

January 25, 6 P. M.—Fire at No. 128 William street, four-story brown stone brick building, 25 x 150, occupied by drugists. Fire originated in subcellar, extended to basement and first and second floors, considerably damaging the building; also extended to Nos. 130 and 132 William street, a five-story brick building, 50 x 25, occupied by an envelope manufacturing company, damaging the building considerably; also extended to Nos. 33 to 43 Gold street, a seven-story brick (iron front) building, 150 x 100, occupied by printers; trifling damage to building. The services of 11 engines (and search-light engine), 5 hook and ladder companies and 4 water-towers were required, and the fire was under control in two hours and thirty minutes.

January 26, 6 P. M.—Fire at No. 119 West Broadway, six-story brick building, 25 x 75, occupied by candy manufacturers. Fire originated on first floor and extended to sixth floor, through Dutch-weather shaft and waterpipes, considerably damaging the building. The services of 15 engines (including the search-light engine), 3 hook and ladder companies were required, and the duration of the fire was four hours and thirty minutes.

January 26, 4:05 P. M.—Fire at Nos. 102 and 104 East Fifteenth street, eight-story brick building, 75 x 75, occupied by Hotel Jefferson. Fire originated on first floor and extended to all floors by elevator shaft, considerably damaging the buildings. The services of 9 engines and search-light engine, 4 hook and ladder companies were required, and the duration of the fire was one hour. Origin of fire unknown. On the arrival of this Department one and a half minutes after the alarm was received, the fire had gained considerable headway. Several persons lost their lives by suffocation and jumping from windows. Several rescues were made at this fire by Deputy Chief Albert and other members of this Department at great personal risk. Assistant Foreman Lynch of Hook and Ladder 3 found a roll of money in room of hotel, which he turned over to Sergeant of Insurance Board, who returned same to proprietor.

January 26, 7:44 A. M.—Fire at premises Nos. 538 to 544 First avenue, a six-story brick building, 100 x 50, occupied by the William Wicke Company, cigar manufactory. Fire originated in basement and extended through roof building, through windows and shaft, destroying same.

Chief follows present were Chief of Department Edward P. Croker, Deputy Chief Purroy, Chiefs of Battalion Henry, George, Burns, Gooderson, Ross, Burns, Farrell and Acting Chief Langford.

The services of 32 engines and search-light engine, 11 hook and ladder companies and 1 water-tower were required, and the duration of the fire was ten hours.

At 7:17 A. M. to 7:20 P. M. and 7:25 A. M. respectively, 2d, 3d, 4th, 5th alarms and simultaneous bell were rung out.

Early in the afternoon of this date this Department responded to an alarm for an explosion at the above premises, which severely damaged building. Owing to the fact that there was a large crack in the chimney which was situated directly over boilers, the Chief Officer in charge of the force in the afternoon, detailed two men with a line of hose ready for use for any emergency that might arise from the pulling down of the chimney, etc., and these two men were on duty constantly from the time of the explosion in the afternoon to the time of the fire which occurred in the evening. There were also several employees of William Wicke Company, several policemen and about twenty employees of the Building Department on premises during the afternoon.

About 7:15 P. M., on the evening of that day, an employee of William Wicke, who had been looking around premises with a lighted candle called the firemen's attention to a slight fire in ceiling of basement. Previous to this there had not been the slightest sign of fire in any part of the building, as Chief Ross of this Department and Inspector Cody of the Building Department made a thorough investigation of the building. The firemen upon having their attention called to the fire in the ceiling of an room immediately picked up line of hose to extinguish the same and about instantly discovered the entire building to be in flames. Unfortunately the water supply was insufficient; in several cases companies getting no water from hydrants had to abandon them and to take positions elsewhere. The bodies of two policemen and two employees of the William Wicke Company were afterward found in the ruins.

Various implements of this Department, such as hooks, axes, nozzles, pipes, etc., were lost or destroyed at this fire, and about 2,000 feet of hose were consumed. Owing to the intense heat, the engine of Engine Company 21, and Water Tower No. 2, were badly damaged before they could be removed from the street; the horses of Engine Company 21 were badly burned and the horses of Engine Company 5 slightly burned before they could be taken from apparatus and removed from place of safety. About twelve tons of coal were used at this fire. Cause of fire unknown, but supposed to have originated from explosion of escaping gas, chemicals or spontaneous combustion of sawdust.

February 2, 7:31 P. M.—Fire at No. 525 Park avenue, five-story brick (stone front) building, 25 by 95, occupied as a dwelling. Fire originated in cellar and extended to first floor. Origin unknown. Two members of this Department were overcome by smoke while working at this fire, and were taken to Presbyterian Hospital. Assistant Foreman Patrick J. Graham of Hook and Ladder Company No. 7, assisted Mrs. Anna Bailey down fifteen-foot ladder.

February 12, 4:22 A. M.—Fire at Nos. 106 and 108 Seventh avenue, four-story brick, 50 x 90, occupied as tenement. Fire originated on first floor and extended to second, third and fourth floors, through flooring and shafting holes, considerably damaging the building. The services of 11 engines, 4 hook and ladder companies and 1 water-tower were required. The duration of the fire was one hour and thirty minutes. Origin unknown.

February 14, 6:08 P. M.—Fire at Nos. 47 to 51 Chrystie street, six-story brick building, 50 x 100, occupied by tailoring manufacturers. Fire originated on fifth floor and extended to sixth floor and roof, by stairway, slightly damaging the building. The services of 13 engines, including search-light engine, 4 hook and ladder companies and 1 water-tower were required, and the duration of the fire was forty-five minutes.

February 20, 1:07 A. M.—Fire at No. 215 Duane street, a five-story brick building, 25 x 35, occupied by produce merchant. Fire originated in cellar and extended to first and second floor through flooring, considerably damaging the building; also extended to No. 213 Duane street, a five-story brick building, 25 x 35, occupied by manufacturers of tinware, considerably damaging the building. The services of 9 engines and search-light No. 1 and 4 hook and ladder companies were required, and the duration of the fire was three hours.

February 20, 5:50 P. M.—Fire at Nos. 1672 and 1674 Broadway, a nine and one-half story brick building, 50 x 90, occupied as dwelling. Fire originated on seventh floor and extended to eighth and ninth floors and roof, through plaster partitions, considerably damaging the building. The services of 13 engines, 4 hook and ladder companies and 1 water-tower were required, and the duration of the fire was one hour and forty minutes. The origin of this fire was due to oil lighting at filling of a lamp.

March 10, 5 P. M.—Fire at Willis avenue and One Hundred and Thirty-second street, a three-story brick building, 25 x 100, occupied as a railroad station. Fire originated on third floor, considerably damaging the building. The services of 9 engines and 3 hook and ladder companies were required, and the fire's duration was eight hours and ten minutes. Origin of fire unknown.

March 19, 4:55 A. M.—Fire at No. 206 East One Hundred and Twentieth street, a two-and-one-half-story brick building, 25 x 100, occupied as a grocery store. Fire originated on first floor and extended to roof by burning through floorings, considerably damaging the building. The services of 9 engines and 3 hook and ladder companies were required, and the duration of the fire was three hours.

March 26, 11:27 P. M.—Fire at Nos. 440 to 440 Canal street, seven-story brick building, 75 x 150, occupied by machinists. Fire originated on seventh floor and extended to sixth floor through flooring, considerably damaging the building. The services of 11 engines, 4 hook and ladder companies, 2 water-towers and search-light Engine No. 1 were required, and the duration of the fire was one hour and thirty minutes. Origin of fire unknown.

March 30, 2:16 A. M.—Fire at No. 97 Norfolk street, a six-story building, 25 x 65, occupied as dwelling and bakery. Fire originated in cellar and extended to all floors and roof by pipe recesses and hallways, considerably damaging the building. The services of 10 engines (including the search-light engine) and 3 hook and ladder companies were required, and the duration of the fire was one hour and a half. Origin of fire not ascertained. At this fire several people were burned to death, and a number of rescues were made by members of this Department, attended with and without personal risk.

## NOTABLE FIRES.

JANUARY 9, 1:41 A. M.—Foot of Richard street. Fire originated in after-deck of wooden pleasure steamer "Idolwild," which was moored at breakwater dock, Erie basin. She was cut away by the warehouse and drifted over to Beard's dock, foot of Richard street, setting fire to the pier, a train of cars 100 by 400 feet, stored with bales of jute and general merchandise, which ignited rapidly, owing to strong wind blowing at the time, which caused the fire to extend to iron warehouse "St. Dunston," lying on east side of the pier and loaded with jute; also to iron steamship "Coya," lying at "Alpha," "Portland" and "Swelter," and to freight cars on float, all of which were lying at the pier. The fire had gained greater headway on the steamboat "Idolwild" while floating around the river. The companies responding to first alarm, on going to the breakwater dock, found the boat afloat, and had to follow same along the river front until she struck Beard's dock; this caused a delay of about twenty minutes in companies getting to work. The fireboat "David A. Boodie" had propeller wheel broken by striking wreck of lighter. The services of two engine and four hook and ladder companies, one water tower and three fire-boats, were required. Damage to pier and vessels as follows: Frame dock, steamship "St. Dunston," and lighters "Alpha," "Portland" and "Swelter," considerably damaged; steamboat "Idolwild" destroyed; steamship "Coya" and freight cars slightly damaged. Estimated damage, \$15,000.

The fire was under control in about four hours.

February 12, 8:58 P. M.—Flatbush and Vernon avenues. Fire originated in about centre of one-story frame building, 75 by 100 feet, occupied as car shed by Brooklyn Rapid Transit Company; extended all through building, damaging same considerably; extended to one-story frame building, No. 59 Vernon avenue, 20 by 20 feet, occupied as stable, totally destroyed, and to one-story frame building, No. 70 Vernon avenue, 16 by 20 feet, occupied as barn, slightly damaged. The services of six engine and three hook and ladder companies were required, and the fire was under control in about three hours. Estimated damage, \$180,000.
