

Sanitary Bureau.

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending February 5, 1887:

The total number of inspections made by the Sanitary Inspectors was 4,591.

The number of complaints returned by the Sanitary Inspectors was 395.

During the past week 232 complaints were received from citizens, and referred to the Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.

There were issued to the consignees of vessels, to discharge cargoes on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Part, 22 permits.

The certificates of 710 births, 41 still births, 216 marriages, and 793 deaths, reported to have taken place in this city, were received by this Bureau during the week ending Saturday, February 5, 1887. This shows an increase of 126 births, 258 deaths, and a decrease of 22 still-births, and 47 marriages, when compared with the number received during the preceding week, but when compared with the corresponding week of the year 1886, there was a increase of 70 births, 16 marriages and 181 deaths, and a decrease of 21 still-births. Compared with the mortality reported during the preceding week, the deaths from scarlatina decreased 11; croup, 3; typhoid fever, 1; cerebro-spinal fever, 4; cancer, 5; pneumonia, 22; hydrocephalus and tubercular meningitis, 1; apoplexy, 1; gastritis, enteritis and peritonitis, 1; cyanosis and atelectasis, 2; premature and preternatural births, 1 and drowning, 2; while the deaths from small-pox mcreased 4; measles, 23; diphtheria, 27; whooping-cough, 5; eryspe¹as, 2; puerperal diseases, 3; manition, 1; alcoholism, 1; rheumatism and gout, 1; phthisis pulmonalis, 5; aneurism, 3; meningitis and encephalitis, 13; convulsions, 6; all diseases of the brain and nervous system, 26; cirrhosis and hepatitis, 5; Bright's disease and nephritis, 3; surgical operations, 2; suicide, 1. The number of deaths from malarial fevers, diarrhoeal diseases, bronchitis, marasmus, tabes mesenterica and scrofula was the same in the two successive weeks. successive weeks.

Notice is therefore given to all householders that, in all further applications for reduction of water rents, no allowance will be made on account of waste of water occurring through leaks, from defective service pipes or plumbing, or wasteful use of water by tenants or occupants of buildings, though such leakage or waste may have occurred without the knowledge or consent of the owners of the buildings.

House-owners are further notified that whenever their premises become vacant, and are likely to remain vacant, they must notify this Department in writing, and that unless this requirement is complied with no deductions in extra water rents will he allowed for any portion of one year.
