The 748 deaths represent a death-rate of 23.52, against 24.73 for the previous week, and 28.46 for the corresponding week of 1890.

The decrease of 38 deaths was mainly due to a decrease of 11 in the deaths from croup, of 31 from pneumonia, and of 30 from Bright's disease and nephritis. There was an increase of 15 in the deaths from measles, and of 13 from phthisis.

The deaths from measles were most numerous in the Twelfth, Twentieth and Twenty-second Wards.

of the "operations and action" of this Department for the three months ending December 31, 1890:

The assessment of real and personal property for purposes of taxation for the year 1891, which was commenced by the Deputy Tax Commissioners, under the direction of the Commissioners of Taxes and Assessments, on the first Monday of September, 1890, as required by section 814 of the New York City Consolidation Act of 1882, is nearly completed, and the preparation of the books of annual record of assessed valuations of real and personal estate for the year 1891 is in a fair state of progress.

Since the assessment rolls for the year 1890 were delivered to the Receiver of Taxes, the Commissioners have remitted taxes for said year in seven instances, amounting in the aggregate to the sum of nine hundred and forty-six dollars and seventy-two cents (\$946.72).

ATTENTION IS CALLED TO THE RECENT act of the Legislature (chapter 449, Laws of 1889), which provides that whenever any streets or avenues in the city, described in any grant of land under water, from the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty containing covenants requiring the grantees and their successors to pave, repave, keep in repair or maintain such streets, shall be in need of repairs, pavement or repavement, the Common Council may, by ordinance, require the same to be paved, repaved or repaired, and the expense thereof to be assessed on the property benefited; and whenever the owner of a lot so assessed shall have paid the assessment levied for such paving, repaving or repairing, such payment shall release and discharge such owner from any and every covenant and obligation as to paving, repaving and repairing, contained in the water grant under which the premises are held, and no further assessment shall be imposed on such lot for paving, repaving or repairing such street or avenue, unless it shall be petitioned for by a majority of the owners of the property (who shall also be the owners of a majority of the property in frontage) on the line of the proposed improvement.
