POLICE DEPARTMENT.

May 22, 1908.

The following proceedings were this day directed by the Police Commissioner: Ordered, That the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund be and are hereby respectfully requested to authorize the Comptroller to execute a lease of premises in West Eighth street, Brooklyn, and the following information is given in pursuance of circular letter of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund adopted by resolution October 22, 1902:

1. Full name of owner or lessor? William Fox, lessor, West Eighth street, Coney Island.

2. Full description of the property? One-story frame building 28 by 25, situated on the west side of West Eighth street, in the Borough of Brooklyn, 100 feet south of Sheepshead Bay road, said building to be altered by lessor so as to be 25 by 85 feet, as per plan submitted, and to accommodate twenty horses.

3. Terms of proposed lease? Five years, with privilege of renewal at same rate.

4. Rental and how payable? \$1,100 per annum, payable quarterly.

5. Particulars as to alterations and repairs? Alterations to be made by lessor, repairs to be made by the City.

6. Does the owner pay water rent? No.

7. Does the owner pay for light, heat and janitor service? No.
8. Necessity for lease? To provide suitable accommodations for horses used for patrol wagons and mounted duty in the One Hundred and Sixty-ninth Police Precinct.

9. Are the premises recommended the most reasonable that can be secured in the neighborhood for the purposes desired? Yes.

10. Is the appropriation from which the rental is to be paid sufficient to cover it? To be paid from appropriation made to the Finance Department to cover rents.

Having investigated the financial condition of Mary A. Collins and as a result of such investigation and from the evidence now before me being of the opinion that the said Mary A. Collins does not need for her support the pension heretofore granted her:

Now, therefore, under authority vested in me by section 356 of the Greater New York Charter, it is

Ordered, That the pension heretofore granted to Mary A. Collins on or about the 1st day of February, 1897, be and the same hereby is reduced to \$120 per annum, as of the 30th day of April, 1908.

Resolutions of Board of Estimate and Apportionment, adopted May 15, 1908, as follows:

“Resolved, That the sum of five thousand seven hundred and eighteen dollars and seventy-eight cents (\$5,718.78) be and the same is hereby transferred from the appropriation made to the Department of Health for the year 1907, entitled ‘Salaries, Sanitary Police,’ the same being in excess of the amount required for the purposes thereof, to the appropriation made to the Police Department for the year 1907, entitled ‘Police Pension Fund,’ the amount of said appropriation being insufficient.”

“Resolved, That the resolution adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment April 3, 1908, which reads as follows:

“Whenever or wherever an article of any class of material is specified by the name of any particular patentee, manufacturer or dealer, or by reference to the catalogue of any such manufacturer or dealer, it shall be taken as intending to mean and specify the article or material described, or any other approved by the Architects equal thereto in quality, finish and durability, and equally serviceable for the purpose for which it is intended.”

The Clerk proceeded to read the minutes of the Stated Meeting of May 26, 1908. On motion of Alderman Dowling, further reading was dispensed with, and the minutes were approved as printed.

MESSAGES FROM HIS HONOR THE MAYOR.

The President laid before the Board the following message from his Honor the Mayor:

No. 826.

City of New York,
 Office of the Mayor,
 June 2, 1908.

To the Honorable the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York:

Gentlemen—I respectfully urge upon your Honorable Body the importance of favorable consideration of the several applications of the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity now before you, and the necessity for action thereon before adjournment is taken for the summer vacation.

Several of the items referred to herein deal with out-of-door work which must be undertaken soon if it is to be begun at all this year. The money asked for will give work to hundreds of unskilled laborers who are so much in need of employment, and to all divisions of the building trades in localities where operations are suspended because of lack of water supply. It will be apparent by an examination of the items that unless they are allowed the Boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens will be denied money for the ordinary yearly development of the water system, when, as a matter of right and of good finance, the City should do even more to keep pace with the growth and expansion in these Boroughs. The actual safety of the water system of all Brooklyn and of all parts of Manhattan and The Bronx that are sixty feet above tide water is threatened by failure to provide funds for repairs to pumping stations. Statements of the economies to be served and the revenue increases to be gained by passing the several applications have been presented to your Board and its committees. Not only as a matter of financial gain—the Water Department turned into the City Treasury nearly \$11,000,000 last year—but as a matter of safety to public health and protection to property from fire hazard, these requests should have your serious and immediate consideration. I refer to the following items:

The issue of \$170,000 of Corporate Stock to provide a delivery main in Trotting Course lane and Myrtle avenue to connect with the pumping station now in course of construction, certified to the Board of Aldermen by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on December 6, 1907. By the time this main can be laid the Department will be prepared to deliver five to ten million gallons of water a day directly into the distribution system of Brooklyn, a quantity having a money value to the City of \$500 to \$1,000 a day.

The issue of \$100,000 Corporate Stock for the extension of water mains in the Borough of Queens, submitted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on April 24. These mains are to be laid in streets and avenues already improved with dwellings and business buildings. Delay will retard development and work an injustice to citizens who have a right to expect such accommodation from the City.

The issue of \$2,500,000 Corporate Stock for the improvement of the water supply of the Borough of Brooklyn, certified by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on March 27. Such stock issues are customary in order to continue a well-defined plan for water main extensions and the gridironing of the present system, a process which has already produced a reduction of fire insurance rates in that Borough. Without the appropriation no extensions can be made, and the City will be deprived of the revenue accruing therefrom.

The expenditure of \$46,500 without the formality of advertising for competitive bids for the repair of engines, boilers and appurtenances of pumping stations, submitted to the Board on January 30. The custom of the Department is to issue open orders for such repairs to the manufacturers of the engines. It is emergency work in the fullest sense. Of late, I am advised, the pump makers have been reluctant to accept such orders, as their bills have been held up for lack of funds. There are thirty-six pumping stations to be cared for, so the allowance for each is small, while the importance of each is incomparably greater.

The application of March 21 for Revenue Bonds in the sum of \$2,367, to enable the Department to pay the prevailing rate of wages to its Machinists.

The issue of \$80,000 of Revenue Bonds to provide for the purchase of water for Queens, and the setting of additional hydrants for fire protection in the newly built-up sections of that Borough.

The expenditure of \$65,000, without advertising, to reinforce the foundations of the Ridgewood Pumping Station, the character of the soil necessitating a change in the original plans for the new station. The new station is to handle 90 per cent. of the Brooklyn water supply, and the Engineers advise that it will be unsafe to construct the building without strengthening the foundations.

The establishment of the position of Electrical Engineer in charge of the high-pressure pumping stations. This new and highly important place is made necessary by the completion of the system in Brooklyn and Manhattan which is shortly to be put in service.

The establishment of a new scale of water rents and charges, submitted February 20. Because of disputes arising as to the legality of certain charges for unmetered water, it is essential that your Honorable Board should make some enactment as provided for by the Charter.

The issue of \$30,000 Revenue Bonds to pay for lighting the Brooklyn Bridge. Under the arrangement made by the Department with a lighting company the City saves over \$20,000 a year. Unless money is provided the City must return to the old system, paying the Brooklyn Rapid Transit Company \$100 a day for steam, and bearing also the expense of operating the Bridge Department's power plant which, under the new arrangement, can be shut down.

I am confident that your Honorable Body will recognize the relation of these requests to the efficiency of the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity.

Dear Sir—In reply to the resolution adopted by the Board of Aldermen, requesting the Public Service Commission to order the New York City Railway Company to refrain from storing cars on the Lexington avenue line, from One Hundred and Sixteenth street to One Hundred and Twenty-ninth street, I beg to state that the matter has been considered by the Commission.

Investigation has developed the following facts. Within the past year or so the New York City Railway Company has lost, by fire, a number of large car barns, which has greatly decreased the capacity of their barns for storing cars. Certain of them are now being rebuilt, and because of this reconstruction it is difficult to use any large portion of the sites for storage purposes. It has become necessary, therefore, to adopt other means and the Commission has made several suggestions, particularly in the direction of the utilization of vacant blocks. But owing to the fact that the surface cars are operated by underground conduit, a large amount of construction work would be necessary for the utilization of such vacant lots as storage yards. If the cars were overhead trolleys, this would be a simple and easy matter, but as these cars must be used every day, the vacant lots could not be adequately equipped to handle all of the cars very much before the barns themselves will have been reconstructed.

Furthermore, the Commission has directed the receivers to overhaul and repair every one of their cars, amounting to upwards of 2,000 in all. This work has required the employment of a large number of men and a great increase in their shop facilities for repairing and painting the car bodies and the overhauling of the electrical equipments. Much of the space in the car houses which ordinarily might be used for storage has been converted, therefore, into shops.

The Commission has also ordered the companies to operate a larger number of cars than they have been running, which has necessitated the storing of the cars during the night where they can be run out when needed in the morning, and makes it impossible to remove the cars any great distance from the lines upon which they are being used.

The total result of these facts is that it has been necessary for the company to store many of their cars in the streets. We have had this in mind for some time and would gladly have issued an order requiring the adoption of some other method, but it seems impossible to repair the cars as rapidly as the public desires, to operate as many cars as we think should be operated to meet the demands of the public—and the number is being increased from week to week—without temporarily storing cars in streets. The Commission feels positive that when the Board of Aldermen understands the conditions, they will agree with the Commission that it is preferable, temporarily, to undergo the inconvenience due to storing of cars in the streets rather than to interfere with the work of overhauling the cars and to make necessary the operation of a less number from day to day. I wish to assure you that as soon as it is possible to order the companies to cease using the streets for storage purposes, this will be done.

Dear Sir—There is transmitted herewith for consideration of your honorable Board, a request for an issue of Special Revenue Bonds of \$25,000 to replenish the appropriation for Maintenance of Asphalt Pavements, Including Fire Burns, 1908, to enable me to enter into a contract to make urgent and needed repairs to asphalt block pavements for the balance of this year. The contract which was made for this work in 1907 has expired, and the amount set apart for maintenance of sheet asphalt, asphalt block pavements, and fire burn damages is totally inadequate to do the work which is necessary.

The contract for repaving and maintaining sheet asphalt pavements which was recently entered into is estimated at \$228,102. This is approximately \$80,000 in excess of last year's contract for similar work owing to the increase in cost from 83 cents to \$1.48 per square yard.

The balance of this appropriation, a portion of which has already been expended for damages by fire burns and unknown causes, will be required for the remaining months of this year, thereby leaving no funds available for repairs to asphalt block pavements.

In addition to the above articles we require in the several Boroughs, Croton, thaw and hydrant pump hose, horse blankets, horse sheets, reducers, nozzles, shovels, hammers, manure and wood forks, signal and national flags, lap robes, rubber pole mats, scoop and flat shovels, and numerous other articles carried under the term "General Supplies," which we were unable to purchase this year on account of the insufficient appropriation.

Attached hereto are comparative statements of the appropriations and expenditures for the years 1906-1907, and the appropriation and the amounts allotted for the year 1908; and attention is called to the fact that, while the appropriation for 1907 was \$491,778.81 for supplies of the kinds noted in the statement for the Boroughs of Manhattan, The Bronx and Richmond, an amount that we were forced to get along with to the detriment of the Department, we were allowed for the year 1908 but \$464,200, or \$27,578.81 less than for 1907.

In the Boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens, in 1907, there was expended \$282,116.61. Although the paid system was extended in the Borough of Queens in July, 1907, and ten new companies organized, there was appropriated in the Budget for 1908, for these two Boroughs, a total of \$287,000, or only \$4,883.39 more than was expended in 1907.

Hon. PATRICK F. McGOWAN, President, Board of Aldermen, City Hall, New York:

Dear Sir—Up to the early part of this year the arrangement for lighting the Brooklyn Bridge was that the Bridge Department receive steam from the Brooklyn Rapid Transit Company, by which they operated an electric plant of their own for lighting the bridge. The steam so supplied originally was furnished to the Bridge Department in return for certain services or privileges granted the Brooklyn Rapid Transit Company. On account of some changes in the terminals this arrangement had to be abrogated.

The Brooklyn Rapid Transit Company offered to furnish this steam at the time the old arrangement terminated for one hundred dollars (\$100) a day, or thirty-six thousand five hundred dollars (\$36,500) a year.

We can obtain this current from the New York Edison Company, under a wholesale contract which was put in effect this year, for between twenty and thirty thousand dollars a year. When you figure in the cost of operating the electric plant by the Bridge Department this will be a saving to the City of from twelve to fifteen thousand dollars a year.

Unfortunately the Bridge Department had let the matter go until the last possible moment, and the Brooklyn Rapid Transit Company stated that they would cut off the supply on a certain date. Commissioner Stevenson then appealed to this Department to help him out, and after a conference we decided we could do so temporarily.

The lighting of the bridge, therefore, was taken over by this Department under its contract with the Edison Company, and the Bridge Department's plant, in consequence, shut down.

On doing this we immediately made an application to the Board of Aldermen for an issue of thirty thousand dollars (\$30,000) Revenue Bonds to pay for this service, it not having been provided for in our appropriations in the Budget for 1908. The Bridge Department are not allowed to transfer to us from their funds, for the reason that the maintenance of the bridge is taken care of out of the earnings, and they are not allowed to transfer any of the funds so received.

Our appropriations are quite close this year, and we have practically no margin after the necessary increase in lighting is provided for. In consequence the Chief Engineer of Light and Power has advised me that unless we can obtain this appropriation of thirty thousand dollars (\$30,000) we shall be obliged to certify to the Bridge Department that we are no longer able to carry the burden of the bridge this year.

The resolution in regard to this matter is still in the Finance Committee of the Board of Aldermen, as it had not been reported out up to the last advice we received last week.

Will you kindly use what efforts you can in order to get this issue of Revenue Bonds through for us, as the arrangement now existing is really saving the City a considerable amount of money, and this issue of Revenue Bonds, instead of increasing the City's expenses, is decreasing them. The request for the issue is, in my opinion, just and proper.

As I have stated, however, if we cannot obtain the issue of bonds we must relieve ourselves of the burden of the bridge, as otherwise I seriously doubt that our appropriations will be sufficient for the balance of the year.

Sir—On February 25, 1908, application was made by me to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for the necessary appropriation to take over to this Department the work of cleaning certain streets in the Borough of Manhattan, which had, up to that time, been cleaned by the Department of Parks, which streets are as follows:

West Seventy-second Street Parkway, west of Central Park.

Cathedral parkway (One Hundred and Tenth street), Fifth avenue to Riverside drive.

Property road (Riverside drive), Grant's Tomb to One Hundred and Twenty-ninth street.

Ninety-sixth street, from West End avenue to Riverside drive.

Plazas in front of Central Park, at One Hundred and Tenth street and Eighth avenue, One Hundred and Tenth street and Fifth avenue, Fifty-ninth street and Eighth avenue and Fifty-ninth street and Fifth avenue.

Ninety-seventh street transverse road under Central Park.

Eighty-sixth street transverse road under Central Park.

Seventy-ninth street transverse road under Central Park.

Eighty-sixth street transverse road under Central Park.

In addition to the above, Seventh avenue, from One Hundred and Tenth street to One Hundred and Fifty-third street, which is now being paved and is soon to be turned over to the Department of Street Cleaning.

The Board of Estimate and Apportionment referred the above application to the Comptroller of the City, and he procured a report from the Bureau of Municipal Investigation and Statistics relative to the request, which report he transmitted on April 1, 1908, to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, together with his own report, setting forth that an allowance of \$24,500 is required by the Department of Street Cleaning for the care of the Park streets in question, in addition to appropriations made for the said Department in the Budget for 1908, and stating that the funds of the Department of Parks are not sufficient to permit of any transfer from the same to the Department of Street Cleaning, and he therefore recommended that the matter be referred back to the Commissioner of Street Cleaning, with the suggestion that application be made to the Board of Aldermen for the adoption of the necessary resolution to provide for an issue of Special Revenue Bonds to the required amount.

Acting upon the aforesaid report the Honorable Board of Estimate and Apportionment referred the Comptroller's report to me for consideration and action.

In pursuance of the above direction I respectfully apply to the Honorable Board of Aldermen for an issue of Special Revenue Bonds in the amount of twenty-four thousand five hundred dollars (\$24,500), as above recommended, to cover the expense of cleaning the streets in question.

Sir—I have the honor to return herewith resolution of the Board of Aldermen, relative to the placing of red lamps on fire alarm signal boxes in the Boroughs of Brooklyn and The Bronx, with report as follows:

The placing of the ruby lanterns to distinguish fire alarm signal stations in the Borough of Manhattan does not come under the jurisdiction of the Fire Department, but under the jurisdiction of the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity. The alarm boxes in this Borough being mostly underground, the same are placed in lamp-posts, and the ruby lantern also placed on the same post. In the Boroughs of Brooklyn and The Bronx, the boxes are, for the most part, overhead, and are placed on telegraph poles, and the same method of distinguishing fire alarm stations by the placing of ruby lanterns could not be carried out, but I would suggest that the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, in neighborhoods where gas is used for lighting purposes, have the nearest lamp-post to the fire alarm box supplied with a lantern with a red top, and where electricity is used for lighting purposes, a red globe placed on the nearest light to the fire alarm box, to distinguish the location of same.

Dear Sir—I would respectfully ask that, pursuant to the provisions of section 188 of the Charter of The City of New York, your Honorable Board will request the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to authorize the issue of Special Revenue Bonds to the amount of forty-two thousand dollars (\$42,000), to be applied to the appropriation for the year 1908, entitled Administration, Supplies and Contingencies.

In this connection, I beg to state that the necessity for this request is caused, primarily, by the fact that while the average census of the Department during the first four months of 1907 was 3,609, the average for the corresponding months of 1908 was 4,865, an increase of 1,256, or 34.8 per cent. The principal increase in amount required during the current year will be for meats and other food supplies, owing to this increase in census. The meat used during the first four months of 1908 cost \$46,708.12, and for the same period in 1907, \$35,057.77, an increase of \$11,650.35 for four months, or an apparent increase for the year 1908 over 1907 of \$34,951.05. This amount, however, will be reduced during the summer months and the increased cost of meat for year will probably not exceed \$27,000.

I would respectfully ask the careful attention of your Honorable Board to the inclosed statement, showing the necessity for this appropriation.

No. 840.

City of New York—Department of Finance,
Comptroller's Office,
June 1, 1908.

To the Honorable the Board of Aldermen:

Gentlemen—Section 900 of the amended Greater New York Charter provides as follows:

"It shall be the duty of the Comptroller of said City to prepare and submit to the Board of Aldermen, at least four weeks before its annual meeting in each and every year, for the purpose of imposing the annual taxes, a statement setting forth the amounts by law authorized to be raised by tax in each year, on account of the Corporation of The City of New York, as hereby constituted, or for City purposes within said City, as created by this Act, and purposes for which said City is liable, and on account of the counties of New York, Kings, Queens and Richmond, and also an estimate of the probable amount of receipts into the City Treasury during the then current year from all sources of revenue of the general funds, including surplus revenue from the Sinking Funds of the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of The City of New York and of any of the municipal and public corporations, or parts of municipal and public corporations, by this Act consolidated with the municipal corporation known as the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of The City of New York, other than the surplus of revenues of any such Sinking Funds for the payment of interest on the City debt of the municipal corporation known as the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of The City of New York, or the like debts of the municipal and public corporations by this Act consolidated as aforesaid, and the said Board of Aldermen is hereby authorized and directed to deduct the total amount of such estimated receipts from the aggregate amount of all the various sums which by law they are required to order and cause to be raised by tax in said year, for the purposes aforesaid, and to cause to be raised by tax only the balance of such aggregate amount after making such deductions."

Section 902 of the amended Greater New York Charter provides as follows:

"In the statement submitted by the Comptroller to the Board of Aldermen, as above provided in this chapter, he shall each year include and state specifically the sum or sums necessary to be raised to pay during the current year the salaries of the County officers and the other County charges and expenses in the counties of New York, Kings, Queens and Richmond, respectively, and the Board of Aldermen is hereby authorized and directed to levy upon and collect from the taxable property within each of said counties, respectively, the sum or sums so necessary to be raised to pay the salaries of County officers and other County charges and expenses of such County; to the end that each of said counties shall ultimately bear and pay all expenses necessary to be incurred within the County for County as distinguished from City purposes."

In pursuance of the foregoing provisions of law I have the honor to submit to your Honorable Body statement as follows:

First—The Budget, in detail, for the year 1908.

Second—The amount of County charges and expenses in the counties of New York, Kings, Queens and Richmond, respectively, included in said Budget, as well as the amount of County charges and expenses paid during the year 1907 from the proceeds of Special Revenue Bonds, which amounts, together are to be raised respectively, by levy upon taxable property within each of said counties, as provided by section 902 of the Charter.

Third—The estimated receipts of the General Fund for the reduction of taxation.

FOR CHARITABLE INSTITUTIONS.

Conditions Governing Payments to Charitable Institutions.

The appropriations in this Budget are made subject to the following conditions:

1. The accounts and records of all charitable institutions receiving public moneys shall be so kept as to show all receipts, disbursements and population in such form as shall be satisfactory to the Comptroller. Records must show the addresses of parents, guardians or nearest relatives of inmates and other information designed to facilitate inquiry into their financial inability to make provision for dependents in the institutions.
2. Moneys received from the City Treasury shall be used by such institutions for recurring expenses of "care, support, education and maintenance."
3. All institutions receiving public moneys and all their books of record and accounts shall at all reasonable times be open to the visitation, inspection and examination of duly authorized representatives of the Department of Finance and at all proper times the Department of Public Charities shall have access to the record of inmates.
4. Upon its appearing to the satisfaction of the Comptroller that it would be to the public interest to withhold payments to any charitable institution for which an apportionment has been made, he shall in his discretion suspend payments and give written notice to such institution of his intention to apply to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for authority to cease making further payments, and upon the determination of said Board that such payments shall terminate, the right of any such institution to receive payment for services rendered thereafter shall thereupon end.
5. Except where appropriations are made in bulk and not upon the per capita basis, no payment shall be made for inmates of private charitable institutions unless the same shall have been accepted by the Commissioner of the Department of Public Charities as proper charges upon the City. Except in emergency cases in hospitals, the Commissioner of Charities shall not accept as proper charges against the City inmates capable of paying for their own support or for whose care adequate provision can be made in public hospitals. *The City shall not be liable for any payment to charitable institutions in excess of the apportionment which may have been made to such institutions, notwithstanding any per capita rates of payment that may have been fixed for the inmates thereof.*
6. All institutions receiving money from the City are required to state specifically the amount so received, as from the City Treasury, in their printed annual reports.
7. No money shall be paid to any private charitable institution which pays any salary to or gives any consideration, financial or of any kind, for services to, or that has any business dealing with, or secures goods or merchandise, directly or indirectly, from any officer or trustee or member of its Board of Managers.
8. That charitable institutions for children now carried in the Budget and not sending their inmates to the Public Schools, and not sharing in the Corporate School Fund, and not receiving teachers and school supplies from the Board of Education, but giving in their own buildings secular education to the children resident in the institutions, shall be paid a per capita of 7 cents per day, five school days in the week, for each child receiving such instruction of four years of age and over during ten months in the year. This money to be paid under the authorization of section 230 of the Charter, but under the general conditions relating to institutions receiving Corporate School money, as provided in section 1154.
9. Magistrates are requested to transfer dependent, and, when judicious, no proper guardianship children, and all cases coming to their attention in the courts where no crime is proven against the child to the Commissioner of Charities, who can commit to institutions. Magistrates are earnestly requested not to commit a dependent child to an institution on a court commitment.
10. The Commissioner of Charities is instructed to take such steps, either by appeal to the national authorities or by proper bills to the Legislature, as to provide

that the children of emigrants abandoned within one year after arrival in this City be returned to the country whence they came.

11. In determining the acceptance of patients in private hospitals as proper charges (see Rule 5) the Commissioner of Charities shall first consider the nature of the service actually rendered to the patients by the hospitals. The records of the institutions and the bed-card notes showing the treatment given shall be received as the essential evidence in deciding acceptances or rejections.

12. No dependent child under 16 years of age shall be accepted as a proper charge upon the City and no money will be paid for the care, support, maintenance or education of such child unless it shall have been lawfully committed to a suitable private charitable institution having its own plant and equipment for the proper protection and care of children, under the supervision of the State Board of Charities, and has been placed in this Budget by the action of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

This order has no relation to the class of children of such mental and physical condition as those cared for in the City Institution at Randall's Island.

The Committee on Finance, to which was referred on April 28, 1908 (Minutes, page 188), the annexed ordinance in favor of an issue of \$100,000 Corporate Stock for water mains in Queens, respectfully

REPORTS:

That Deputy Commissioner Loughman and Engineer Byrnes appeared before the Committee and stated that the Borough of Queens is in need of water mains much more extensive than this sum would supply.

The Committee recommends that the said ordinance be adopted.

AN ORDINANCE providing for an issue of Corporate Stock in the sum of one hundred thousand dollars (\$100,000) to provide means for laying water mains in the Borough of Queens.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York as follows:

Section 1. The Board of Aldermen hereby approves of and concurs in the following resolution adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment April 24, 1908, and authorizes the Comptroller to issue Corporate Stock of The City of New York to the amount and for the purposes therein specified:

Further, any person found guilty of violating any provision of this section by a court of competent jurisdiction shall be subject to a fine of not less than fifty dollars (\$50). It shall be the duty of the City Clerk and the Chief of the Bureau of Licenses to have the language of this section printed in bold type respectively on all applications of and licenses granted to persons under the provisions of this article.

Sec. 2. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

MINUTES OF THE LOCAL BOARD OF VAN CORTLANDT, TWENTY-FIFTH DISTRICT.

Pursuant to call by President Haffen the members of the Local Board of Van Cortlandt, Twenty-fifth District, met in the office of the President of the Borough of The Bronx, on May 14, 1908, at 1 p. m., in the Municipal Building, One Hundred and Seventy-seventh street and Third avenue.

Present—Alderman Hochdorffer, Alderman Crowley and the President of the Borough of The Bronx.

Minutes of previous meeting were adopted as printed.

No. 76. Sidewalk repairs, etc., on south side of East One Hundred and Seventieth street, between Harlem Railroad and Brook avenue.

The Bureau of Highways, Borough of The Bronx, under date of April 28, 1908, reported that lots at that locality had been excavated for building purposes and that the work had been abandoned, and in consequence was in a dangerous condition, the same having been excavated close to the flagging.

On motion, duly seconded, it was

Resolved, That proceedings be and the same hereby are initiated for building a retaining wall, placing necessary filling, to bring the sidewalk to its proper width, relay flagging where necessary, erect guard rail for a distance of about 75 feet on One Hundred and Seventieth street and 25 feet on Brook avenue, the cost of said work to be charged as a lien against the property deemed to be benefited.

AQUEDUCT COMMISSION.

Minutes of Stated Meeting of the Aqueduct Commissioners, Held at Their Office, No. 280 Broadway, New York City, on Tuesday, May 5, 1908, at 2 o'clock p.m.
Present—Commissioners Cowan (President), Ten Eyck, Ryan and Windolph, and Chief Engineer Sears.

The minutes of April 21, 1908, were read and approved.

I. J. Beaudriais, Esq., Special Counsel, appeared before the Commissioners in the matter of the new highways at the Cross River Reservoir, and, after discussion, it was decided to prepare a form of letter for transmission to the representatives of the various towns in relation to the subject.

The Chairman of the Committee of Finance and Audit presented bill of R. L. Fox for furnishing copies of legislative bills, etc., amounting to \$100, with recommendation that the same be approved and certified to the Comptroller for payment. The recommendation of the Committee was approved and the Secretary directed to prepare a voucher for the payment of said bill.

The Committee of Finance and Audit reported the examination and audit of bills contained in vouchers Nos. 18936 to 18948, inclusive, amounting to \$2,732.41, and of estimate contained in voucher No. 18949, amounting to \$58,572.41, which were approved and ordered certified to the Comptroller for payment by the following vote:

Affirmative—Commissioners Cowan, Ten Eyck, Ryan and Windolph—4.

The following preamble and resolution was offered:

Whereas, In the opinion of the Aqueduct Commissioners, the further sum of five hundred thousand dollars (\$500,000) will be required to defray the necessary and lawful expenditures of said Commissioners; therefore

Resolved, That the Comptroller of The City of New York be and hereby is requested to raise the sum of five hundred thousand dollars (\$500,000) upon bonds of The City of New York, in conformity with the requirements of section 32, chapter 490, Laws of 1883, of the State of New York, for the uses and purposes of the Aqueduct Commissioners, as set forth in said chapter and section of said law.

Adopted by the following vote:

Affirmative—Commissioners Cowan, Ten Eyck, Ryan and Windolph—4.

The Construction Committee returned to the Commissioners communication from the Corporation Counsel, dated January 7, 1908, submitting, with his approval, manuscript copy of contract, specifications, etc., for iron fencing at Jerome Park Reservoir with recommendation that said contract be returned to the Chief Engineer with request to embody therein the clauses relating to assignments, pursuant to circular letter of the Comptroller, dated April 15, 1908, and that he consider the advisability of increasing the height of the three-foot part of said fence to four feet.

The recommendation of the Committee was adopted.

Report No. 1699 of the Chief Engineer, dated May 5, 1908, recommending payment of bill of James H. O'Loughlin for team hire on April 1, 1908, amounting to \$5, was received, approved and ordered filed and the Secretary directed to prepare a voucher for the payment of said bill.

The Commissioners then adjourned until Thursday, May 7, 1908, at 11 o'clock a.m.


