 4, and in the Boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens 2, a total of 6, as against 3 in the Boroughs of Manhattan, The Bronx and Richmond, and 1 in the Boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens during the corresponding period of 1911, a total of 4, being an increase of 2 in the number of convictions for the third quarter of 1912, as compared with the like period in 1911.

Prosecutions.

The activities of the Legal Division during the third quarter have been productive of satisfactory results. The number of orders served was 5,775, of which 457 had been complied with at the end of the quarter. Reinspections totalling 2,309 were made by the field force. Cases to the number of 115 were prosecuted in the Police Courts, resulting in 16 convictions with 12 discharges and the withdrawal of complaints in 20 cases, the orders having been complied with, leaving 67 pending at the close of the quarter.

Apparatus and Hose.

During the third quarter 8 pieces of motor apparatus were acquired, consisting of 2 75-foot hook and ladder trucks, 3 auto hose wagons, 2 touring cars and 1 one-ton delivery truck. Fire hose to the amount of 26,000 feet was purchased by contract based upon bids received at public letting.

Buildings.

During the third quarter contracts were awarded at public letting and work thereunder begun for erecting 2 apparatus houses in the Borough of The Bronx, 2 in the Borough of Brooklyn and 2 in the Borough of Queens, a total of 6 at a cost of \$247,419. Contracts were also awarded for installing new steel doors at the quarters of 4 apparatus houses in the Borough of Manhattan at an outlay of \$1,995. Minor repair jobs, 347 in all, were done to buildings by Department mechanics, involving an expenditure of \$12,854.52, and 46 by open market order, at a cost of \$6,052.91.

Horses.

At the close of the third quarter there were in service 1,434 horses.

Contracts, Agreements and Open-Market Orders.

Contracts executed for furnishing apparatus and supplies for erecting new buildings and for architects' services amounted for the third quarter to \$946,590.28.

During the period covered by this report 160 contract orders were issued in the gross sum of \$334,974.99, and 770 open market orders to the amount of \$49,765.06. Respectfully,

Extent of damage to buildings and vessels—Built mainly of brick, stone or iron—Slight, 102; considerable, 17. Built mainly of wood—Slight, 26; considerable, 16; destroyed, 7; total, 168. Between 6 a. m. and 6 p. m., 1,152; between 6 p. m. and 6 a. m., 1,035; total, 2,187.

Water consumption—20,705,297 gallons, of which 12,349,331 gallons were river water, used by fireboats in all boroughs.

The Engineering Division supervised and inspected all work done by the National India Rubber Company and the Waterbury Company during this quarter on the following installations: Upper Manhattan installation, Manhattan; 3d avenue installation, Manhattan; Myrtle avenue installation, Brooklyn; Jackson avenue installation, Queens, and Manhattan Bridge installation, Manhattan and Brooklyn.

Progress.

The most important advances made during the last quarter in this Bureau are improvements in organization.

The Boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens have, for some time, been extremely troublesome, in that improvements ordered experienced long and apparently unwarranted delays before completion. I caused my Assistant Electrical Engineer Fendrich to be placed in charge of Brooklyn and Queens, and through him have succeeded in establishing a very creditable working organization in those Boroughs.

Chief Inspector Martin, formerly in charge of Brooklyn, has been placed at the head of a newly created squad, the duty of which is to inspect and improve conditions of all local apparatus throughout the various Boroughs. Many of the instruments in Company houses have apparently never been renovated since their installation. It has been former practice to wait until a fault developed before an instrument was overhauled. I am now taking steps tending to prevent the occurrence of a fault.

Conditions in the Borough of Richmond have also, for some time, been unsatisfactory, due principally to the fact that Operator Sims was in charge of this Borough and had failed to obtain the full co-operation of his working force. After a thorough investigation, I caused Operator Cusack to be placed in charge of the Borough of Richmond, and through Operator Sims, who is an expert instrument man, am renovating all local apparatus throughout the said Borough.

Records.

One of the many serious drawbacks to the proper administration of this Bureau has been and is the lack of authentic records showing circuits, location of boxes, character of boxes, and other conditions incident to Fire Telegraph Service. What information of this character there was in the Bureau existed principally in the

minds and in the private records of various individuals. Much of the time of the last quarter has been expended in collecting such private information and reducing it to record in convenient form, including card indexes and illustrative charts for ready reference. Such charts and records are absolutely necessary before an intelligent improvement of the entire Fire Telegraph system can be effected.

Speedy progress on new work has been greatly handicapped the last quarter by the many and frequent breakdowns in the old overloaded system. For weeks at a time the entire force has been engaged on emergent work necessary to keep the Fire Telegraph in service.

In the Borough of Brooklyn, the greatest amount of maintenance trouble has arisen from loops extended from Fire Telegraph lines on to private property, providing service with what is known as "Class 3" boxes. Standard uniform practice tending to the betterment of circuit conditions in Class 3 service has been brought about and is working out satisfactorily.

I have removed every Fire Telegraph attachment from Bushwick avenue from Myrtle to Jamaica avenues.

Until the last quarter, conditions have been such that the development of a serious fault in the 3d avenue cable would have thrown out the Fire Telegraph Service over practically one-sixth of the Borough of Manhattan. Knowing that the development of such a fault was not unlikely, I established an emergency cut-over between the 3d and 9th avenue cables so that service can be shifted to 9th avenue in about thirty minutes instead of requiring otherwise several days to resume service in the case of such a drawback. This emergency cut-over was actually required within forty-eight hours of the time it was completed.

New Work.

Specifications have been completed for a contract covering a run from the present headquarters along 68th street to Madison avenue, which, together with the newly completed appendix to the National India Rubber contract, completes the specifications for the run down 3d avenue and up Madison avenue. This work, when completed, will do away with the 3d avenue cable attached to the elevated structure, and in dangerous condition.

It has been found necessary to make some few improvements in the base and sub-base of the new posts, five hundred of which have already been bought. The new board wiring for Headquarters in Manhattan has been almost completed.

Much time has been spent in conference with the architects drawing the plans for the three new Bureau buildings. The plans for the Bureau building in Central Park are practically completed, even to details, and the contract should be let in the very near future. Less progress has been made on the plans of the Bureau buildings for Crotona Park and Prospect Park.

One large contract for the improvement of Fire Telegraph conditions in the Borough of The Bronx is well under way, but the completion of specifications for the same is hindered on account of lack of transportation facilities. The location for each new post must be mutually agreed to by a representative of this Bureau and by a representative of the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity. The three runabouts in this Bureau must be employed nearly all the time for emergency service in the maintenance of the old system.

Another serious drawback to progress, especially of new work, is inadequate typewriting force. But two stenographers are employed by the Bureau; one in the Borough of Brooklyn and one in the Borough of Manhattan. Tabulations on new specification work alone is more than enough to occupy the time of two copyists.

Designing.

Some time has been spent on post and terminal box designs, calculated to embody the invention of the Fire Commissioner providing fire extinguishing apparatus at a box location.

A new cut-out box has been designed for Class 3 service, for the purpose of speedily cutting out a defective loop.

A new selecting switch for Engine House circuits has been designed to overcome defects in the present switch employed.

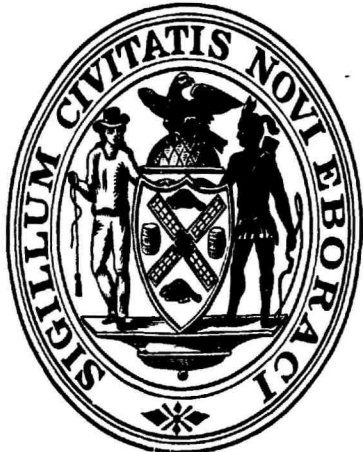

TERMS AND CONDITIONS UNDER WHICH BUILDINGS, ETC., WILL BE SOLD FOR REMOVAL FROM CITY PROPERTY.

THE BUILDINGS AND APPURTENANCES thereto will be sold to the highest bidder, who must pay cash or certified check, drawn to the order of the Comptroller of The City of New York, and must also give a certified check or cash in half the amount of the purchase price as security for the faithful performance of the terms and conditions of the sale. Where the amount of the purchase price does not equal or exceed the sum of \$50, the sum of \$50 shall be the amount of the security to be deposited. This security may at any time after the expiration of the contract period be applied by the City to the cost of completing any of the work required under the contract, but unfinished at the expiration of the contract period.

The purchaser shall not lease, occupy, cause or permit the building or buildings, etc., purchased by him to be used or occupied for any purpose other than that of their speedy removal, nor shall he collect any rental or other revenue for the use of either the land or the buildings, etc., situated thereon. The breach of either or any of these conditions shall forthwith void the sale and cause immediate forfeiture of the purchase money and the security deposited for the faithful performance of the conditions of the sale. The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money or corporate stock or certificates of indebtedness of any nature issued by The City of New York, which the Comptroller shall approve as of equal value with the security required in the advertisement, to the amount of not less than three nor more than five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.
