On the recommendation of the Advisory Board in reports (3) dated May 8, it was

After consideration of a report and recommendation of the Advisory Board under date of May 8, it was

Resolved, That Regulation VII, paragraph 2 (Age Limitations) of the Regulations of the Municipal Civil Service Commission be and the same is hereby amended so as to include age limitations of 21 to 40 years for the position of Craneman (Electric).

Recommendation: That variation be granted permitting the employment of not to exceed twenty persons on the 2d floor of this building during the months of September and October, 1918.

5. Premises affected: Herkimer (Gem Department); appellant, Union Mills, Inc. Provide suitable and convenient dressing room for use of females on 2d, 3d and 4th floors. (Feb. 1, 1918.) On floors mentioned there is a cloak room, and on 1st floor is a hospital; fully equipped with bed, chairs and First Aid Kit. The room measures 6 feet 6 inches; is enclosed to ceiling and provided with door. The Inspector visited each floor and indicated space on 2d and 3d floors where suitable dressing room could be provided; no space on 4th floor without removing considerable machinery.

Recommendation: That rest room measuring 11 feet by 22 feet with window to outer air be provided where indicated on 3d floor for the 63 females employed thereon; that rest room measuring 9 feet by 18 feet with window to outer air be provided where indicated on 2d floor for the 63 females employed thereon; there is a stairway from 3d to 4th floors near where dressing room on 3d floor is to be located, and would recommend that order be waived in so far as it relates to 4th floor and the 40 females on 4th floor use rest room on 3d floor.

6. Premises affected: Lyndenville; appellant, The Lyndenville Canning Co., Inc., 5—Prohibit occupancy. 6—Additional exit, 7—Enclose exit stairs according to section 79-a-3. 8—Make roof of stairway enclosure of fireproof material 4 inches thick. 9—Self-closing firedoors at openings to stairway enclosure. 10—Stairs of incombustible material. (July 25, 1917.) Two-story non-fireproof building erected since Oct. 1, 1913; no sprinkler; combustibles; no fire alarm; occupancy, 15 to 50; above 1st floor, 2; exits 1 interior stairway not properly enclosed with fireproof partitions, and 1 exterior unenclosed wooden stairway. This matter was before the Industrial Commission on Sept. 26, 1916, and present interior stairway accepted on condition that a similar interior stairway be provided at a remote point, viz., the easterly end. In lieu of the interior stairway an exterior stairway from 2d floor to grade was provided. Business now under different management.

Recommendation: Inasmuch as there are but two persons on 2d floor, accept present exits on condition that occupancy be not increased. No. 5 to be automatically waived and Nos. 7, 8, 9 and 10 waived while occupancy remains unchanged.

7. Premises affected: Newark (DuBois Building); appellant, Newark Union Gazette, 1—Proper safety devices for elevator. (July 26, 1918.) Elevator suspended on two cables, each winding on separate drum overhead; two guide rails on one side of shaftway and car fitted with one guide shoe at each corner (4 in all), on one side of car only; hand-power elevator; limit of car 10 feet; used for freight only; two employees.

Recommendation: Waival of orders while conditions and occupancy remain unchanged.

8. Premises affected: Mt. Morris; appellant, Winters & Prophet Canning Co. Additional exit, 1, 2, and 3-story building, wood construction; open lofts; no sprinkler; no combustibles; no fire alarm; occupancy, 152; above the 1st floor, 33; above the 2d floor, 2; exits, one interior wood-enclosed stairway at southeast corner of 3-story section extending from 1st to 3d floors; a cleared runway at north side of building extending from 3d floor level to adjoining 2-story building and thence by stairs to grade; opening at northeast corner on 2d floor leading to roof of 1-story building, from which an outside stairway extends to ground.

Recommendation: While conditions and occupancy remain unchanged, accept present exits, outside stairway to be kept free and clear of ice and snow at all times.

9. Premises affected: Newburgh, South Plank rd, and Wisner ave.; appellant, DuPont Fabrikoid Co. Re exits, section 79-a, 2-story building, constructed of wood with wood and concrete floors and roof of wood and corrugated iron; at southwest and northwest ends are interior unenclosed wooden stairs from 1st to 2d floors; automatic sprinkler provided; building located outside the fence line of the factory proper and is to be used by the female employees to change their clothing; at intervals from 50 to 250 women will use the building, but the entire number will not occupy the building at any one time; it is desired to erect an outside metal fire escape at the southeast corner as a means of exit.

Recommendation: Accept as a means of exit from this building an outside iron stairway leading from 2d floor to grade, with a nonfireproof door leading thereto, same to be constructed to open outwardly so as not to obstruct the stairway, said iron stairway to be located at the southeast corner of building; the interior unenclosed wooden stairways to be accepted as exits, conditioned on present character and use of the building.

10. Premises affected: Pelham, Sparks ave.; appellant, Westchester County Brewing Co. Fireproof openings on course of fire escape, 4-story building erected before Oct. 1, 1913; no sprinkler; no combustibles; no fire alarm; occupancy, 19; above 1st floor, 7; above the 2d floor, one or two occasionally; exits, one 36-inch interior unenclosed stairway and a fire escape, the windows opening on the course of which are not fireproofed; exits at 4th floor not remote; from stairway. No safe egress from roof.

Recommendation: While conditions and occupancy remain unchanged accept fire escape as at present constructed as a required means of exit.

11. Premises affected: Peekskill, 116-120 North Broad st; appellant, T. J. Maxwell Co. 3—Fire alarm signal system. (April 23, 1917.) 4-story frame building; open lofts; no sprinkler; no combustibles; no fire alarm system; occupancy, 100; 75 above the 1st floor, 25 above 2d floor; exits, two interior stairways enclosed with wood and plaster; exits remote; there is also a fire escape.

Recommendation: Inasmuch as this plant is kept in clean and sanitary condition, all exits free and unobstructed, accept a Class "B" system.

12. Premises affected, Troy, 647-649 3d ave., rear; appellant, Monarch Brush Co. Provide additional means of exit as per section 79-b. 3-story building used for storage on 1st floor, manufacturers of brush handles on 2d with an occupancy of 9 persons, and live storage on 3d floor with no regular occupancy; open lofts; no sprinkler; no fire alarm signal system; no combustibles; exists, one interior stairway from 1st to 2d floors at center of building and continued from 2d to 3d floors at south end thereof; imperfect horizontal exit on 2d floor leading to 2-story building and an imperfect horizontal exit on 3d floor in the form of a wooden bridge over roof of 2-story building to 3d floor of front factory building; exists remote; on 1st floor there is access to 2-story building through openings in fire wall.

Recommendation: In view of the fact that there are but 9 people employed on 2d floor and no one permanently employed on 3d floor, accept the openings in fire wall at 1st and 2d floor and bridge on 3d floor while conditions and occupancy remain unchanged.

13. Premises affected: Sag Harbor, Jermain

ave.; appellant, Harry W. Butts for Engravers' & Printers' Machinery Co. Variation requested from section 79-a for building erected for use of Engravers' & Printers' Machinery Co. 1—Termination of stairway enclosure at main story at underside of roof. 2—Acceptance as a required means of exit of a 6-foot concrete ramp from northeasterly corner of easterly section extending from 2d floor to ground. 3—Construct auxiliary stairway from 1st to 2d floor in westerly section along southerly side, same to be enclosed as per 504-c. 4—Acceptance as 2d means of exit from cellar of wooden stairs to 1st floor enclosed with fire resisting partitions as per rule 504-c. 2-story and cellar; cellar located in center and measures 32 feet by 14 feet; 1st and 2d floors of building, easterly section measures 31 by 61 feet, westerly section 40 by 40 feet; floor areas each section, 3,000 square feet; exists from cellar; exterior concrete stairway and wooden stairway from 1st floor, said wooden stairway is being enclosed with 2x4 studs, wooden lath and plaster; there is exit on 1st floor at easterly and westerly ends; there is a 22-inch stairway at front or easterly end from 2d floor, and appellant desires the acceptance as a required means of exit of a ramp 6 feet wide, constructed of concrete, extending from 2d floor to grade, same to be located at northeasterly corner. There is also a stairway at the southerly side in the westerly section, which is enclosed with wood studs, 2 by 4, and plaster, which enclosure does not extend to roof. Recommendation: Enclosure of front stairway fireproof from flooring of 2d floor with nonfireproof doors from street, said enclosure to terminate at underside of roof, a window to outer air to be provided therein. Acceptance of ramp 6 feet wide, of concrete construction, at northeasterly end, with proper handrails, and fireproof self-closing door opening onto said ramp and steps provided at one side the entire length of ramp, said steps to occupy the entire width of ramp. Acceptance of an enclosure conforming to rule 504-c, for auxiliary stairway in westerly wing; acceptance of wooden stairs and a 504-c enclosure for stairway from 1st floor to cellar; opening between two sections to be maintained as per section 79-f-9, equipped with self-closing fire doors provided with fusible link, said doors to remain open at all times when anyone is at work in the building. Doorway on 2d floor to auxiliary stairway to be provided with self-closing firedoor, equipped with fusible link.

14. Premises affected: Watertown, Mill and Moulton sts, Building 3; appellant, J. B. Wise, Inc., 9—Prohibit occupancy. 10—Additional exit. (April 12, 1917.) 3-story and basement building, erected before Oct. 1, 1913; open lofts; sprinkler with two sources of water supply; combustibles carried; no fire alarm signal system; occupancy, 29; above the 1st floor, 19; above the 2d floor, 15; exists, one interior enclosed stairway extending from 1st to 3d floors at Mill st end; doors to same open outwardly, but are not self-closing; fire escape on Building No. 2 accessible from 3d floor over roof of Building No. 2, which is 2-story and basement high; fire escape remote from stairway; horizontal exit on each floor leading to adjoining building; same is not remote from stairway; no fireproof base for horizontal exit; safe egress from roof; window on 2d floor Building No. 2 not fireproof; windows on 2d floor under balcony not fireproofed; window Building No. 2, 1st floor, under 2d floor balcony, not fireproofed; transom over 1st floor doorway not fireproofed; stairway from 2d floor to ground is covered on underside with sheet metal for the 1st flight down; windows underneath should be fireproofed; door to balcony, 2d floor Building No. 2, is double and of iron, but not self-closing.

Recommendation: Accept fire escape as required means of exit while conditions and occupancy remain unchanged if sprinkler head be located in center of space over following windows about 12 inches from top of said window as follows: Window on course of stairway to roof, window on 2d floor underneath balcony on roof, window on 1st floor underneath 2d floor balcony, and one over transom of 1st floor door. Doors opening onto balcony at 2d floor of building, two, to be made self-closing and equipped with fusible link.

15. Premises affected: Watertown, Water st (Main Building); appellant, J. B. Wise, Inc. 32—Self-closing firedoors at elevator shaft. 34—Self-closing firedoors at entrance to stairway tower. 35—Enclose stairways fireproof, eliminating glass. 36—Skylight in stairway enclosure. 37—Stairs to roof. 38—Four additional exits. 39—Prohibit occupancy. 40—Fire alarm signal system. 41—Fire drills. 2-story building constructed since Oct. 1, 1913; on concrete foundation (nonfireproof); open lofts; no sprinkler; no fire alarm; occupancy, 184; above 1st floor, 92; there will at times be as many as 150 above the 1st floor; exists, two interior stairways not properly enclosed with fireproof partitions, doors to stairway open outwardly; doors not self-closing; exists remote; no safe egress from roof; building measures 360 by 46 feet, with an "L" 172 feet 6 inches by 33 feet. Inspector Service took this matter up with J. B. Wise (deceased on July 5, 1915), and advised him to procure an Engineer. On August 24 the inspector took up the matter with Mr. Wise and his engineer named Steage. Plans were drawn up but not submitted to the Department. Inspector went over the matter with Mr. Wise and the Engineer and it was agreed that Mr. Wise would meet his Engineer in Albany on Thursday of the week of Aug. 24, 1915, relative to filing plan. Neither stairway conforms to section 79-a; two elevator shafts; no skylight; no openings in shaft; no firedoors. No. 32—Elevator shafts concrete; gates opening to westerly elevator; no firedoors; easterly elevator not in use, but has openings 1st and 2d floors; no firedoors; no openings to outer air in either shaft. No. 34—2d floor has wooden door from water closet to stairway; this should be fireproof; double firedoors provided at entrance to stairway towers, opening outwardly, but not self-closing; No. 35—Wall between factory proper and stairway is of concrete for a distance of 5 feet, balance of distance to roof is metal frames and wired glass. In several panels are windows with self-closing devices; some panels of glass were missing. The entire tower stairway, including time office, is surrounded by fire wall; all interior partitions in said tower on 1st floor are of wood with common glass; to make stairway a separate fireproof tower these partitions should be fireproofed; within the tower of the 2d floor is the draughting room. The wall to stairway enclosure is concrete, 14 inches thick and 5 feet high, with wired glass in metal frames for the remainder of the distance, which makes the wired glass a larger area than the concrete wall. The present construction, inasmuch as the building is but 2 stories high, would probably retard fire until the occupants of the 2d floor could escape. No. 36—No windows in exterior wall of tower on westerly side; tower on easterly side has window. Westerly stairway terminates directly to outer air, the only other opening being entrance to stairway at 2d floor. No. 37—Building isolated; no egress to adjoining tower. No. 38—Four exits not required now; only sufficient to have not more than 100 feet distant between points of exit. No. 39—Will be waived when work called for is done. No. 40 and No. 41 not required in 2-story building.

Recommendation: In view of the fact that there are but 9 people employed on 2d floor and no one permanently employed on 3d floor, accept the openings in fire wall at 1st and 2d floor and bridge on 3d floor while conditions and occupancy remain unchanged.

When this work is completed the present partitions with wired glass will be accepted. No. 36—Window or skylight to be provided in westerly tower; accept window from roof; order waived by amendment to law. No. 38—Law amended; will accept a sufficient number of exits as per section 79-a-3, so that no point on a floor will be more than 100 feet from an exit. Orders No. 40 and No. 41 withdrawn.

And it appearing that there are practical difficulties and unnecessary hardship in complying with the strict provisions of law and of the Industrial Code on the premises noted herein, and that in granting the variations set forth in each case the spirit of the law and of the Code will be adhered to and public safety secured; and

It further appearing that each of the appellants herein has been advised that he would have an opportunity to appear and be heard at this time and place if be so desired, and such of the appellants who appeared having been heard by the Commission, therefore be it

Resolved, by the State Industrial Commission, that the variations noted herein be granted to the appellants in each case, affecting the premises noted with the understanding that said variation is effective only so long as the conditions and occupancy remain as of this date.




