

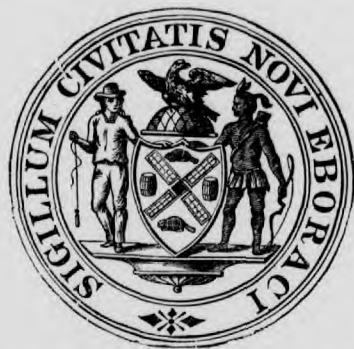

#### Sanitary Bureau.

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending February 5, 1887:

The total number of inspections made by the Sanitary Inspectors was 4,591.

The number of complaints returned by the Sanitary Inspectors was 395.

During the past week 232 complaints were received from citizens, and referred to the Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.

There were issued to the consignees of vessels, to discharge cargoes on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port, 33 permits.

There were issued to consignees, to discharge rags (in bulk, under bonds), 4 permits.

There were issued, under the Sanitary Code, 4 miscellaneous permits.

There were issued to scavengers to empty, clean and disinfect privy sinks, 29 permits.

At premises where contagious diseases were reported, 249 visits were made, and 73 disinfections and 26 fumigations were performed.

The number of cases of contagious diseases removed to Rivers' de Hospital was 11.

The number of vaccinations performed was 2,878 of which 342 were primary, and 2,536 revaccinations.

The number of analyses of milk made was 2.

The certificates of 710 births, 41 still births, 216 marriages, and 793 deaths, reported to have taken place in this city, were received by this Bureau during the week ending Saturday, February 5, 1887. This shows an increase of 126 births, 258 deaths, and a decrease of 22 still-births, and 47 marriages, when compared with the number received during the preceding week, but when compared with the corresponding week of the year 1886, there was a increase of 70 births, 16 marriages and 181 deaths, and a decrease of 21 still-births. Compared with the mortality reported during the preceding week, the deaths from scarlatina decreased 11; croup, 3; typhoid fever, 1; cerebro-spinal fever, 4; cancer, 5; pneumonia, 22; hydrocephalus and tubercular meningitis, 1; apoplexy, 1; gastritis, enteritis and peritonitis, 1; cyanosis and atelectasis, 2; premature and pretermatural births, 1 and drowning, 2; while the deaths from small-pox increased 4; measles, 23; diphtheria, 27; whooping-cough, 5; erysipelas, 2; puerperal diseases, 3; mania, 1; alcoholism, 1; rheumatism and gout, 1; phthisis pulmonalis, 5; aneurism, 3; meningitis and encephalitis, 13; convulsions, 6; all diseases of the brain and nervous system, 26; cirrhosis and hepatitis, 5; Bright's disease and nephritis, 3; surgical operations, 2; suicide, 1. The number of deaths from malarial fevers, diarrhoeal diseases, bronchitis, marasmus, tabes mesenterica and scrofula was the same in the two successive weeks.

Deaths from the principal Zymotic Diseases, Phthisis Pulmonalis, Pneumonia, Bronchitis, and Children under five years of age, reported during the week and compared with the three preceding weeks.

Of the total number of deaths reported for the week, 171 were in institutions, 455 in tenement houses, 154 in houses containing three families or less, 10 in hotels and boarding-houses, 3 in rivers, streets, boats, etc.; 14 were on the basement floor, 139 on the first, 177 on the second, 164 on the third, 84 on the fourth, 38 on the fifth, 3 on the sixth; 776 were stated to be residents of New York City, and 17 non-residents; 108 were stated to be single, 200 married, 76 widowed, and the condition of 409 was not stated; these were children who had not attained a marriageable age.

The total number of burial permits issued during the week were as follows, viz.: City deaths, 793; still-births, 41; bodies in transit, 17; of the total burial permits issued for city and still-births, 74 were upon certificates received from the Coroners; 710 births, 216 marriages, 41 still-births, 793 deaths; 17 applications for transit permits were recorded, indexed and tabulated; 144 searches of the registers of births, marriages, and deaths were made, and 4 transcripts of the birth record, 6 of marriage, and 93 of death were issued during the week.

The mean temperature for the week ending February 29, 1887, was 28.3 degrees Fahr.; the mean reading of the barometer was 30.243; the mean humidity was 79, saturation being 100; the number of miles traveled by the wind was 1,416, and the total amount of rain-fall was 0.89 inches depth of water, as reported by D. Draper, Ph. D., Director of the New York Meteorological Observatory, Central Park.

The disposition of 714 deaths and still-births, or 85.61 per cent. of the total number reported, was in the following 14 cemeteries: Bayside (Jewish), 26; Calvary (Roman Catholic), 280; City, pauper burial-ground (undenominational), 105; Greenwood (undenominational), 54; Lutheran (undenominational), 94; Cypress Hills (undenominational), 19; Evergreen (undenominational), 44; Woodlawn (undenominational), 22; St. Michael's (Protestant Episcopal), 12; Union (Methodist Protestant), 6; Holy Cross (Roman Catholic), 9; Machpelah, L. I. (Jewish), 8; St. Raymond's (Roman Catholic), 11; Washington (undenominational), 24.

The distribution of deaths (actual mortality) for the week ending January 29, 1887, was in the following Wards, viz.: First, 7; Second, 0; Third, 3; Fourth, 11; Fifth, 5; Sixth, 16; Seventh, 31; Eighth, 10; Ninth, 23; Tenth, 24; Eleventh, 28; Twelfth, 113; Thirteenth, 17; Fourteenth, 34; Fifteenth, 7; Sixteenth, 16; Seventeenth, 24; Eighteenth, 31; Nineteenth, 151; Twentieth, 46; Twenty-first, 36; Twenty-second, 68; Twenty-third, 15; Twenty-fourth, 10.

The actual mortality for the week ending January 29, 1887, was 732; this is 70 more than the number that occurred during the corresponding week of the year 1886, and 41 more than the average of the corresponding weeks of the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 26.00 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,463,932.

Under the law all charges for water supplied through meters are a lien against the respective premises, and the law therefore holds the owner of the premises responsible for the amount of water used or wasted.

Notice is therefore given to all householders that, in all further applications for reduction of water rents, no allowance will be made on account of waste of water occurring through leaks, from defective service pipes or plumbing, or wasteful use of water by tenants or occupants of buildings, though such leakage or waste may have occurred without the knowledge or consent of the owners of the buildings.
