Pursuant to the authority vested in me by law, and in accordance with the provisions of section 37 of the Greater New York Charter, I, Patrick F. McGowan, Acting Mayor of The City of New York, do hereby call a special meeting of the Board of Aldermen, to be held in the Aldermanic Chamber, City Hall, Manhattan, on Wednesday, August 12, 1908, at 1:30 o'clock in the afternoon, for the purpose of:

I. Receiving and acting upon the Mayor's veto of the application of the Arverne Carnival Association, passed by the Board of Aldermen on the 21st day of July, 1908.

II. Receiving and acting upon the application of the Arverne Carnival Association to parade through the streets of Arverne, Long Island, on August 28 and 29, 1908, and erect and maintain a temporary arch on Remington avenue, near Story place, from the 24th to the 31st of August, 1908.

III. Extending an official welcome to the United States athletes who recently participated in the Olympic games in London.

### MESSAGES FROM HIS HONOR THE MAYOR.

The President laid before the Board the following message from his Honor the Mayor:

No. 1027.

City of New York—Office of The Mayor,  
August 5, 1908.

To the Honorable the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York:

Gentlemen—I return herewith, with my disapproval, resolution adopted by your Honorable Board on July 21, 1908, permitting the Arverne Carnival Association to erect stands, etc.

On July 6, 1908, I returned to you, with my disapproval, a similar resolution in favor of said Arverne Carnival Association, passed by your Honorable Board on June 23, 1908, giving as one of the grounds therefor, "because the same grants the exclusive use of certain highways to this association on the 28th and 29th of August, 1908."

I find in the said resolution adopted by you on July 21, 1908, the following:

"Resolved, That permission be and that the same is hereby given to the Arverne Carnival Association to use the streets and highways in Arverne, Long Island, \* \* \* granting the said association all rights and privileges to and on said highways, streets and avenues upon which said celebration may be held."

For the reason that this second resolution has not been changed so as to meet the objections pointed out in my communication of July 6, 1908, I return the same herewith with my disapproval.

Resolved, That permission be and the same hereby is given to the Arverne Carnival Association to use the streets and highways in Arverne, Long Island, and to the use of the street and highway known as Remington avenue, from the Boulevard to the board walk in Arverne, of the Borough of Queens, City of New York, on the 28th and 29th days of August, 1908, for the purpose of the celebration to be conducted by the said association, giving and granting to the said association all rights and privileges to and on said highways, streets and avenues upon which said celebration may be held; it is further

Resolved, That permission be and the same hereby is given to the Arverne Carnival Association to erect and maintain a grandstand and arch on the aforesaid Remington avenue, for the purpose of said celebration, at about Story place, and which grandstand and arch are to be erected August 24, 1908, to the satisfaction and under the supervision of the President of the Borough, and that the said grandstand and arch are to be removed within twenty-four hours after the celebration, which will be on August 29, 1908.

All ordinances and regulations in conflict with this resolution be and the same hereby are suspended, such suspension to be, however, only for the days and place as hereinbefore mentioned.

Which was laid over, ordered to be printed in the minutes and published in full in the City Record.

### MOTIONS, ORDINANCES AND RESOLUTIONS.

No. 1043.

By Alderman Emmer—

Resolved, That permission be and the same is hereby given to the Arverne Carnival Association to parade through the streets and thoroughfares of the suburb of Arverne, in the Borough of Queens, under the supervision of the Police Department, on the 28th and 29th days of August, 1908, such permission to continue only during the days above specified, and also that permission be and is hereby given to the aforesaid Arverne Carnival Association to erect a temporary grandstand and arch on Remington avenue, Arverne, in the vicinity of Story place, under the direction of the President of the Borough, provided that such stand and arch be not erected until August 24, 1908, and shall be removed within forty-eight hours after the celebration contemplated by the Arverne Carnival Association, to wit, not later than August 31, 1908, Sunday falling on August 30, 1908.

By Alderman Doull—

Whereas, Once again American muscle and brawn have manifested their superiority in the world by the magnificent victories won by the athletes from this country at the Olympic games held in London, England, in July, 1908; and

Whereas, The Sons of Columbus through their pluck, ability and sportsmanlike conduct won for themselves golden honors and raised the glorious Stars and Stripes far, far above the standards of every other country in the world, thus demonstrating the perfection which American youths have attained in the athletic field.

Resolved, That the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, voicing the sentiment of the whole people, are proud of every man of the American team who participated in the Olympiad, and congratulates them most heartily on the well merited success they attained.

Resolved, That the President of the Board be requested to appoint a committee from this Board to co-operate with the committee appointed by his Honor the Mayor, to complete arrangements for a public reception to be tendered by the City to the American athletes on their return to this country; and be it further

Resolved, As an additional mark of the esteem in which the American team is held by the people of this City, his Honor the Mayor be and he is hereby authorized to extend to them, and to each of them, the freedom of the City on and during the day of the public reception.

Which was unanimously adopted.

No. 1045.

By Alderman Doull—

Resolved, That his Honor the Mayor be and he is hereby respectfully requested to issue a proclamation ordering the national colors to be displayed on all public buildings on the day of the public reception, requesting all citizens in the City to decorate their houses and all athletic associations to parade in honor of the occasion. And further, that he be requested to communicate with the Governor of the State with a view of having the National Guard of the City parade on that day, to render all befitting honor to the victorious team.

Resolved, That the public streets selected by the committee in charge of the reception for the route of the parade be closed for vehicular traffic during the passing of the parade, and the Police Commissioner be requested to issue the necessary orders.

Which was unanimously adopted.

The Vice-Chairman appointed as Committee on Reception of the Olympiad Victorious Athletes the entire Board of Aldermen, with Alderman Percival E. Nagle, Chairman.

Alderman Reginald S. Doull made an interesting statement as to what might be expected at the reception on August 20, 1908, and paid an eloquent tribute to the manliness, grit and athletic skill of the competitors who represented the United States, and of whom a large proportion were young men who worked for their living in The City of New York.

Alderman Downing moved that the Board do now adjourn.

The Vice-Chairman put the question whether the Board would agree with said motion.

Which was decided in the affirmative.

And the Vice-Chairman declared that the Board stood adjourned sine die.

Whereas, The Committee on Buildings is in receipt of an estimate, in the sum of \$342, from George F. Driscoll, contractor for the work of general construction at Public School 24, Brooklyn, for repairs for exterior walls, windows, etc., in the old building; and

Whereas, The Superintendent of School Buildings reports that this estimate is reasonable and that the work is necessary; therefore be it

Resolved, That the sum of three hundred and forty-two dollars (\$342) be, and the same is hereby, appropriated from the proceeds of Corporate Stock, to be issued by the Comptroller pursuant to sections 47 and 169 of the Revised Charter, application for the issue of which is hereby made; said amount to be applied in full payment for extra cost in George F. Driscoll, contractor, for additional work in connection with his contract, as hereinbefore stated; requisition for said sum being hereby made upon the Comptroller.

Whereas, Mrs. Bessie Warren Campbell, a special Teacher of Drawing, was absent from school on account of quarantine by the Department of Health; and

Whereas, Under section 44 of the By-Laws of the Board of Education only ten days' refund for this absence can be allowed; therefore be it

Resolved, That so much of the absence of Mrs. Bessie Warren Campbell, a special Teacher of Drawing, from June 2 to June 20, 1908, as is non-excusable under section 44 of the By-Laws, be and it hereby is excused with pay, and that all provisions of the By-Laws inconsistent therewith be and they hereby are suspended for the purpose of this resolution.

Concurring in the action of the Committee on Buildings, taken June 20, 1908, in deciding that the work under the contract of P. F. Boland for the installation of a pipe organ in Erasmus Hall High School, Brooklyn, is unnecessarily and unreasonably delayed; that said contractor is wilfully violating the conditions and covenants of said contract, and that the work is not being done according to the terms thereof; declaring voided and forfeited the contract of P. F. Boland for the installation of a pipe organ in Erasmus Hall High School, Brooklyn, The Title Guarantee and Surety Company, surety, for non-compliance with the terms thereof, and authorizing the Chairman of the Committee on Buildings to serve formal notice to the foregoing effect upon the said P. F. Boland.

Approving the action of the Committee on Supplies in accepting the resignation of John H. Dent as first grade Clerk in the Bureau of Supplies, taking effect July 1, 1908.

Empowering, from this date until September 9, 1908, the Executive Committee to perform any and all administrative powers of the Board of Education, save only those relating to the appointment of Principals, Teachers and officers of the Board, and to increases of salaries except so far as relates to the departmental estimate for the year 1909.

Excusing hereafter all absences of officials and employees of the Board of Education, including the members of the teaching and supervising force in day schools, who are regularly enrolled members of the National Guard, caused by their performing required military service, with full pay, and without deducting from their regular vacations the time of such absences, and suspending any provisions of the By-Laws inconsistent herewith for the purposes of this resolution.
