

DEPARTMENT OF TAXES AND ASSESSMENTS.

Report for the Quarter Ending June 30, 1898.

NEW YORK, July 1, 1898.

Hon. ROBERT A. VAN WYCK, Mayor of The City of New York:

SIR—In accordance with the requirement of Section 1544 of the Greater New York Charter, we make the following report for the Department of Taxes and Assessments for the three months ending June 30, 1898. Though nominally for the last quarter, this report is actually a statement of all the principal transactions of the Department, including a summary of its work for the official year, in the Boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx, together with the steps taken towards reorganization in the other Boroughs since January 1, 1898.

As all the provisions of the Charter affecting the present city are based upon the provisions of the Consolidation Act of the old city, the operations of this Department, as heretofore, commence with the assessment of property by the Deputy Tax Commissioners on the first Monday in September, and terminate with the delivery of the assessment rolls to the Municipal Council on the first Monday of July, excepting the mere extension of the tax after confirmation by the Municipal Assembly, which extension is performed by this Department at the request of the President of the Municipal Council, without additional expense to the city, and also because of our experience and knowledge of the books, thus obviating many errors.

Boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx.

The following statement shows the assessed valuation of real and personal estate in the Boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx for the year 1898, as compared with such valuation for the year 1897:

In 1898 reductions upon the assessed value of real estate were made by the Commissioners, amounting to \$1,686,000; reductions upon the real estate of clergymen to the amount of \$60,000

amount of \$1,000,000; reductions upon the real estate of dergymen to the amount of \$00,000; on parsonages to the amount of \$212,750; on property purchased with pension money to the amount of \$6,350, making a total reduction of \$1,065,100 from the assessed valuation.

In addition to the above, property taken by the City for parks, schools, dock improvements, etc., was exempted to the amount of \$2,230,025, which had heretofore been assessed, making a total of reductions and exemptions during the year amounting to \$4,195,125.

The foregoing being a summary of the work performed during the last year in Manhattan and The Bronx, relative to the completion of the assessments made by our predecessors, it is fitting that the work of reorganization of this important department in all the Boroughs should be submitted in the preparation of this report.

There have been three distinct and separate Bureaus recognized in the administration of this Department which are respectively known as the "Real Estate," with Mr. Frank Bell in charge; "Personal," superintended by Mr. E. T. Taggard, and "Surveyors," under the direction of Mr. Henry W. Vogel, all of whom are officials of old standing in the Department. Although as Bureaus they have never been given distinct recognition, yet in the ordinary transactions of the Department these divisions have always been maintained, and now, because of the enlarged city, they come into greater prominence and the division is necessarily more marked and permanent.

REAL ESTATE BUREAU.

By consolidation, on the first day of January, 1898, from an area of 39,118 acres, the "City" suddenly grew to an area of about 195,478 acres, of which Manhattan comprises 12,575; Bronx, 26,543; Brooklyn, 47,240; Queens, 77,000, and Richmond, 37,120.

Each of the Boroughs are separated into convenient, assessable districts according to law, and a Deputy Tax Commissioner assigned to each. Manhattan will have ten districts, containing 113,670 separate assessments, recorded in 32 volumes; Bronx will have seven districts, containing 49,722 separate assessments, to be recorded in 21 volumes; Brooklyn will have twelve districts containing 224,389 separate assessments last year (which number will be materially increased), to be recorded in about 85 volumes, although 120 volumes were used last year; Queens will have nine districts containing 170,057 separate assessments to be recorded in 39 volumes; Richmond will have five districts containing about 28,448 separate assessments to be recorded in nine volumes.

The difficulties to be overcome are necessarily in the boroughs whose system of taxation was not so well regulated as the Borough of Manhattan, and as neither the Boroughs of Brooklyn, Queens or Richmond was at all similar to it in method or condition, a radical change was necessary. In Brooklyn, no annual record of assessed valuations was left, the "Field Book," or as it was termed "The Blotter" was the only record, and as this was required to do service for a term of years similar to "Field Book," it became worn and mutilated, and even these records were very imperfect; very few sizes of buildings were given and in some districts this was even more imperfectly done than in others. The meadow lands of the Twenty-sixth Ward, comprising about 1,700 acres, were not assessed at all, no maps made of that area nor of the whole of the Thirty-second Ward, it was made against the names of owners, which is entirely insufficient, except to those personally acquainted with the individuals and locations. However, all these irregularities will now be corrected; dimensions of buildings will be given, unassessed property will be assigned its proper place and lot number and described upon the record; and all property shall be shown upon the maps with the valuation of each piece definitely attached to it; thus affording owners every facility for comparisons.

In the Borough of Queens it would be hard to imagine a condition of assessment, however peculiar, which has not a parallel in this borough and the same may be said of Richmond. Many of the maps available, together with the books, are cumbersome and unwieldy, while the maps degenerate from fairly good in Long Island City, although much below our standard, to much less perfect in Jamaica, still less perfect in Flushing, and there are none in Newtown and Hempstead.

We have succeeded in completing the field books for Long Island City and Flushing, and those of Newtown and Jamaica are in progress. Hempstead will be completed as the maps are supplied by the Surveyor.

PERSONAL BUREAU.

The net increase of \$127,573,384 on personal estate this year consists mainly of assessments upon individuals, both resident and non-resident, doing business in this city.

The effect of a strict enforcement of the personal tax laws in their present condition is only a "snap shot" assessment, as in the ensuing year, the many millions caught will find legal means of avoidance, either by change of securities, residence, situs, or the incurring of an indebtedness to offset the same; and while such opportunities are permitted by law there always will remain a seeming inequality of assessment of personal property as compared with real estate assessments.

The inequalities created by the law are numerous. We have estates of deceased residents, otherwise under the complete jurisdiction of our Surrogate's Court, yet permitted through the non-residence of the executors or administrators to escape the burdens of taxation. Appropriate correction of this inequality might be made, by compelling the appointment of only resident executors, etc., or by determining that the executors or trustees are assessable at the residence of the decedent at the time of his death, and continue at that place until final distribution of the estate to the legatees and beneficiaries. This last provision has been incorporated in the war tax measure of the national government.

While the banks are assessed through the individual shareholder on the actual value of their share stock, the trust companies who are their competitors in business are assessed as a corporation, and are permitted to invest their assets in non-taxable securities and also allowed the deduction of their debts, and otherwise permitted by law to avoid just taxation. These conditions should be corrected

should be corrected.

The decision of the Court of Appeals in 1891, by which corporations are made assessable on their tangible assets and not upon their capital share stock, has had the effect of eliminating the valuation of the intangible franchise of all corporations for local purposes. Nothwithstanding that our City has lost by this system since 1891, over a hundred millions of dollars, no step has been taken, nor recommendation made by which the inequality might be remedied.

We think this question requires the greatest consideration, because of its vast interest and great injustice. And we believe this to be the greatest inequality sanctioned by the law.

We cite an instance of this great inequality, viz., a railroad corporation with \$10,000,000 of capital and \$5,000,000 of bonded indebtedness, with about \$4,000,000 of real estate, and personal property of \$1,000,000, in all assets of \$5,000,000, exclusive of franchise, is made practically exempt from taxation for local purposes upon its capital, because of that decision, and the \$10,000,000 of share stock because of its assumed assessability is exempted in the hands of the shareholders, even if it was worth \$300 per share, or \$30,000,000 in actual value.

The remedy, therefore, is to modify the law by which all property, tangible and intangible, shall be assessable, and for the purpose of accomplishing greater equality and more certainty in the assessment of personal property. As almost all personal property is now being held in the name of corporations, why not assess corporations upon the actual value of their share stock and also their bonds, exempting the share stock in the possession of owners, as at present, and apply the same rule to the bonds; for after all, the bonds as well as the share stock represent the capital of the corporation, and both should be assessed against it, subject, of course, to the deduction of the cost value of real estate. the cost value of real estate.

This is one remedy to cure an evil which should not be permitted longer to exist.

Unless some such step is taken to overcome that decision by appropriate legislation many large corporations will continue to escape taxation and the burden which they should justly share

will have to be assumed by others less able to bear it.

While on the subject of domestic corporations, we should be remiss, if we did not call your attention to the positive discrimination against them, in favor of foreign corporations. At present, under the plea of encouraging capital to invest here, a foreign corporation can fill a warehouse in the city with its manufactured goods, and if the proceeds of the sales are immediately transmitted to the home office, the large stock in the warehouse cannot be taxed, and a domestic corporation with a similar stock of goods would be taxed for them.

If these or similar expections can be adopted, the amount of assessable personal property.

If these or similar suggestions can be adopted, the amount of assessable personal property will be increased beyond the expectations of the most sanguine, and real estate will not be compelled longer to bear an unnecessary and unjust burden.

SURVEYOR'S BUREAU.

Section 891 of the Greater New York Charter, provides that it shall be the duty of the Surveyor

Section 891 of the Greater New York Charter, provides that it shall be the duty of the Surveyor to make all maps which may be required for the assessment of real estate.

In the Borough of Brooklyn the area not covered by the old maps is about 1,200 acres of meadow lands in the Twenty-sixth Ward, being former Town of New Lots, and about 7,300 acres in the Thirty-second Ward, or former Town of Flatlands, in all about thirteen square miles. This area will comprise seven volumes, three of which are now complete, the remainder in progress.

In the Borough of Queens, the First Ward, being Long Island City and the Third Ward being the Town of Flushing, have maps with block and lot numbers, but fall far short of the standard heretofore maintained in New York City tax maps. Yet they comply with the letter of the law, and, owing to the mass of work require I where no maps at all exist, the preparation of new maps will be postponed until next year. The Second Ward, formerly the Town of Newtown, will consist of six volumes of maps. Volume 1 is complete, volumes 2 and 3 in progress, and information for the remaining volumes is being gathered rapidly. The Fourth Ward, formerly Town of Jamaica is in progress; the information has all been gathered and arranged, and will consist of six volumes; volumes 1 and 2 now in progress. The Fifth Ward, formerly a portion of the Town of Hempstead, is also in satisfactory progress, and will consist of three volumes, and the material has been collected and indexed.

The maps of the outlying boroughs are based on the following data:

ist. Maps of all officially laid out streets, parks and public places.

2d. Property maps and subdivisions of lands, filed by private owners in offices of record.

3d. Descriptions of properties, contained in deeds recorded in offices of record.

The preparation of the maps requires a study of the former methods of levying taxes, so that, wherever possible, such methods can be adapted to our New York system to facilitate the payment of taxes hereafter, and also to aid in the searching for back taxes and assessments.

The fact must also be borne in mind, that not only the real estate tax is based on these maps, but also all maps made for the assessment for constructive works, such as sewers, regulating, grading and paying, and benefit maps, for acquiring title to streets, avenues, parks, etc., must, in

but also all maps made for the assessment for constructive works, such as sewers, regulating, grading and paving, and benefit maps, for acquiring title to streets, avenues, parks, etc., must, in accordance with law, be copies of the tax maps.

Carefully prepared maps, showing dimensions, aid largely in comparing values and making equable valuations, and when the maps are systematically numbered and designated by familiar local names facilitate identification by property-owners applying for tax bills.

Two copies of all new maps are made, so that one copy will always be in the office at the service of the public, while the other copy is used by the Deputy Commissioner in the field.

In addition to the foregoing preliminary assessment maps, this Department also has a continued system of block tax assessment maps, made under the provisions of chapter 542 of the Laws of 1892. This work was commenced in November, 1892, and prior to the present year two sets of maps were filed in the Tax Department, one set in the Comptroller's Office and one set in the Department of Public Works. Each set consists of 42 volumes of maps, and comprises sections 1 to 9 of the land map, i. e., all of Manhattan Island and a portion of the Twenty-third Ward.

Four sets of sections 10 and 11 land maps are now in progress. Each set of section 10 will consist of eight volumes and each set of section 11 of ten volumes of maps. This system of tax maps has now been tested for five years, and has been found to adapt itself admirably to the uses of the Tax Department, the Water Register, the Bureau of Arrears and all other Departments

having occasion to copy or refer to the maps.

We respectfully recommend that legislation be obtained to enable this Department to apply the system to the Borough of Brooklyn and to all other outlying boroughs as soon as such boroughs

have a definite street system established.

In addition to the previously-named maps, the tax maps under section 891 of the Greater New York Charter are corrected or altered for the following reasons:

First—Subdivisions of ownership of farms and large parcels of land.

Second—Erection of buildings having dimensions differing from dimensions of lots shown on

Third-Transfer of narrow strips of party walls or for the purpose of clearing title on account

of encroachments.

Fourth—Consolidation of small plots for the erection of large buildings.

Fifth—Lands acquired for public purposes, such as streets, avenues, parks, parkways, aqueducts, reservoirs, schools, engine-houses, bridge purposes, water front improvements, either by condemnation proceedings, or by cession to the City.

Sixth—Changes in the street system, due to acts of legislation, or to action of Board of Public Improvements; also changes in street names through the City ordinances.

Seventh—New piers, bulkheads and alterations and extensions of piers on the water fronts. Such alterations during the past six months numbered 7618 in the Borough of Manhattan; 1773 in the Borough of The Bronx, and 2254 in the Borough of Brooklyn.

It is suggested that the Corporation Counsel be requested to notify the Tax Department whenever title of land for public purposes vests in the City, either by condemnation proceedings, special acts of legislation, the filing of official oaths of the Commissioners of Estimate and Assessment, or by cession of lands by private individuals for public purposes, in order that tax maps may be altered and property so acquired exempted from taxation.
