MUNICIPAL CIVIL SERVICE COMMISSION.

Minutes of Meeting of the Municipal Civil Service Commission of New York, Held Wednesday, November 12, 1913, at 10 o'clock A. M.

Present—President Frank Gallagher and Commissioners Alexander Keogh and Richard Welling. The President presided.

A public hearing was had on the proposed amendment of rule 7 of the rules of the Municipal Civil Service Commission by changing paragraph 4 thereof to read as follows:

"4. The subjects of examination and the relative weight given to each, where not fixed by these rules or by regulation, shall be fixed by the Chief Examiner, upon the recommendation of the Advisory Board, subject to the direction of the Commission.

"The Chief Examiner shall assign the examiners for a given examination, or for a given subject, except where experts are employed, and all written questions prepared by such examiners or experts shall be placed in his custody in advance of such examination. Such questions shall be printed, from type or other process, under his immediate supervision and, unless relieved by the Commission, he shall be responsible for their safekeeping. So far as practicable, such printing shall be done on the day of the examination."

There were no appearances.

A public hearing was had on the proposed amendment of the Municipal Civil Service Classification by striking from the Exempt Class, under the heading "Health

Department," the following: "2 Sanitary Engineers," and by including in the Competitive Class, part 4 (the Inspection Service), group 5, Inspectors, Miscellaneous, the title: "Sanitary Engineer." Dr. Marion B. McMillan, Assistant Sanitary Superintendent of the Department of Health, appeared in behalf of the proposed amendment. There were no other appearances and the Chair declared the hearing closed.

The Commission then went into regular session and the minutes of the meeting held November 5, 1913, were approved.

On motion, the matter of the proposed amendment of paragraph 4 of rule 7 of the Rules of the Municipal Civil Service Commission was laid over.

On motion, the application of the Commissioner of the Department of Health for an amendment of the classification by striking from the exempt class for his department "2 Sanitary Engineers" and including in the competitive class, part 4 (the Inspection Service), group 5 (Inspectors, Miscellaneous), the title "Sanitary Engineer" was denied.

Harry E. Carver of 15 North 8th st., East Orange, N. J., failed to appear, as directed, to show cause why his name should not be removed from the eligible list of Assistant Electrical Engineer for the reason that he was not a resident of the State of New York. On motion, it was

Resolved, That the name of Harry E. Carver of 15 North 8th st., East Orange, N. J., be and the same hereby is removed from the eligible list of Assistant Electrical Engineer for the reason that he is not a resident of the State of New York, and is, therefore, ineligible for appointment under the recent ordinance of the Board of Aldermen requiring residence in the State of New York by all employees of the city government.

Matters, Not Upon the Calendar, Considered by Unanimous Consent.

A report, dated November 11, was presented from the Chief Examiner, transmitting a circular containing the requirements for the physical examination for the position of Police Matron, prepared by Doctors Warbasse and de Forest, and approved by the Advisory Board of the Commission, reading as follows:

"Municipal Civil Service Commission of The City of New York, Bureau of Physical Examinations.

"Standards Required in Applicants for the Position of Police Matron.

"Experience has shown that many applicants are rejected at their medical examination for defects which would have been remedied had the applicant been informed beforehand of the standard of physique required by the Civil Service Commission. The following information, therefore, is furnished to remedy this defect. To save unnecessary trouble and expense, it is well that each candidate should have herself examined, as a preliminary measure, by her family physician, in order to be sure that she conforms to this standard and that she is not suffering from ailments or defects which would necessarily cause her to be rejected.

"The Medical Examiner is prohibited by the rules of this Commission from examining candidates in his private capacity as a physician, and applicants will, therefore, not call upon him for information or special examination.

"Age—Not less than thirty at time of application, nor more than forty.

"General Appearance—The applicant must be free from any marked deformity, free from all parasitic or systemic skin diseases, and from evidence of intemperance in the use of stimulants or drugs. The body must be well proportioned, of good muscular development, and show careful attention to personal cleanliness.

"Obesity, muscular weakness or poor physique must reject.

"Height—Not less than 5 feet 6 inches, taken barefoot.

"Weight—Not less than 130 pounds. All measurements taken in light clothing.

"Nose, Mouth and Teeth—Obstruction to free breathing, chronic catarrh, or offensive breath must reject.

"The mouth must be free from deformities or conditions that interfere with distinct speech, or that predispose to disease of the ear, nose or throat.

"Teeth must be clean, well cared for and free from multiple cavities. There must be at least two molar teeth in each jaw on each side, and these teeth in good apposition for proper mastication. The jaws must be free from badly broken or decayed teeth, so far destroyed as to render filling or crowning impossible. Missing teeth may be supplied by crown or bridge work; where site of teeth makes this impossible, rubber dentures will be accepted. At least twenty natural teeth should be present.

"Rupture in any form must reject.

"Rectum and anus fissures, fistulas, and external or internal piles must reject.

"Varicose veins or a marked tendency to their formation must reject.

"Arms and legs, hand and feet must be free from affections of the joints, sprains, stiffness or other condition, such as flatfoot, ingrowing nails or hammer toes, which would prevent the proper and easy performance of duty.

"Eyes—The applicant must be free from color blindness and be able to read with each eye, separately, standard test types, No. 20, at a distance of 20 feet. Loss of either eye, chronic inflammation of the lids or permanent abnormalities of either eye must reject.

"Ears—Normal hearing with each ear is required.

"Respiration must be full, easy and regular. The respiratory murmur must be clear and distinct over both lungs, and no disease of the respiratory organs be present.

"Circulation—The action of the heart must be normal, its rhythm regular, and the heart free from organic disease.

"Brains and nervous system must be free from disease.

"Kidneys must be healthy and the urine normal.

"Pelvic organs must be normal and menstruation regular.

"The examination of the heart, feet, lungs and groins will be made in the presence of a woman physician.

"Inasmuch as the physical tests require a certain amount of agility, it is suggested that each applicant come provided with a gymnasium suit or bathing suit and slippers of the "sneaker" type.

"The necessity for the selection of such women only as are sound in all respects, and are in every way physically qualified for the position, is self-evident. The foregoing qualifications are indispensable, but it is understood that the Medical Examiner will put such other questions or tests, bearing upon each case as he may think necessary and proper, and that the whole examination will be thorough, exact and circumstantial.

"The Medical Examiner shall also test the strength, activity and physical capacity of all applicants who come up to the standard required in the medical examination by suitable examination into the strength of back, chest, legs, arms, etc., which tests shall be submitted to and approved by the Commission. The strength shall be determined by lifting dumb-bells and weights, chinning horizontal bars, grip of hands, pulling and pushing with arms. Agility shall be tested by jumping.

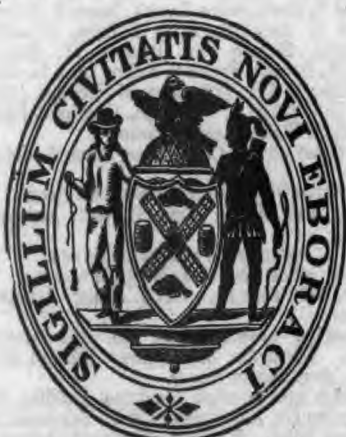

Whereas, By a contract dated July 10, 1912, the Company was authorized to construct, maintain and operate a street surface railway upon and along Desbrosses, Vestry, Washington, Greenwich and Canal streets, in the Borough of Manhattan, and to across the Manhattan Bridge, and upon and along Flatbush Avenue Extension and other streets in the Borough of Brooklyn, from the Desbrosses Street Ferry, Borough of Manhattan, to the Long Island Railroad Depot, Borough of Brooklyn; and

Whereas, By a contract dated 1913, said contract of July 10, 1912, was amended by extending the times for commencement and completion of construction; and

Whereas, The Company has by a petition dated September 25, 1913, applied to the Board for certain modifications and amendments in and to said contract dated July 10, 1912, as amended by said contract dated 1913, to wit:

First—By substituting for that portion of the route authorized by said contract of July 10, 1912, upon and along Rockwell place, Flatbush ave. from Rockwell place to 4th ave., 4th, Atlantic and 3d aves. in the Borough of Brooklyn, the following routes:

(a) An additional single track upon and along Fulton st. from Flatbush Avenue Extension to Rockwell place; thence by double track upon and along Fulton st. and Ashland place from Rockwell place to Hanson place.

(b) A single track upon and along Lafayette ave. and Flatbush ave. from the above described route on Ashland place to and connecting with the existing route of the Company in Flatbush ave. between 3d ave. and Livingston st.

Second—By amending Section 2, sixth of said contract of July 10, 1912, by permitting the use of overhead electric power upon the Manhattan Bridge, its terminals and approaches.

Amendment to Sanitary Code.

AT A MEETING OF THE BOARD OF
Health of the Department of Health, held De-
cember 9, 1913, the following resolution was
adopted:

Resolved, That section 108 of the Sanitary
Code be and the same is hereby amended to
take effect January 1, 1914, so as to read as
follows:

Section 108. It shall be the duty of every
owner, tenant, lessee, occupant or person in
charge of any and every building or place of
business in the generally built-up portions of
the City of New York forthwith to provide or
cause to be provided, and at all times there-
after to keep and cause to be kept and provided,
within such building or place of business, and
for the exclusive use of such building or place
of business, separate receptacles for receiving
and holding, without leakage, all the ashes, gar-
bage and liquid substances that may accumu-
late during thirty-six hours, from said building
or place of business, or the portion thereof of
which such person may be the owner, tenant,
lessee, occupant or in charge, and every such
receptacle designed and used to hold ashes shall
be made of or lined with some suitable metal.

And it shall be the duty of every owner,
lessee or agent of any such building or place
of business to cause to be separated and put
into their respective receptacles all such mate-
rials and substances, and such receptacles shall
not be filled to within four inches of the top
thereof.

And such receptacles, as well as any light
refuse or rubbish to be removed, shall be kept
within the premises until the proper time for
removal, and shall then be placed in the area,
or within the stoop line, fence or other en-
closure in front of any building and not upon
the sidewalk, and shall there remain until such
materials or substances are removed by the De-
partment of Street Cleaning, but in no case
shall such receptacles be placed where they shall
be or become a nuisance.

All light refuse or rubbish likely to be scat-
tered or blown about shall, before being placed
outside of any building or premises for re-
moval, be properly bundled, packed or other-
wise secured.

Any receptacle containing garbage or liquid
substances, which shall be placed outside of a
building in the area or within the stoop line,
fence or other enclosure shall be covered and
kept covered until such removal, as aforesaid.

The foregoing provisions are applicable through-
out The City of New York, except that in the
Borough of Richmond ashes from house furnaces
shall be kept in a receptacle separate and apart
from the remainder of the household waste, and
no material other than furnace ashes shall be
placed in said receptacle. Other household waste
materials, including garbage, kitchen ashes,
sweepings, soiled paper or rubbish shall be
placed in a separate metal or metal lined re-
ceptacle, which when placed outside of a build-
ing for removal shall be covered and kept cov-
ered with a tight fitting cover.

No receptacle shall when filled contain more
than two cubic feet of material nor weigh more
than one hundred pounds, and a sufficient num-
ber of receptacles shall be provided by the owner,
lessee or occupant of a building to hold what-
ever ashes or other waste materials may accumu-
late thereat during sixty hours next preced-
ing the removal thereof.

Newspapers, wrapping paper and other light
rubbish likely to be blown or scattered about the
street shall be securely bundled, tied or
packed before placed for removal. Yard sweep-
ings, hedge cuttings, grass, leaves, earth, stone
bricks or trade waste shall not be mixed with
household waste.

Accumulations of household refuse resulting
from failure to take advantage of the regular
collection service shall be removed at the ex-
pense of the person or persons concerned.

Resolved, That the Sanitary Code be and the
same is hereby amended by the adoption of an
additional section to be known as section sixty-
seven (a), to take effect March 1, 1914, and to
read as follows:

Section 67a. Bichloride of mercury, other-
wise known as corrosive sublimate, shall not be
sold, kept, sold or offered for sale at retail
in the dry form except in colored tablets indi-
vidually wrapped, the wrapper to have the word
"Poison" in plain letters conspicuously placed,
and dispensed in sealed containers of glass,
conspicuously labeled with the word "Poison" in
red letters.

This section does not apply to tablets contain-
ing one-tenth of a grain or less of bichloride
of mercury.

THE BUILDINGS AND APPURTENANCES thereto will be sold to the highest bidder, who must pay cash or certified check, drawn to the order of the Comptroller of The City of New York, and must also give a certified check or cash in half the amount of the purchase price as security for the faithful performance of the terms and conditions of the sale. Where the amount of the purchase price does not equal or exceed the sum of \$50, the sum of \$50 shall be the amount of the security to be deposited. Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a Department, chief of a Bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work, or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money or corporate stock or certificates of indebtedness of any nature issued by The City of New York, which the Comptroller shall approve as of equal value with the security required in the advertisement, to the amount of not less than three nor more than five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there
