

To the Board of Supervisors of the County of New York: The Trustees of the College of the City of New York, pursuant to the provisions of an act of the Legislature of the State of New York, passed May 1, 1872, chapter 471, entitled "An act amending chapter six hundred and thirty-seven of the Laws of eighteen hundred and sixty-six," entitled "An act in relation to the College of the City of New York, passed April seventeenth, eighteen hundred and sixty-six," do hereby report to your Honorable Body that they require for the payment of salaries of the professors and tutors of the said college, for obtaining and furnishing scientific apparatus, books for the students, and all other necessary supplies therefor, and for repairing and altering the college buildings, and for the support, maintenance, and general expenses of said college for the year eighteen hundred and eighty-two (1882), the sum of one hundred and fifty thousand dollars (ten thousand dollars of which to be used for library, laboratory, and other extraordinary expenses).

The Trustees, therefore, ask your Honorable Body, in pursuance of the provisions of said act, that you will cause to be raised by tax the said sum of one hundred and fifty thousand dollars (\$150.000)

(\$150,000).

Resolved, That the foregoing report and estimate be duly authenticated by the signatures of the Chairman and Secretary of the Board of Trustees, and submitted to the Board of Supervisors, as provided by the act above named, and that a copy thereof be also submitted to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

SIR—There were 778 deaths reported to have occurred in this city during the week ending Saturday, October 1, 1881, which is an increase of 73, as compared with the number reported he preceding week, and 249 more than were reported during the corresponding week of the year 1880. The actual mortality for the week ending September 24, 1881, was 741, which is 240.8 above the average for the corresponding week for the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 30.79 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,251,154.
