The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending November 25, 1876: The total number of inspections made by the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors was 1,254, as follows, viz.: 4 public buildings, 576 tenement-houses, 72 private dwellings, 37 other dwellings, 9 manufactories and workshops, 10 stores and warehouses, 43 stables, 63 slaughterhouses, 3 fat-rendering establishments, 10 manure-dumps, 1 stock yard, 1 sausage factory, 1 distillery, 12 sunken and vacant lots, 63 yards, courts, and areas, 74 cellars and basements, 112 waste-pipes and drains, 112 privies and water-closets, 33 street-gutters and sidewalks, 17 dangerous stairways, 3 dangerous chimneys, 7 other nuisances, together with 1 visit to case of contagious disease.

The number of reports thereon received from the Inspectors was 446.

During the past week 58 complaints were received from citizens, and referred to the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.

Permits were issued to the consignees of 39 vessels to discharge cargoes, on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port.

40 permits were granted scavengers to empty, clean, and disinfect privy-sinks.

The Disinfecting Corps have visited 22 premises where contagious diseases where found, and have disinfected and fumigated 19 houses, 19 privy-sinks, together with clothing, bedding, etc.

1 case of small-pox was removed to hospital by the Ambulance Corps.

During the week ending November 25, 1876, there were issued from this Bureau 413 burial permits for city deaths, 18 for bodies in transitu, and 44 for the interment of still-born infants. There were recorded 413 deaths, 117 marriages, 498 births, 44 still-births, 18 applications for transit permits, and 50 returns from Coroners. There were 24 searches of the registers of births, marriages and deaths, and 5 transcripts of birth record, 2 of marriage, and 17 of death, were issued from this Bureau. from this Bureau.

SIR—During the week ending Saturday, November 25, 1876, 413 deaths were registered in this Bareau, being a decrease of 2 as compared with the preceding week, and 79 less than the number reported the corresponding week of 1875. The actual number of deaths which occurred during the week ending November 18 was 426, which is 62.8 below the average for the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 20.75 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,067,558.

The deaths reported during the past compared with the week previous, showed a decrease of 5 deaths from zymotic diseases, 22 from local diseases, 2 from measles, 2 from diphtheria, 1 from whooping cough, 1 from typhoid fever, 3 from diarrhœal diseases, 16 from pneumonia, 6 from diseases of the heart, 5 from diseases of the nervous system, 1 from Bright's disease, and an increase of 2 from scarlatina, 4 from membranous croup, 1 from typhus fever, 1 from puerperal diseases, 7 from cancer, and 8 from phthisis pulmonalis. Compared with the corresponding week of the year 1875, there were 41 less deaths from zymotic diseases, 10 from small-pox, 6 from measles, 20 from diphtheria, 6 from membranous croup, and 1 from typhoid fever, while scarlatina increased 16, whooping cough 1, and typhus fever 1.

There were 2,097 deaths reported in this city during the past five weeks, of which 2 were from small-pox, 13 from measles, 69 from scarlatina, 108 from diphtheria, 50 from membranous croup, 20 from whooping cough, 1 from typhus fever, 40 from typhoid fever, and 380 from phthisis pulmonalis. This mortality compares favorably with the number of deaths reported during the corresponding five weeks of 1875; it shows the diminution of the mortality in the present compared with the corresponding five weeks of last year of 269, of which 69 deaths were of small-pox, 1 of measles, 117 of diphtheria, and 51 of membranous croup, and an increase of 10 of whooping cough, 3 of typhoid fever, 13 of phthisis pulmonalis, and 40 from scarlatina.

The mean temperature for the week was 42.9 degrees Fahr., the mean humidity was 89, saturation being represented by 100: the mean reading of the barometer was 29.771 inches, the total number of miles traveled by the wind was 580, and the amount of rain-fall was 1.09 inches, as reported by D. Draper, Director of the Meteorological Observatory, Central Park.
