Whereas, The proper demands, countersigns, and certificates prescribed by the Military Code have been made and provided by and on behalf of the said regiment and the companies thereof;

Resolved, That the leasing of premises for an armory and drill-room for the use and occupation for military purposes of the Seventy-first Regiment of the National Guard in the City and County of New York, be and the same is hereby authorized, and that the Clerk of this Board be and he is hereby authorized and directed to execute a lease, in the name of the Mayor, Aldermen, and Commonalty of the City of New York, and to affix the seal of the said Corporation thereto, of the entire premises on the second story of the building bounded by Broadway, Sixth avenue, Thirty-fifth and Thirty-sixth streets, in the City of New York, described in the leases thereof, dated February 16, 1869, executed in pursuance of resolutions of the Board of Supervisors of the County of New York, and heretofore used and occupied as an armory by the Seventy-first Regiment, for the term of two years from the first day of May, 1879, at the yearly rent of eight thousand dollars, payable quarterly, to be used and occupied by all the companies of the Seventy-first Regiment for a regimental armory; that the said lease shall provide that no alterations of or additions to the said premises shall be made by the said Corporation or the said regiment without the previous written consent of the owners; also, that the superstructure shall be kept in good repair during the term of said lease by and at the expense of the owners of said property, and the usual fire clause in leases be inserted therein; and that the Comptroller be and he is hereby directed to pay the said rent quarterly.

AN ORDINANCE to amend section 1 of chapter XXXVII. of the ordinances of 1866, as amended by ordinance passed July 27, 1878, entitled "Of carts and cartmen, dirt-carts, public carts, and garbage carts."

The Mayor, Aldermen, and Commonalty of the City of New York do ordain as follows:

Section 1. Section 1 of the above-entitled ordinance is hereby amended by inserting after the words "New York," the words "for hire, wages, or pay for such transportation," so that said section, when so amended, shall read as follows:

Section 1. Every cart, truck, wagon, dray, or other vehicle, drawn by one or more horses or other animals, which shall be kept, used, driven, or employed for the transportation or conveyance of goods, wares, merchandise, or other articles, from place to place within the City of New York, for hire, wages, or pay for such transportation, shall be deemed a public cart within the meaning of this chapter, and every person who shall set up, or so keep, use, or employ any such public cart without first obtaining license therefor from the Mayor of said city, as is hereinafter provided, shall be deemed guilty of a violation of this chapter.

Sec. 2. All ordinances or parts of ordinances inconsistent or conflicting with the provisions of this ordinance are hereby repealed.

Sec. 3. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

Sanitary Bureau.

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending October 4, 1879:

The total number of inspections made by the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors was 2,104, as follows, viz.: 4 public buildings, 1,038 tenement-houses, 159 private dwellings, 66 other dwellings, 10 manufactories and workshops, 13 stores and warehouses, 78 stables, 1 market, 26 slaughter-houses, 1 mill, 1 lodging-house, 4 manure dumps, 1 oil works, 1 public sewer, 1 lime kiln, 21 sunken and vacant lots, 1 garbage dump, 1 dock, 1 coal yard, 1 fat-melting establishment, 52 yards, courts, and areas, 74 cellars and basements, 100 waste-pipes and drains, 278 privies and water-closets, 47 streets, gutters, and sidewalks, 11 dangerous stairways, 5 smoky chimneys, 2 piggeries, 38 other nuisances, together with 72 visits of the Sanitary Inspectors to cases of contagious disease.

The number of reports thereon received from the Inspectors was 1,315.

During the past week 125 complaints were received from citizens and referred to the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.

Permits were issued to the consignees of 85 vessels to discharge cargoes, on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port.

152 permits were granted scavengers to empty, clean, and disinfect privy sinks.

The Disinfecting Corps have visited 50 premises where contagious diseases were found, and have disinfected and fumigated 47 houses, 47 privy sinks, together with clothing, bedding, etc.

One case of fever was removed to hospital by the Ambulance Corps.

Bureau of Vital Statistics.

The certificates of 624 births, 39 still-births, 175 marriages, and 498 deaths, reported to have taken place in this city, were received by this bureau during the week ending Saturday, October 4, 1879. This shows an increase of 95 births and 47 deaths, and a decrease of 12 still-births and 12 marriages, when compared with the number received during the preceding week, but when compared with the corresponding week of the year 1878, there was an increase of 135 births and 50 marriages, and a decrease of 5 still-births and 18 deaths. Compared with the mortality reported during the preceding week, the deaths from measles decreased, 1; scarlatina, 9; croup, 9; erysipelas, 1; puerperal diseases, 2; diarrhoeal diseases, 6; alcoholism, 3; cancer, 3; bronchitis, 10; aneurism, 3; meningitis and encephalitis, 6; all diseases of the brain and nervous system, 1; cirrhosis and hepatitis, 2; premature and pretermatural births, 2; drowning, 6; while the deaths from diphtheria increased 3; whooping cough, 8; typhoid fever, 6; malarial fevers, 5; inanition, 1; phthisis pulmonalis, 40; pneumonia, 10; heart diseases, 6; marasmus, tabes mesenterica and scrofula, 13; hydrocephalus and tubercular meningitis, 2; convulsions, 1; apoplexy, 2; Bright's disease and nephritis, 3; cyanosis and atelectasis, 5; surgical operations, 1; suicide 3. The number of deaths from cerebro-spinal fever, rheumatism and gout, gastritis, enteritis, and peritonitis was the same as that reported for the past week.

Deaths from the principal Zymotic Diseases, Phthisis Pulmonalis, Pneumonia, Bronchitis, and Children under five years of age, reported during the week and compared with the three preceding weeks.

Of the total number of deaths reported for the week, 85 were in institutions, 247 in tenement-houses, 153 in houses containing 3 families or less, 10 in hotels and boarding-houses, 3 in rivers, streets, boats, etc.; 9 were on the basement floor, 104 on the first, 128 on the second, 97 on the third, 54 on the fourth, 15 on the fifth, 3 on the sixth. 496 were stated to be residents of New York City, and 2 non-resident. 64 were stated to be single, 124 married, 53 widowed, and the condition of 257 was not stated; these were children who had not attained a marriageable age.

The total number of burial permits issued during the week are as follows, viz.: City deaths, 498; still-births, 39; bodies in transit, 19. Of the total burial permits issued for city deaths and still-births 38 were upon certificates received from the Coroners. 624 births, 175 marriages, 39 still-births, 498 deaths, 19 applications for transit permits were recorded, indexed, and tabulated. 63 searches of the registers of births, marriages, and deaths were made, and 7 transcripts of the birth record, 5 of marriage, and 28 of death were issued during the week.

The mean temperature for the week ending October 4, 1879, was 66.8 degrees Fahr., the mean reading of the barometer was 30.095, the mean humidity was 74, saturation being 100, the number of miles traveled by the wind was 582, and the total amount of rain-fall was 0.16 inch depth of water, as reported by D. Draper, Director of the New York Meteorological Observatory, Central Park.

The disposition of 483 deaths and still-births, or 89.94 per cent. of the total number reported, was in the following 14 cemeteries: Bayside (Jewish), 13; Calvary (Roman Catholic), 187; City (pauper burial ground—undenominational), 55; Greenwood (undenominational), 31; Lutheran (undenominational), 77; Cypress Hills (undenominational), 27; Evergreen (undenominational), 41; Woodlawn (undenominational), 18; St. Michael's (Protestant Episcopal), 5; Union (Methodist Protestant), 3; Holy Cross (Roman Catholic), 11; Machpelah, L. DEPARTMENT OF BUILDINGS.

[BOARD OF EXAMINERS.]

At a meeting of the Board of Examiners, held pursuant to call of the Superintendent of Buildings, at the office of the Department of Buildings, No. 2 Fourth avenue, on Tuesday, the 7th day of October, 1879, at 3 o'clock, P. M.

There being present thereat, Superintendent Henry J. Dudley, Edwin Dobbs, and Henry Dudley at opening of meeting, 3 P. M., Messrs. John Banta and James M. McLean subsequently appearing and participating in the proceedings.

Superintendent Henry J. Dudley presiding.

The Chairman submitted for the action of the Board the hereinafter named petitions and applications, to wit:

Petition of S. L. Berrian, architect, for and on behalf of A. E. Putnam, owner, for permission to so far vary the provisions of the Building Law, in the proposed alteration of the two-story brick building on west side of Independence avenue, 100 feet north of Washington avenue, Spuyten Duyvil, as will permit the second story of the extension thereto to be built with walls of but eight inches in thickness, in conformity with Alteration Plans and Specifications No. 1,034, filed relative thereto September 11, 1879. Which petition was, upon motion, granted—Messrs. Dobbs, Henry Dudley, and Chairman Dudley, voting in the affirmative.

Petition of J. H. Valentine, architect, for and on behalf of James E. Ray, owner and builder, for permission, in the erection of six three-story and basement brick and brown-stone front dwellings on premises south side of Sixty-ninth street, 175 feet east of Second avenue (each 16 feet 8 inches by 45 feet, 46 feet in height), to be allowed to so far vary the provisions of the Building Law as will permit the inside walls (of the said six buildings) but eight inches in thickness from the top of the parlor up, the same to be with good materials, and the beams to be alternated, in conformity with New Building Plans and Specifications No. 688, filed relative thereto August 30th, 1879. Which petition was, on motion, denied—Messrs. Dobbs, Henry Dudley, and the Chairman, H. J. Dudley, voting to deny the same.

Petition of J. B. Tallman, architect, for and on behalf of Jesse Baldwin, owner, for permission, in the erection of a two-story brick stable, 25 feet by 75 feet, 25 feet in height, on front of premises No. 124 East Fifty-fifth street, to be allowed to so far vary the provisions of the Building Law as will permit the two side walls of the same, from the top of the first tier of beams up, only eight inches in thickness, in conformity with New Building Plans and Specifications No. 723, filed relative thereto September 18, 1879. Which petition was, upon motion, and on a division, granted—Mr. Edwin Dobbs voting in the negative; Mr. Henry Dudley, and the Chairman, H. J. Dudley, voting in the affirmative.

Petition of James E. Ware, architect, on behalf of Mrs. W. D. Wilson, owner, for permission, in the proposed alteration and extension to the three-story brick dwelling No. 5 West One Hundred and Thirtieth street, to be allowed to so far vary the provisions of the Building Law, as will permit the walls of the one-story extension, proposed to be built thereto, to be constructed above the basement thereof but eight inches in thickness, in conformity with Alteration Plans and Specifications No. 1,032, filed relative thereto September 9, 1879. Which petition was, upon motion, granted—Messrs. Henry Dudley, Edwin Dobbs, and the Chairman, H. J. Dudley, voting in the affirmative.

Petition of Isaac Bell, Vice-President of the Old Dominion Steamship Company, relative to the application of the said company, for permission to erect a temporary frame freight shed, with a felt and gravel roof, on Pier No. 1, North river (to be 30 x 100 and 12 feet in height), and asking that in the erection of the same, they may be exempted from so much of the conditions of the application as requires the sides and ends of the structure to be covered with iron or other metal (the company stipulating to take down and remove the structure within six months after its erection). Application and Plan No. 596, filed September 25, 1879. Which petition was submitted, and relative thereto, it was, upon motion,

Resolved, That the Old Dominion Steamship Company be permitted to construct a temporary frame structure, 100 feet long, 30 feet wide, 12 feet high, on Pier No. 1, North river, for the protection of perishable freight, the said structure to remain until the repairs now being made to their Pier, No. 37, North river, by the Dock Department, are completed; but said shed shall not be permitted to remain on said pier longer than six months from this date, according to stipulation on file in Department of Buildings, relative thereto.

Petition of Edward Denby, builder, on behalf of George H. Hilge, owner, for permission, in the proposed alteration of the two-story brick stable on premises No. 89 Horatio street, and the erection of a two-story brick extension thereto, 12 x 6 feet, and 16 feet in height, to be allowed to so far vary the provisions of the Building Law as will permit the side walls of same, which are to be but 6 feet in depth and 16 feet in height, to be built above the foundation: only eight (8) inches in thickness, in conformity with Alteration Plans and Specifications relative thereto No. 1,055, filed September 17, 1879. Which petition was, upon motion, granted—Messrs. E. Dobbs, Henry Dudley, and Chairman H. J. Dudley voting in the affirmative.

Petition of Hugh Lamb, of firm Lamb & Wheeler, architects, for and on behalf of Francis S. Kinney, owner, for permission, in the erection of a four-story brick factory building (for light manufacturing purposes) on the north side of West Twenty-second street, 200 feet distant westerly from Tenth avenue, to be 149 feet front and rear, 99 feet in depth, 54 feet in height, to be allowed to so far vary or deviate from the provisions of the Building Law as will permit the use of the party walls of the adjoining buildings on the easterly and westerly sides of the premises described, by adding a 12-inch brick wall to the cellar of each and lining up with 8 inches of brickwork the walls above same, all to be thoroughly anchored to present walls, in conformity with New Building Plans and Specifications No. 740, filed relative thereto September 25, 1879. Which petition was, upon motion, granted—Messrs. J. M. McLean, Henry Dudley, Edwin Dobbs, and the Chairman, H. J. Dudley, voting in the affirmative.

Petition of Charles Sturtzkober, architect, for and on behalf of A. and F. Stern, owners, for permission, in the proposed alteration of the three-story brick store and dwelling No. 47 Avenue B, and the erection of a one-story brick 17 x 20 extension thereto (11 feet in height), to be allowed to so far vary the provisions of the Building Law as will permit the walls of the said extension to be constructed of the thickness of eight (8) inches only, excepting the wall on the southerly side, which will be twelve (12) inches in thickness, in conformity with Alteration Plans and Specifications No. 1,059, filed relative thereto September 18, 1879. Which petition was upon motion granted—Messrs. J. Banta, E. Dobbs, H. Dudley, J. M. McLean, and Chairman Dudley voting in the affirmative.

Application of W. H.
