

SANITARY BUREAU.

The following is a summary of the operations of the Sanitary Bureau, which is charged with the duty of inspecting and reporting in proper form all nuisances or causes of danger to the public health, with the execution of the orders of the Board, and with the care of contagious diseases, for the quarter ending March 31, 1889:

The number of inspections made by the Sanitary Inspectors and the Sanitary Police was

90,267.

The number of causes of complaint returned was 5,612.

The number of complaints received from citizens was 2,753, all of which were referred to the Sanitary Inspectors and the Sanitary Police for investigation and report.

The Sanitary Superintendent during the same period, under instruction and authority of the Board, granted 477 permits to discharge cargoes, under proper vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port; 212 permits to scavengers to empty privies; 37 permits to land rags (in bulk) under bonds; and 6 miscellaneous permits under the Sanitary Code.

The mortality for the quarter is less than for the corresponding quarter of 1888, but greater than the average for the corresponding quarter of the past five years (26.96 as against 26.12). The decrease, as compared with 1888, is mainly due to a decrease of deaths from diphtheria, phthisis and pneumonia, while the increase, as compared with the average of the past five years, is mainly due to an increase of deaths from diphtheria, scarlet fever and Bright's disease. As compared with 1888 there was a marked increase in the number of deaths from measles (277 and 67), scarlet fever (678 and 348), and whooping cough (189 and 75).

OFFICE OF THE SECRETARY-NOTICES OF THE BOARD.

The notices of the Board for the abatement of nuisances are issued upon the facts and evidence contained in the written reports of the Sanitary Inspectors, the result of personal inspection of premises complained of. During the three months ending March 31, 1889, the number of notices issued by the Board was 5,378. These notices call the attention of owners, lessees and agents to violations of the Sanitary Code in each case, and require the necessary alteration, repair, cleaning, and improvement of the premises named within five days from the receipt of the notice. If, upon re-inspection, it is found that the requirements of the notice have not been complied with, a suit for penalty is commenced against the delinquents under section 82, chapter 335, Laws of 1873.

of the Eighth Regiment Armory. NEW YORK, May 31, 1889. The undersigned, as directed by the Armory Board, visited the Eighth Regiment Armory, in

The undersigned, as directed by the Armory Board, visited the Eighth Regiment Atmory, in company with the architect of the building, and inspected the rifle range. The rifle pit for the markers, which is about nine feet in depth below the bed of the range, is filled with water, and cannot be drained to any sewer. There is also water at the firing point, which is below the level of the range. The water in rifle pit is said to come from a spring or springs; but whether from a spring or surface water, there is no provision in the contract that will exclude the water and keep the range or the rifle pit or the firing point dry and fit for use. If the remaining work is performed according to the contract, it will be necessary, when the contractor has completed his contract, to make an attiditional contract for protecting the rifle range and rifle pit from water, and the expense of the work will be double the amount necessary to be expended for that purpose at the present time.

The contractor proposes, with the approval of the architect, to omit the three-quarter inch layer of asphalt cement from beneath the floor of the drill room and substitute therefor three layers of tar paper, and in consideration of this omission will agree to make the entire rifle range, including ing the rifle pit and firing point, perfectly dry in every part. Considering the character of the soil, and that the whole surface of the drill room is covered with six inches of concrete upon which the three layers of tar paper will be spread, and that upon the paper will be laid locust sleepers three inches square, with concrete between the sleepers, I am of the opinion that the omission of the three-

quarter inch asphalt cement and the substitution of the tar paper will not perceptibly alter the value of the floor of the drill room or lessen its permanence. It is impossible to estimate the cost of making the entire rifle range perfectly dry.

If this Board has the power to do so, I would recommend that the proposition of the contractor be accepted, and that an agreement be drawn and signed by the Armory Board and the contractor to that effect, not waiving or altering, however, any other part of the contract.

If it is not within the power of the Armory Board to make such an agreement, then an additional contract should be made without delay for the work necessary to make and keep the rifle

ditional contract should be made without delay for the work necessary to range dry in all its parts, and of use to the regiment that is to occupy the Armory.

Resolved, That under the power conferred by law upon the Health Department, the following additional section to the Sanitary Code for the security of life and health, be and the same is hereby adopted and declared to form a portion of the Sanitary Code:

Section 212, In every public hospital and dispensary in the City of New York there shall be provided and maintained a suitable room or rooms and place for the temporary isolation of persons infected with contagious disease, who shall immediately be separated from the other persons and other patients at such dispensary or hospital. It shall be the duty of the physician or physicians, of the officers, managers and of every one in charge of a hospital or dispensary, and of every one who has any duty or office in respect to patients in the course of treatment, or persons who apply for treatment or care at a dispensary or hospital, to see that a report is immediately made to the Health Department of the City of New York of every person infected with a contagious disease who comes to their knowledge, and that such person or persons so infected are properly isolated and kept separate from other persons and other patients.

Resolved, That section 18 of the Sanitary Code be and is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

SEC. 18. That no owner or lessee of any building,

or any part thereof, shall lease or let, or hire out the same or any portion thereof, to be occupied by any person, or allow the same to be occupied, as a place in which, or for any one, to dwell or lodge, except when said buildings or such parts thereof are sufficiently lighted, ventilated, provided and accommodated, and are in all respects in that condition of cleanliness and wholesomeness, for which this Code or any law of this State provides, or in which they or either of them require any such premises to be kept. Nor shall any such person rent, let, hire out, or allow, having power to prevent the same to be used as or for a place of sleeping or residence, any perition or apartment of any building, which apartment or portion has not at least one foot of its height and space above the level of every part of the sidewalk and curbstone of any adjacent street, nor of which the floor is damp by reason of water from the ground, or which is impregnated or penetrated by any offensive gas, smell, or exhalation prejudicial to health. But this section shall not prevent the leasing, renting, or occupancy of cellars or rooms less elevated than aforesaid and as a part of any building rented or let, when they are not let or intended to be occupied or used by any offensive are not let or intended to be occupied or used by any offensive and the properties of the suppression as a sleeping apartment, or as a principal or sole dwelling apartment. dwelling apartment.

PLANS FOR A MUNICIPAL BUILDING IN THE CITY OF NEW YORK.

NOTICE TO ARCHITECTS.

In Accordance with the Provisions of chapter 81 of the Laws of 1889, entitled "An act to provide for the erection of a building for certain purposes relating to the public interests in the City of New York," passed March 27, 1889, the Board of Commissioners thereby constituted will, until the first day of August, 1889, receive plans and specifications for a New Municipal Building, provided for in said statute, to be erected in the City Hall Park, upon the plot of ground east of the City Hall and the New County Court-house.

For the plans adjudged to be the second best, a premium of \$1,500 will be paid, and for the plans adjudged to be the third and fourth best, premiums of \$500 each will be paid.

In the examination and judgment of plans the Board will be assisted by a Committee to be appointed by the Mayor, consisting of not more than three competent architects and a civil engineer.

All plans submitted for competition, for which premiums are awarded, shall become the property of the city, and all plans must be filed with the Comptroller on or before the date mentioned. Each plan submitted shall be marked with such assumed designation as the architect may select, provided there shall be filed with the Mayor a sealed envelope, giving the real name of the author of the plans so designated, which shall be opened by the Mayor in the presence of the Board, after the premiums shall have been awarded.

REGULATIONS ESTABLISHING A SCALE OF WATER RENTS AND RULES GOVERNING THE USE OF WATER, FOR THE CITY OF NEW YORK, BY ORDER OF JOHN NEWTON, COM-MISSIONER OF PUBLIC WORKS.

U NDER CHAPTER 410, LAWS 1882, SECTIONS 350, 351, 352 and 353, and as amended by chapter 350, Laws 1887, as follows:

UNDER CHAPTER 410, LAWS 1882, SECTIONS 350, Law 1837, as follows:

"The commissioner of public works shall, from time to time, establish scales of rents for the supplying of water, which rents shall be collected in the manner now provided by law, and which shall be apportioned to different classes of bindings in said city in reference to their dimen ions, values, exposure to fires, ordinary uses for dwellings, stores, shops, private stables and other common purposes, number of families or occupants, or consumption of water, as near as may be practicable, and modify, after, amend and increase such scale from time to time, and extend it to other descriptions of buildings and establishments. All extra charges for vater shall be deemed to be included in the regular rents, and shall become a charge and lien upon the buildings upon which they are vertectively imposed, and, if not paid, shall be returned as arrears to the clork of arrears. Such regular rents, including the extra charges above mentioned, shall be collected from the owners or occupants of all such buildings respectively, which shall be situated upon lots adjoining any street or avenue in said city in which the distributing water-pipes are or may be laid, and from which they can be supplied with water. Said rents, including the extra charges above mentioned a charge and lien upon such houses and lots, respectively, as herein provided, but no charge tohatever shall be determined only by the quantity of water actually used as shown by said meters.

METERS will be placed on all houses where waste of water is found, and theywill be charged at rates fixed by the Department for all the water passing through them. The extra and miscellaneous rates sha be as follows, owit:

Liquor and Lager Beer Saloons shall be charged an annual rate of ten dollars each. An additional charge of five dollars per annum shall be made for each tap or wash-box.

Photograph Galleries shall be charged an annual rate of trom five to twenty dollars, in the discretion of the Commissioner of Public Works.

Printing Offices, when not metered, shall be charged at such rates as may be determined by the Commissioner of Public Works.

Span Mineral Water and Root Beer Fountains shall be charged five dollars per annum each.

Steam Engines, where not metered, shall be charged by the horse-power, as follows: For each horse-power up to and not exceeding ten, the sum of five dollars per annum; for each exceeding ten, and not over ifteen, the sum of seven dollars and fifty cents each and for each horse-power over fifteen, the sum of five dollars.

It is provided by section 352, Laws of 1882, that "all expenses of meters, their connections and setting, water rates, and other lawful charges for the supply of Croton water, shall be a lien upon the premises where such water is supplied, as now provided by law." * # All manufacturing and other business requiring a large supply of water will be fitted with a meter.

The rate charged for steam-vessels taking water daily or belonging to daily lines, is one-half cent, per ton (Custom House measurement) for each time they take water. Steamers taking water other than daily, one cent per ton (Custom House measurement).

Water supplied to sailing vessels and put on board, twenty-five cents per hundred gallons.

All matters not hereinbefore embraced are reserved for special contract by and with the Commissioner of Public Works.

HYDRANTS, HOSE, TROUGHS, FOUNTAINS, ETC., ETC.

No owner or tenant will be allowed to supply water to another person or persons.

All persons taking water from the City must keep their own service-pipes, street tap, and all fixtures connected therewith in good repair, protected from trost, at their own risk and expense, and shall prevent all waste of scales.

The use of hose to wash coaches, omnibuses, wagons, railway cars or other vehicles or horses, cannot ne per-

The use of hose to wash coaches, omnibuses, wagons, railway cars or other vehicles or horses, cannot ne permitted.

No horse-troughs or norse-watering fixtures will be permitted in the street or on the sidewalk, except upon a license or permit taken out for that purpose. All licenses or permits must be annually renewed on the first of May. Such fixtures must be kept in good order and the water not allowed to drip or waste by overrunning the sidewalk or street, or to become dangerous in winter by freezing in and about such troughs or fixtures

No hydrant will be permitted on the sidewalk or in the front area, and any hydrant standing in a yard or alley, attached to any dwelling or building, must not be left running when not in actual use, and if the drip or waste from such hydrant freezes and becomes dangerous in winter, the supply will be shut off in addition to the penalty of five dollars imposed.

Taps at wash-basins, water-closets, baths and urinals must not be left running, under the penalty of five dollars for each offense, which will be strictly enforced.

Fountains or jets in hotels, porter-houses, eating-saleons, confectioreries or other buildings are strictly prohibited.

The use of hose for washing sidewalks, stoops, areas, house-fronts, yards, court-yards, gardens, and about stables, is prohibited. Where premises are provided with wells, special permits will be issued for the use of hose, in order that the police or inspectors of this department may understand that the permission is not for the use of Croton water.

Opening fire-hydrants to fill hand sprinklers or other vessels will not be allowed.

The penalty for a wilation of any of the preceding rules and regulations will be five dollars for each offense, and if not paid when imposed will become a lien on the premises in like manner as all other charges for unpaid water rates.

PUBLIC NOTICE AS TO WATER RATES.

PUBLIC NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN THAT in compliance with the provisions of chapter 550, Laws of 1887, amending sections 350 and 921 of the New York City Consolidation Act of 1882, passed June 9, 1887 the following changes are made in charging and collecting water rents:

ing water rents:

1st. All extra charges for water incurred from and after
June 9, 1887, shall be treated, collected and returned in
arrears in the same manner as regular rents have heretofore been treated,
2d. In every building where a water meter or meters
are now, or shall hereafter be in use, the charge for water
by meter measurement shall be the only charge against
such building, or such part thereof as is supplied through
meter.

by meter measurement thereof as is supplied through meter,

3d. The returns of arrears of water rents, including the year 1887, shall be made as heretofore on the confirmation of the tax levy by the floard of Aldermen, and shall include all charges and penalties of every nature.

4th. A penalty of five dollars [85] is hereby established, and will be imposed in each and every case where the rules and regulations of the Department prohibiting the use of water through hose, or in any other wasteful manner, are violated, and such penalties will be entered on the books of the Bureau against the respective buildings or property, and, if not collected, be returned in arrears in like manner as other charges for water.

3th. Charges for so-called extra water rents of every nature, imposed or incurred prior to June 9, 1881, will be canceled of record on the books of the Department.

NOTICE TO CROTON WATER CONSUMERS.

NUMEROUS APPLICATIONS HAVE BEEN made to this Department by citizens claiming reductions or rebates on bills for water supplied through meters, on the alleged ground of leakage caused by defective plumbing and worn-out service pipes, or by willful waste of water by tenants allowing the faucets to be turned on in full force in water-closets, sinks, etc., without the knowledge or consent of the owners of the premises.

The main object of the use of water-meters is to enable
this Department to detect and check the useless and unwarrantable waste of an element so valuable and essential
to the health and comfort of all the citizens, and this object can only be accomplished by enforcing payment for
the water wasted.

Under the law all charges for water supplied through
meters are a lien against the respective premises, and
the law therefore holds the owner of the premises responsible for the amount of water used or wasted.

Notice is therefore twen to all householders that, in all
further applications for reduction of water rents, no
allowance will be made on account of water rents, no

year.

GRANTS OF LANDS UNDER WATER.

THE OWNERS OF LANDS IN THE CITY OF New York, which were formerly under water, and which were granted by the City of New York, are notified that nearly all of the grants of such lands contain covenants, on the part of the grantes, and their successors and assigns, to maintain and keep in repair the adjacent streets. The condition of many of these streets is such as to make it necessary that they should be repaired and repaved, and that the obligation resting upon the present owners of adjacent lots to do this work should now be enforced. Many of such owners have requested that such covenants be commuted, and wholly released, upon the payment by them of a certain sum per lot.

The matter will shortly be presented to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund for their consideration, and the adjustment of the basis of commutation, and application for releases should therefore be made at once.
