

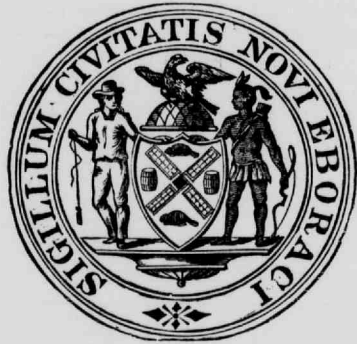

HEALTH DEPARTMENT OF THE CITY OF NEW YORK,
NEW YORK, February 17, 1880.

The Board of Health met this day.

Reports.

Sanitary Bureau.

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending February 14, 1880:

The total number of inspections made by the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors was 1685, as follows, viz.: 2 public buildings, 796 tenement houses, 88 private dwellings, 95 other dwellings, 10 manufactories and workshops, 12 stores and warehouses, 45 stables, 38 slaughter-houses, 1 lime-kiln, 2 manure dumps, 1 garbage dump, 1 oil works, 1 stock yard, 4 sunken and vacant lots, 1 public pound, 1 public bridge, 1 lodging-house, 58 yards, courts, and areas, 126 cellars and basements, 91 waste pipes and drains, 228 privies and water-closets, 25 streets, gutters, and side-walks, 15 dangerous stairways, 3 smoky chimneys, 1 cesspool, 14 other nuisances.

The number of reports thereon received from the Inspectors was 962.

During the past week 83 complaints were received from citizens, and referred to the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.

Permits were issued to the consignees of 95 vessels to discharge cargoes, on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port.

44 permits were granted scavengers to empty, clean, and disinfect privy sinks.

The Disinfecting Corps have visited 93 premises where contagious diseases were found, and have disinfected and fumigated 80 houses, 80 privy sinks, together with clothing, bedding, etc.

Two cases of contagious disease were removed to the hospital by the Ambulance Corps.

Bureau of Vital Statistics.

The certificates of 564 births, 52 still-births, 183 marriages, and 532 deaths, reported to have taken place in this city, were received by this Bureau during the week ending Saturday, February 14, 1880. This shows an increase of 41 births, 3 still-births, and 11 deaths, and a decrease of 39 marriages, when compared with the number received during the preceding week, but when compared with the corresponding week of the year 1879, there was an increase of 188 births, 5 still-births and 38 marriages, and a decrease of 22 deaths. Compared with the mortality reported during the preceding week, the deaths from measles decreased 3; whooping cough, 4; erysipelas, 4; typhoid fever, 1; puerperal diseases, 2; diarrhoeal diseases, 4; inanition, 5; alcoholism, 6; phthisis pulmonalis, 5; bronchitis, 11; aneurism, 2; marasmus, tabes mesenterica and scrofula, 1; convulsions, 12; all diseases of the brain and nervous system, 10; cirrhosis and hepatitis, 3; cyanosis and atelectasis, 4; suicide, 1; while the deaths from scarlatina increased 5; diphtheria 6; croup, 6; cerebro-spinal fever, 1; malarial fevers, 3; cancer, 7; pneumonia, 20; heart diseases, 8; hydrocephalus and tubercular meningitis, 13; meningitis and encephalitis, 2; Bright's disease and nephritis, 10; premature and pretermatural deaths, 2; surgical operations, 3; and drowning, 1. The number of deaths from rheumatism and gout, apoplexy and gastritis, enteritis, and peritonitis, was the same in the two successive weeks.

Deaths from the principal Zymotic Diseases, Phthisis Pulmonalis, Pneumonia, Bronchitis, and Children under five years of age, reported during the week and compared with the three preceding weeks.

The ages of 103 of the persons who died during the week were reported to be under one year; 148 under two years; 203 under five years, and 42 seventy years and over, which shows that the deaths of children under five years of age was 3 more than the number reported during last week, and represent 38.17 per cent. of the total weekly mortality.

Of the total number of deaths reported for the week, 94 were in institutions, 281 in tenement houses, 147 in houses containing 3 families or less, 5 in hotels and boarding-houses, 4 in rivers, streets, boats, etc.; 6 were on the basement floor, 106 on the first, 138 on the second, 104 on the third, 62 on the fourth, 15 on the fifth, 2 on the sixth. 528 were stated to be residents of New York City, and 4 non-residents. 63 were stated to be single, 148 married, 69 widowed, and the condition of 252 was not stated; these were children who had not attained a marriageable age.

The total number of burial permits issued during the week are as follows, viz.: City deaths, 532; still-births, 52; bodies in transit, 26. Of the total burial permits issued for city deaths and still-births 54 were upon certificates received from the Coroners. 564 births, 183 marriages, 52 still-births, 532 deaths, 26 applications for transit permits were recorded, indexed, and tabulated. 56 searches of the registers of births, marriages, and deaths were made, and 9 transcripts of the birth record, 7 of marriage, and 40 of death were issued during the week.

The mean temperature for the week ending February 14, 1880, was 36.5 degrees Fahr., the mean reading of the barometer was 29.971, the mean humidity was 71, saturation being 100, the number of miles traveled by the wind was 1,105 and the total amount of rain-fall was 0.84 inch depth of water, as reported by D. Draper, Director of the New York Meteorological Observatory, Central Park.

The disposition of 511 deaths and still-births, or 87.50 per cent. of the total number reported, was in the following 14 cemeteries: Bayside (Jewish), 7; Calvary (Roman Catholic), 225; City, (pauper burial ground—undenominational), 52; Greenwood (undenominational), 44; Lutheran, (undenominational), 68; Cypress Hills (undenominational), 29; Evergreen (undenominational), 40; Woodlawn (undenominational), 13; St. Michael's (Protestant Episcopal), 6; Union (Methodist Protestant), 4; Holy Cross (Roman Catholic), 3; Machpelah, L. I. (Jewish), 6; St. Raymond's (Roman Catholic), 6; Washington (undenominational), 8.

The distribution of deaths (actual mortality) for the week ending February 7, 1880, was in the following wards, viz.: First, 12; Second, 0; Third, 3; Fourth, 17; Fifth, 4; Sixth, 10; Seventh, 30; Eighth, 18; Ninth, 20; Tenth, 15; Eleventh, 22; Twelfth, 38; Thirteenth, 14; Fourteenth, 13; Fifteenth, 10; Sixteenth, 18; Seventeenth, 23; Eighteenth, 26; Nineteenth, 74; Twentieth, 42; Twenty-first, 38; Twenty-second, 42; Twenty-third, 6; Twenty-fourth, 3.

The actual mortality for the week ending February 7, 1880, was 498; this is 71 less than the number that occurred during the corresponding week of the year 1879, and 37.8 less than the average of the corresponding weeks of the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 23.41 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,106,245.

The annual death-rate per 1,000 persons living, of the estimated or enumerated population, according to the most recent weekly returns, of Philadelphia was 16.73; Brooklyn, 20; St. Louis, 8.52; Baltimore, 15.96; Boston, 20.26; San Francisco, 16.20; New Orleans, 30.22; Cleveland, 19.11; Richmond, 20.80; Charleston, 24.63; Dayton, 15.45; Toledo, 11.78; Erie, 13; Lowell, 26.34; Worcester, 21.79; Cambridge, 13.52; Fall River, 17.88; Lawrence, 14.97; Lynn, 19.59; Springfield, 11.56.
